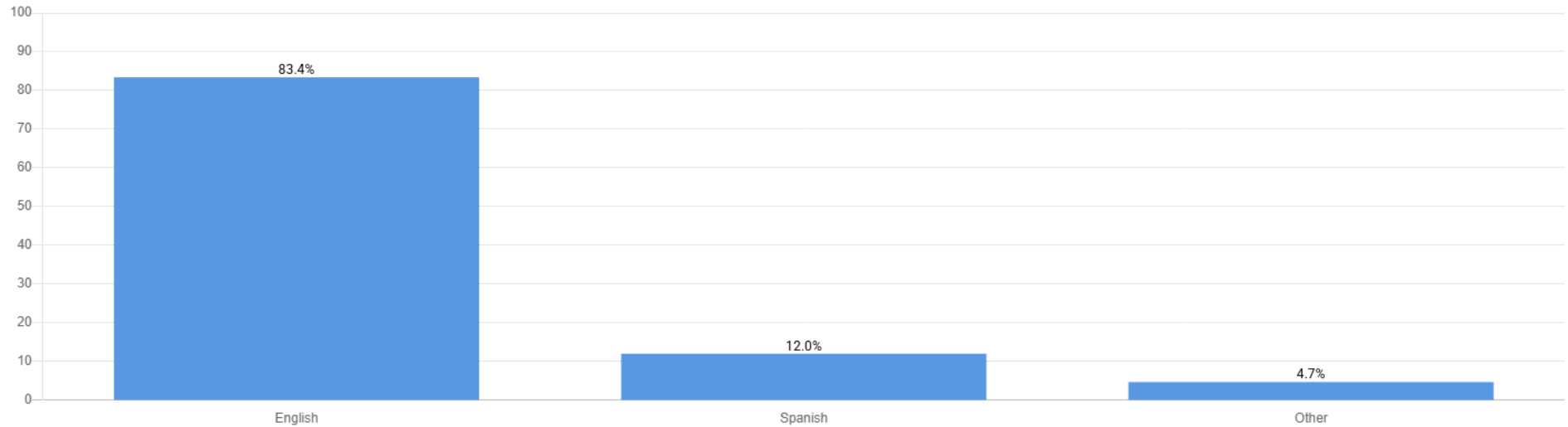

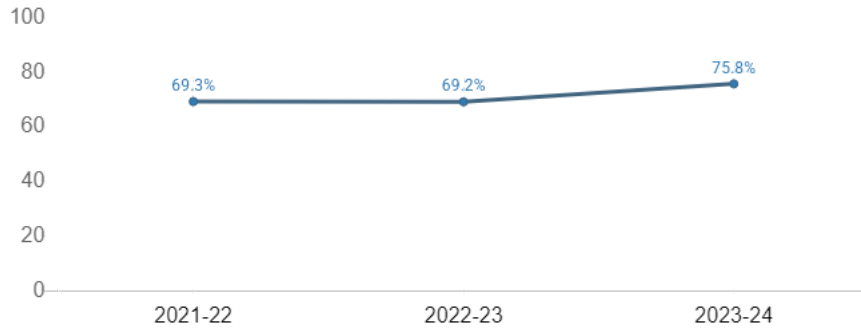

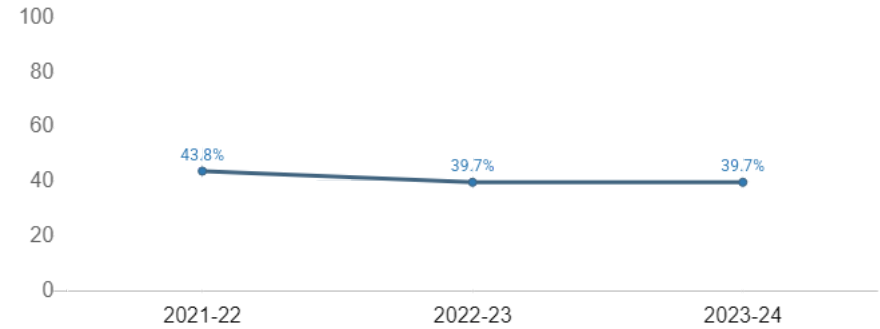
English Language Arts and Mathematics Performance Trends

These graphs show trends in the Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability over the last three years. The data includes the results of students taking both the New Jersey Student Learning Assessment (NJSLA) and the DLM alternate assessment for English language arts (ELA) and mathematics. The Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability measures the percentage of students who met or exceeded expectations on the assessments (NJSLA or DLM) with an adjustment made if the participation rate is below 95% to ensure reporting on at least 95% of students. Students who were enrolled for less than half a school year are excluded from performance results. 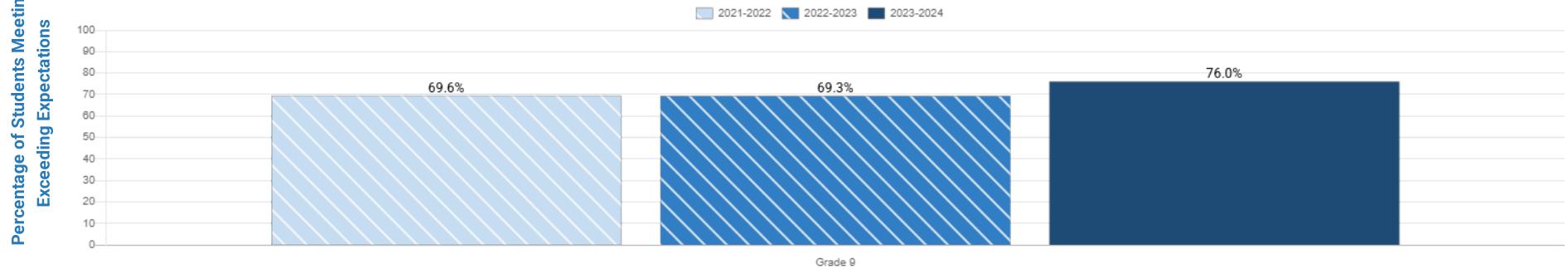

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Mathematics Assessment - Participation and Performance

This table shows performance on statewide assessments for mathematics both overall and by student group. It includes the results of students taking both the NJSLA and DLM. NJSLA results include students taking end-of-grade assessments in grades 3 through 8, as well as end-of-course assessments (Algebra I, Geometry, Algebra II) in middle school and high school. High school mathematics assessment results include all results for Algebra I and Geometry and/or Algebra II results only for students who took Algebra I in middle school and who are enrolled in their first high school mathematics course that corresponds to an end-of-course assessment. 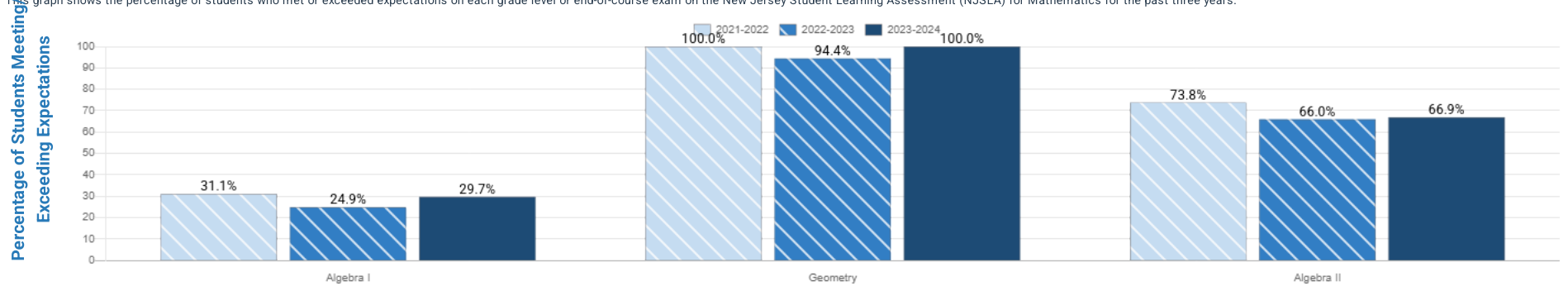

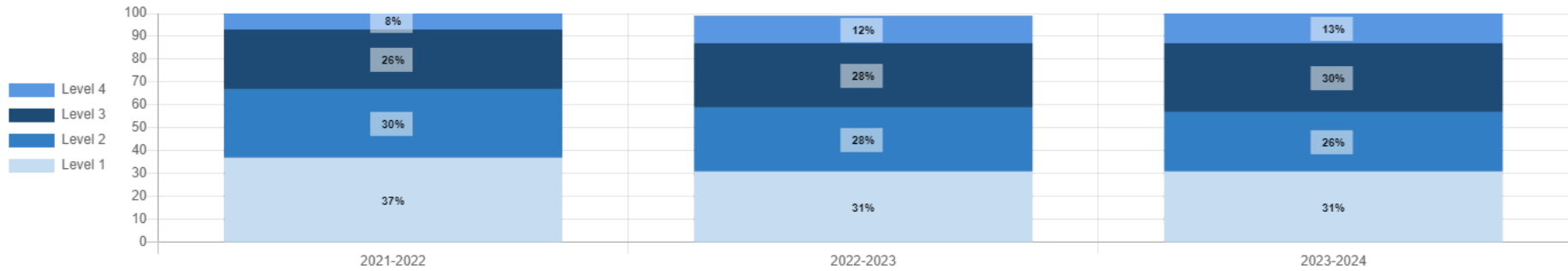
Academic Achievement

The New Jersey Student Learning Assessment for Science (NJSLA-S) measures student proficiency with the New Jersey Student Learning Standards for Science. All students in grades 5, 8, and 11 take the NJSLA-Science assessment. Students receive a score of Level 1, 2, 3, or 4 where levels 3 and 4 represent proficiency. 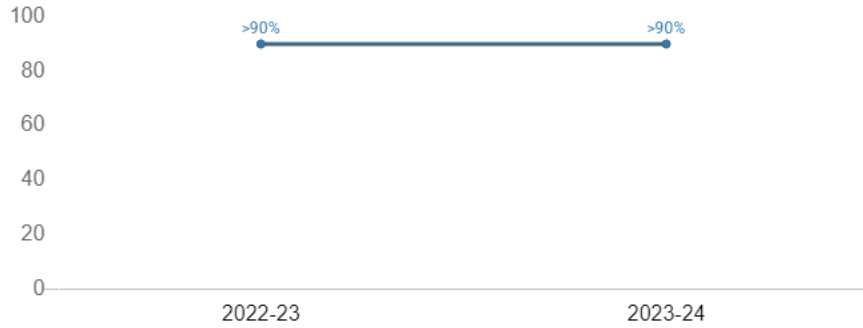

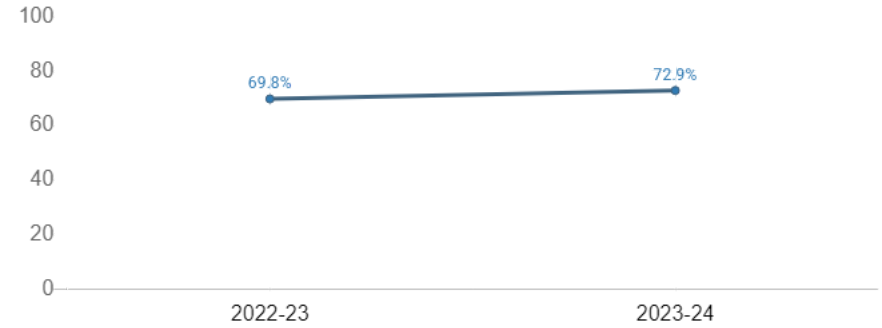

Students taking one or more AP or IB exam

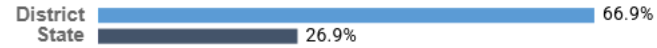

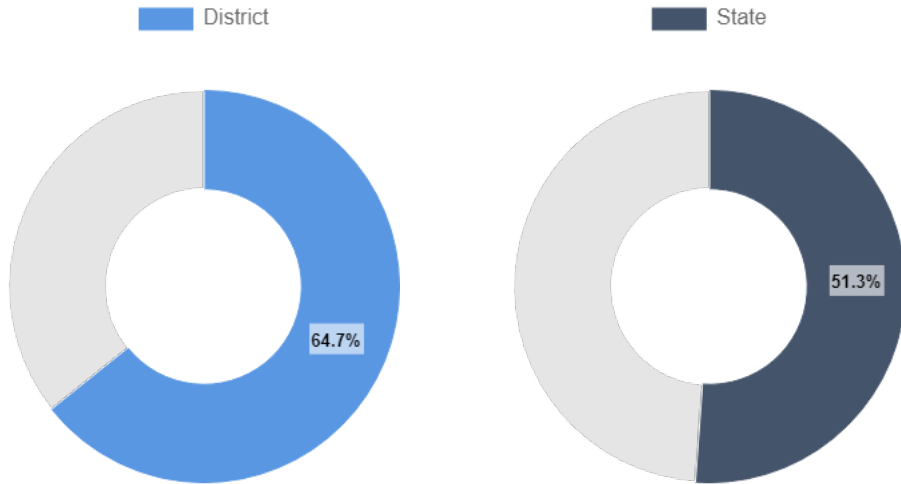

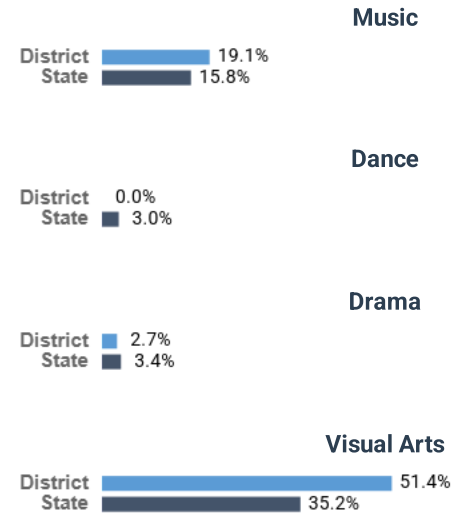

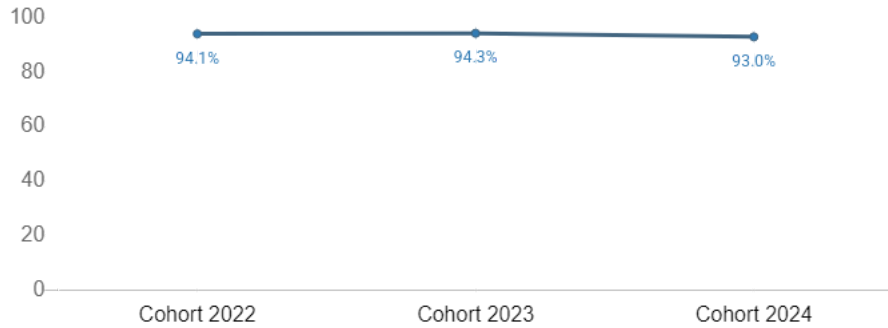

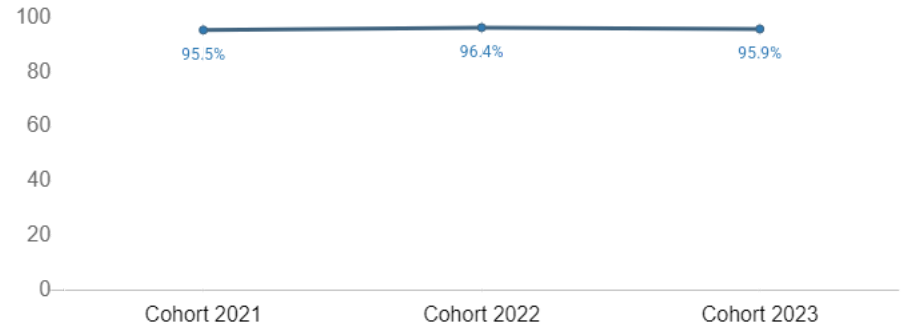

Graduation/ Postsecondary

Information about students enrolling in colleges and universities after graduation is collected from the [National Student Clearinghouse \(NSC\)](#), which collects data from at least 97% of higher education institutions nationwide. New Jersey graduates are matched to postsecondary enrollment data by NSC each year. While most students who enroll in a postsecondary institution each year are able to be matched by NSC, there are some students each year who cannot be matched. Some reasons that students may not be matched are: 1. Postsecondary enrollment cannot be shared with the NJDOE if students request a FERPA block on their postsecondary enrollment records; 2. Students who attend a college or university outside of the United States are not included in NSC data; 3. Certain colleges or universities may not participate in sharing data with NSC or may fail to report data for a certain semester or a certain group of students; and 4. NSC may not be able to match a student's name or date of birth in NJ SMART to the information provided by the postsecondary institution(s) with a high level of confidence.

In 2023, NSC implemented an additional manual review process to reduce the number of students who do not match due to #4 above, which may result in NSC matching additional students to postsecondary records moving forward. As a result, the NJDOE is not including trend data from prior to 2022-2023 in the reports.

Note for 2023-2024: Postsecondary enrollment data for the 2023-2024 school year is not yet available. The NJDOE expects to release the data in the coming months. Please refer to the 2022-2023 reports for the most recently available postsecondary enrollment rates.

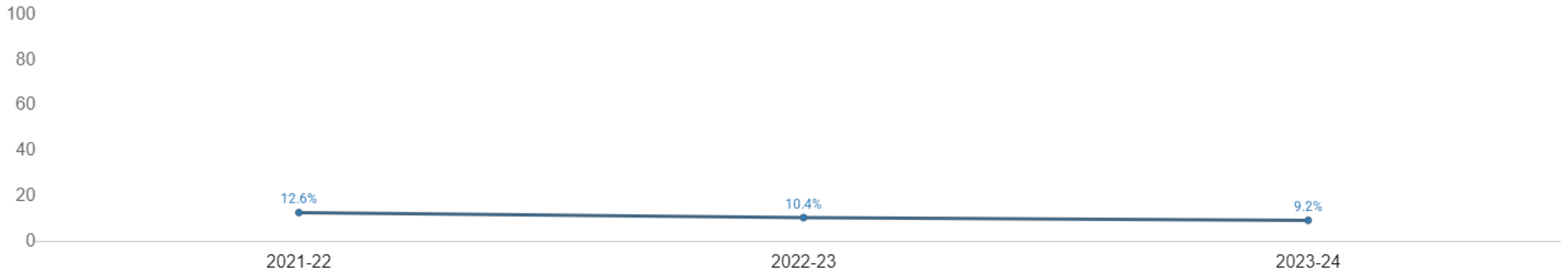

Climate and Environment

The NJDOE used input from stakeholders to select chronic absenteeism as its measure of school quality and student success for the ESSA accountability plan. **Chronic absenteeism** is defined as being absent for 10% or more of the days enrolled during the school year. A student who is not present for any reason, whether excused, unexcused, or for disciplinary action, is considered absent unless permitted by state statute or regulations. Students with fewer than 45 days in membership are excluded from attendance calculations.

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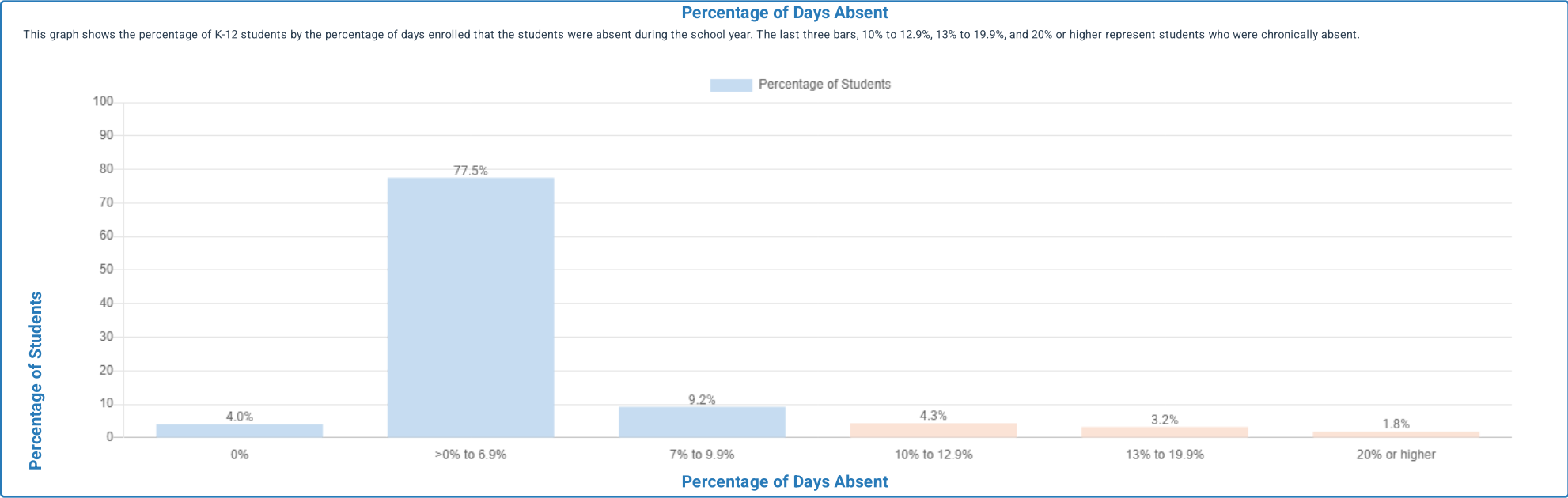

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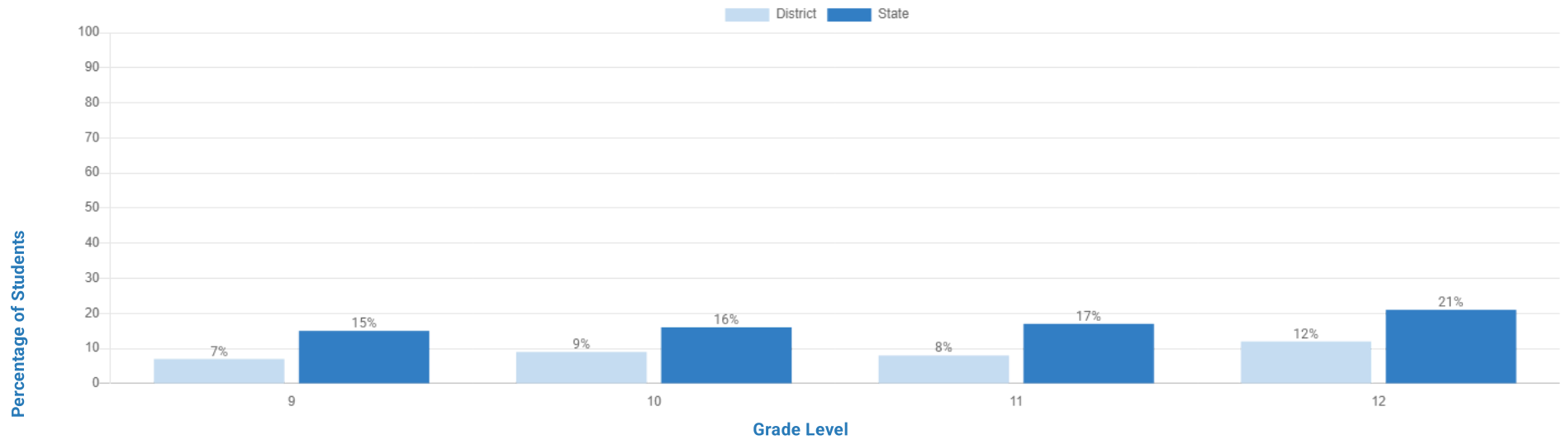


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Chronic Absenteeism by Grade

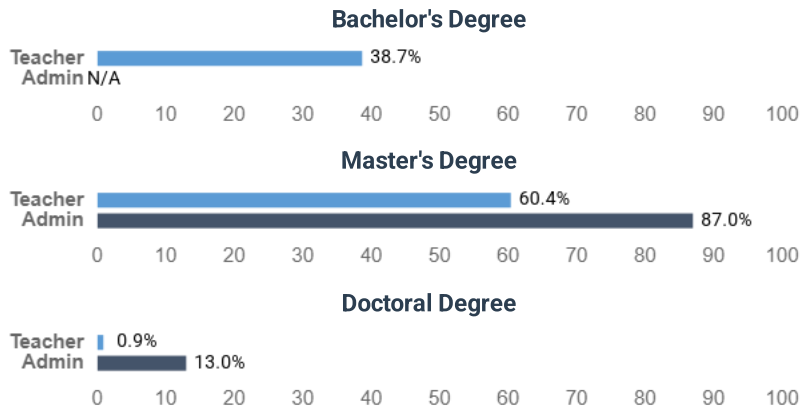

- HCRHS strives to offer something for everyone - unique courses in multiple levels, over 100 clubs & activities driven by student interest, and 18 different types of sports including Unified Sports.
- The district offers a wide variety of courses with over 50 dual enrollment options for college credit, 4 specialized magnet programs & over 20 AP courses. Over 40% of teachers have advanced degrees.



Mission, Vision, Theme:

Hunterdon Central is an innovative educational community dedicated to the intellectual, social, and emotional safety and growth of all students. While fostering curiosity and promoting wellness, we aspire to create powerful learning experiences, establish strong partnerships, and serve as contributing members of society." The District has a proud tradition of innovation. At many times in our history, Hunterdon Central has served as an example to schools throughout the state and the nation. We believe in an inclusive environment for all students, striving to offer something for everyone.



Awards, Recognition, Accomplishments:

HCRHS is a two time Blue Ribbon School of Excellence, a three time New Jersey Star School, and the recipient of 14 Best Practice Awards from the NJ Dept. of Education. The District was named to the AP Honor Roll for Expanding Opportunities and Improving Performance of AP Students in 2011, 2012, 2014, 2015, 2016, 2023 and 2024. Each year, students are selected in the National Merit Scholarship Program and recognized as AP Scholars. Our World Language program has been recognized as a Model Program by the NJ Department of Education. Numerous staff achievements from County Teacher of the Year to department specific recognitions such as Outstanding Chemistry Teacher of the Year have been bestowed on our incredible staff.

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Courses, Curriculum, Instruction:

HCRHS offers an academically rigorous and diverse curriculum that includes over 70 AP and honors courses, over 50 dual enrollment opportunities, and other specialized programs that meet the needs of all of our students, including Special Education and Multilingual Learners (MLs). HCRHS has Gifted & Talented programs with accelerated pathways in both Mathematics and Art. In addition, the school has four magnet programs in Architecture, Biomedical Sciences, Computer Science, and Robotics. Individualized and alternative pathways utilizing capstone opportunities, Option Two, and independent study offer options for academic achievement, developed to meet the needs of a diverse student population and to give students greater flexibility and autonomy in their learning. HCRHS has various models of tutorial support for all students, including specific support for MLs, students requiring testing support, and AP students.



Sports and Athletics:

Sports Offered: Baseball (Boys), Basketball (Boys & Girls), Bowling (Boys & Girls), Cheerleading (Girls), Cross Country (Boys & Girls), Fencing (Boys & Girls), Field Hockey (Girls), Football (Boys), Golf (Boys & Girls), Gymnastics (Girls), Ice Hockey (Boys), Lacrosse (Boys & Girls), Soccer (Boys & Girls), Softball (Girls), Swimming (Boys & Girls), Tennis (Boys & Girls), Track and Field - Spring (Boys & Girls), Track and Field - Winter (Boys & Girls), Volleyball (Boys & Girls), Wrestling (Boys & Girls)

HCRHS is a member of the NJSIAA, Skyland Conference, Hunterdon/Warren/Sussex (HWS) Athletic Association, and Big Central Football Conference. The Athletic Department offers 34 interscholastic sports, is a 2 time winner of the Star-Ledger Cup and 3 time winner of the ShopRite Cup for Excellence in Athletics, Academics & Sportsmanship. In 2023-2024, the Red Devils were Hunterdon-Warren-Sussex champions in Boys Golf, Girls Lacrosse, Boys Soccer, Boys Cross Country, Boys Wrestling, Softball, and Girls Tennis. Skyland Champions in Gymnastics, Field Hockey, Girls Volleyball, and Boys Golf. NJSIAA Group V Sectional Championships in Boys Wrestling.



Clubs and Activities:

HCRHS strives to engage as many students as possible in co-curricular activities. The comprehensive activities program provides opportunities for students to explore their interests and enhance their development beyond the standard curriculum of academic courses. The District offers over 100 clubs and activities, developed to appeal to a wide range of student interests, including award-winning arts programs, student government, STEM groups, and community service organizations.

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Before and After School Programs:

HCRHS offers a drop-in after school program for students in the ML Programs. The after-school program meets 1 day per week for approximately 2 hours. Students are MLs of levels 1 through 4, ages 14 to 19. The program is supervised by supervisor of World Languages and ML programs, and designed by two ESL teachers. ESL teachers staff the program every week. Students may drop in for help with homework or social/emotional support. Regular program activities such as enrichment crafts, games and intramural sport activities are also provided.



Staff and Professional Learning:

HCRHS offers a staff training program that has achieved state & national recognition from The National Center for Public Productivity at Rutgers, The N.J. Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development and the U.S. Department of Education Professional Development National Awards. HCRHS offers an innovative professional learning program with summer workshops and opportunities for personalized professional learning. Staff and administrators are frequent presenters at state and regional conferences. Staff are offered a variety of different in-house training opportunities through professional development offered during the school day and after school, content-focused department workshops, and a robust Professional Learning Communities model. In addition, selected HCRHS teachers and staff serve in the capacity of "Instructional Design Assistant," a teacher leadership and instructional coaching structure.



Postsecondary Information:

HCRHS offers comprehensive college admissions counseling to students and parents/guardians through a dedicated College & Career Center, in addition to grade level counseling. Multiple evening programs are offered to families to learn more about the college admissions process and financial aid. These programs are typically recorded and available on our YouTube channel for future reference. For the Class of 2024, 67% of reporting seniors planned to attend a 4 year college, 19% planned to attend a 2 year college, and 14% plan to attend trade/technical school, join the military, or begin employment.

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Student Supports and Services:

HCRHS offers a variety of student support services that includes an Intervention and Referral Services Committee, as well as a Response to Intervention program to identify and assist at-risk students.



Student Health and Wellness:

The district serves breakfast, lunch, and healthy snacks in compliance with state and federal regulations, offering students a wide variety of choices of meal components.



Parent and Community Involvement:

The district believes in the important partnership between home and school. The Home & School Association, open to all parents/guardians and staff, meets monthly to discuss a variety of topics and brainstorm ways to work together to improve programs and school climate. Parents can also become involved in our other parent organizations, such as the Booster Club and Red Devils Music Association. Parent advisory groups are formed on a as needed basis for different initiatives. The district also has a Special Education Advisory Group (SEPAG) that meets multiple times a year. To connect with the greater community, Hunterdon Central Television (HCTV) broadcasts live streams of sporting events and creates subject-specific content, highlighting our various programs and departments. All HCTV content is available through a dedicated YouTube channel. Central also launched Facebook and Instagram pages in summer 2024 to connect more with interested constituents.

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Climate Surveys:

Is a Climate Survey Used: Yes; Who is surveyed: Students, Parents, Administrators, Teachers. HCRHS utilized a version of the New Jersey School Climate Survey, with additional questions on student wellness. The survey provided data for measuring attainment of strategic planning goals.



Facilities:

HCRHS opened its doors in September 1956 and is one of the largest, campus-style high schools in N.J. The District has a 72 acre campus with two large general classroom buildings, a music and communications building housing classrooms, FM radio station and TV studio, Instructional Media Center, 280 seat Little Theater, 900 seat Auditorium, 2,000 seat Fieldhouse, 4 gymnasiums, Fitness Center, a Project Adventure course, football stadium, 8 additional playing fields, tennis courts, 3 cafeterias, and a large Commons area.



School Safety:

HCRHS has a robust security program that includes a School Safety Specialist, 1 SRO, 3 Class III officers, 5 full time security staff, and 12 duty release aides that assist in overall management and security presence. All exterior doors remain locked at all times, with access afforded to students and staff via ID swipes. Three staffed reception entrances are equipped with an ID scanning and visitor badge process. A full scope of security cameras throughout the inside and outside of the buildings assist in ongoing monitoring with remote access for specific administrators. The district has a Safety Team that meets monthly as well as a School Threat Assessment team which meets as needed. This District Safety team consists of representatives from all factions of the program. A communicative and collaborative relationship with our local police department and county law enforcement serves as a complement to our internal security program.

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Technology and STEM:

HCRHS is a 1:1 district with each student having their own district-issued Chromebook. Classrooms are wireless with full audio and video capabilities. The Instructional Media Center catalyzes innovative practices in technology and STEAM, housing a recently renovated Makerspace with a CNC machine, 3D printers and green screen, and offering multiple flexible learning spaces. HCRHS has multiple STEM programs as part of its Program of Studies, with magnet programs in Architecture, Biomedical Sciences, Computer Science, and Robotics. HCRHS offers a coding club and competitive programming club for students, and python code activities have been embedded into all Geometry classes. HCRHS also has a radio and TV recording studio supporting classroom needs and co-curricular activities. HCRHS has hosted a county-wide Hack-a-thon for community members and students, as well as STEAM showcases. Media specialists and Instructional Design Assistants provide training for teachers and staff.
