
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
## Student Growth

Student growth is a measure of how much students are learning each year. New Jersey's ESSA state plan outlines that academic progress will be measured with school's median student growth percentile (mSGP) on statewide ELA and mathematics assessments. Each individual student receives a Student Growth Percentile (SGP) for English Language Arts (ELA) in grades 4 through 8 and for Mathematics in grades 4 through 7. The SGP measures their academic progress from one year to the next compared to other students with similar prior test scores (academic peers).

A student's SGP falls between 1 and 99 and can be grouped into three levels. An SGP below 35 indicates low growth, an SGP between 35 and 65 indicates typical growth, and an SGP greater than 65 indicates high growth. If the SGPs for all students are ordered from smallest to largest, the mSGP is the percentile in the middle of the list.

The NJDOE Student Growth page has more information about SGPs and mSGPs, including a video that explains how both SGPs and mSGPs are calculated.

Important Note for 2023-24: Student growth data is not available for the 2019-2020, 2020-2021, and 2021-2022 school years due to federal waivers and assessment cancellations. An alternate measure of academic progress, or growth, called Relative School Improvement Measure (RSIM) was used for the 2021-2022 school year only.

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
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

#### **English Language Arts and Mathematics Performance Trends**

These graphs show trends in the Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability over the last three years. The data includes the results of students taking both the New Jersey Student Learning Assessment (NJSLA) and the DLM alternate assessment for English language arts (ELA) and mathematics. The Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability measures the percentage of students who met or exceeded expectations on the assessments (NJSLA or DLM) with an adjustment made if the participation rate is below 95% to ensure reporting on at least 95% of students. Students who were enrolled for less than half a school year are excluded from performance results. The table below provides participation rates, proficiency rates, annual targets and status in meeting the targets, and statewide proficiency rates.

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
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
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
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# Climate and Environment

Student absences provide important information about a school's culture and climate. Research shows that absences impact a student's ability to succeed in school. The NJDOE used input from stakeholders to select chronic absenteeism as its measure of school quality and student success for the ESSA accountability plan. **Chronic absenteeism** is defined as being absent for 10% or more of the days enrolled during the school year. A student who is not present for any reason, whether excused, unexcused, or for disciplinary action, is considered absent unless permitted by state statute or regulations. Students with fewer than 45 days in membership are excluded from attendance calculations.



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# Climate and Environment

Student absences provide important information about a school's culture and climate. Research shows that absences impact a student's ability to succeed in school. The NJDOE used input from stakeholders to select chronic absenteeism as its measure of school quality and student success for the ESSA accountability plan. **Chronic absenteeism** is defined as being absent for 10% or more of the days enrolled during the school year. A student who is not present for any reason, whether excused, unexcused, or for disciplinary action, is considered absent unless permitted by state statute or regulations. Students with fewer than 45 days in membership are excluded from attendance calculations.









For purposes of ESSA accountability, only schools and student groups with data for 20 or more students are included in calculations.

The NJDOE only identified schools for TSI status based on data from the 2023-2024 school year.

- The district consistently is recognized as a top elementary school in Salem County. We are considered a small school based on enrollment but we provide an excellent educational experience.



Mission, Vision, Theme:

"The Mannington Township Board of Education is committed to providing a system of education which facilitates the development of the potential of every student. The Mannington Township Board of Education offers equal education opportunities in accordance with the student's abilities and needs, consistent with available resources. This mission statement enables Mannington Township School District to not only meet, but exceed the expectations set forth by the New Jersey Department of Education. Promoting integrity, academic excellence, and productive citizenship to build a community of lifelong learners who discover the value of their potential to create a better world.



**Awards, Recognition, Accomplishments:** 

The district is ranked 1st in the county with a score of 98% for its state assessment results.



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Curricular resources include Creative Curriculum, iReady Math grades K-6, Reading Horizons K-3, Pearson Literature e-book, Lucy Calkins Units of Study, TCI Science and Social Studies, Lab AIDS, Glencoe Mathematic, Big Ideas Algebra, and multiple online resources. Teachers utilize iReady Diagnostic in both Math and ELA to determine student instructional needs along with classroom assessments and observation. Instructional best practices are used to appropriately engage all students in the learning process. The teachers are passionate about providing students instruction that meets students needs and prepares them for mastery of grade level expectations. Technology use is infused throughout the curriculum to provide students with real life experiences using technology to enhance learning. Additionally, with added emphasis on a child's social, emotional learning the district offers classroom lessons from our school Trauma Informed Coach.



The district does not offer organized athletics except through what is provided in physical education class. The community offers a recreation league with organized team sports such as field hockey and basketball. The school supports the recreation league through communication, distribution, and use of facilities when needed.



Enrichment activities are offered during the school day and after school for all interested students. Examples of offered clubs and activities include Garden Warriors, art club, band & chorus, academic league, science fair, student council, and chess club.



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School Aged Child Care is provided to families before and after school that need a safe child care alternative. The prior mentioned clubs are offered after school for children in grades PK-8. Additionally, a 6 week summer camp is offered to families in hopes of reducing the effects of summer slide.

# **Before and After School Programs:**



Staff and Professional Learning:

Staff work collaboratively in professional learning communities; identifying student needs and implementing evidence based strategies to meet student needs. They participate in a minimum of five professional development days plus six half days per year. The focus of provided professional development is based on district/State initiatives, identified student and/or staff needs as determined through data analysis. Staff participate beyond the school day in webinars and NJEA sponsored events to deepen their knowledge and grow in areas of their choice.



**Student Supports and Services:** 

The district provides academic, behavioral, social, and emotional support to teachers and families through the Intervention and Referral Team. A system of tiered supports are tailored by level and intensity to support students and foster greater success. The district in collaboration with families and physicians uses 504 plans to meet student individual needs. The district Child Study Team provides evaluation services and Individual Education Plans with specific accommodations when needed. Counseling and behaviorist services are available. The Trauma Informed coach works with both families and students to provided personalized supports. The Director of Student Services is a liaison between families and teachers to best serve the students. The Early Childhood Coordinator facilitates the Preschool Intervention and Referral Team and an Early Childhood Advisory Committee that interreacts with teachers and families to accurately review and evaluate the early childhood program.



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The district's nurse helps children and families with illnesses and injuries as well as community resources. A Positive Behavioral Intervention and Support framework is used for assisting students with their behavioral, academic, social, emotional, and mental health. Breakfast and lunch is provided everyday for any student that wishes to partake. Students in grades PK-8 all participate in health, physical education and daily recess. The district prioritizes student health and wellness beyond physical health and wellness to include social, emotional, and factors of mental health as well.



**Parent and Community Involvement:** 

The district strives to engage families in the learning process. Parents are asked to participate in classroom theme days and often to volunteer in the classroom. Community members with specific talents or experiences are used to share and work with students when available. Parents can always stay in touch with the school and their child's progress through our parent portal, OnCourse Connect, Class Dojo, and Social Media. The district also has a very active and supportive parent teacher organization called TEAM (Together in Education at Mannington). TEAM plans schoolwide events to bring the school and families together. They also are generous in helping and supporting teachers with specific classroom needs. The early childhood program includes a Parent and Community Involvement Specialist that organizes opportunities for families to grow, learn, interact, and openly communicate with the school community.



Is a Climate Survey Used: Yes; Who is surveyed: Students, Parents, Teachers. A climate survey is provided to students, staff, and families multiple times throughout the year. The survey asks the students, staff, and families about themselves, the school building, student conduct/discipline, school safety, instruction and programs, their classmates/friends, staff, and family. The survey and the results are analyzed by the School Improvement Team used to make improvements in the identified areas evident in collected data.

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# **Narrative**

The school sits on eleven acres in rural Salem County and was originally built in 1951. In 1962 the school was expanded and then in 2007 and 2008 under went renovations. All efforts are taken to ensure a safe, healthy and comfortable building. In 2018 the classrooms were outfitted with air conditioning units. Continued upgrades and updates occur to maintain a safe and healthy learning environment for students and staff. The school is the "Pride of the Community" and opens its facilities for community use, particularly the 1/3 mile walking path and exercise stations that were recently installed to provide a safe exercise space for residents.



School safety remains a priority. The use of security cameras and other safety mechanisms continue to be expanded providing for greater visibility around the school and school grounds. Safety inside and around the building is under constant review. A double locking vestibule greats guests to the building where access is only granted after an valid explanation and proper credentials. The district has an immediate notification system with law enforcement as well as a system for immediate access in the event of an emergency. As demand on our technology has increased, the infrastructure and devices have been upgraded. Go Guardian, a technology platform that allowed teachers and the computer tech to monitor student technology is in use to help keep children safe while using school devices and the internet.



Elementary level students participate in STEAM classes taught by the math/science and art/music teacher. The middle school science through the Next Gen standards is designed to incorporate science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) with connected and cohesive instruction.

Technology and STEM:



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Full Day Pre-School for three and four year olds is offered to township residents. The state approved curriculum that is used is Creative Curriculum. The use of Creative Curriculum develops a child's cognitive, social, and emotional skills to help them reach their fullest potential. Teaching Strategies Gold is used to monitor and communicate student abilities related to current developmental levels.



The district, in good faith to their mission and vision, believe that serving others is at the heart of being a productive citizen. Students work with organizations such as Meals on Wheels, Office on Aging, MAPSA, and Clean Communities using their talents to give back to the community in which they live



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Mannington Township School located in rural South Jersey is "small but mighty". It has a proud tradition of excellence and high achievement, serving resident and tuition students in Pre-Kindergarten (full day) through 8th grade. The school community has high expectations for all children and provides the necessary support to ensure every child experiences academic growth. High expectations are the reason that the students as a whole, consistently score at or above the state mean on state assessments. They are the reason that our students are accepted into private high schools and local academy programs.
