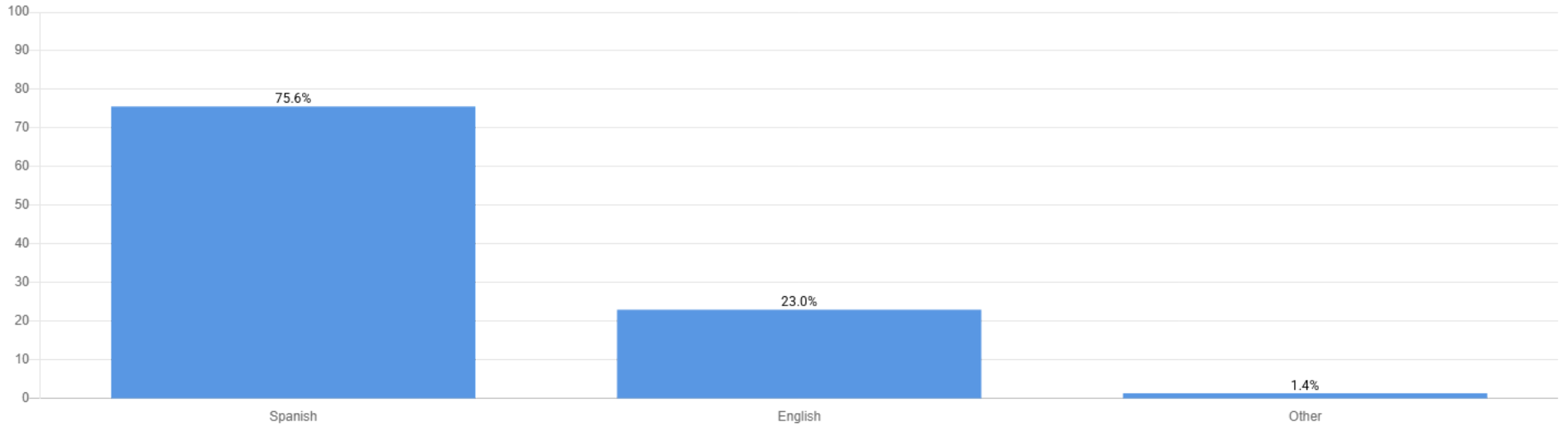

## Student Growth

Student growth is a measure of how much students are learning each year. New Jersey's ESSA state plan outlines that academic progress will be measured with school's median student growth percentile (mSGP) on statewide ELA and mathematics assessments. Each individual student receives a Student Growth Percentile (SGP) for English Language Arts (ELA) in grades 4 through 8 and for Mathematics in grades 4 through 7. The SGP measures their academic progress from one year to the next compared to other students with similar prior test scores (academic peers).

A student's SGP falls between 1 and 99 and can be grouped into three levels. An SGP below 35 indicates low growth, an SGP between 35 and 65 indicates typical growth, and an SGP greater than 65 indicates high growth. If the SGPs for all students are ordered from smallest to largest, the mSGP is the percentile in the middle of the list.

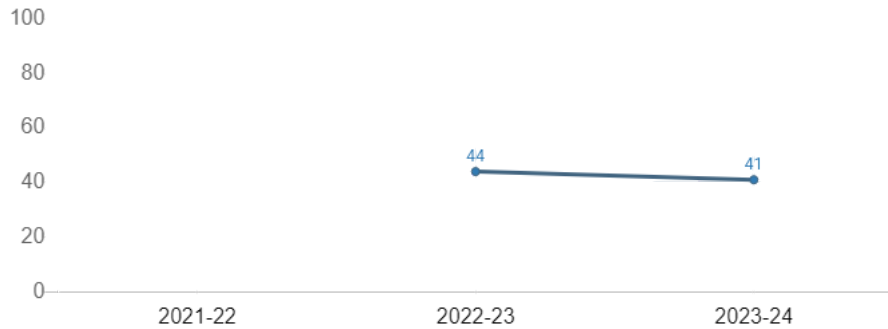

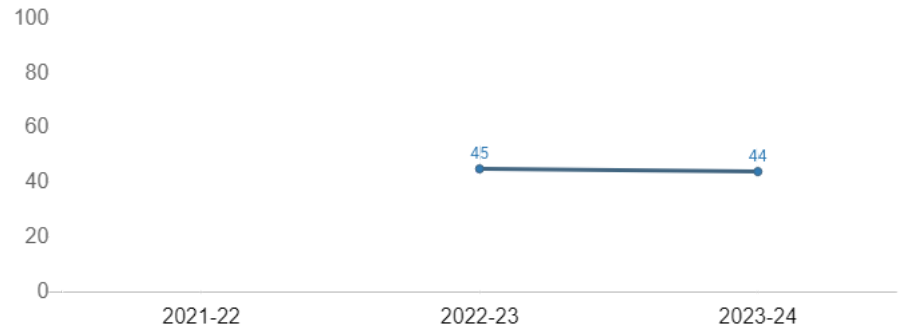

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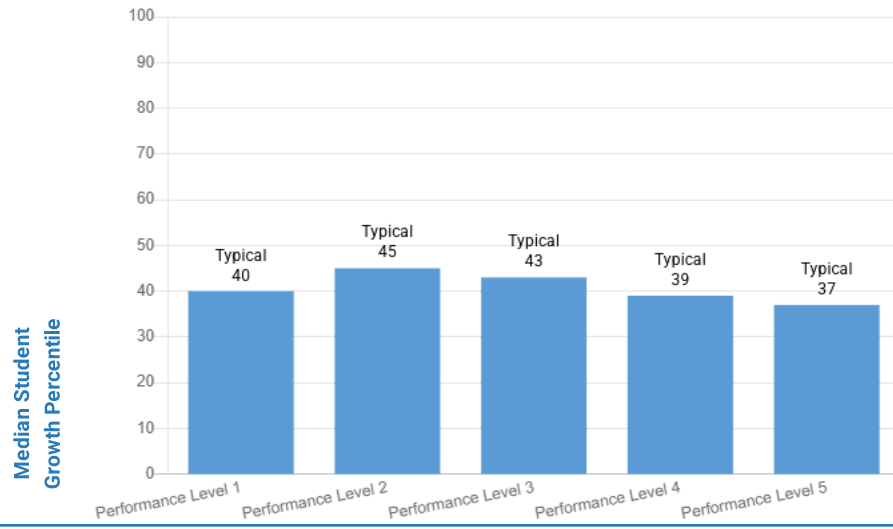
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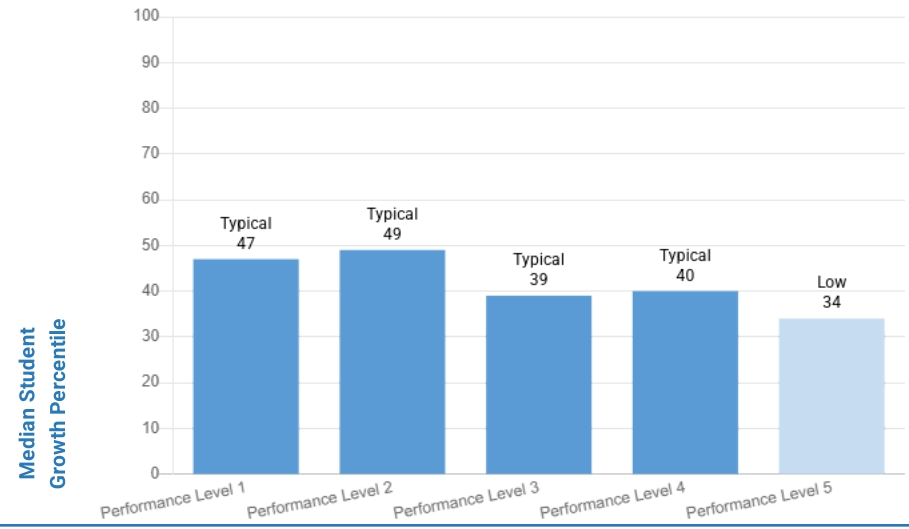

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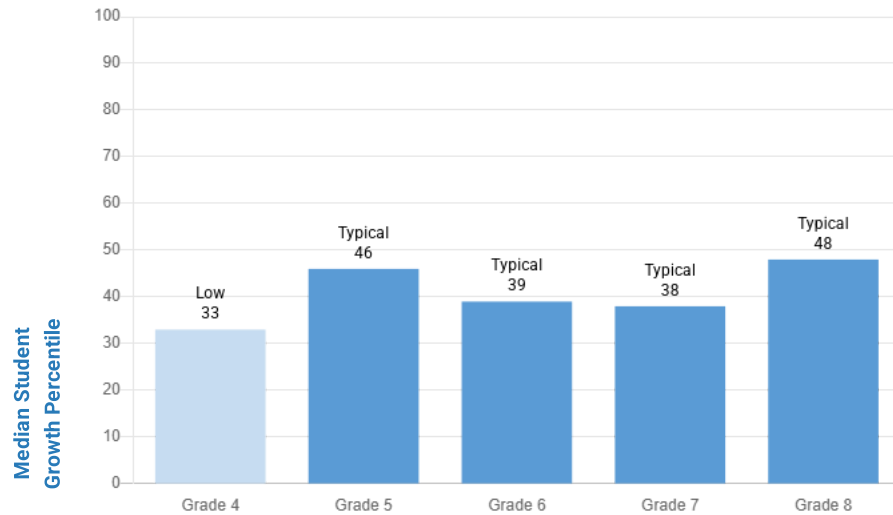
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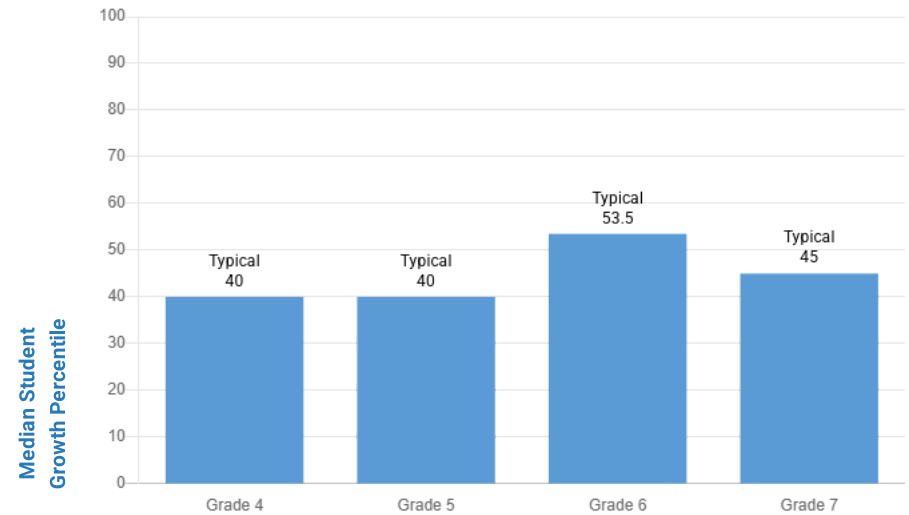
### Student Growth by Grade

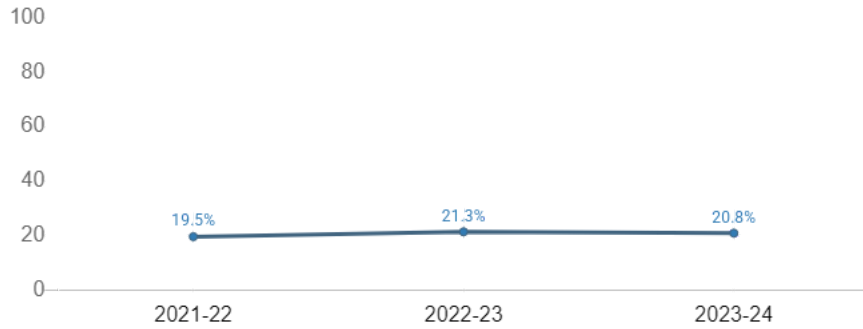

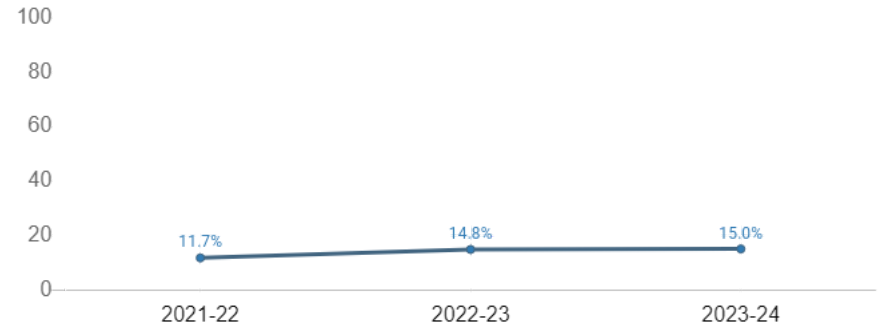
### English Language Arts and Mathematics Performance Trends

These graphs show trends in the Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability over the last three years. The data includes the results of students taking both the New Jersey Student Learning Assessment (NJSLA) and the DLM alternate assessment for English language arts (ELA) and mathematics. The Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability measures the percentage of students who met or exceeded expectations on the assessments (NJSLA or DLM) with an adjustment made if the participation rate is below 95% to ensure reporting on at least 95% of students. Students who were enrolled for less than half a school year are excluded from performance results. The table below provides participation rates, proficiency rates, annual targets and status in meeting the targets, and statewide proficiency rates.

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### English Language Arts Assessment - Participation and Performance

This table shows performance on statewide assessments for English language arts (ELA) both overall and by student group. It includes the results of students taking both the NJSLA and DLM. NJSLA results for ELA include only students in grades 3 through 9. Students who were enrolled for less than half a school year are excluded from performance results. Student are considered to have met or exceeded expectations if they score at Level 4 or 5 on the NJSLA or at Level 3 or 4 on the DLM.

This table shows both the percentage of students who met or exceeded expectations and a proficiency rate used for federal accountability. The proficiency rate for federal accountability will be lower if the participation rate is below 95%. This table also shows status in meeting annual targets. Annual targets are specific to each student group, school, and district and represent the expected proficiency needed to stay on track to meet long-term goals. Student groups where the annual target fields are grayed out are not required to meet annual targets under ESSA accountability. 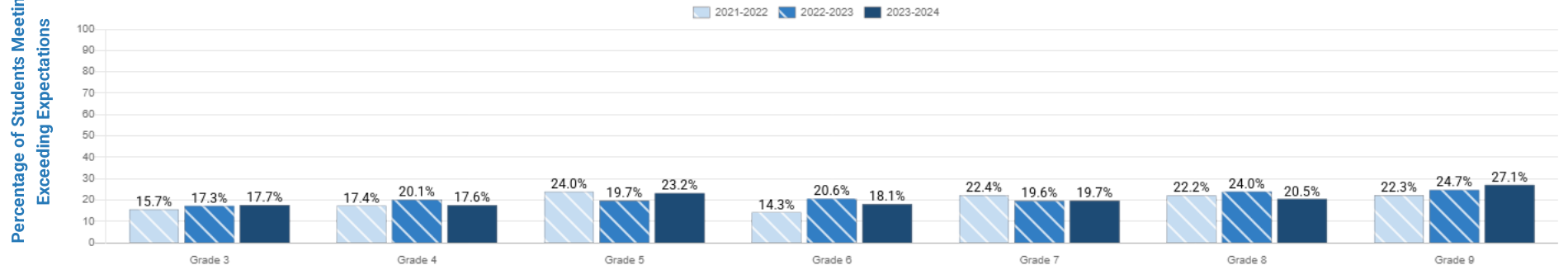

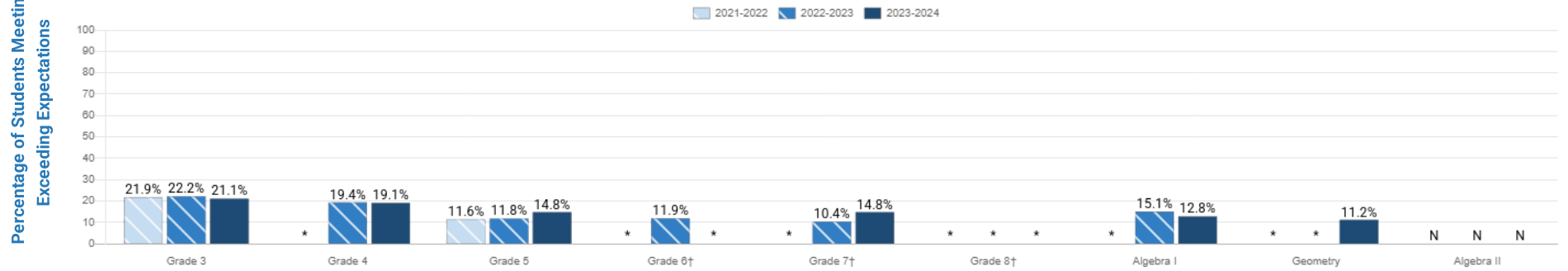

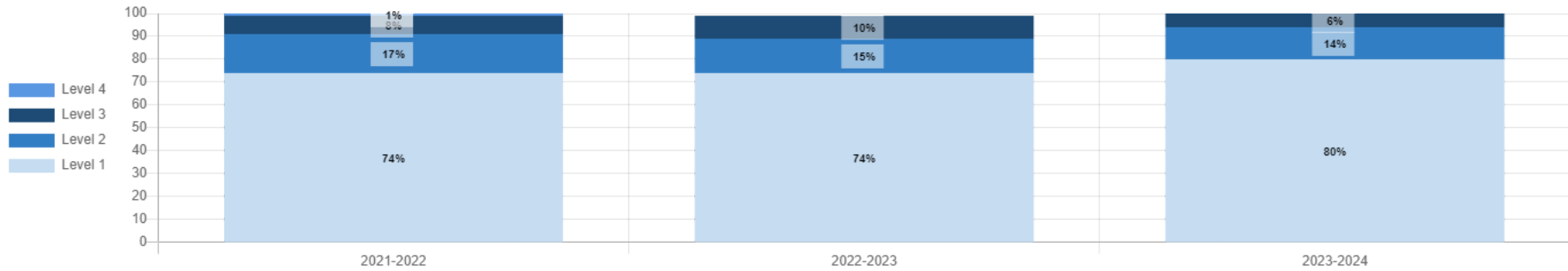

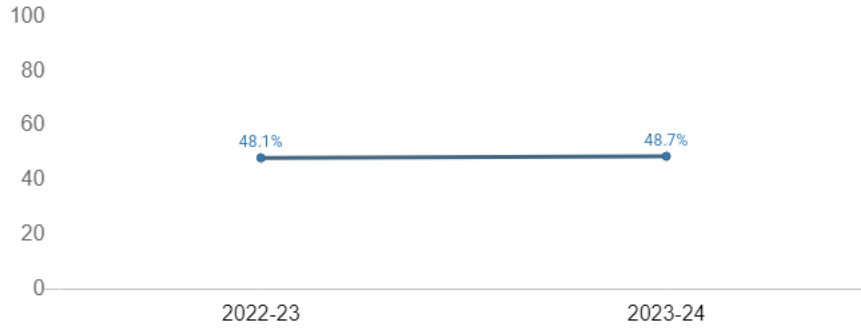

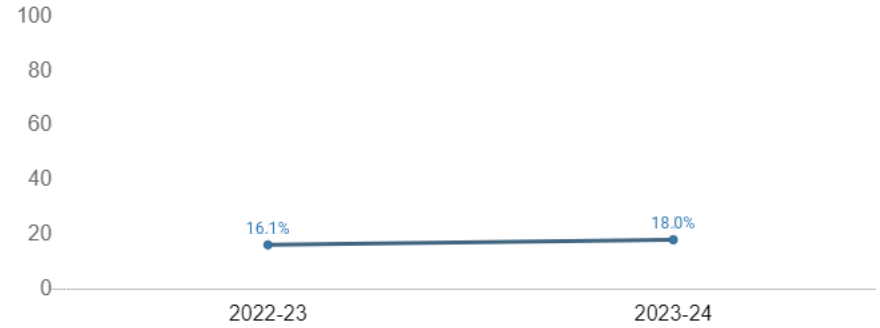

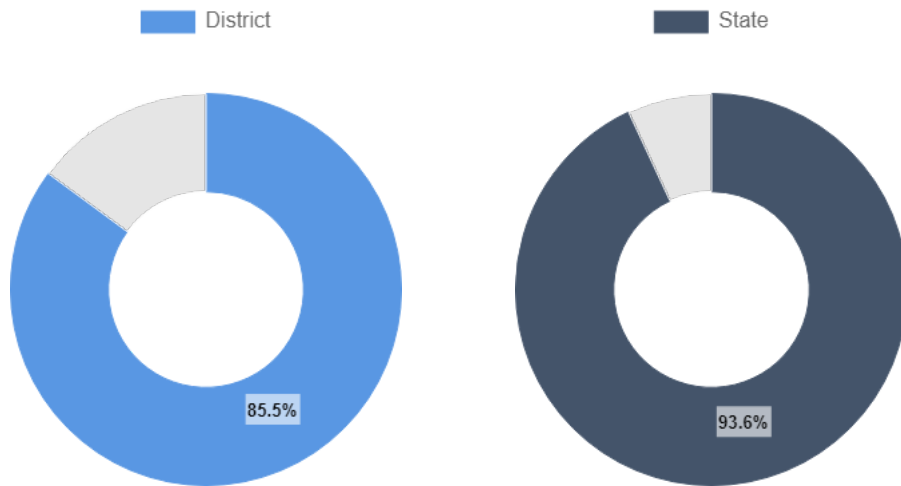

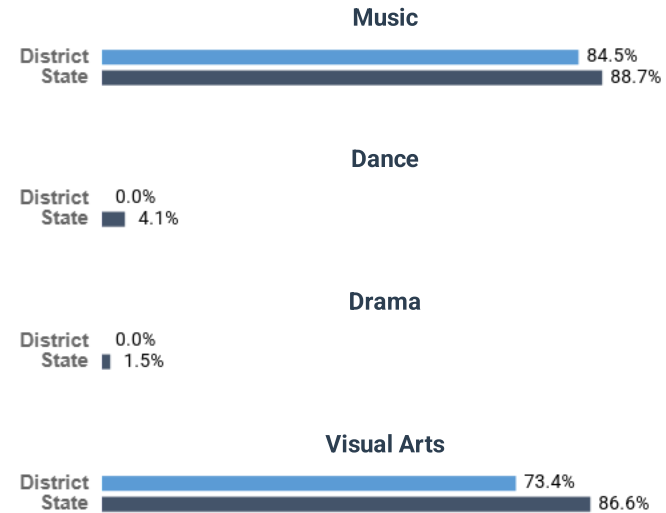

**Students enrolled in one or more classes by discipline:**



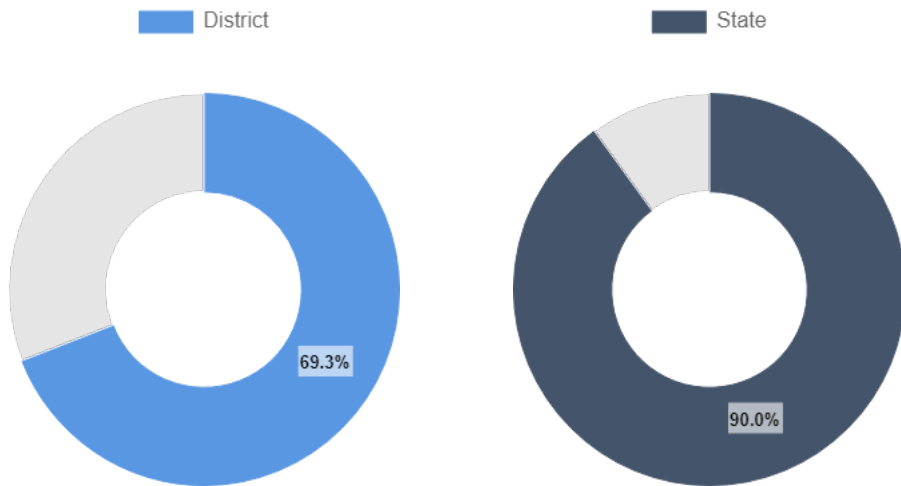

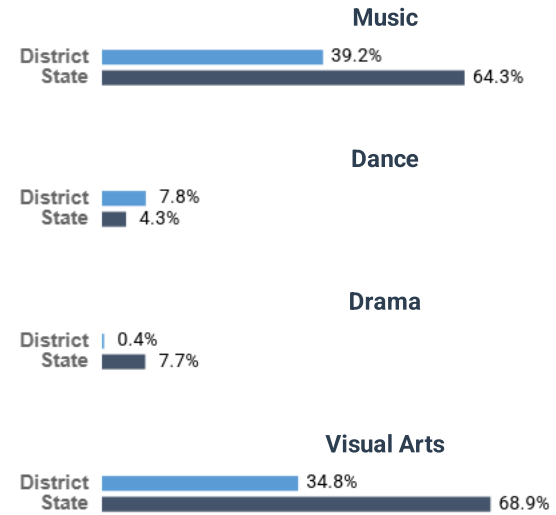

**Students enrolled in one or more classes by discipline:**



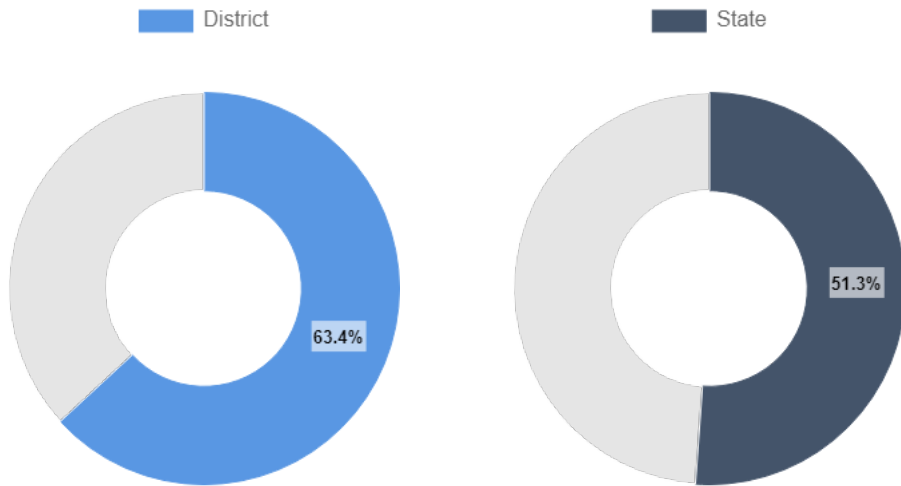

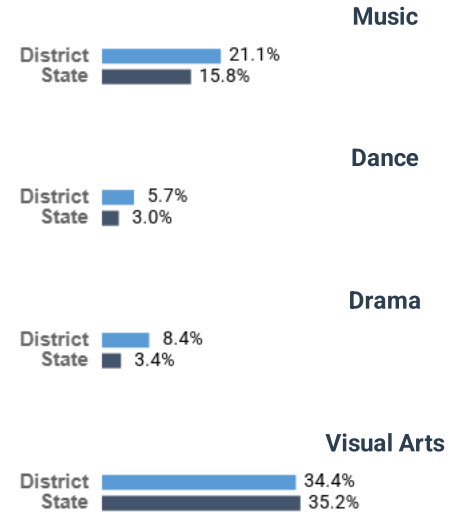

## Graduation/ Postsecondary

Graduation rates are calculated based on the adjusted cohort graduation rate calculation. Beginning in the 2020-2021 school year, the NJDOE was required to make changes to the methodology used to calculate the adjusted cohort graduation rate for federal reporting and accountability purposes. The United States Department of Education (USED) determined that the NJDOE must only include students who receive a diploma that is fully aligned with the state's standards, meaning they have met the state's graduation assessment requirements, course requirements, and local attendance requirements. This means that students with disabilities who did not meet some or all graduation requirements because of a modifications or exemption in their Individualized Education Program (IEP) may not be counted as graduates in the calculation of the adjusted cohort graduation rate used for federal reporting and accountability purposes. It is important to note that this was only a change to how graduation rates are calculated for federal reporting. It does not affect requirements to earn a diploma or the type of diploma that the state awards to students with disabilities.

As a result of these changes, the NJDOE began calculating two versions of the adjusted cohort graduation rate starting with 2021 graduation rates. The "federal version" aligns with ESSA requirements and USED guidance and is used for federal reporting and ESSA school accountability only. The "state version" continues to use the same methodology used prior to 2021 and reflects all students who received a state-endorsed diploma.

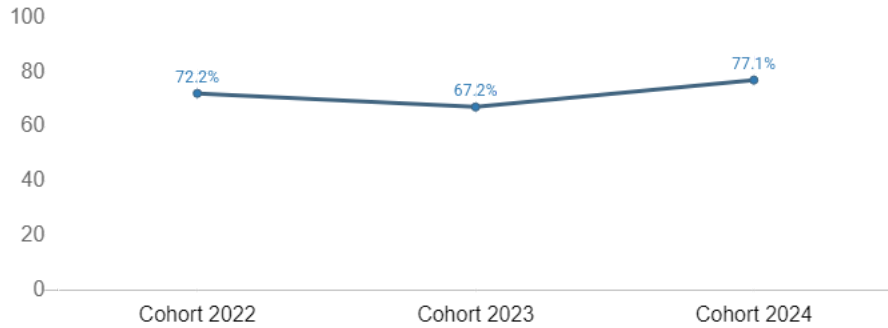

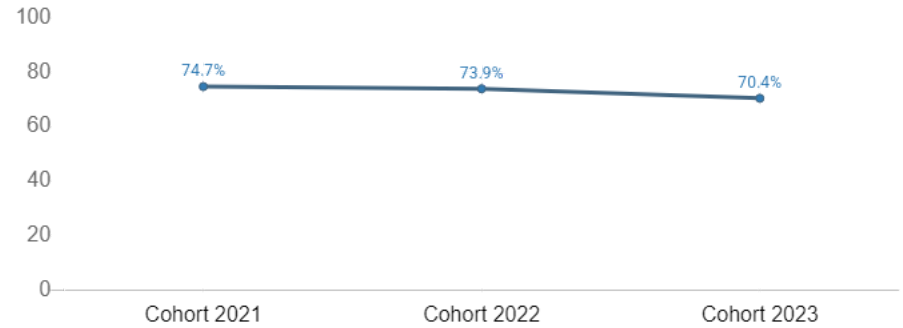

Beginning in the 2020-2021 school year, the NJDOE was required to make changes to the methodology used to calculate the adjusted cohort graduation rate for federal reporting and accountability purposes. The United States Department of Education (USED) determined that the NJDOE must only include students who receive a diploma that is fully aligned with the state's standards, meaning they have met the state's graduation assessment requirements, course requirements, and local attendance requirements. ## Graduation/ Postsecondary

Information about students enrolling in colleges and universities after graduation is collected from the [National Student Clearinghouse \(NSC\)](#), which collects data from at least 97% of higher education institutions nationwide. New Jersey graduates are matched to postsecondary enrollment data by NSC each year. While most students who enroll in a postsecondary institution each year are able to be matched by NSC, there are some students each year who cannot be matched. Some reasons that students may not be matched are: 1. Postsecondary enrollment cannot be shared with the NJDOE if students request a FERPA block on their postsecondary enrollment records; 2. Students who attend a college or university outside of the United States are not included in NSC data; 3. Certain colleges or universities may not participate in sharing data with NSC or may fail to report data for a certain semester or a certain group of students; and 4. NSC may not be able to match a student's name or date of birth in NJ SMART to the information provided by the postsecondary institution(s) with a high level of confidence.

In 2023, NSC implemented an additional manual review process to reduce the number of students who do not match due to #4 above, which may result in NSC matching additional students to postsecondary records moving forward. As a result, the NJDOE is not including trend data from prior to 2022-2023 in the reports.

**Note for 2023-2024:** Postsecondary enrollment data for the 2023-2024 school year is not yet available. The NJDOE expects to release the data in the coming months. Please refer to the 2022-2023 reports for the most recently available postsecondary enrollment rates.

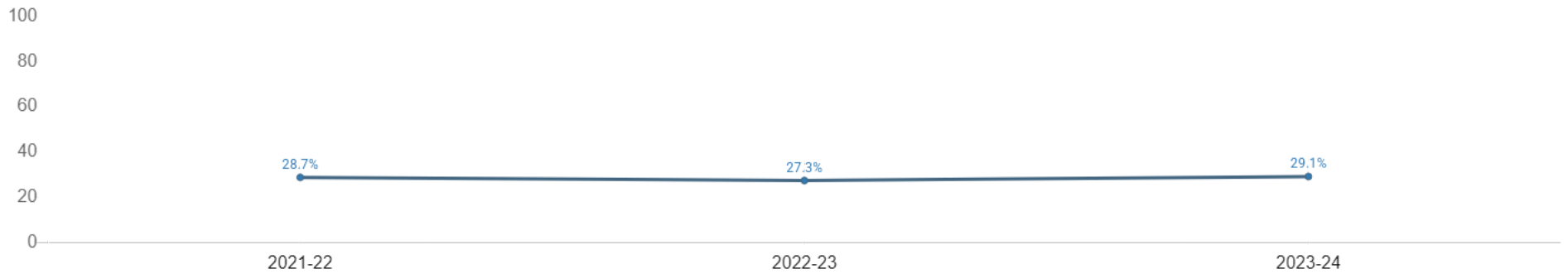

## Climate and Environment

Student absences provide important information about a school's culture and climate. Research shows that absences impact a student's ability to succeed in school. The NJDOE used input from stakeholders to select chronic absenteeism as its measure of school quality and student success for the ESSA accountability plan. **Chronic absenteeism** is defined as being absent for 10% or more of the days enrolled during the school year. A student who is not present for any reason, whether excused, unexcused, or for disciplinary action, is considered absent unless permitted by state statute or regulations. Students with fewer than 45 days in membership are excluded from attendance calculations.

### Chronic Absenteeism Trends

This table shows the number and percentage of students in grades K-12 both overall and by student group who were chronically absent during the school year. The ESSA Target: State Average for Grades Served column is the target used for ESSA accountability purposes. It reflects the statewide average for students in the grades offered by the district. Each student group has the same target based on all students, so the same ESSA Target will appear for all student groups. The last column shows whether the rate for each student group was above the state average ("Not Met") or less than or equal to the state average ("Met").

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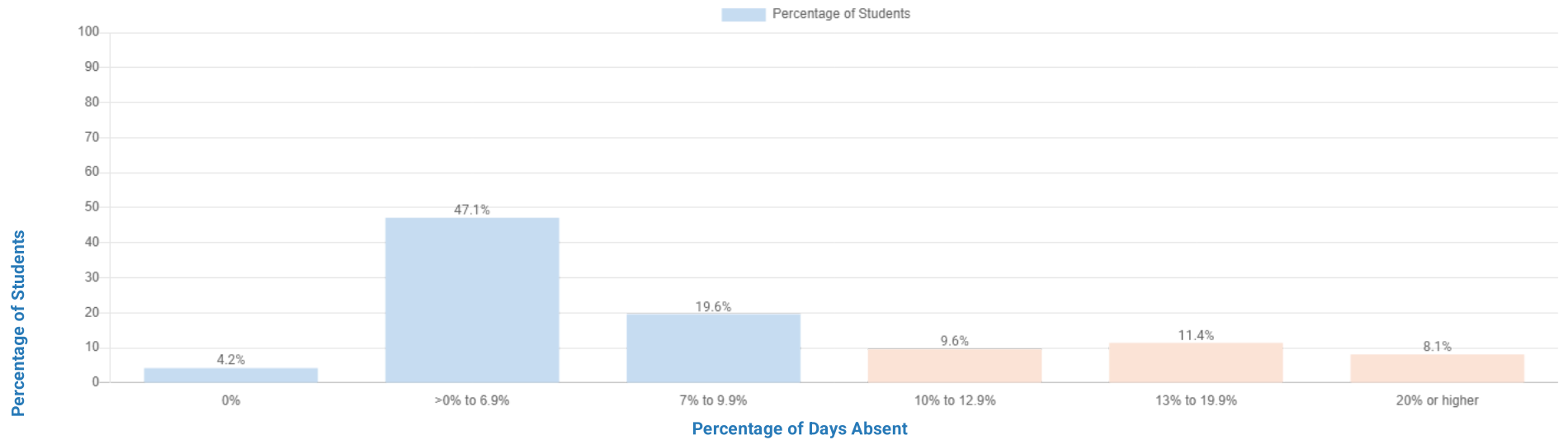

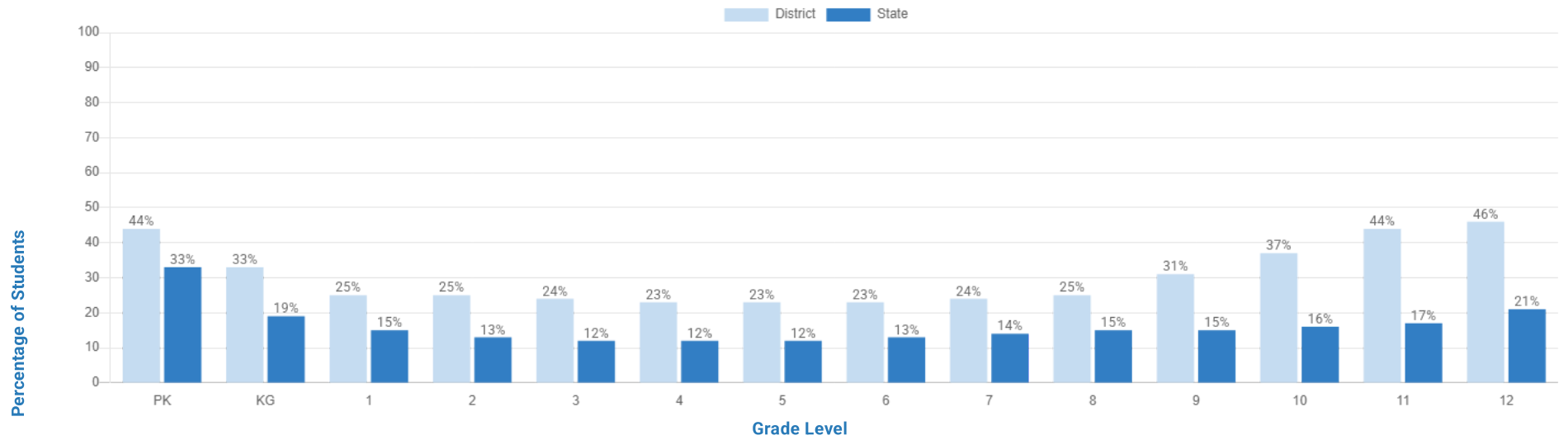

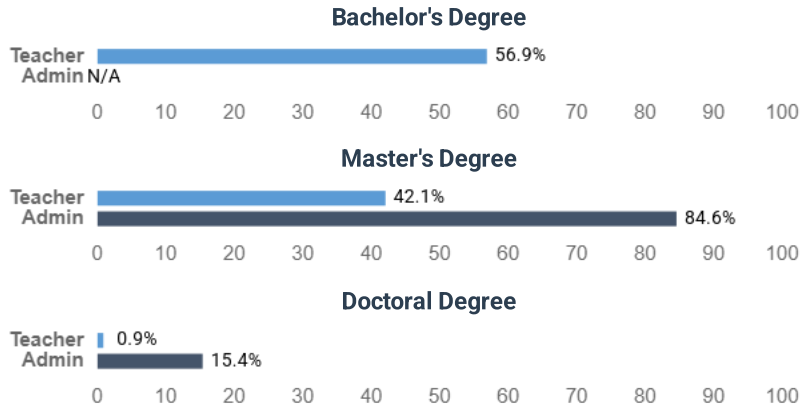

Our continued partnership with Kean University Kean Scholar Academy is in its third year. KSA dual enrollment allows students to earn college credits while still in high school.

Plainfield Public Schools offers breakfast daily to all students before the school day. Plainfield extends its school day with enrichment afterschool programs and summer learning camps. Each school has the opportunity to offer after school programs to the students of Plainfield as well as sporting activities.



### Staff and Professional Learning:

Plainfield Public Schools fosters job-embedded professional development provided to staff in the form of professional learning communities, as well as opportunities to receive training via workshops professional content, and leadership conferences. Staff are provided opportunities to collaborate within and across their workspace.



### Postsecondary Information:

Plainfield Public Schools offers multiple opportunities for career exploration. Career exposure includes an array of professions and trades via career fairs, guest speakers and college visits along with the expansion of our CTE/Perkins Programs. In addition, the district partners with several organizations to provide pre-college and career experiences. Our students choose a variety of experiences after graduation, including 2/4-year college, trade schools, military options, as well as other career choices. PPSD has partnered with Kean University to provide a dual education opportunity for high school ninth graders with its Kean Scholar Academy initiative. Students in the program will graduate from high school with two years of college credits. We also have a partnership with Union County College where they provide college course work on site to high school juniors and seniors. These partnerships allow PPSD high school students to become college students while still in high school.

Plainfield Public Schools provides our students with a number of supports, including after school intervention programs, as well as summer programs for our Bilingual and Special Needs students. This year PPSD was able to institute the WIN (What I Need) program as an additional support for students.



### Student Health and Wellness:

Plainfield Public Schools provides a nutrient rich breakfast and lunch for all students promoting health and wellness. Students participate in rigorous Physical education Programs which is provided on campus and off campus. Along with various girls, boys and co-ed extra-curricular and sports activities.



### Parent and Community Involvement:

Parent and Community Involvement remains paramount to the success of the Plainfield Public School District. The District hosts monthly town hall meetings with community members on various topics including, Special Education and Multilingual Education. The Superintendent of Schools hosts quarterly advisory committee meetings with parents who lead our PATT (Parents and Teachers Together) groups at each school. Our website and resources that are located on our website are available in English and Spanish, including our parent portal for accessing grades and student information. Student learning is assessed throughout the year via the COR Advantage 1.5 assessment tool as well as through the use of a newly developed K-Readiness Assessment which is administered three times during the year. Multilingual learners are supported via strategic staffing which pairs mono & bilingual teachers and teacher assistants. In partnership with the Division of Special Education, the Division of Early Childhood promotes equity & inclusion through the use of an inclusion model which is implemented for students with special needs in all centers & classrooms.
