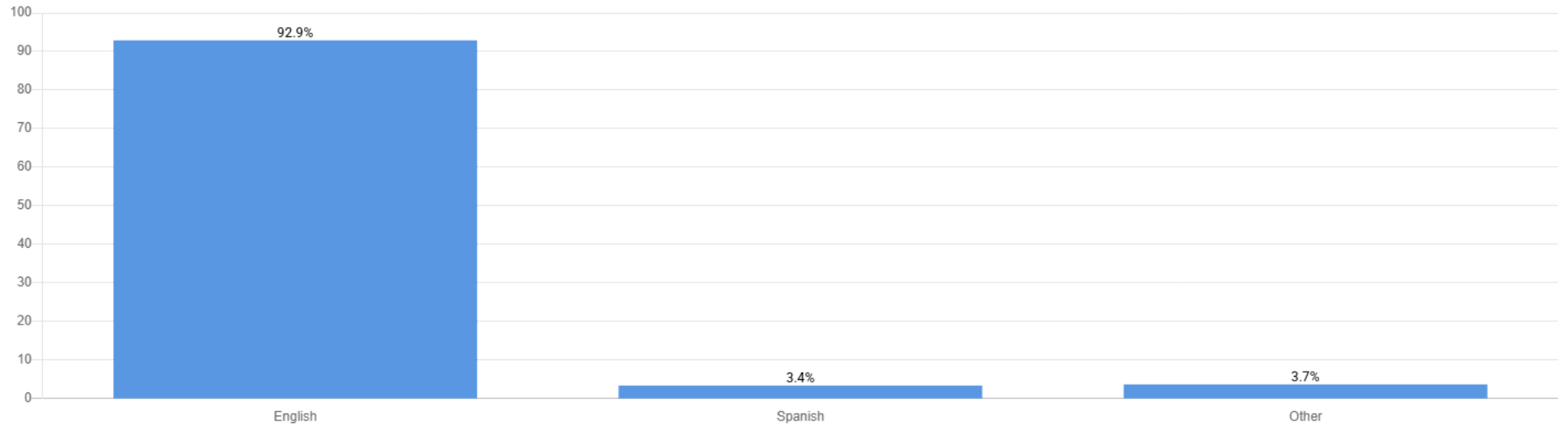

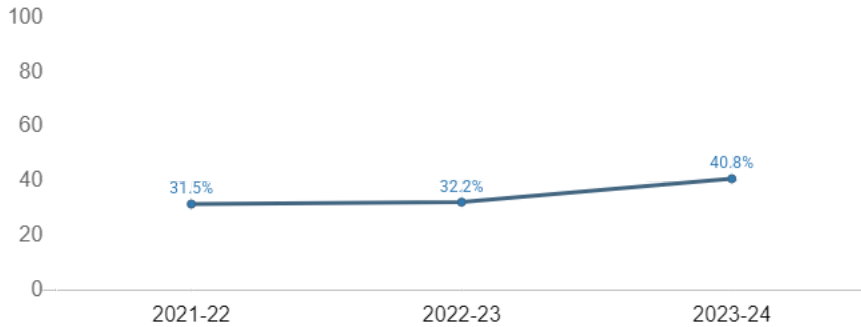

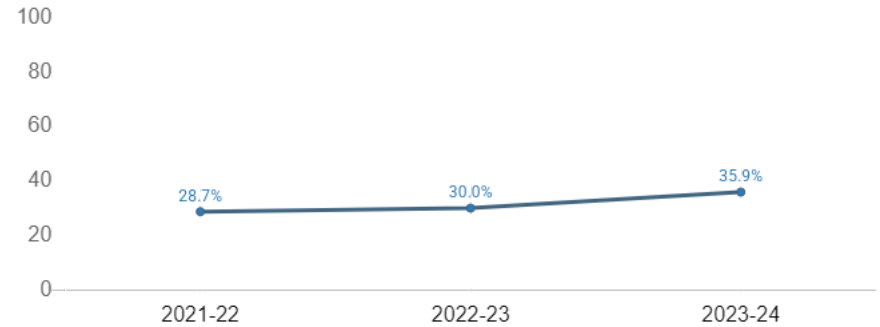
### English Language Arts and Mathematics Performance Trends

These graphs show trends in the Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability over the last three years. The data includes the results of students taking both the New Jersey Student Learning Assessment (NJSLA) and the DLM alternate assessment for English language arts (ELA) and mathematics. The Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability measures the percentage of students who met or exceeded expectations on the assessments (NJSLA or DLM) with an adjustment made if the participation rate is below 95% to ensure reporting on at least 95% of students. 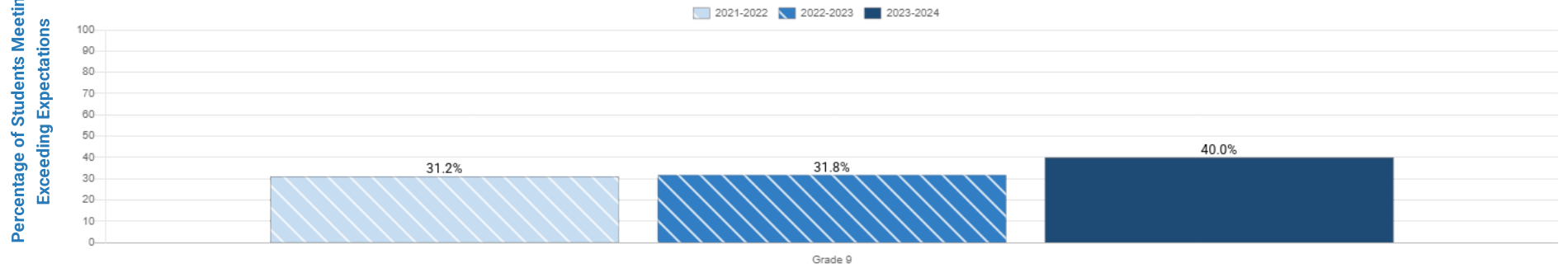

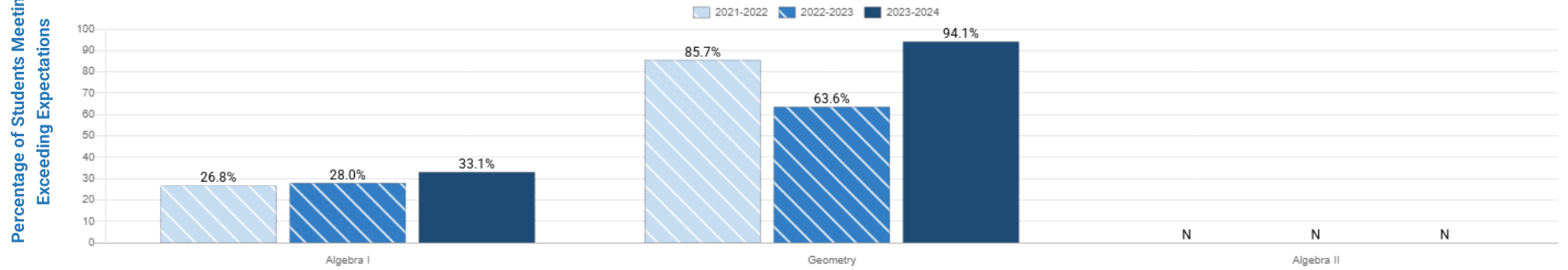

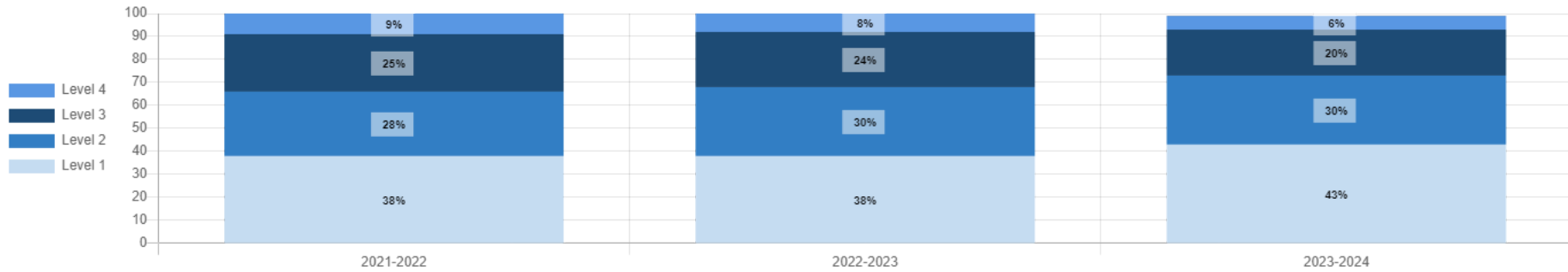

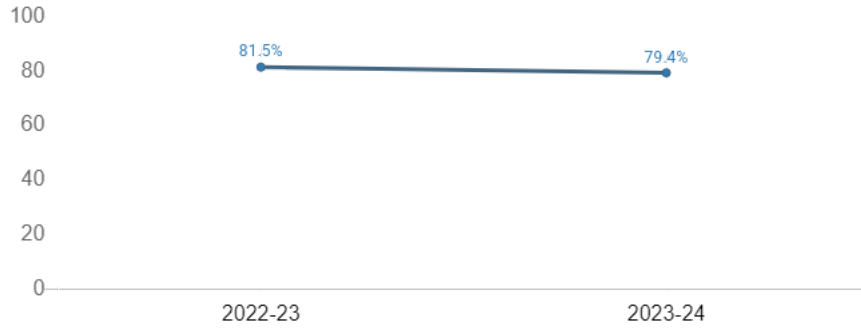

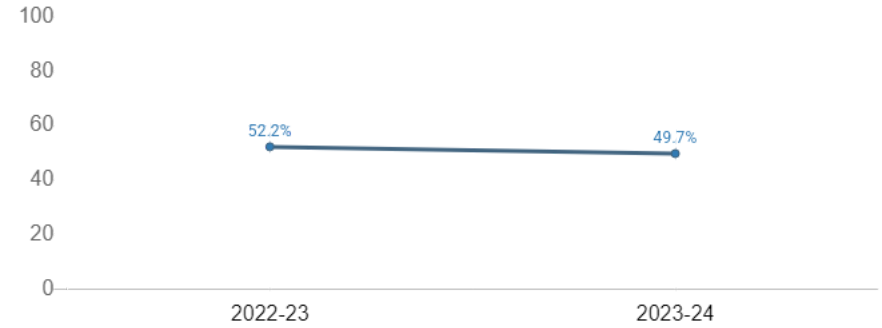

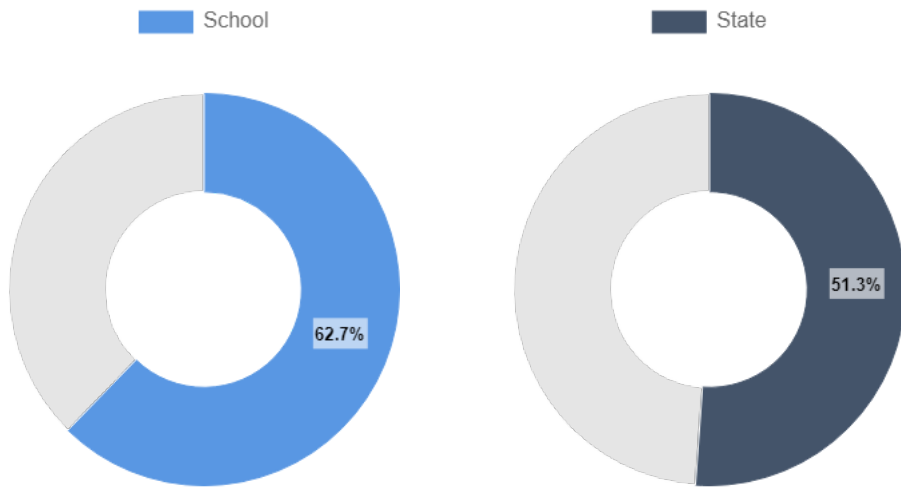

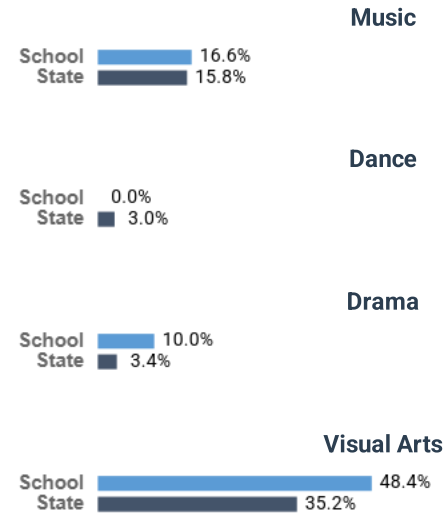

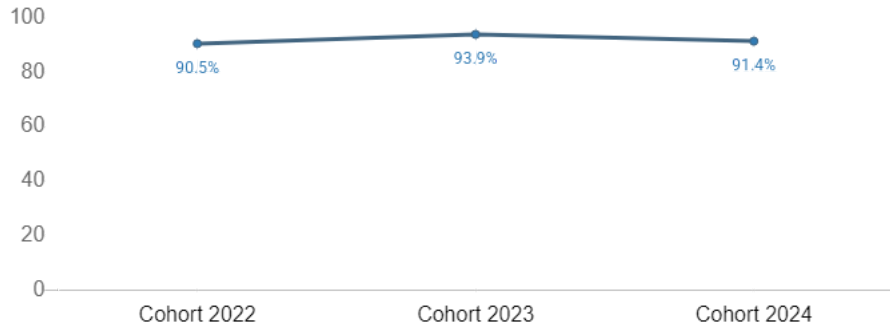

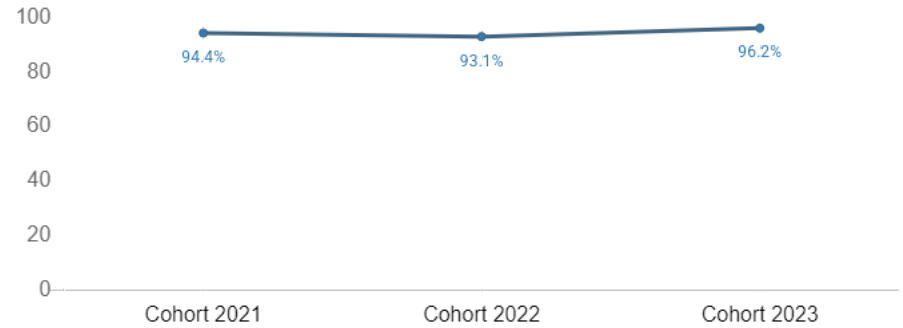

## Graduation/ Postsecondary

Information about students enrolling in colleges and universities after graduation is collected from the [National Student Clearinghouse \(NSC\)](#), which collects data from at least 97% of higher education institutions nationwide. New Jersey graduates are matched to postsecondary enrollment data by NSC each year. While most students who enroll in a postsecondary institution each year are able to be matched by NSC, there are some students each year who cannot be matched. Some reasons that students may not be matched are: 1. Postsecondary enrollment cannot be shared with the NJDOE if students request a FERPA block on their postsecondary enrollment records; 2. Students who attend a college or university outside of the United States are not included in NSC data; 3. Certain colleges or universities may not participate in sharing data with NSC or may fail to report data for a certain semester or a certain group of students; and 4. NSC may not be able to match a student's name or date of birth in NJ SMART to the information provided by the postsecondary institution(s) with a high level of confidence.

In 2023, NSC implemented an additional manual review process to reduce the number of students who do not match due to #4 above, which may result in NSC matching additional students to postsecondary records moving forward. As a result, the NJDOE is not including trend data from prior to 2022-2023 in the reports.

**Note for 2023-2024:** Postsecondary enrollment data for the 2023-2024 school year is not yet available. The NJDOE expects to release the data in the coming months. Please refer to the 2022-2023 reports for the most recently available postsecondary enrollment rates.

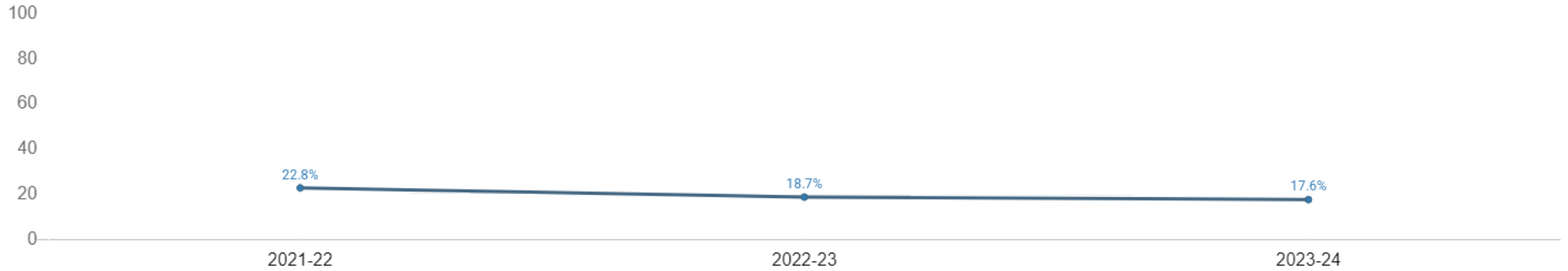

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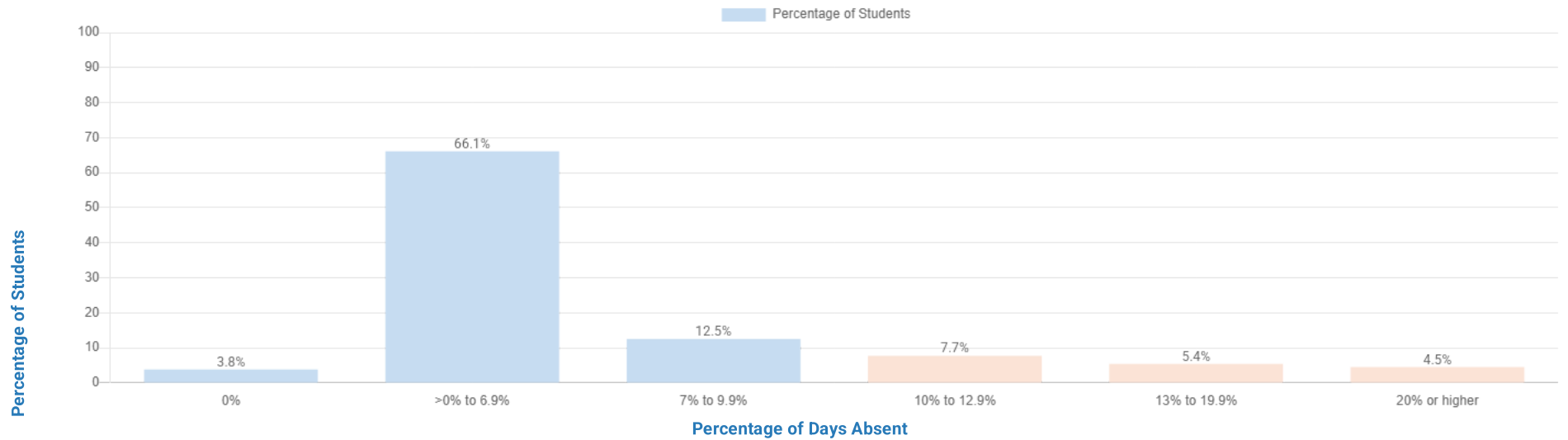

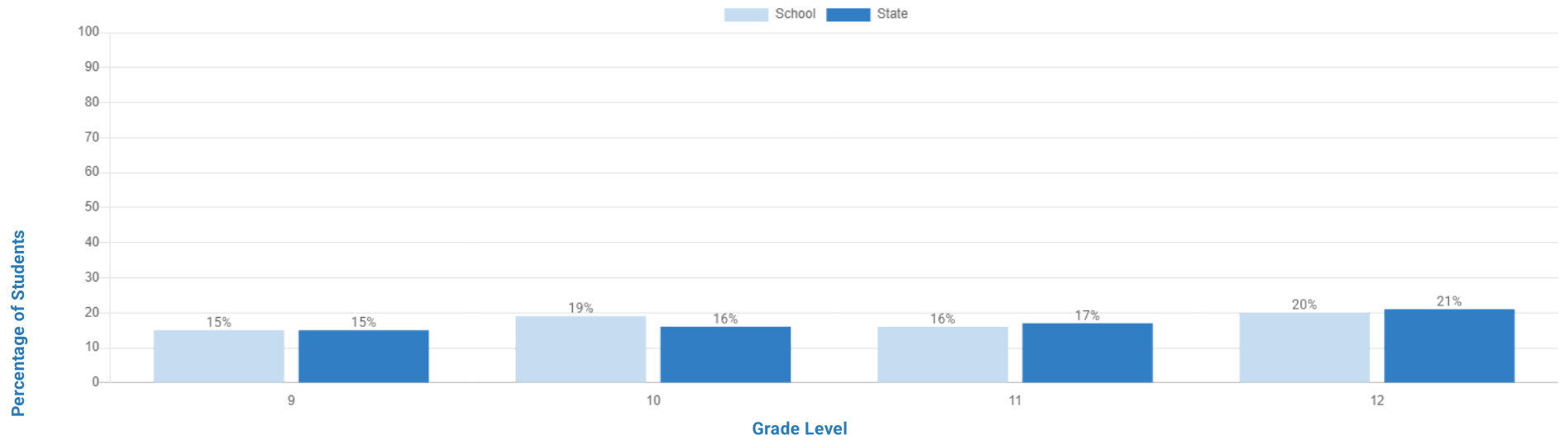


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**Chronic Absenteeism by Grade**

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## Staff

Staff data reflects teachers and administrators reported by districts at the beginning of the school year.

**Key terms for staff data:**

**Teachers:** All classroom teachers

**Administrators:** Principals, assistant principals, supervisors, coordinators, directors, and other central-office administrators, as well as superintendents and other district-level administrators

**Experience:** Experience is based on information submitted by districts on all their staff members. For purposes of this report, the ESSA Educator Equity and federal reporting requirements, NJDOE has defined teachers as "inexperienced" if they have fewer than four years of prior experience in a given district. The tables below report on "experienced" teachers and administrators for federal reporting purposes.

**Out-of-Field:** A teacher is labeled "out-of-field" if they are potentially teaching outside their area of certification. This could occur if the teacher cannot be found in the NJDOE's certification system, if their job code does not match their certification, or if the teacher has an expired certificate.

**Provisional Teacher:** A teacher with provisional certifications is a fully certified novice teacher of record who must meet further requirements of evaluation and mentoring during their induction into the profession before being granted "standard" or permanent certification.

### Teachers – Experience

This table shows information about the experience and professional qualifications of teachers. Out-of-field teachers are teachers who are potentially teaching outside of their area of certification. 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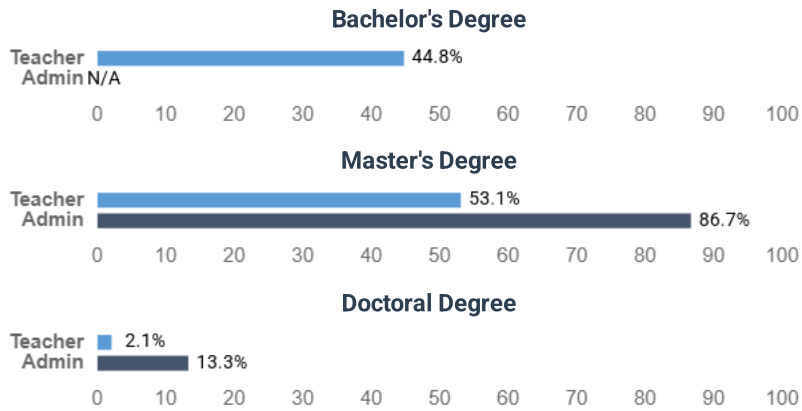

We offer 23 different interscholastic athletic programs. Our Athletic Teams at Rancocas Valley High School have been successful in history. Each student-athlete prepares hard to compete to their fullest potential. It is a community effort to achieving this goal. One of our goals is to promote participation and sportsmanship which provides equitable opportunities, positive recognition and learning experiences to students while maximizing the achievement of our educational goals. Rancocas Valley High School will continue to forge a legacy of a strong work ethic and high expectations.



### Clubs and Activities:

The learning does not stop at the end of the school day at Rancocas Valley. Rancocas Valley offers a wide range of over 90 clubs and activities for students that will enhance the high school experience and shape the collaborative skills needed for post-high school success. Above all is our flagship activity: Red & White Night - Go Red Devils!

## Narrative

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### Staff and Professional Learning:

The RVRHS Board of Education generously provides three full days for professional development for staff each year. Our Red Devil University offers a multi-day experience for newly hired staff who are immersed in the climate and culture of RVRHS from a dedicated team of stakeholders. We are currently coordinating with the Teaching Learning Succeeding professional development center who work with our staff on the implementation of research based differentiated instruction pedagogy building capacity for differentiated teaching. We are in the third year of our personalized learning focus as we collaborate with staff to help them design student led instructional pathways. We are also working with Rowan University to provide our staff with sound professional learning aligned with the myriad needs of our ML population.



### Student Supports and Services:

Special Education teachers and CST members provide support to students through reinforcement of accommodations, modifications, and goals during tutorials and Intervention/Enrichment periods. A special education teacher is assigned to a mainstream class to support the general education teacher and students. This may take the form of co-teaching. Related Services include Speech therapy, counseling, audiological support (e.g. Teachers of the Deaf), Occupational and Physical therapy, and job coaching. School Counselors and members of the CST also create our Crisis Team as an additional support for students in need. The Red Devil Bridge Academy (ERI program) was designed to support students with social-emotional or behavior difficulties so that they are able to stay within the school.



### Student Health and Wellness:

While offering four years of traditional health, driver's education, and fitness classes, RV's Health and PE department provides additional options that enable students to meet or exceed the H&PE requirement. These include classes in yoga, personal life design, strength and conditioning, dance, and outdoor adventure activities. Also, RV's Board of Education recently approved the Nutrition Club to support students and expand on health and wellness beyond the school day.

## Narrative

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### Parent and Community Involvement:

RV has provided opportunities group inviting parents for various meetings. RV began its strategic planning process for equity with a quality equity review study involving multiple stakeholders in 2020. Participant feedback led to crafting the strategic plan for equity. RV Special Education Parent Group is a group providing input on challenges in SPED. PRIDE at the PREP is a monthly newsletter highlighting academic, social & emotional achievements of students. It has contributions from staff & students. Parents partake in other district projects such as the Middle States Accreditation, Educator of the Year program, Project Graduation, and School Safety Team. Most recently, parents participated in our latest community engagement sessions preparing for our next Strategic plan! Turnout was great as multiple sessions solicited parent stakeholders.



### Climate Surveys:

Is a Climate Survey Used: Yes; Who is surveyed: Students, Parents, Administrators, Teachers. The Rancocas Valley Regional High School District utilized Community Engagement sessions to assess climate and culture. This data was utilized to create the Vision 2020 Strategic Plan Board of Education Approved in June 2017. RVRHS administered the National Climate Survey Instrument during the 2017-2018 school year as part of the strategic plan. In May of 2018 RVRHS received certification from the Anti-Defamation League (ADL) and has been designated as an official No Place for Hate annually ever since, including this past year 2023-2024!



### Facilities:

In 1937 RVRHS was constructed as a colonial-style building. In 1954, RV added classrooms, and in 1957, 22 more classrooms and other areas expanded. In 1985, D-wing, Performing Arts Center and media center were added. Since 2003 the athletic complex was constructed, the sports stadium was renovated, and the annex was acquired and renovated for administrative offices, the FLIP program and RVPREP. Rancocas Valley completed a three year project in 2023, after passing a \$21.7 million Bond Referendum in September 2019, for improvements in safety and security, windows, doors plus HVAC upgrades. During the summer of 2023 Rancocas Valley installed a new turf field at the Sports Complex in Eastampton.

## Narrative

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### School Safety:

RV takes pride in placing safety and security at the forefront of importance every day. The district's commitment to personnel is demonstrated by proactively hiring 3 student assistance counselors, 2 student resource officers, 2 coordinators of school safety, a team of security guards (8), and the Office of Climate and Culture developing the building culture for a safe environment. RV prepares by conducting tabletop drills, K9 sweeps, lockdowns, & evacuations. Procedures are in place to facilitate lockdowns and visitor management creating the safest facility possible. The district utilizes advanced technology developed by ZeroEyes including an elaborate camera system outfitted with an Artificial Intelligence to detect weapons. Communication systems have been upgraded with new digital radios as well as a school safety app, CrisisGo.



### Technology and STEM:

A comprehensive technological education is essential to the development of the vital 21st Century skills for students to become productive members of the global community. RVRHS utilizes technology as a tool for learning that expands the skill set and capacity for learning for all stakeholders. The 1:World Initiative has ensured that all members of the educational community have equitable access to the technological tools and devices required to maximize their learning experience. Each stakeholder is outfitted with a MacBook that is loaded with appropriate software resources to enhance the teaching and learning experience year round. In addition, in order to maintain a productive learning environment, the facilities are equipped with interactive projection technology, such as interactive ViewSonic, Promethean and Smart Boards. Apple TV's are also employed in conjunction with 75" HDTVs. The network infrastructure is continually updated to meet the ever changing needs of the community.



### Attendance:

Teachers are responsible for emailing home when a student accumulates 3 unexcused absences and calling home upon reaching 6 unexcused absences, after which the counselor will meet with the student. Official district letters are sent at 4, 9, and 13 unexcused absences, and a mandatory family meeting is required at 18 unexcused absences. The administrator responsible for attendance works with counselors, the Child Study Team, DCP, and truancy court to ensure students receive support. Additionally, School Resource Officers (SROs) and Perform Care conduct home visits for truant students. For students facing economic hardships, we offer access to our food pantry and comfort closet for daily essentials to encourage attendance. For those with mental health challenges, we provide home visits through Perform Care, referrals to the I&RS team, and in-house counseling services with NJ4S. These supports are designed to remove barriers and improve student attendance.

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**Other Information:**

RVRHS's block schedule provides students with a deep academic experience, enabling them to take four, seventy-two-minute courses each day, during each eighteen-week semester. 19 Advanced Placement (AP) courses are offered for science (Chemistry, Biology, and two Physics courses), math (Pre-Calculus, Calculus AB, Calculus BC, Statistics), history (African American Studies, United States History, Economics-macro, European History, US Government and Politics, Psychology) and english (English Literature and Composition, English Language and Composition), Computer Science Principles, and for world languages (French, Italian, and Spanish). Close to 300 students sat for AP tests in 2023. In addition, RVRHS has multiple dual-enrollment agreements with area colleges and universities, including Rowan College at Burlington County, Seton Hall University, Fairleigh-Dickinson University, and Stockton University. Nearly 250 students earned college credit in 2022 by enrolling in AP and honors courses taught on the RV campus. RVRHS participates in the Project Lead the Way (PLTW) Pathway to Engineering program, which provides students interested in pursuing a STEM career with an opportunity to experience real-world, hands-on learning. Nearly 150 students participate in our storied Junior ROTC program, which has been honored by the Navy as a Distinguished Unit with Academic Honors for nearly 20 consecutive years. Our Rancocas Valley Personalized Readiness and Education Program (RVPREP) provides small group, individualized, proficiency-based instruction to students in a unique learning community setting. Among the 463 students in the class of 2023, 91 percent planned to attend a two- or four-year college; 2 percent planned to attend another post-secondary institution, 2 percent planned to enter the military; and 3 percent sought direct employment. Nearly half of RVRHS staff have earned a master's degree or higher, with one staff member having earned National Board Certification.
