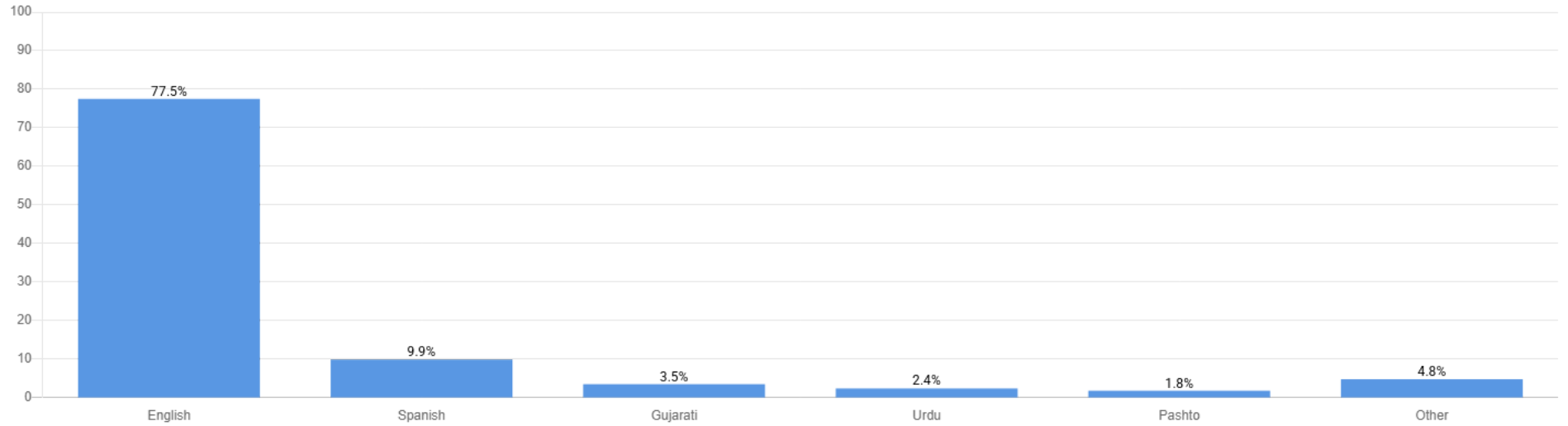

## Student Growth

Student growth is a measure of how much students are learning each year. New Jersey's ESSA state plan outlines that academic progress will be measured with school's median student growth percentile (mSGP) on statewide ELA and mathematics assessments. Each individual student receives a Student Growth Percentile (SGP) for English Language Arts (ELA) in grades 4 through 8 and for Mathematics in grades 4 through 7. The SGP measures their academic progress from one year to the next compared to other students with similar prior test scores (academic peers).

A student's SGP falls between 1 and 99 and can be grouped into three levels. An SGP below 35 indicates low growth, an SGP between 35 and 65 indicates typical growth, and an SGP greater than 65 indicates high growth. If the SGPs for all students are ordered from smallest to largest, the mSGP is the percentile in the middle of the list.

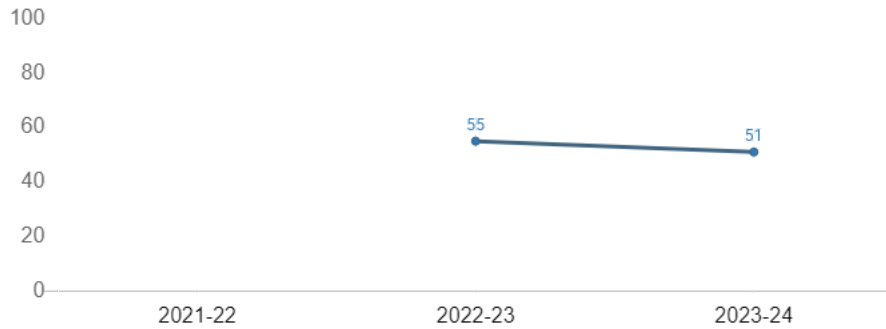

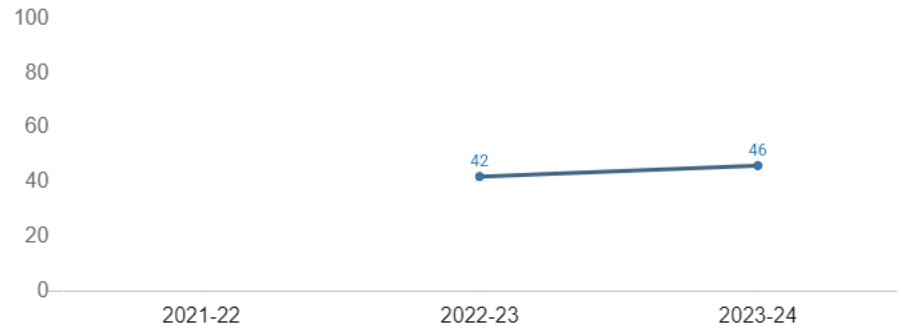

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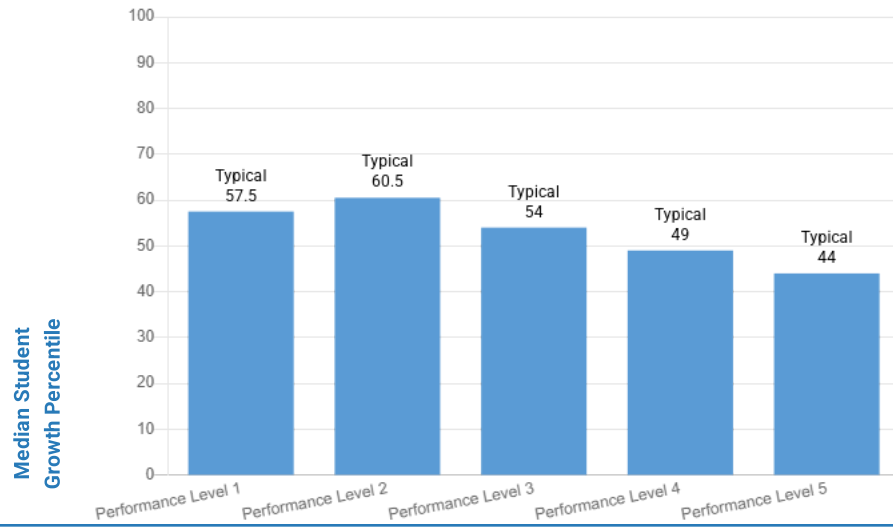
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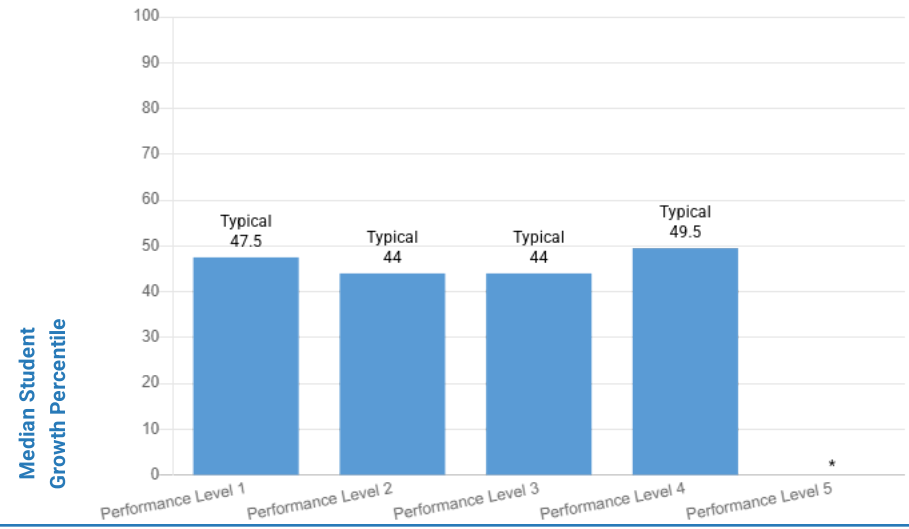

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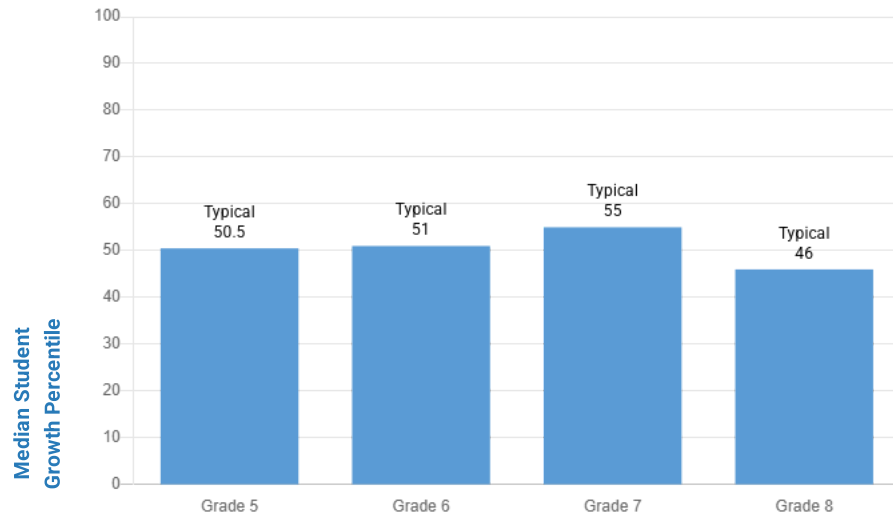
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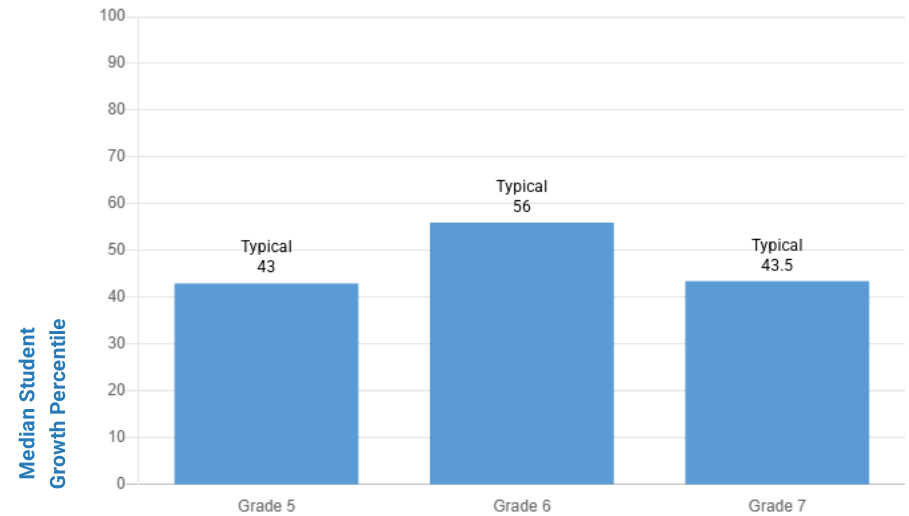

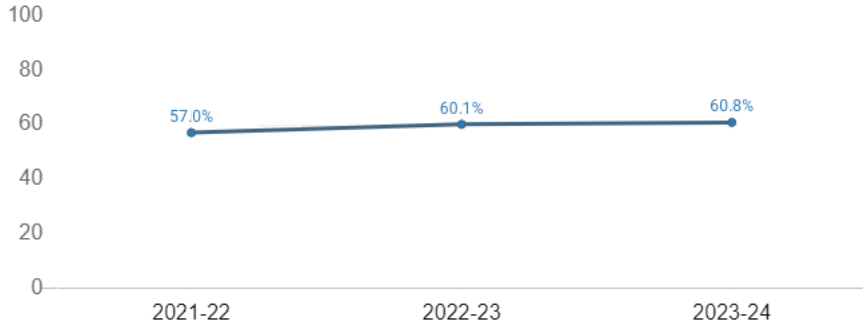

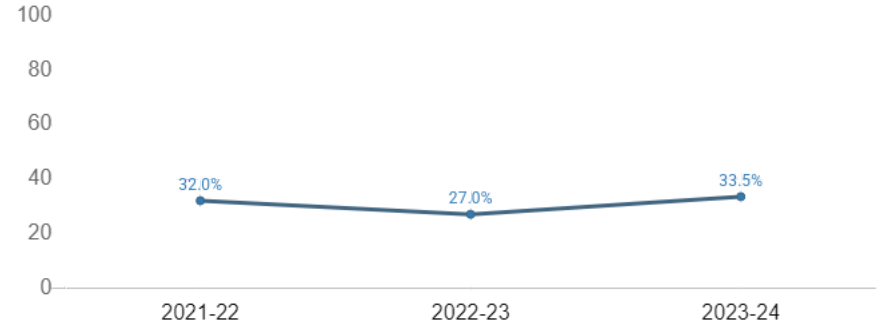
### English Language Arts and Mathematics Performance Trends

These graphs show trends in the Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability over the last three years. The data includes the results of students taking both the New Jersey Student Learning Assessment (NJSLA) and the DLM alternate assessment for English language arts (ELA) and mathematics. The Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability measures the percentage of students who met or exceeded expectations on the assessments (NJSLA or DLM) with an adjustment made if the participation rate is below 95% to ensure reporting on at least 95% of students. Students who were enrolled for less than half a school year are excluded from performance results. The table below provides participation rates, proficiency rates, annual targets and status in meeting the targets, and statewide proficiency rates.

### English Language Arts Assessment - Participation and Performance

This table shows performance on statewide assessments for English language arts (ELA) both overall and by student group. It includes the results of students taking both the NJSLA and DLM. NJSLA results for ELA include only students in grades 3 through 9. Students who were enrolled for less than half a school year are excluded from performance results. Student are considered to have met or exceeded expectations if they score at Level 4 or 5 on the NJSLA or at Level 3 or 4 on the DLM.

This table shows both the percentage of students who met or exceeded expectations and a proficiency rate used for federal accountability. The proficiency rate for federal accountability will be lower if the participation rate is below 95%. This table also shows status in meeting annual targets. Annual targets are specific to each student group, school, and district and represent the expected proficiency needed to stay on track to meet long-term goals. Student groups where the annual target fields are grayed out are not required to meet annual targets under ESSA accountability. 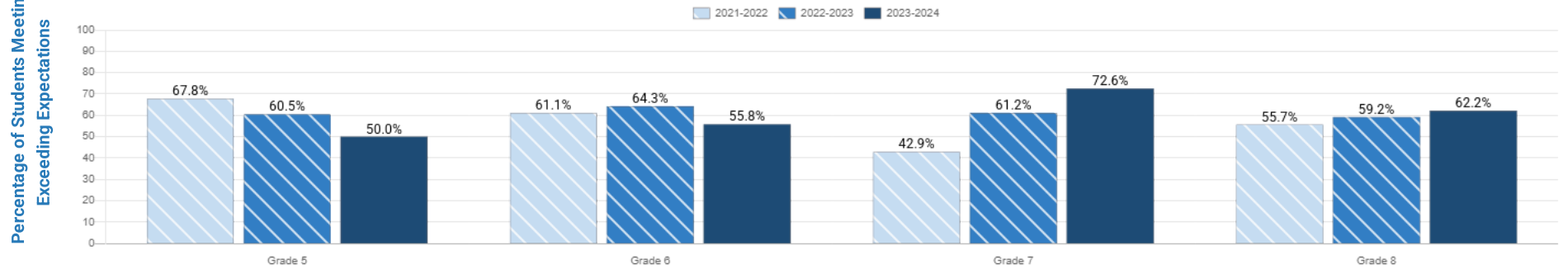

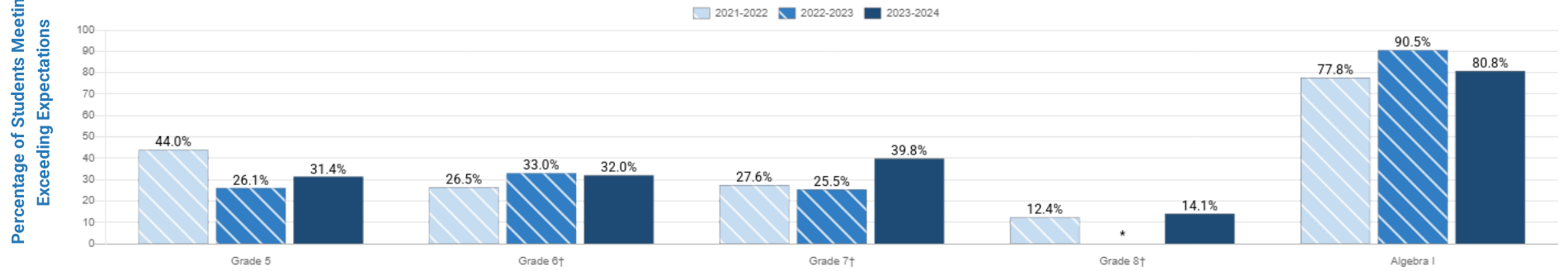

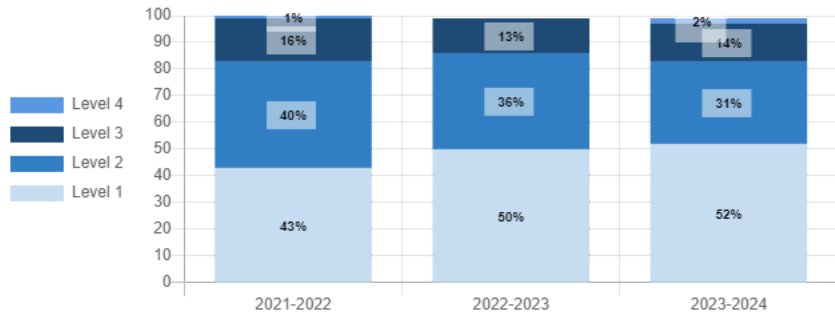

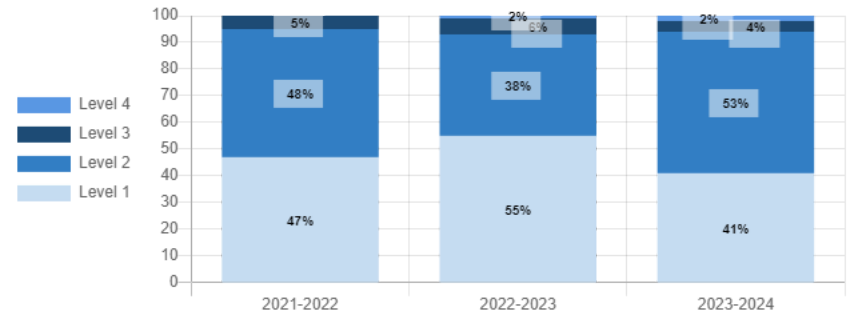

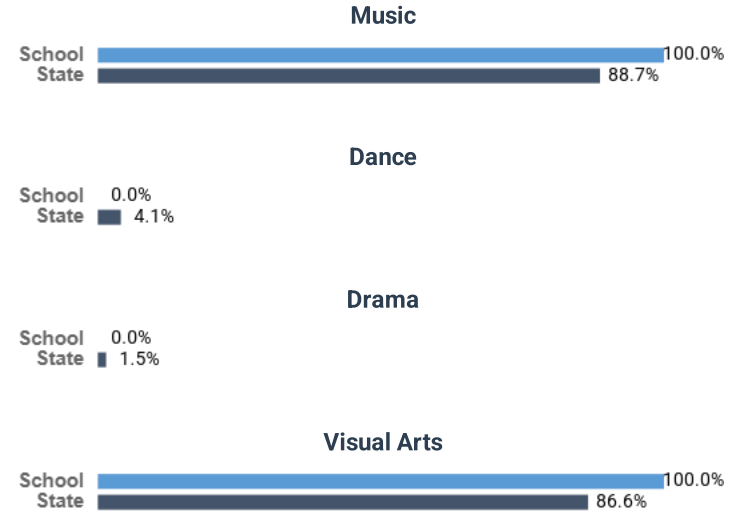

**Students enrolled in one or more classes by discipline:**



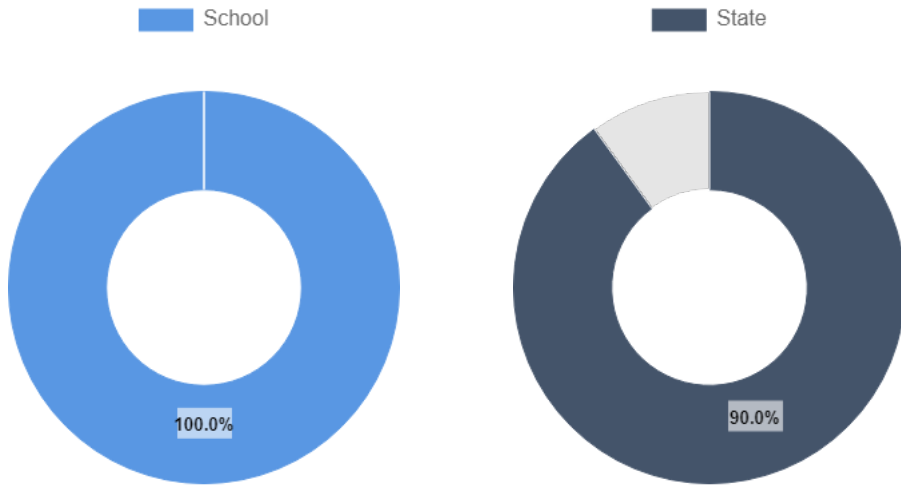

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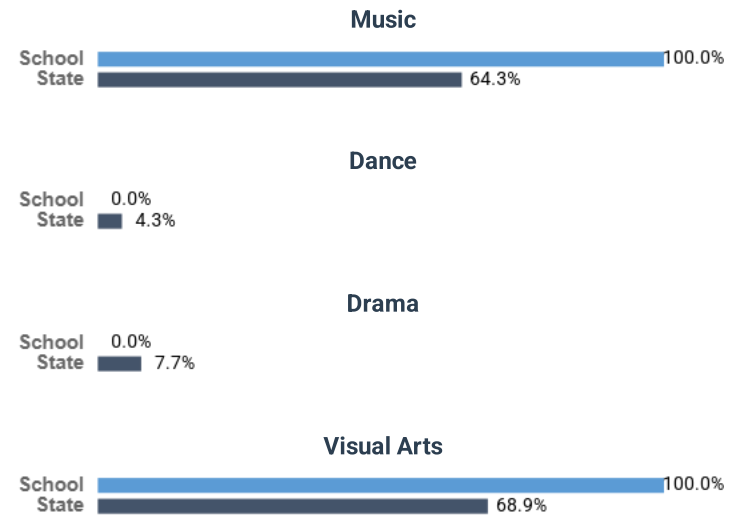

**Students enrolled in one or more classes by discipline:**



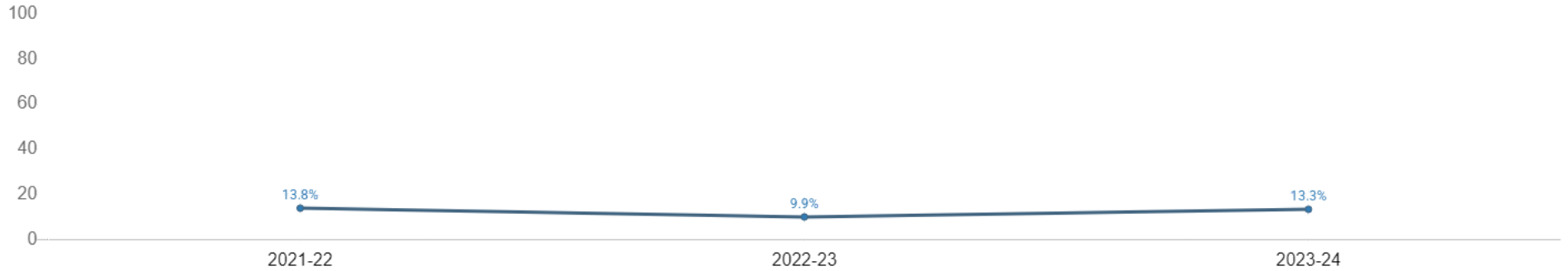

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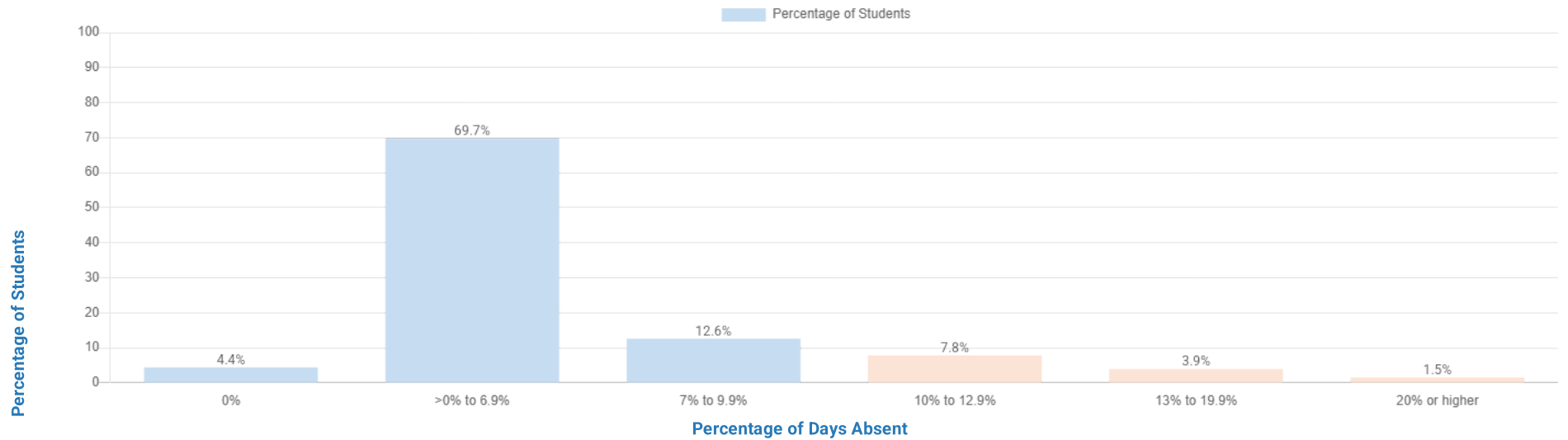

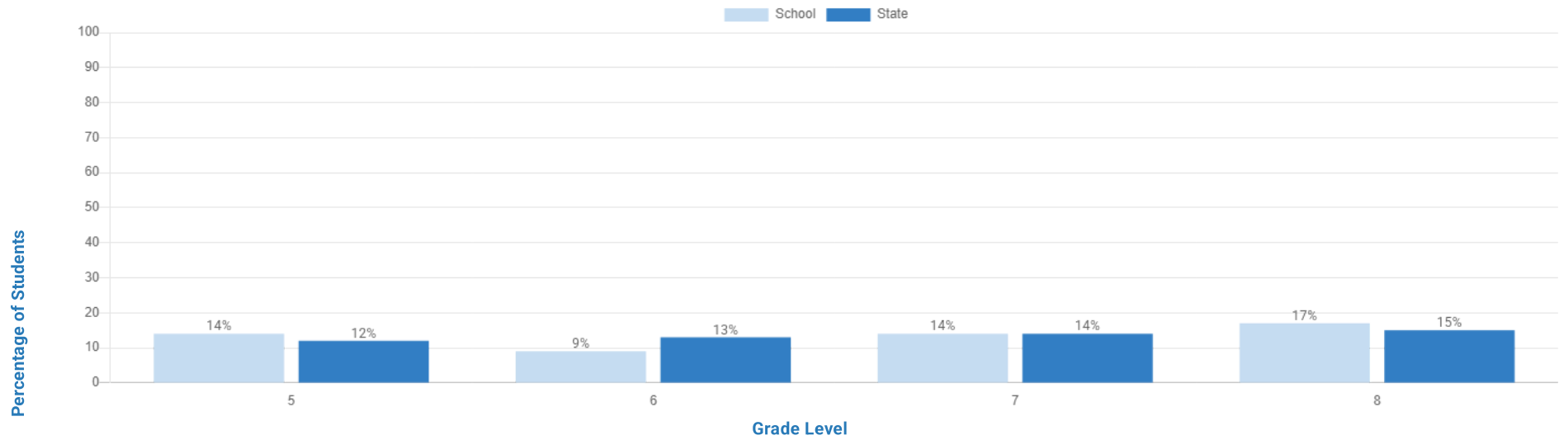

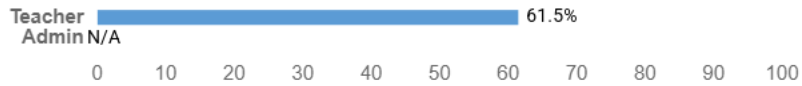

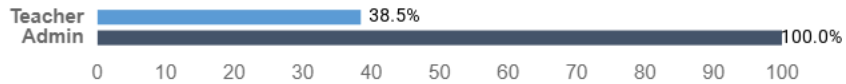

The NJDOE is required under ESSA to identify schools for Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI) annually and for Additional Targeted Support and Improvement (ATSI) every three years. Both TSI and ATSI identifications are based on how student groups within schools perform. Schools are identified for ATSI if they have at least one student group that has a summative score that would be in the bottom 5% of Title I schools if it was its own school. Schools are identified for TSI if they have at least one student group that missed annual targets or standards for all indicators for two years in a row. Only student groups that have data for at least 20 students are included in the accountability determinations.

The NJDOE identified schools for ATSI status based on data from the 2022-2023 school year, so schools will not be identified for ATSI status based on data from the 2023-2024 school year. The table below will show the summative score for each student group, but it will not show a cut-off score or indicate that a student group has been identified for ATSI status since it is not an identification year.

Schools will be identified for TSI status based on data from the 2023-2024 school year, since that is required annually. The remaining columns in the table show whether each student group met annual targets or standards for all indicators for the 2023-24 school year. If at least one student group did not meet all targets and also did not meet all targets in the 2022-23 school year, then the school will be identified as requiring TSI.

## Narrative

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### Courses, Curriculum, Instruction:

We offer diverse & expansive opportunities for our 5th -8th graders. It is our goal to provide a comprehensive academic and social foundation enabling them to meet the challenges of the new millennium. Programs are designed to meet requirements of the NJSLs exposing them to the latest research-based, data-driven best practices in education. In ELA , the Online Common Lit program provides our students with leveled texts, and Wit & Wisdom promotes cross-curricular content-based learning. Mathematical reasoning & number sense are used to solve real world problems via Eureka math & the Big Ideas program. Algebra is offered to identified 8th graders. Our Science program is aligned to the Next Generation Science Standards. Our arts program includes art, music, technology/STEAM, health, PE & spanish. Data collection via Benchmark Literacy, iReady, Linkit, & district benchmarks in addition to those required by the NJDOE ensure student growth is closely monitored.



### Sports and Athletics:

Sports Offered: Baseball (Boys), Basketball (Boys & Girls), Bowling (Coed), Cheerleading (Coed), Lacrosse (Boys), Soccer (Coed), Softball (Girls), Track and Field - Spring (Boys & Girls), Volleyball (Coed)

We are proud of the numerous afterschool sports, clubs and activities that are in place for all of our students at the middle school. All of our grade levels are encouraged to get involved in at least one afterschool activity to help build their social skills and tap into the different passions they may seek to explore as they transition through high school and beyond. On average 80% of our student body participates in at least one activity during the school year. The following sports, clubs and activities are available here at the Bell Oaks Middle School: Intramurals in the Fall and Spring, Co-ed Soccer, Boy's & Girls' Basketball, Softball, Baseball, Track, Lacrosse workouts, Volleyball, and Cheerleading.



### Clubs and Activities:

## Narrative

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### Before and After School Programs:

The Bellmawr C.A.R.E. Program provides child centered activities that reinforce excellence for children who need additional supervision outside the hours of the typical school day. The program offers a safe and structured setting for students in grades five through eight here on the grounds of the middle school. We also provide academic supports for those students in need of math and language arts intervention twice per week, and our Homework Club affords everyone the opportunity to get assistance from their peers afterschool hours.



### Staff and Professional Learning:

We have adopted Charlotte Danielson's Framework for Teaching (FFT) which was designed to enhance professional practice. It has been shown to accelerate teacher growth and improve student outcomes, by ensuring that educators and administrators are able to engage in a common dialog of what effective instruction looks like. We utilize Assessment Capable Visible Learners John Hattie's research on teacher practice which encompasses 1,800 meta-analyses of over 100,000 studies, encompassing 300,000 students worldwide, and is growing daily. Bellmawr Public Schools believes that the most valuable professional development is embedded, ongoing and that it comes from within our rank of master teachers which is demonstrated through our Collaborative Teacher Crew/New Teacher Academy. This allows ongoing support and collaboration during PLC time. Bellmawr School District also hosts outside presenters, a districtwide book study, staff presentations, and districtwide sessions using Google meets



### Postsecondary Information:

Bellmawr School District strives to encourage learning beyond high school. In our middle school all of our staff have signs posted showing where they attended college, what degree they have and the college's mascot and motto. These signs are great for inciting conversations about furthering education. We also have activities planned for our 8th grade class which include visits to local colleges and an exciting Career Week. Our 8th grade students complete a survey highlighting areas of interest which is then used later in the year for Career Week. During Career Week students attend various sessions throughout the school day where we have outside presenters from all different professions engaging in interactive sessions giving the students a chance to gain information and ask questions about different careers.

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### Student Supports and Services:

In order to accommodate the needs of all students, Bellmawr Schools provides many ancillary programs. This includes music, physical education, art, technology & world cultures classes. Academic supports include Basic Skills support for Language Arts and Mathematics, English as a Second Language (ESL) programming, and Summer Enrichment/ Extended Year program for our Special Education & Basic Skills students. Students in need of additional support (academic and/or behavioral) are serviced through the Intervention & Referrals Services (I&RS) Team. This team identifies intervention strategies and best practices for teachers to use with the referred students. If it is found that the strategies are not successful a student may be referred to the Child Study Team for further testing. We offer a counseling department along with our School Psychologists and Social Worker. We are contracted with Care Solace as a resource for parents, students, and staff to find outside mental health services.



### Student Health and Wellness:

Bellmawr School District is happy to partner with Nutri-Serve Food Management, Inc. to provide our students with nutritious meals and snacks. Students are offered breakfast, lunch and snacks. Daily nutrition information for all of the food served is posted for students & families. Our curriculum includes a course for Health which covers age appropriate material regarding healthy daily habits, lifestyles, and ways to improve personal wellbeing.



### Parent and Community Involvement:

The Bellmawr PTO plays a vital role in providing extra services and opportunities for all of our students. Many of our family members volunteer their time to assist the PTO throughout the school year. The PTO organizes monthly dances for our students and is heavily involved in funding and helping to plan end of year activities for all grade levels. Bell Oaks publishes a weekly email newsletter that keeps our families up to date with all pertinent school information.

## Narrative

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### Climate Surveys:

Is a Climate Survey Used: Yes; Who is surveyed: Students, Parents, Teachers. Climate surveys are used each year to assess our programs and school climate. Students, parents, teachers and administrators are surveyed. We have used our Panorama program to survey students about their overall well-being and have surveyed parents regarding return to school and remote/hybrid learning plans.



### Facilities:

Bell Oaks is a two-story school facility serving students in grades 5-8. It is the largest and most-recently built school of the district's three facilities. It houses over 20 classrooms, including a completely renovated art room and media center offering ever-expanding STEM activities. It has both a cafeteria facility for meal service, as well as a separate gymnasium which features a recently installed rubber floor, benefiting physical education classes as well as extracurricular sports. Future projects include the installation of roof-mounted solar panels which will generate energy savings as well as be integrated into the district's science curriculum. The district will also undergo a phased in replacement of classroom unit ventilation to upgrade air conditioning and air quality in all instructional spaces.



### School Safety:

The Bell Oaks School plans for and recognizes the importance of school safety and security. We have various procedures and policies in place that include security and fire drills per DOE regulations. Our local police department routinely participates in our security drills and provides guidance and assistance as needed. All visitors are required to enter through our main entrance where strict protocol is followed and adhered to. All doors within each school are secure, with security cameras positioned both outside and within our buildings. All staff are consistently trained regarding emergency management situations.

## Narrative

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### Technology and STEM:

The Bell Oaks Middle School provides all students access to advanced technology platforms and devices that allow them to meet and exceed academic standards as outlined in the NJ Student Learning Standards for Technology. Classrooms are equipped with Smartboards and/or Interactive boards, and our 1:1 initiative permits all students have their own Chromebooks with access given at home. This enables our school to enhance our instruction and make learning more hands-on. STEM units of instruction are embedded into our technology course on all grade levels and our Academic Lab period and club offerings.



### Attendance:

The Bellmawr School District has a full child study team consisting of two School Psychologists, a Learning Disabilities Teacher Consultant (LDTC) and a School Social Worker which is supervised by the Director of Special Services. Related Services such as occupational and speech services are provided by our own district staff. Physical therapy is also provided through a contracted service by Virtua health. Transportation services are provided to those students who qualify based on their disability and is provided through a contracted service with Camden County Educational Services. Counseling services are provided by our counseling department along with our School Psychologists and Social Worker. We also contract with Care Solace as a resource for parents, students, and staff to find outside mental health services.
