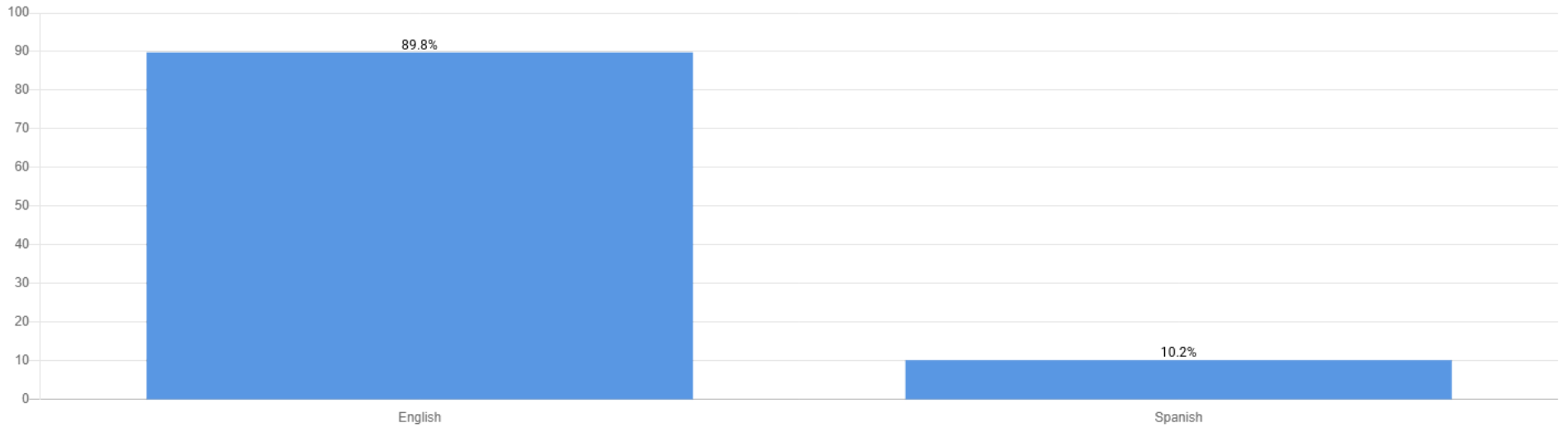

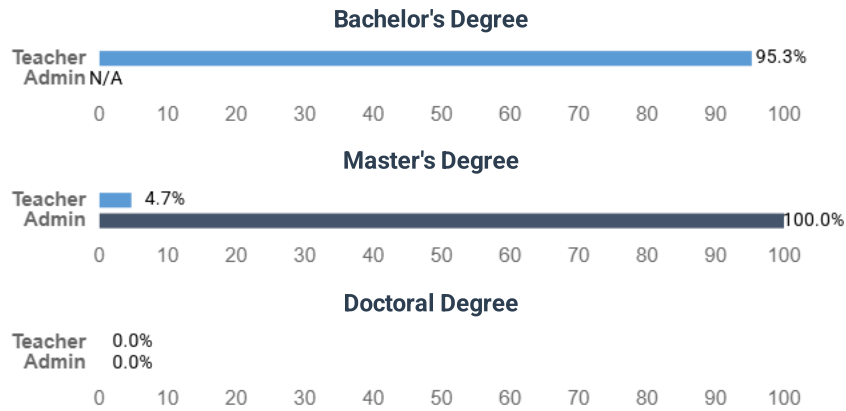

Highlights:

- Martha F. Wilson ECDC serves more than 320 preschool aged student of wide-ranging cultural heritage and experience.
- Martha F. Wilson ECDC staff are trained in early childhood development and have foundational knowledge in creating supportive environments for diverse learners.



Mission, Vision, Theme:

Every child, supported by strong relationships between staff, parents, and community, will develop their full socio-emotional and intellectual potential by engaging in developmentally appropriate experiences in a safe, nurturing, and innovative environment.



Courses, Curriculum, Instruction:

At Martha F. Wilson Early Childhood Development Center, the curriculum, Teaching Strategies Gold includes a strong focus on early childhood development. In addition to Teaching Strategies Gold, The Second Step curriculum is used to support preschool students in developing social and emotional skills, such as empathy, emotional regulation, and positive relationships.

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Sports and Athletics:

The Health and Physical Education program at Martha F. Wilson ECDC is designed to support young children's physical development, motor skills, and overall wellness. Gross motor development activities focus on helping children develop balance, coordination, and strength. Students also develop social skills through group games and activities, children learn the basics of teamwork, cooperation, and good sportsmanship which align well with the social-emotional learning goals of the school.



Clubs and Activities:

The Catapult Summer Program at Martha F. Wilson ECDC is designed as an enriching, hands-on experience to keep young learners engaged over the summer. During the summer students develop literacy and language skills through reading circles, storytelling, and vocabulary games. Early math, STEAM and science activities are hands-on and boost early problem-solving skills and creativity.



Staff and Professional Learning:

All Martha F. Wilson ECDC teachers receive weekly/bi-weekly 1-1 coaching in instructional best practice from their building administrators. We hold 90-minute training sessions with our staff twice a month. Teachers take part in five mandatory professional development days a year, and are offered an additional two optional training days on specific topics like differentiated instruction and classroom time management. In September all school-based staffed were trained in creating an inclusive learning for all students.

Narrative

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Postsecondary Information:

At Martha F. Wilson ECDC, we focus on setting a strong foundation for lifelong learning and preparing students and families for success in future educational transitions. Although this level is primarily early childhood, we have a supportive framework in place to help families understand how to support their children's learning and development beyond preschool. We offer workshops for parents such as understanding school readiness, supporting literacy and math skills at home and preparing for transitions to elementary school.



Student Health and Wellness:

At Martha F. Wilson ECDC we take a comprehensive approach to student health and wellness, helping them develop lifelong wellness habits. We partner with FoodCorps, Wellness in the Schools and Food Bank of South Jersey. We also offer pediatric mobile services for vaccines and physicals. We share information and resources with families about nearby health services, nutrition programs, and wellness resources for health inside and outside of school.



Parent and Community Involvement:

At Martha F. Wilson ECDC parent and community involvement is integral to creating a supportive and enriching environment for young learners. Our Family Operations Coordinator works with fostering connections with parents and local community strengthens and educational experience and supports each child's growth. Our FOC is responsible for advocating for families and connecting them with local services. Our Family Operations Coordinator has her own parent led Parent Advisory Council whose purpose is to advocate at the school level and provide updates to the Parent District Advisory Council. She brings the Parent Advisory council together with the Special Education Parent Advisory Councils for the general District Parent Advisory council meeting, so that all parents can receive the same District updates. The Special Needs Councils then have the opportunity to break into separate groups to discuss any specific updates that are relevant to their individualized groups.

Narrative

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Climate Surveys:

Is a Climate Survey Used: Yes; Who is surveyed: Students, Parents, Administrators, Teachers. Our school conducts two surveys each year, one to survey the opinions of families and the other to survey to opinions of our staff. Families report that they are satisfied with Martha F. Wilson ECDC and appreciate the environment and follow through on commitments from the school administration. Staff report that Martha F. Wilson is a strong community focused on teaching and learning.



Facilities:

At Martha F. Wilson ECDC we have added a cooking room and STEAM room. Both learning spaces provide hands-on, exploratory learning experiences that enhance early childhood education. In the cooking room students learn math, literacy and social and emotional skills while working cooperatively measuring and cooking healthy foods. The STEAM room is a dedicated space for activities in Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Math. Students are encouraged to ask questions and make predictions fostering early critical thinking, nurturing curiosity, independence, and foundational skills. Additionally, we will be establishing a sensory room to enhance the support of our students with sensory processing needs, autism or other developmental challenges. The sensory room is designed as a safe, calming place where children can self-regulate and engage with various sensory stimuli to enhance their learning and emotional well-being.



School Safety:

At Martha F. Wilson ECDC we have added a new security camera system and the use of a new visitor management. Cameras are on continuous 24/7 monitoring and recording. Cameras are placed in key locations. The new visitor screening is an additional security measure that uses a digital system upon arrival, providing a record of who is in the building and when they entered. The system allows for ID checks which enhances security.

Narrative

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Technology and STEM:

At Martha F. Wilson ECDC, students engage in technology experiences in the classroom using interactive learning tools. Students utilize Smartboards and tablets engaging in activities like drawing, matching, or interactive storybooks that make learning fun and engaging. As outlined on the NJ DOE website, "Readiness in this century demands that students actively engage in critical thinking, communication, collaboration, and creativity. Technology empowers students with real-world data, tools, experts and global outreach to actively engage in solving meaningful problems in all areas of their lives."



Early Childhood Education:

Early Childhood Education: Martha F, Wilson Early Childhood Development Center is the educational setting for approximately 320 students, ages 3-5, from 8:40-2:40. The program is based on Creative Curriculum with integration of specialized programs for students with IEP's. Martha F, Wilson ECDC meets the needs of students in a variety of ways, through general education & self-contained classrooms. Push-in resource support is available to students in the general education setting who require additional support as indicated by their IEP's.
