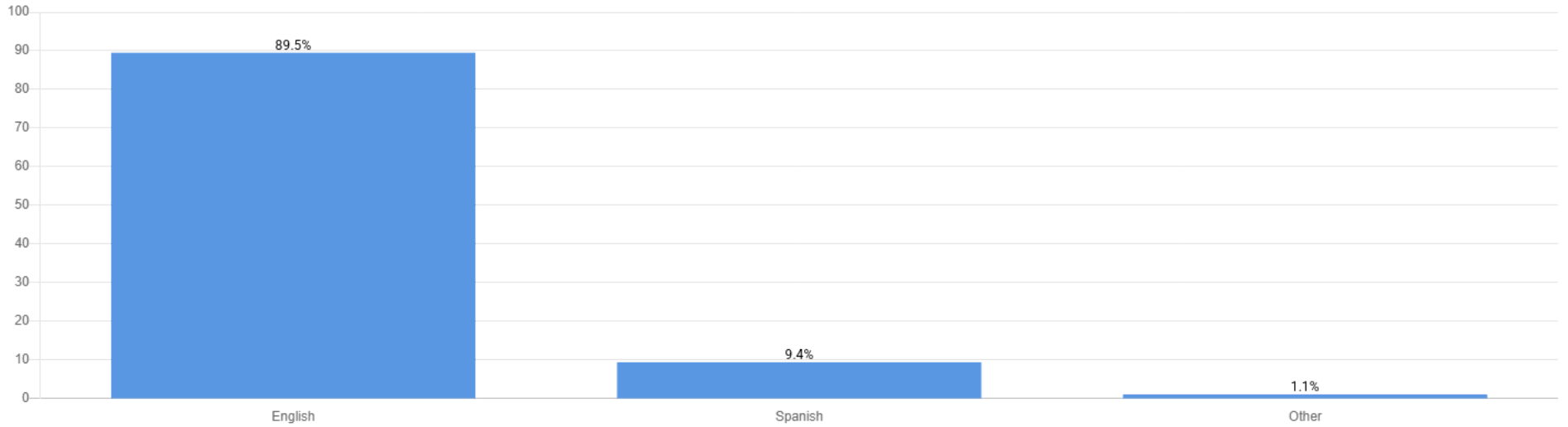

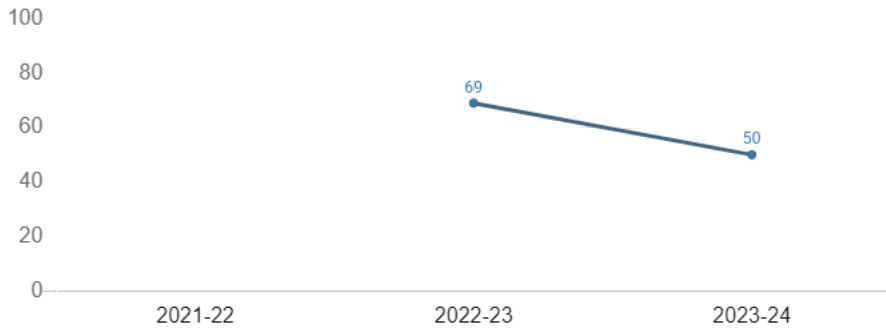

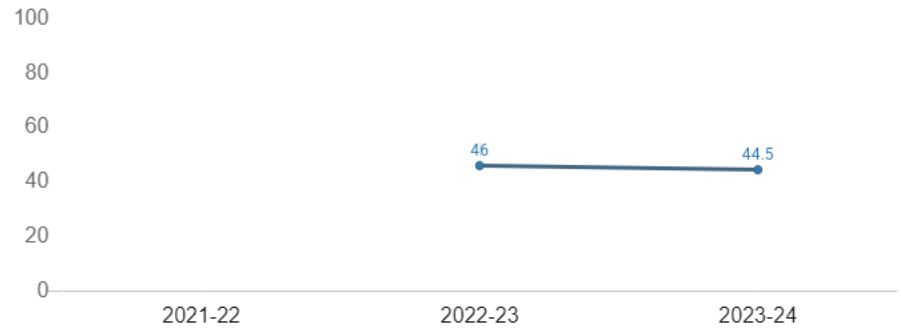

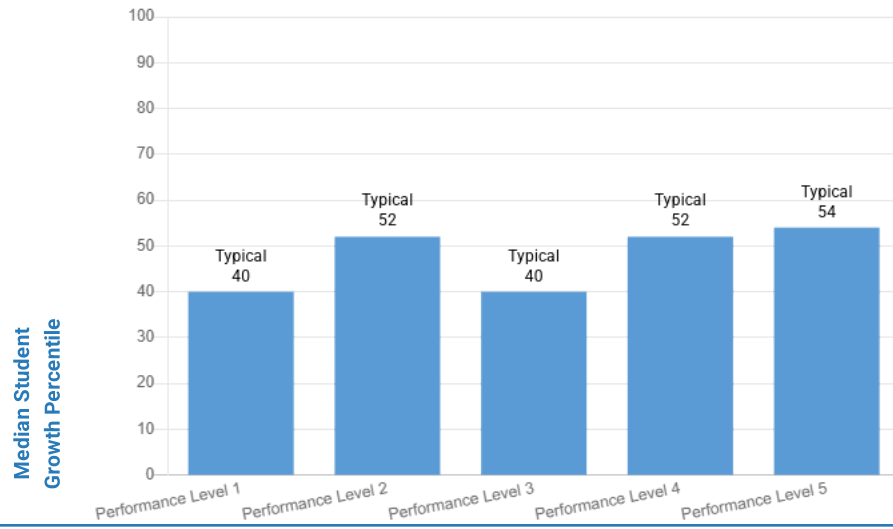

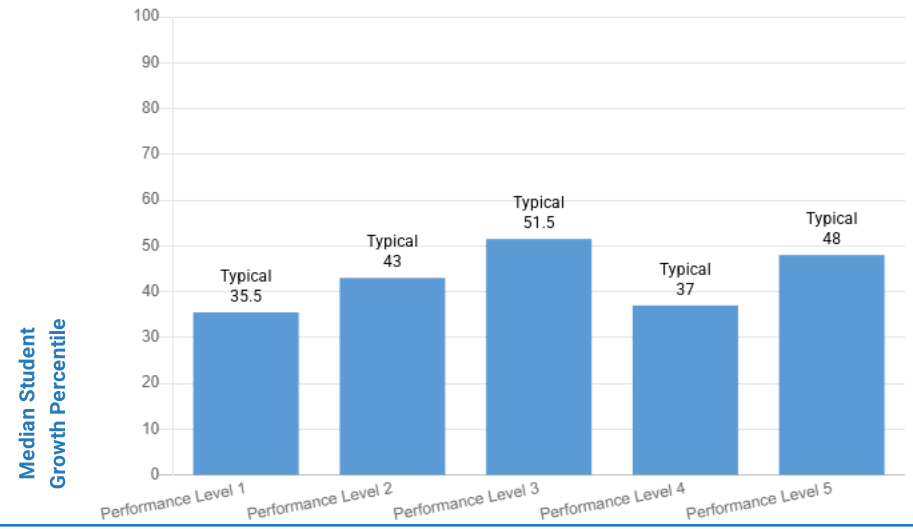

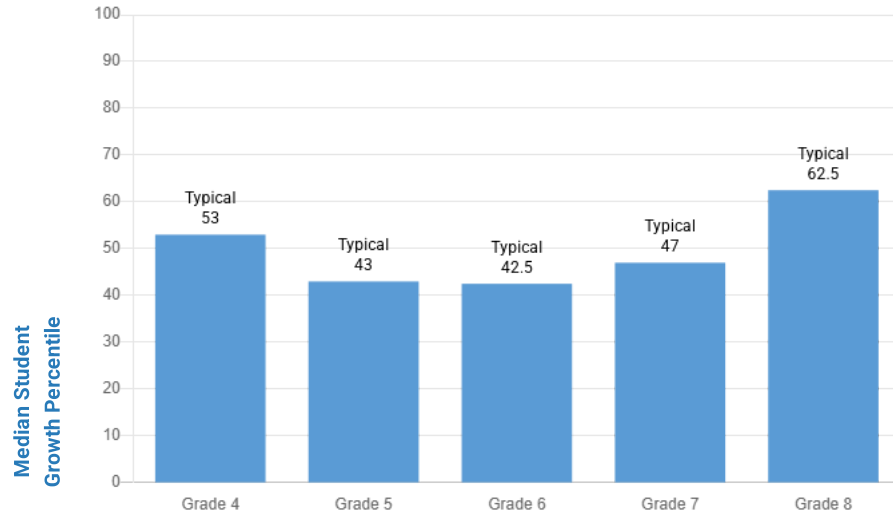

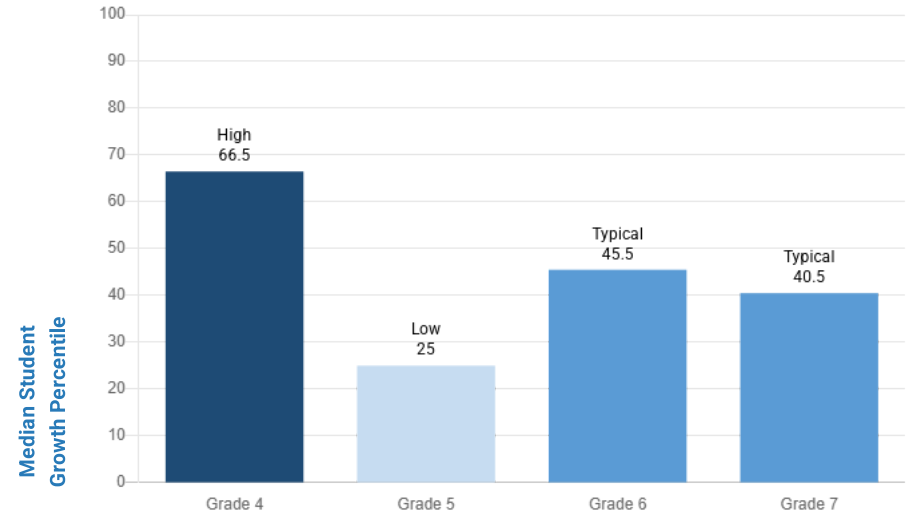

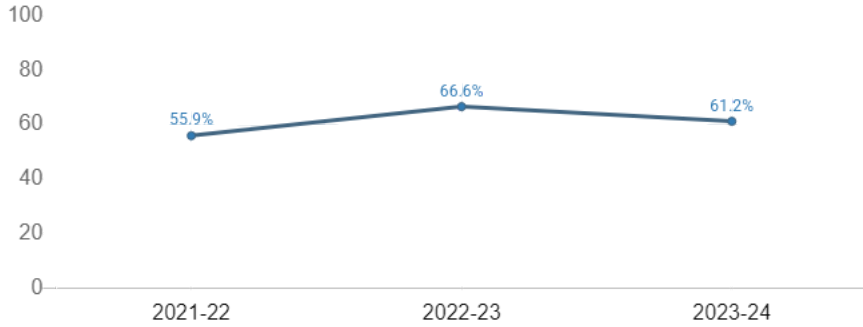

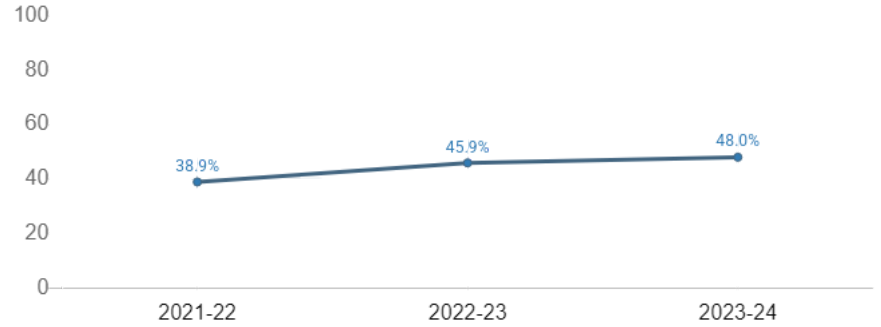
English Language Arts and Mathematics Performance Trends

These graphs show trends in the Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability over the last three years. The data includes the results of students taking both the New Jersey Student Learning Assessment (NJSLA) and the DLM alternate assessment for English language arts (ELA) and mathematics. 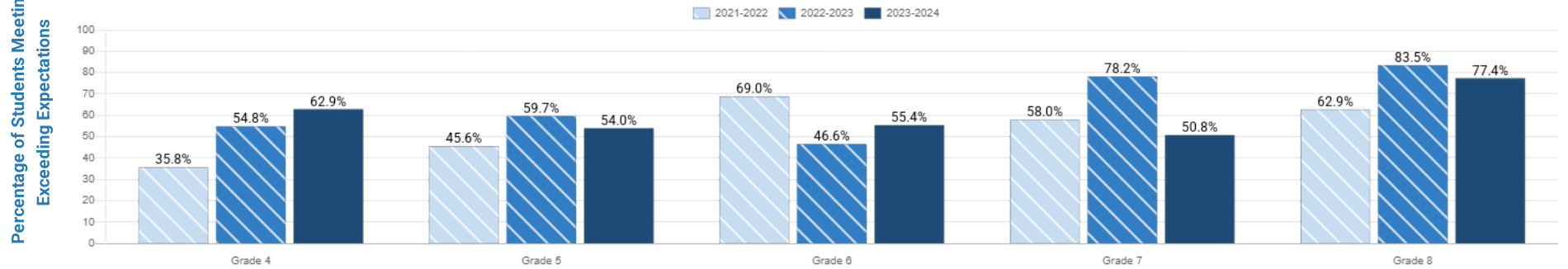

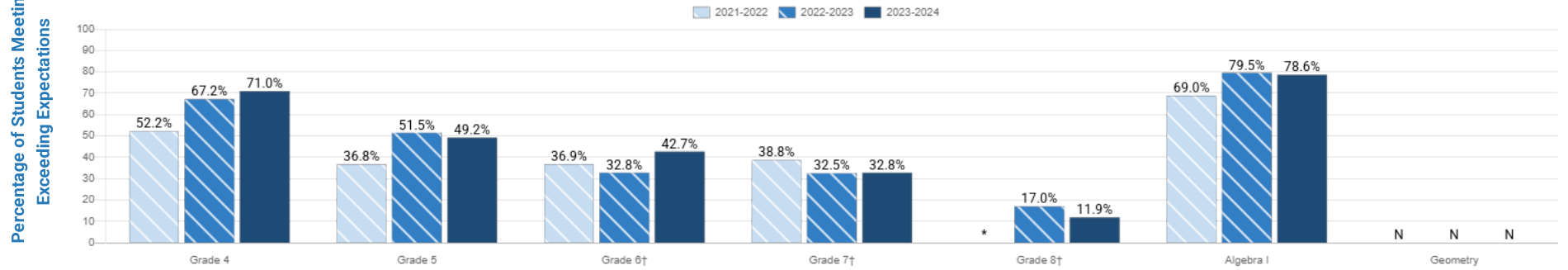

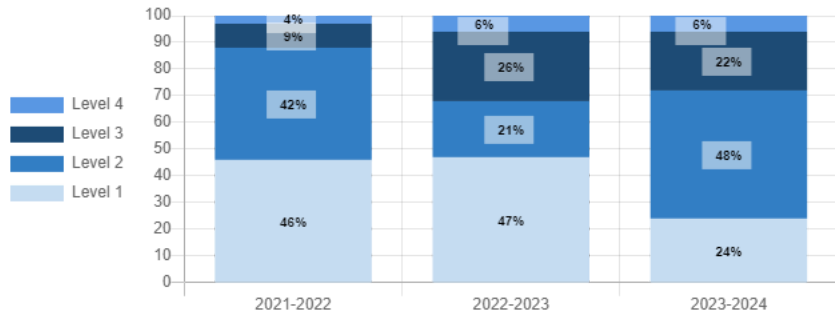

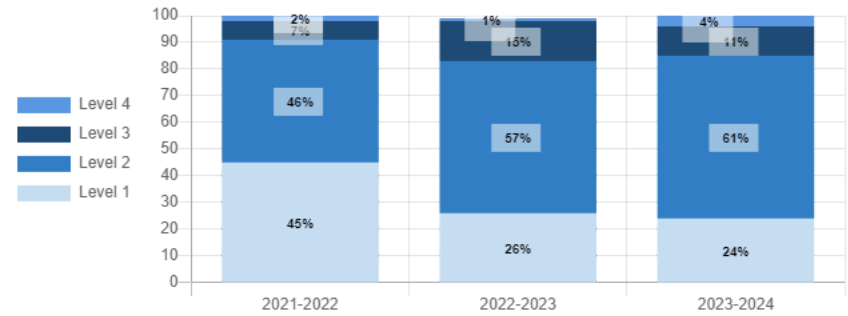

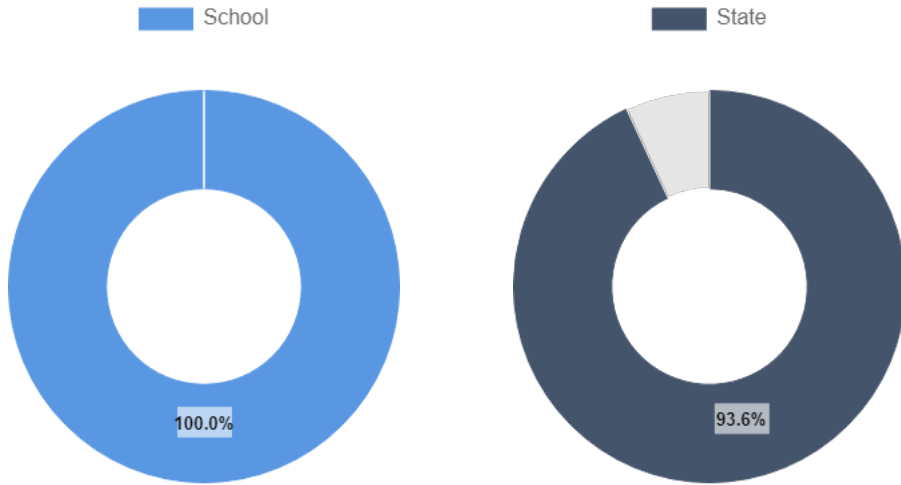

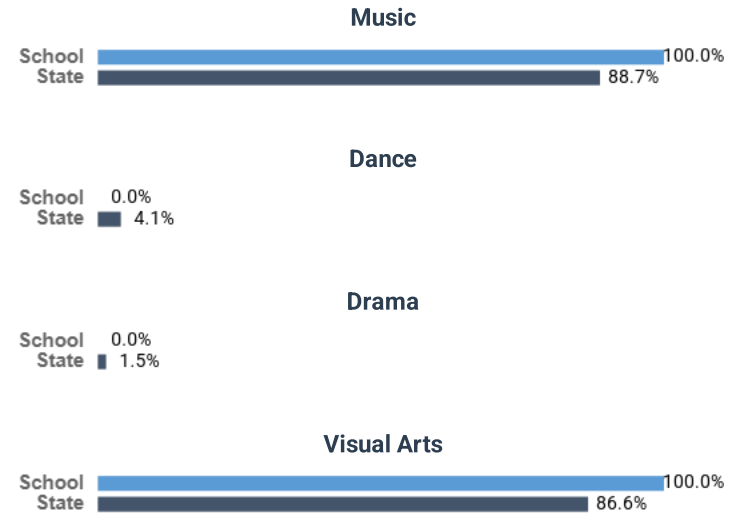

Students enrolled in one or more classes by discipline:



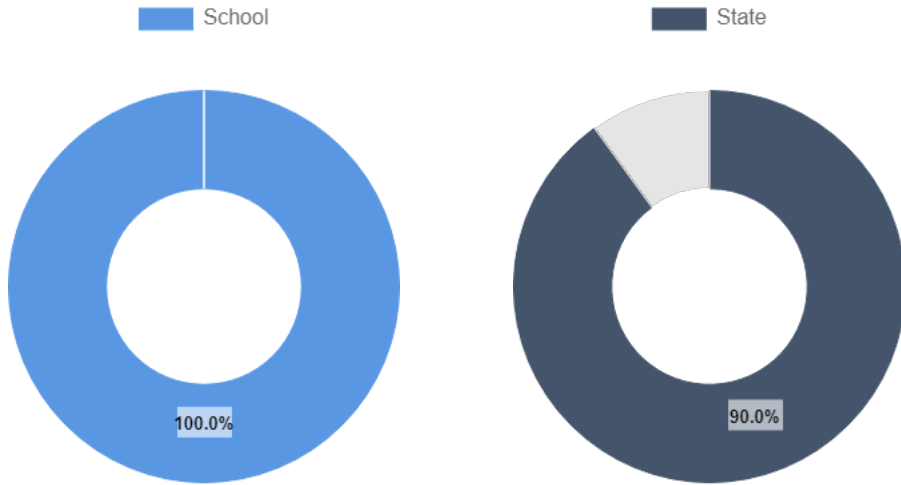

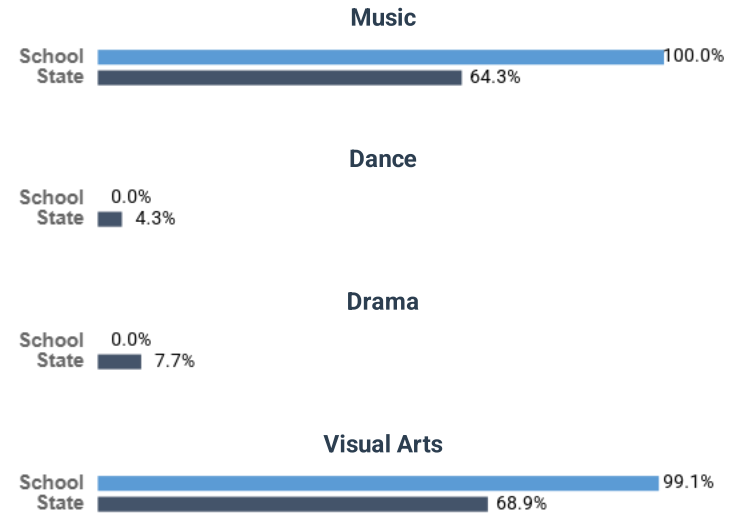

Students enrolled in one or more classes by discipline:



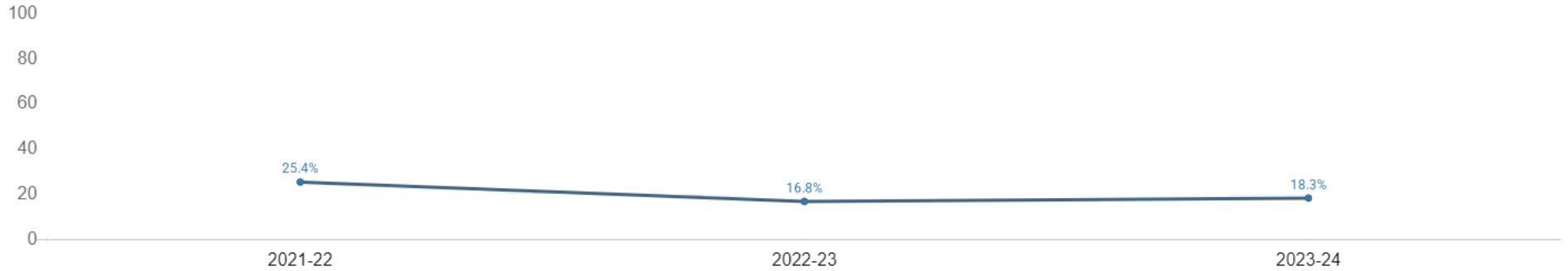

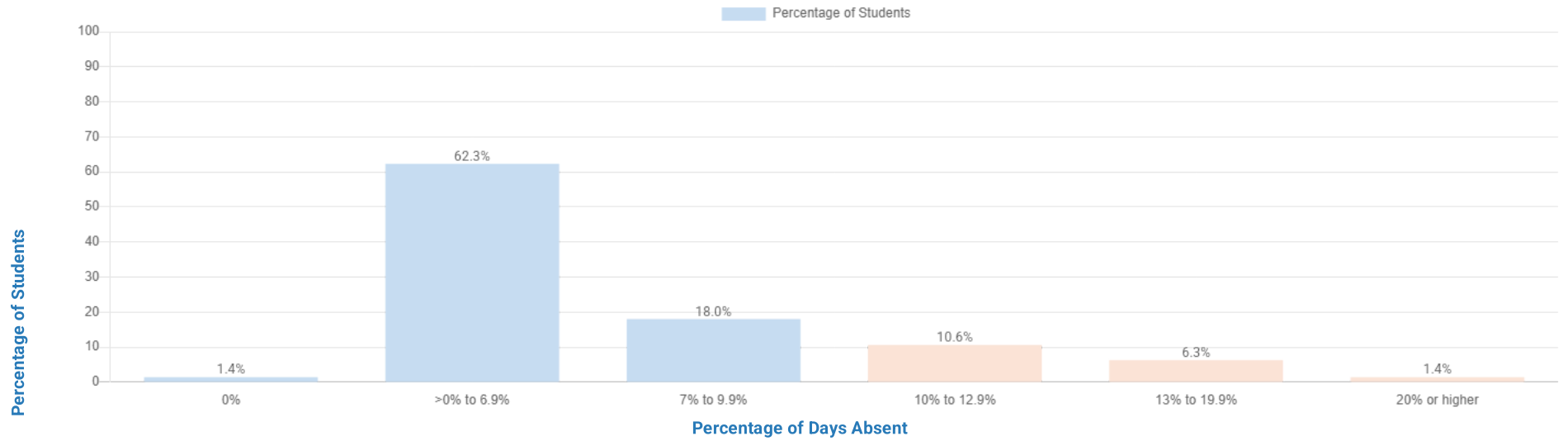

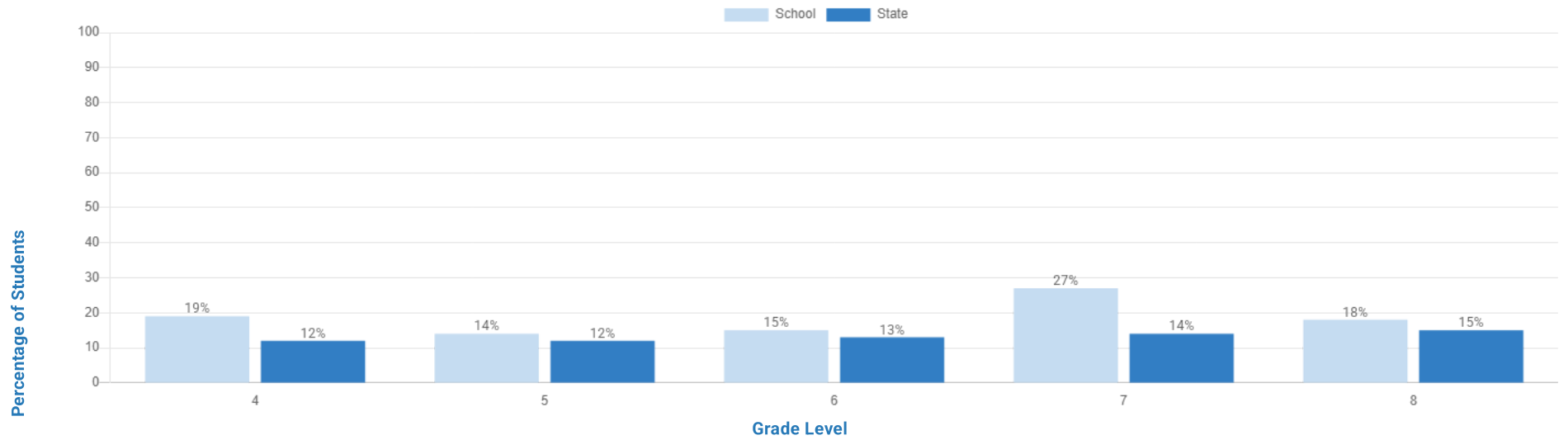

Facilities:

OCIS was built in 1965 and has had two major renovations since it opened its doors. The custodians, faculty, and students take pride in keeping the school in great shape. Technology, such as interactive boards can be found in every classroom and we are proud to offer students with one-to-one devices, utilizing Chromebooks. We are fortunate to have a courtyard that is utilized as an outdoor classroom, which includes a rain garden, bird habitats, butterfly plants, an edible garden, and a boardwalk with park benches and picnic tables. In our continued efforts to promote sustainability and be energy efficient, the building has upgraded our lighting system in an effort to save costs, reduce energy, and decrease pollution.



School Safety:

At OCIS, the safety of our students and staff is a top priority. In collaboration with local law enforcement, we continuously enhance our security procedures and facilities, regularly reviewing and debriefing after monthly drills. Staff receive annual training, and school safety remains a key focus during faculty meetings and PLCs. STEM is taught through many classes and in collaboration, as teachers utilize cross-curricular best practices, as well as team teaching. OCIS has one computer lab, a CAD lab, PCs and interactive boards in every room, and one-on-one devices with Chromebooks for our students. In our computer sciences course, students expand upon their knowledge of technology and engineering and continue to develop their innovation, problem-solving, collaboration, and critical thinking skills helping them become digital citizens of the 21st Century. Internet safety and the dangers of social media are discussed. Students will work to solve real-world problems using various types of technology such as robotics, STEAM, Google Suite, computer coding, web 2.0 tools, and much more. The Introduction to Technology course is designed to introduce the students to the world of engineering and architecture.

At OCIS, we provide an academically challenging environment with engaging programs that connect students to prior knowledge and real-life experiences. Our educational offerings include a rigorous curriculum that is both relevant and exciting, preparing students for life after secondary education, whether that path leads to college or a career. The Naviance program, supported by our guidance department, helps students plan for their future. We track academic growth through MAP (Measures of Academic Progress) testing from fall to spring, and students are assessed through standardized state testing each spring to measure achievement. We follow an elementary schedule for grades four and five, while grades six through eight operate under a middle school model. As a shore and beach community, many students walk or bike to school, and we leverage our unique environment to enrich learning opportunities and connect students to their surroundings.
