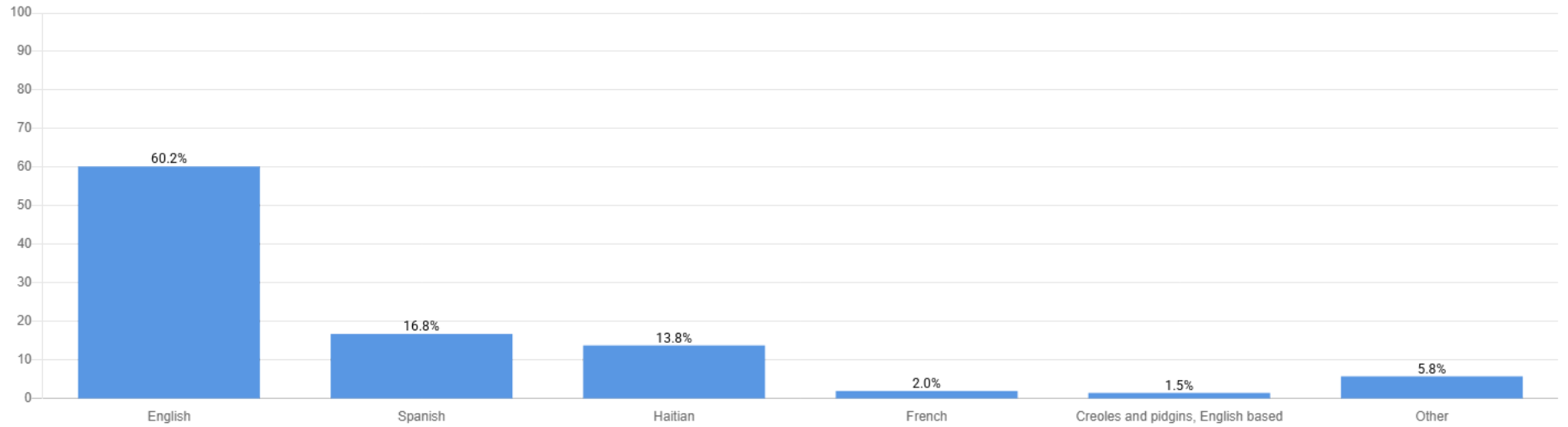

Student Growth

Student growth is a measure of how much students are learning each year. New Jersey's ESSA state plan outlines that academic progress will be measured with school's median student growth percentile (mSGP) on statewide ELA and mathematics assessments. Each individual student receives a Student Growth Percentile (SGP) for English Language Arts (ELA) in grades 4 through 8 and for Mathematics in grades 4 through 7. The SGP measures their academic progress from one year to the next compared to other students with similar prior test scores (academic peers).

A student's SGP falls between 1 and 99 and can be grouped into three levels. An SGP below 35 indicates low growth, an SGP between 35 and 65 indicates typical growth, and an SGP greater than 65 indicates high growth. If the SGPs for all students are ordered from smallest to largest, the mSGP is the percentile in the middle of the list.

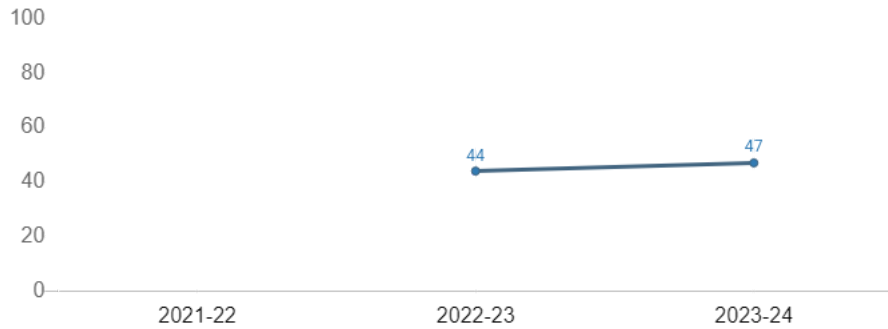

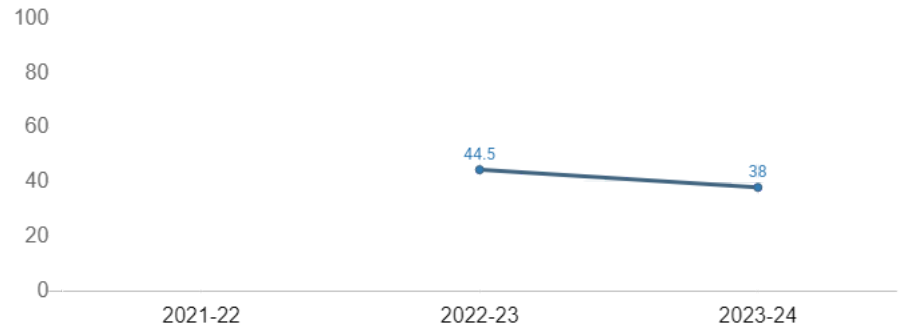

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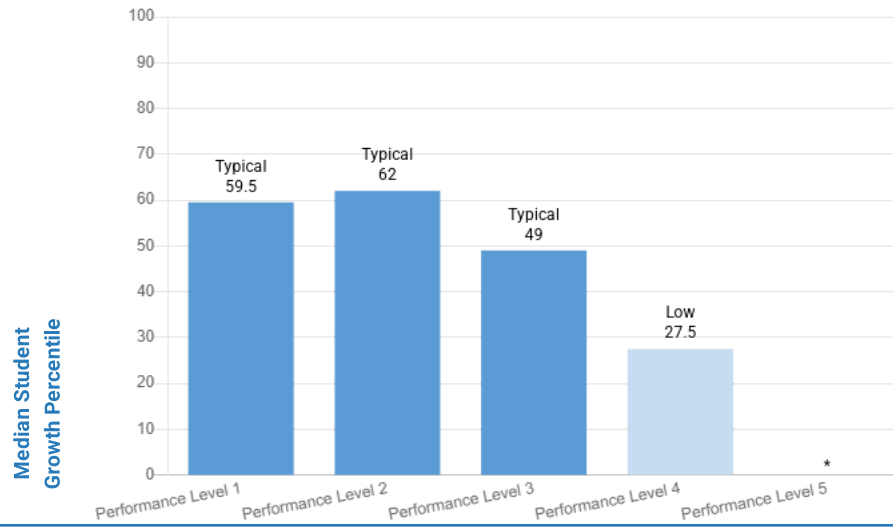
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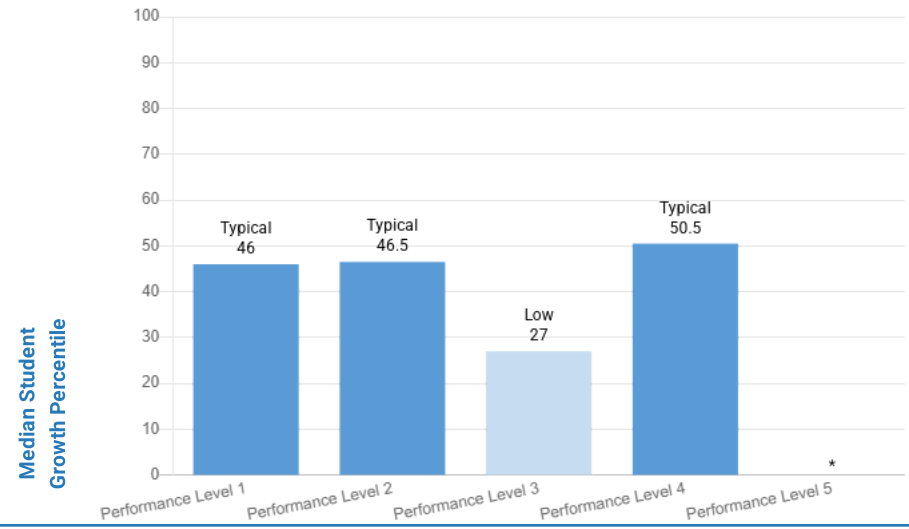

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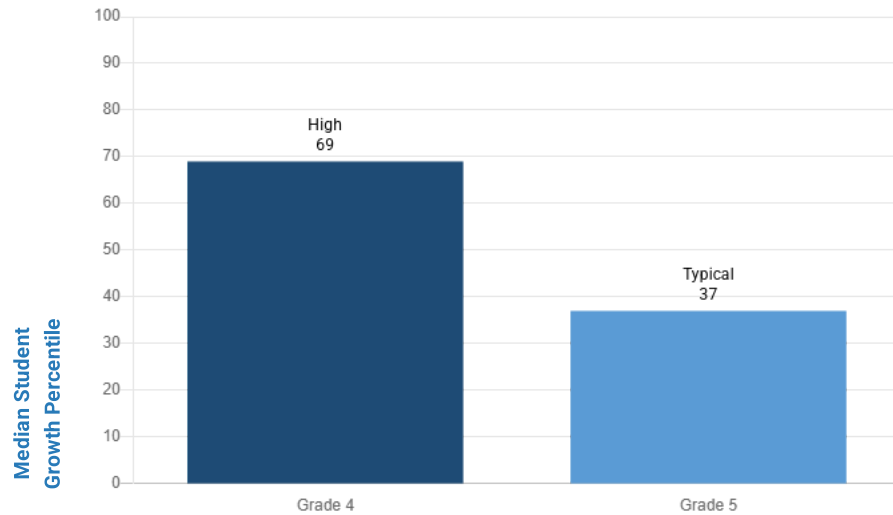
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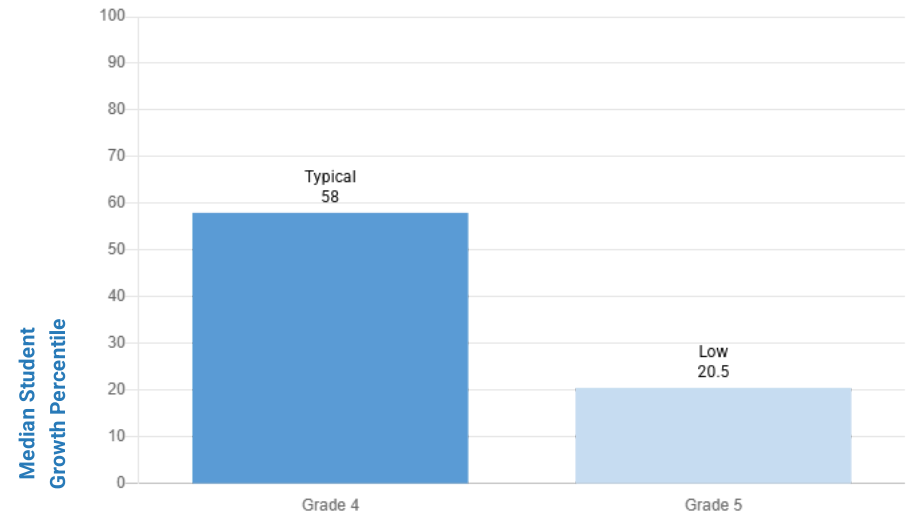

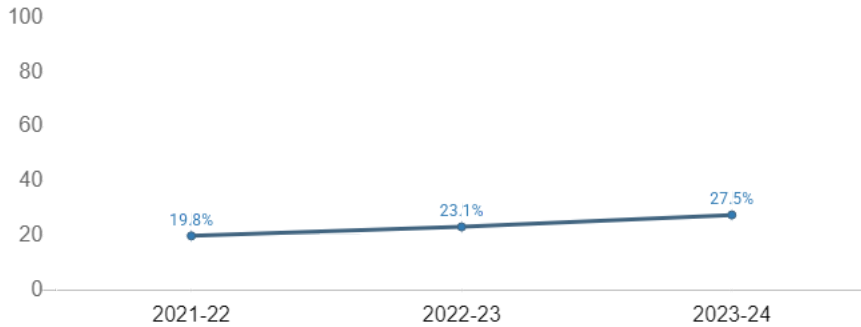

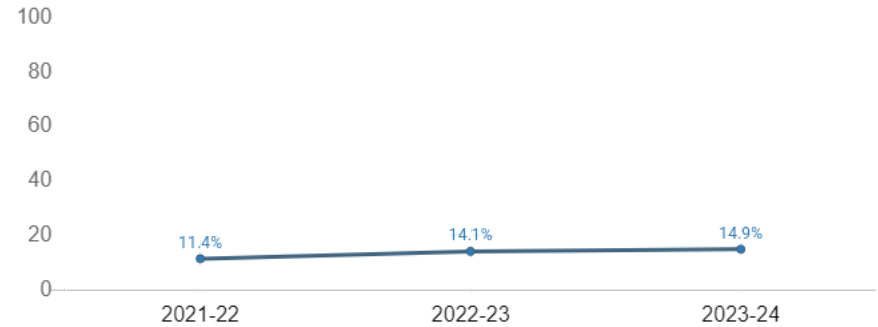
English Language Arts and Mathematics Performance Trends

These graphs show trends in the Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability over the last three years. The data includes the results of students taking both the New Jersey Student Learning Assessment (NJSLA) and the DLM alternate assessment for English language arts (ELA) and mathematics. The Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability measures the percentage of students who met or exceeded expectations on the assessments (NJSLA or DLM) with an adjustment made if the participation rate is below 95% to ensure reporting on at least 95% of students. Students who were enrolled for less than half a school year are excluded from performance results. 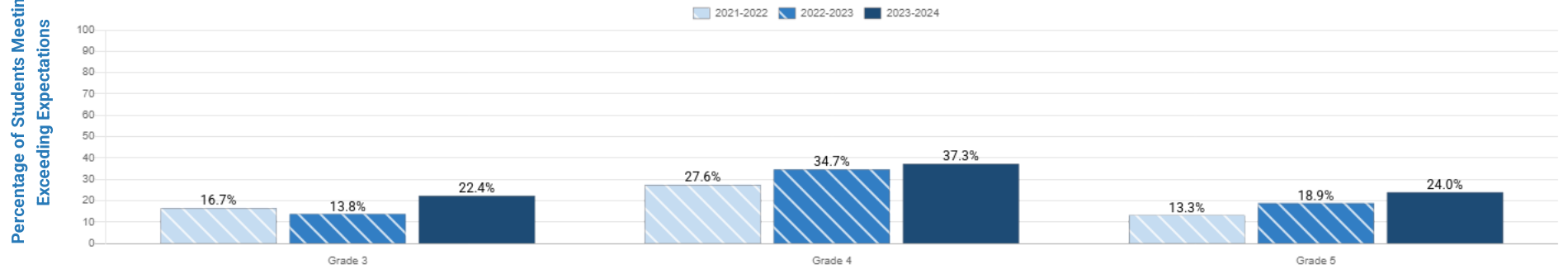

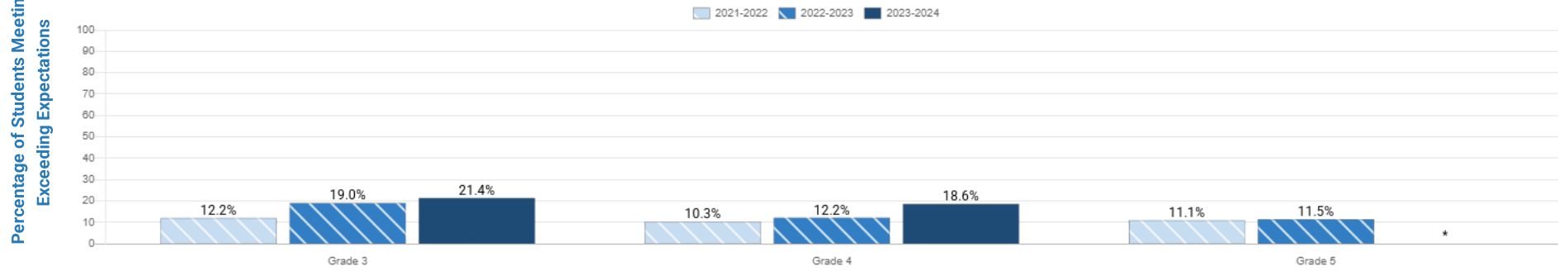

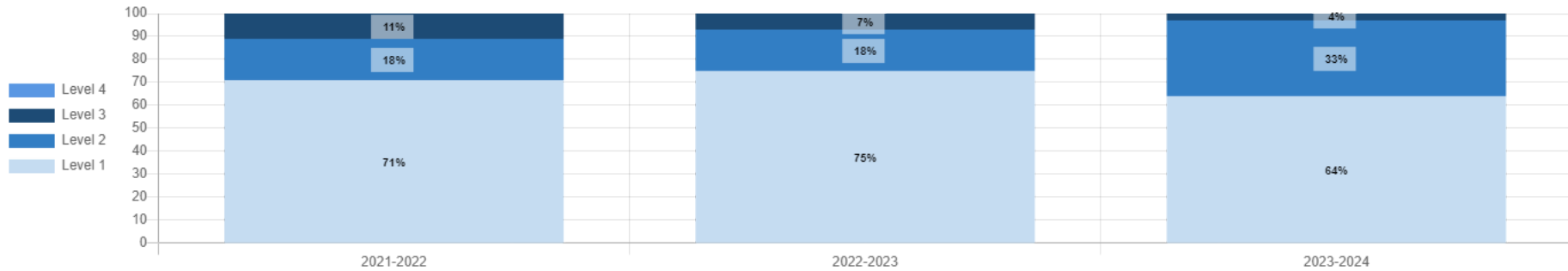

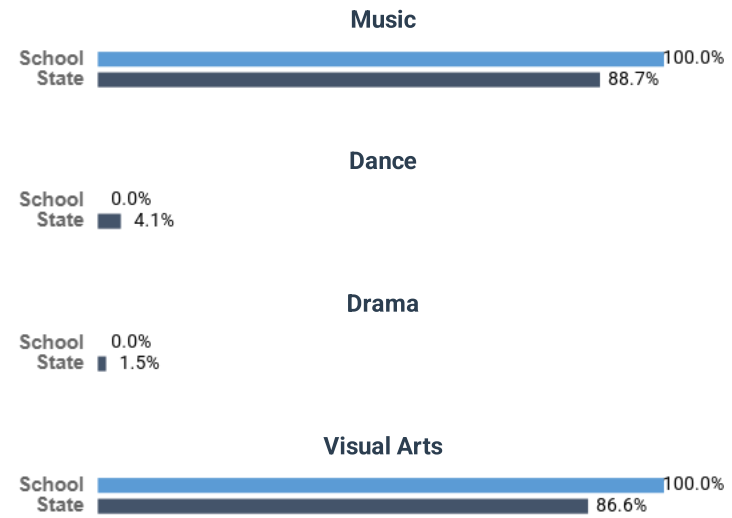

Students enrolled in one or more classes by discipline:



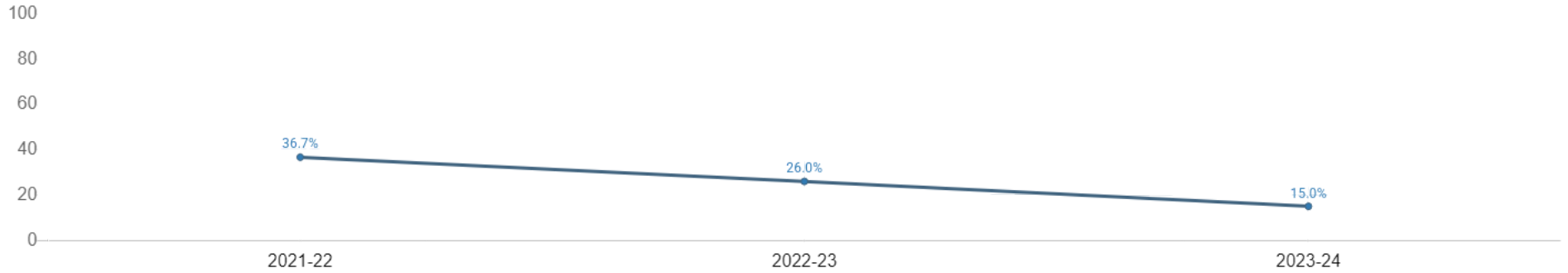

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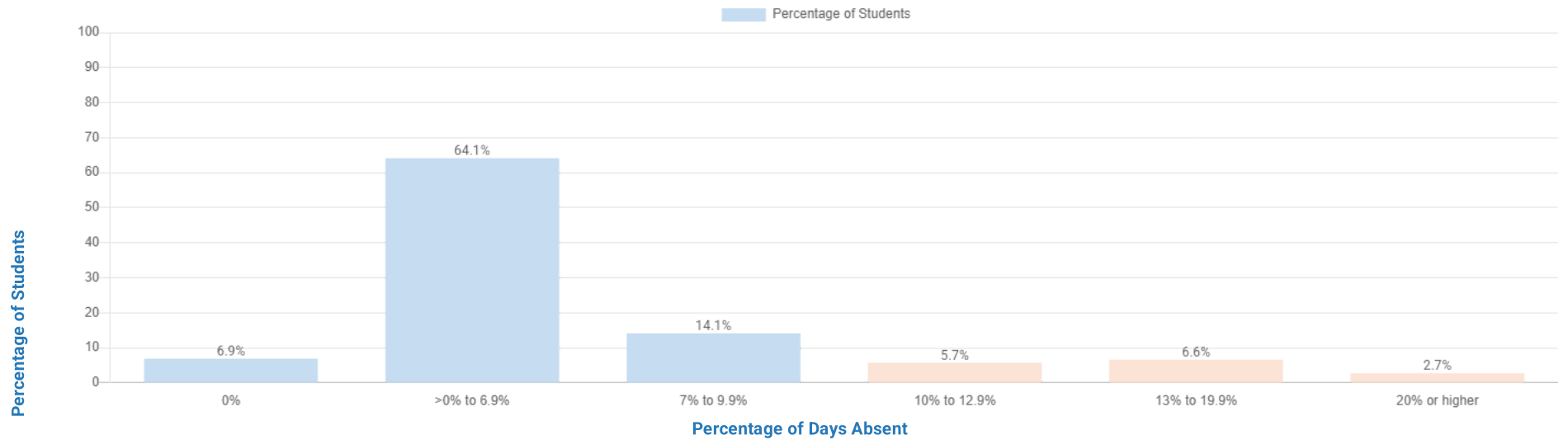

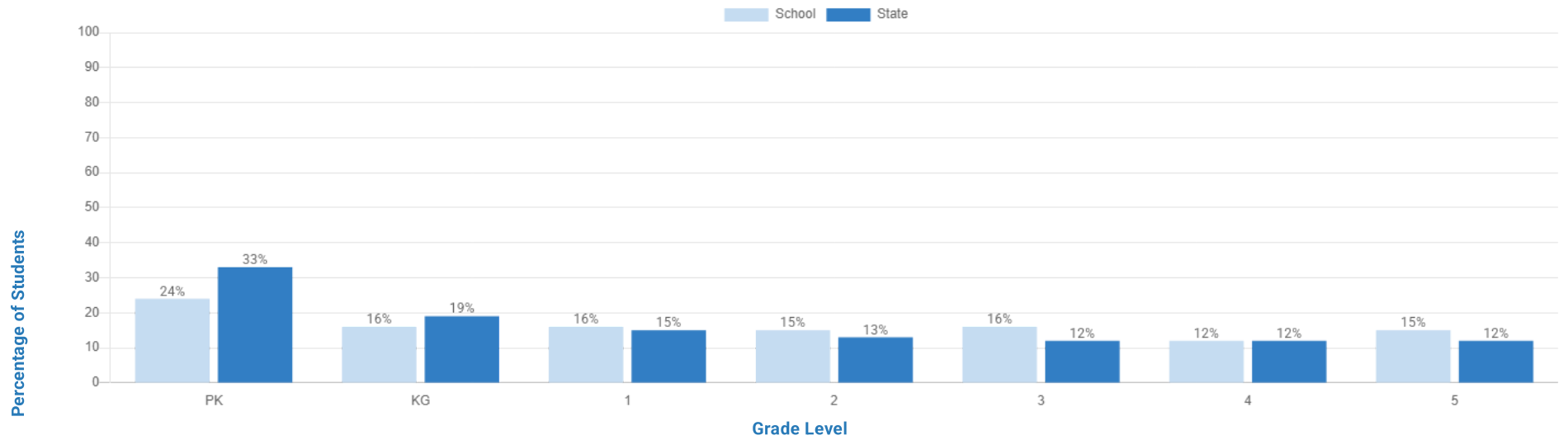


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Chronic Absenteeism by Grade

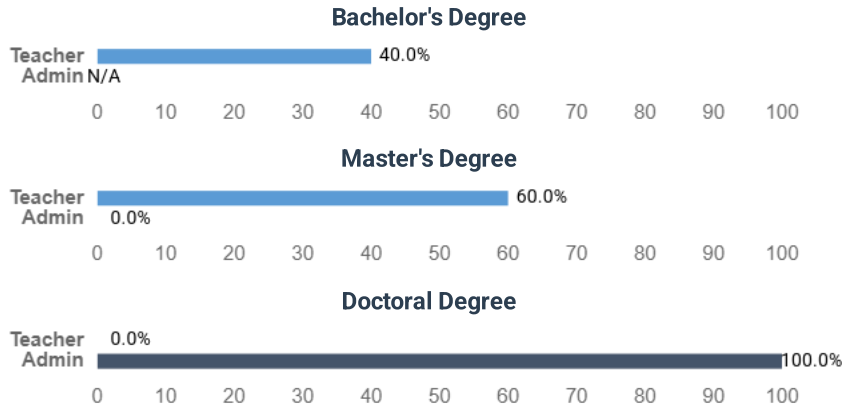

Accountability Summary by Student Group - 2023-24 School Year

We are also cognizant that the teaching-learning process progresses uniquely for each student. We are committed to providing each student with the skills and knowledge necessary to attain individual success. We follow the District's Mission Statement which inspires and instructs students to think critically, creatively, and responsibly, to embrace diversity, and to pursue their dreams with purpose. We support the development of students as lifelong learners who work towards the acquisition of knowledge. We believe that every child deserves a Champion.



Our accomplishments include but are not limited to the following: Enhance instruction by integrating technology on a daily basis. Strive to create critical thinkers and self-directed learners. Work collaboratively with all stakeholders. Include students with special needs in regular education classrooms as frequently as possible. Monitor growth and progress through various forms of assessment to track and plan for each student's educational needs. Create a nurturing environment that consists of a clear set of expectations. Work assiduously to create and maintain meaningful partnerships and connections with students and families. Prioritize professional development and stay abreast of research-based instructional strategies. Six teachers received an overall rating of Highly Effective. Our scholars won several District and County Essay Contests. We made tremendous progress and are proud of our accomplishments while being cognizant of the fact that there remains a lot of work to be done.

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Courses, Curriculum, Instruction:

Instructional programs are aligned to the NJSL and affords students a thorough and proficient knowledge and a conceptual understanding in all academic areas. ELA is overarched by Balanced Literacy and iReady Read which focus on Phonics, Phonemic Awareness, Comprehension, Vocabulary, and students' ability to read and write with fluency. Invisions and iReady Math are designed to help students develop skills for life-long critical thinking and the integration of technology into the mathematical process. Social Studies provide the tools to understand principles of American democracy and culture. Science literacy reveals an understanding of how scientists conduct their research. Health and Phys Ed programs promote physical and social-emotional development and an understanding of being healthy for life. Fourth and fifth graders receive Spanish instruction. Through language learning, students are exposed to a different set of aesthetics, cuisines, philosophies, histories and traditions.



Sports and Athletics:

Sports Offered: Basketball (Boys & Girls), Cheerleading (Coed), Football (Coed), Soccer (Coed)
Grove Street School offers a basketball program, a soccer program, and a cheerleading program. These programs enhance collaboration, sportsmanship, social skill development. The Unified Play Sports Club fosters the inclusion of students with special needs and others in order to create a sense of teamwork, sportsmanship and an acceptance of differences.



Clubs and Activities:

Grove Street School offers several after school clubs geared towards academic achievement, teamwork, and sportsmanship. The Unified Play Sports Club meets once a week from November through June. The club's main focus is to foster the inclusion of all students and to provide a safe and healthy environment for students to engage in learning various sports and activities. The Instrumental Band Club meets once per week and students learn to play musical instruments. This club meets from November through June. The Grove Street Choir is also an afterschool activity that meets once per week. Students in grades 2-5 prepare and practice for performances throughout the year. Students also participate in the the Book Club which meets once per week throughout the school year. The phenomenal cheerleading squad meets once each week to prepare for performances at school, district, and township activities.

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Before and After School Programs:

The After School Enrichment Program meets twice per week to provide a range of benefits including improved academic performance, enhanced social skills, exploration of interests, increased confidence, a safe supervised environment, and opportunities for creative development, all while allowing students to delve deeper into subjects beyond the standard curriculum and potentially discover new passions. Additionally, participation in the After School Enrichment Program has also enhanced the academic performance of students.



Staff and Professional Learning:

Staff members are provided with continuous professional development. District wide in-service sessions focus on content specific professional development to meet the needs of staff, use data to make informed decisions and design congruent instruction. Data usage has become a main point for dialogue on improving student academic achievement and improving staff productivity. It continues to provide a rich source of information regarding strategies, programs, and performance. It paints an accurate picture of the school and is used to remind all stakeholders of the sense of urgency as we work to inspire all students. Staff members use numerous types of data to create flexible and cooperative learning groups. Faculty, PLCs and collaborative meetings with consultants are used to explore and disaggregate information from various sources. In alignment with the district's goals and mission, we continue to participate in PD regarding the incorporation of best practices in technology and SEL.



Student Supports and Services:

Student support services are extremely important in Grove Street School because they can help students with their academic, personal, and social needs. They can also help students develop skills that will prepare them for the future. Attending high-quality afterschool programs and regular participation can lead to improved social and emotional competencies, including prosocial behavior, intrinsic motivation, better concentration efforts, and a higher sense of self-worth and a sense of self-efficacy. Students who receive support are more likely to succeed academically. This can include help with clarifying concepts, study techniques, and a plethora of additional resources.

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Student Health and Wellness:

Student health and wellness is crucial because it directly impacts a student's ability to learn, achieve academically, maintain positive social relationships, and overall thrive in their educational environment. 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Facilities:

Teachers and support staff utilize a variety of interactive lessons to facilitate the transfer of information and encourage hands-on student engagement. 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Early Childhood Education:

Pre-schoolers are guided by the Creative Curriculum. This encompasses learning objectives and activities, which address areas of growth. It is an inclusive educational program that builds on learning experiences, which helps to develop lifelong learners who work to analyze and solve problems. Learning is accelerated and builds on the strengths and interests of each student. Students are involved in the learning process and their progress is documented through authentic assessment.
