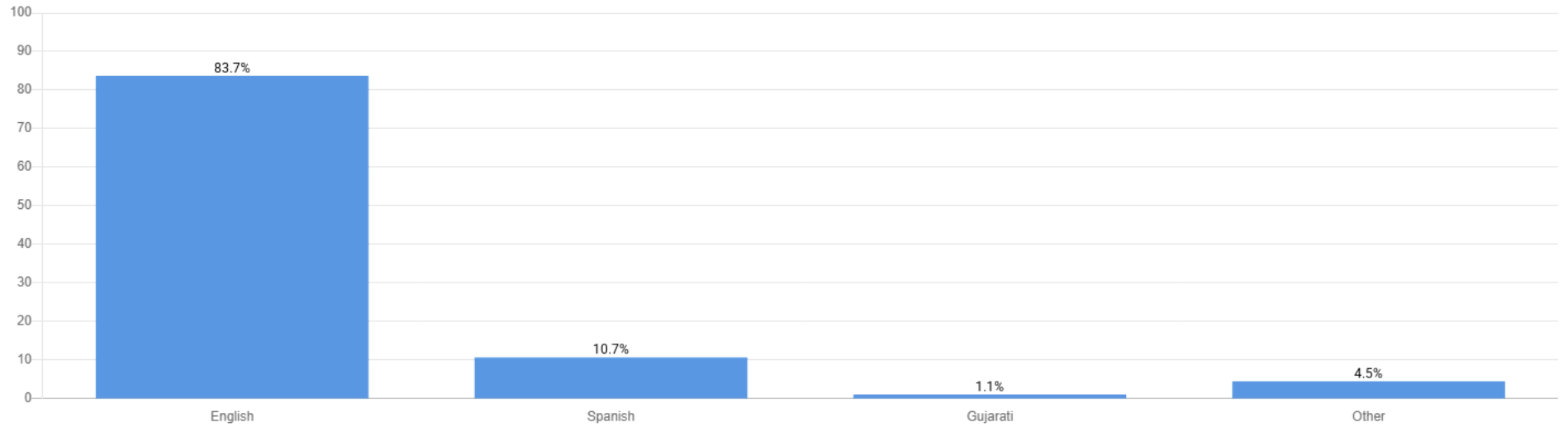

Student Growth

Student growth is a measure of how much students are learning each year. New Jersey's ESSA state plan outlines that academic progress will be measured with school's median student growth percentile (mSGP) on statewide ELA and mathematics assessments. Each individual student receives a Student Growth Percentile (SGP) for English Language Arts (ELA) in grades 4 through 8 and for Mathematics in grades 4 through 7. The SGP measures their academic progress from one year to the next compared to other students with similar prior test scores (academic peers).

A student's SGP falls between 1 and 99 and can be grouped into three levels. An SGP below 35 indicates low growth, an SGP between 35 and 65 indicates typical growth, and an SGP greater than 65 indicates high growth. If the SGPs for all students are ordered from smallest to largest, the mSGP is the percentile in the middle of the list.

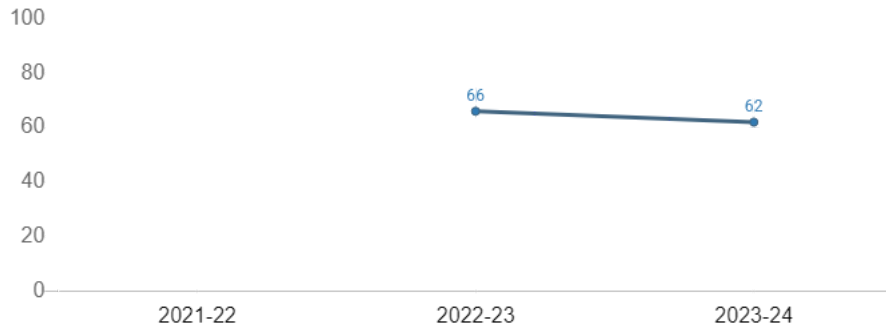

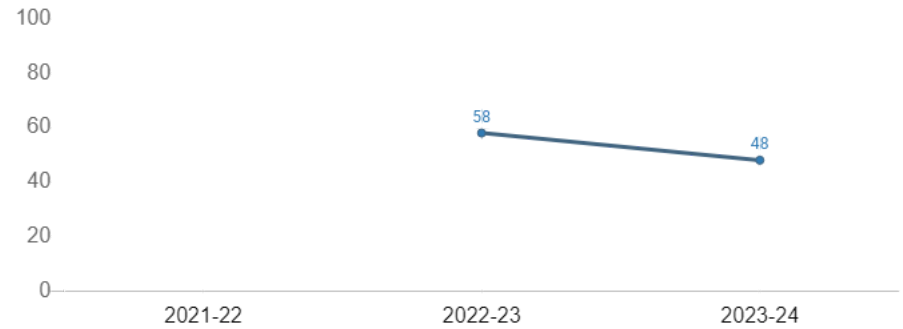

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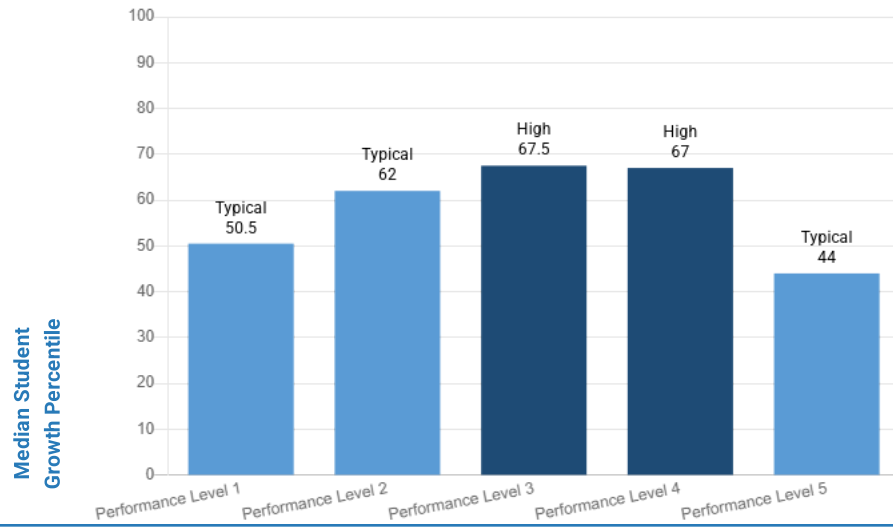
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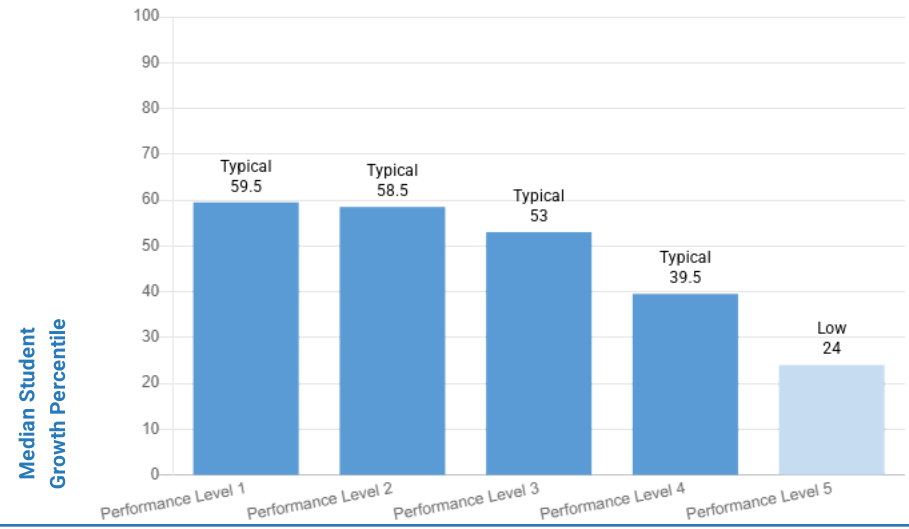

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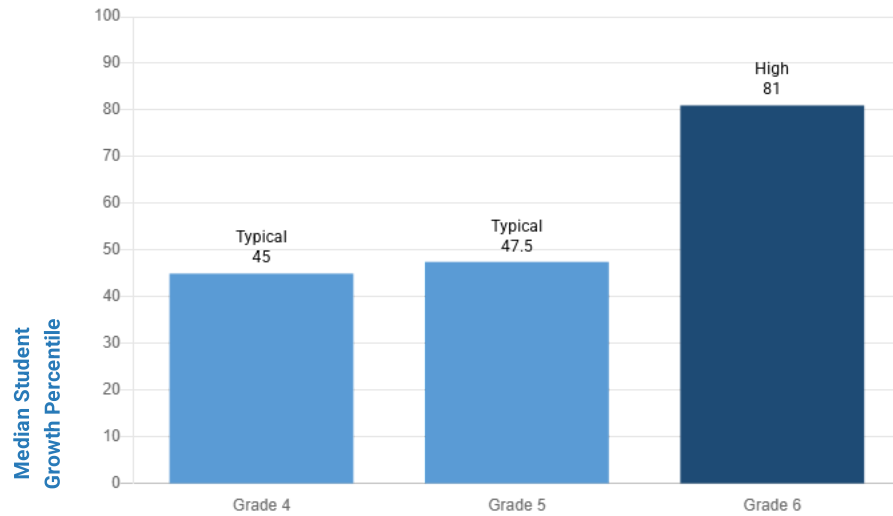
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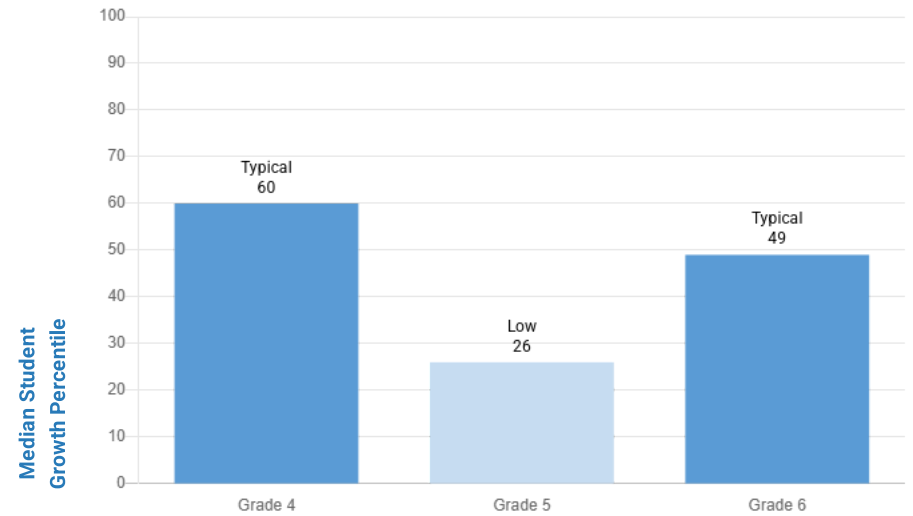

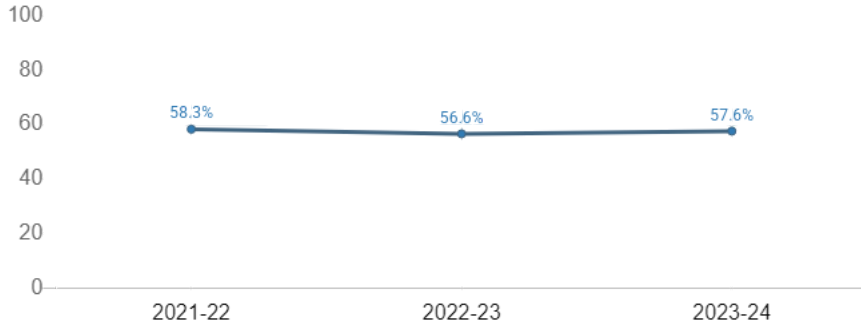

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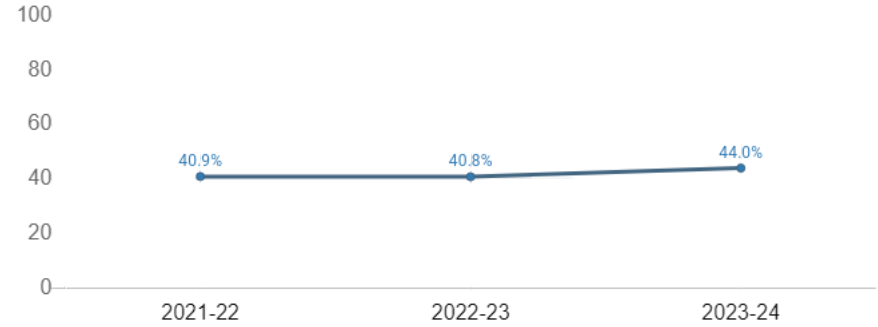
English Language Arts and Mathematics Performance Trends

These graphs show trends in the Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability over the last three years. The data includes the results of students taking both the New Jersey Student Learning Assessment (NJSLA) and the DLM alternate assessment for English language arts (ELA) and mathematics. The Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability measures the percentage of students who met or exceeded expectations on the assessments (NJSLA or DLM) with an adjustment made if the participation rate is below 95% to ensure reporting on at least 95% of students. Students who were enrolled for less than half a school year are excluded from performance results. The table below provides participation rates, proficiency rates, annual targets and status in meeting the targets, and statewide proficiency rates.

English Language Arts Assessment - Participation and Performance

This table shows performance on statewide assessments for English language arts (ELA) both overall and by student group. It includes the results of students taking both the NJSLA and DLM. NJSLA results for ELA include only students in grades 3 through 9. Students who were enrolled for less than half a school year are excluded from performance results. Student are considered to have met or exceeded expectations if they score at Level 4 or 5 on the NJSLA or at Level 3 or 4 on the DLM.

This table shows both the percentage of students who met or exceeded expectations and a proficiency rate used for federal accountability. The proficiency rate for federal accountability will be lower if the participation rate is below 95%. This table also shows status in meeting annual targets. Annual targets are specific to each student group, school, and district and represent the expected proficiency needed to stay on track to meet long-term goals. Student groups where the annual target fields are grayed out are not required to meet annual targets under ESSA accountability. 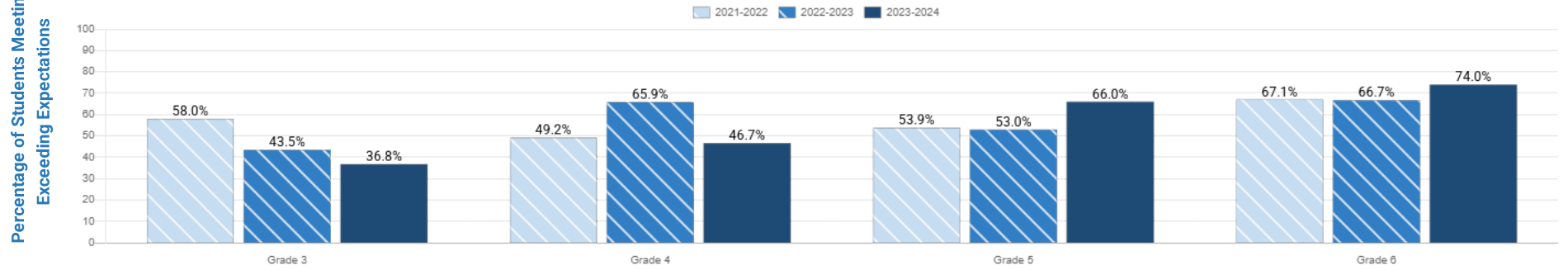

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Mathematics Assessment - Participation and Performance

NJSLA results include students taking end-of-grade assessments in grades 3 through 8, as well as end-of-course assessments (Algebra I, Geometry, Algebra II) in middle school and high school. High school mathematics assessment results include all results for Algebra I and Geometry and/or Algebra II results only for students who took Algebra I in middle school and who are enrolled in their first high school mathematics course that corresponds to an end-of-course assessment. 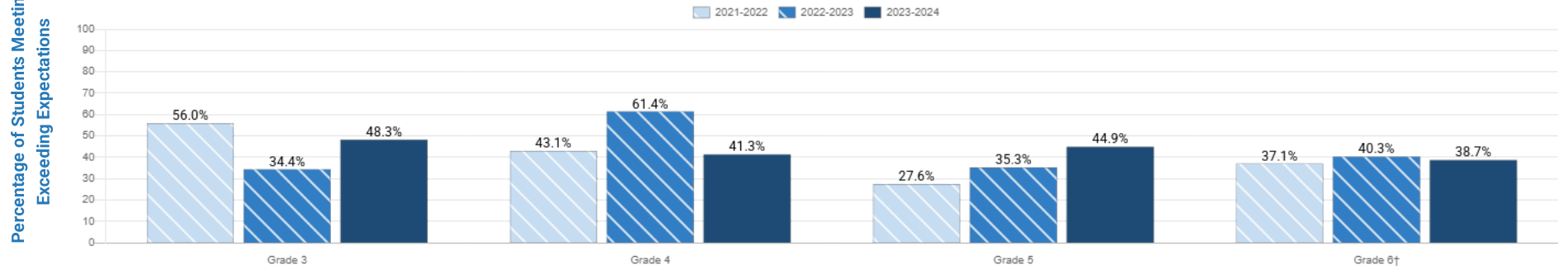

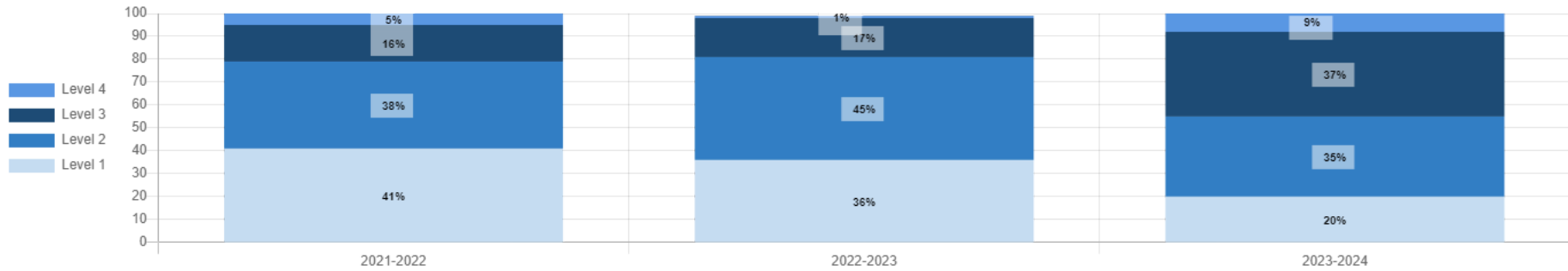

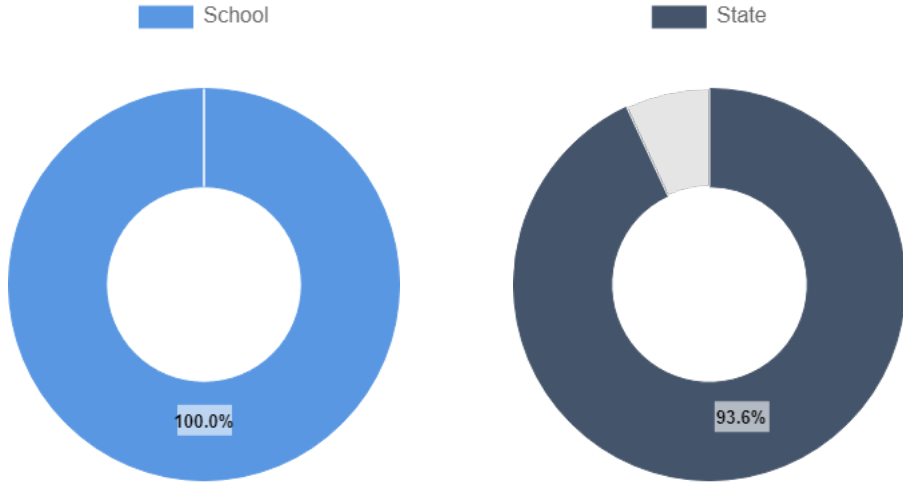

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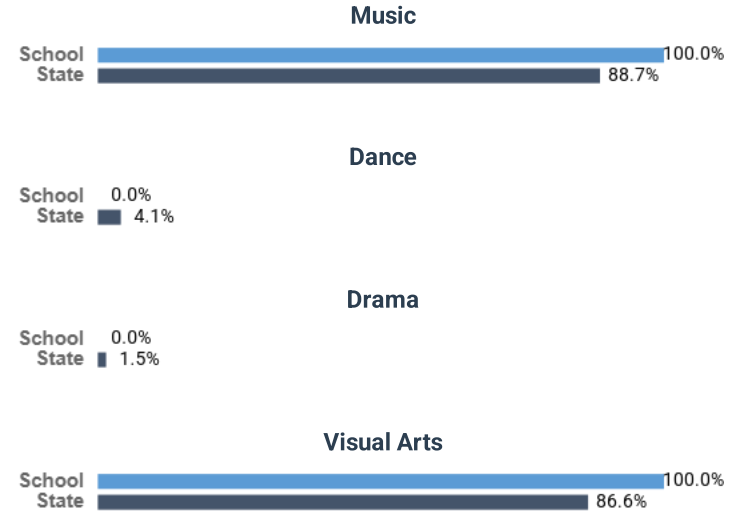

Students enrolled in one or more classes by discipline:



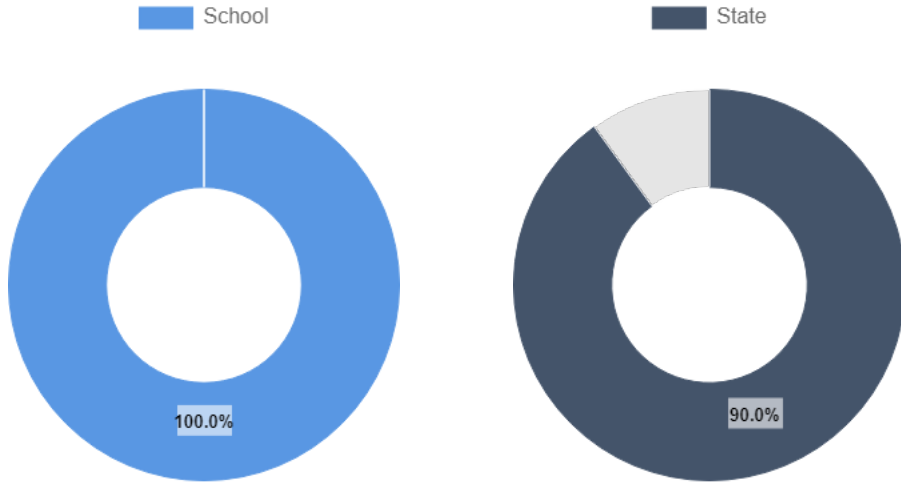
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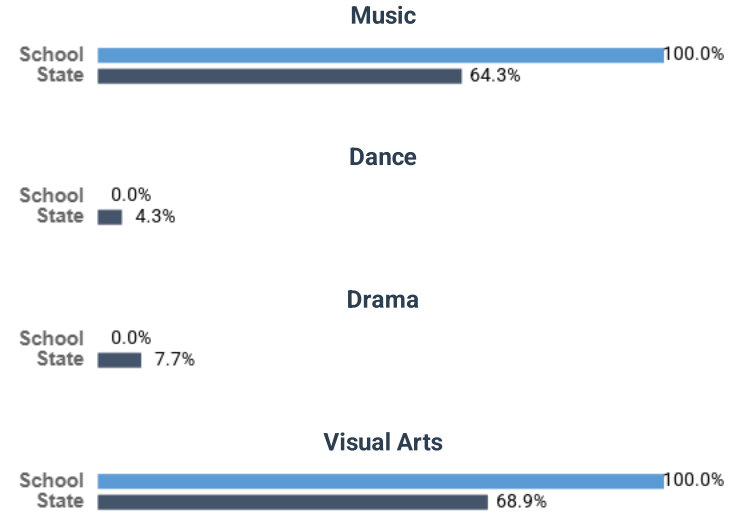

Students enrolled in one or more classes by discipline:



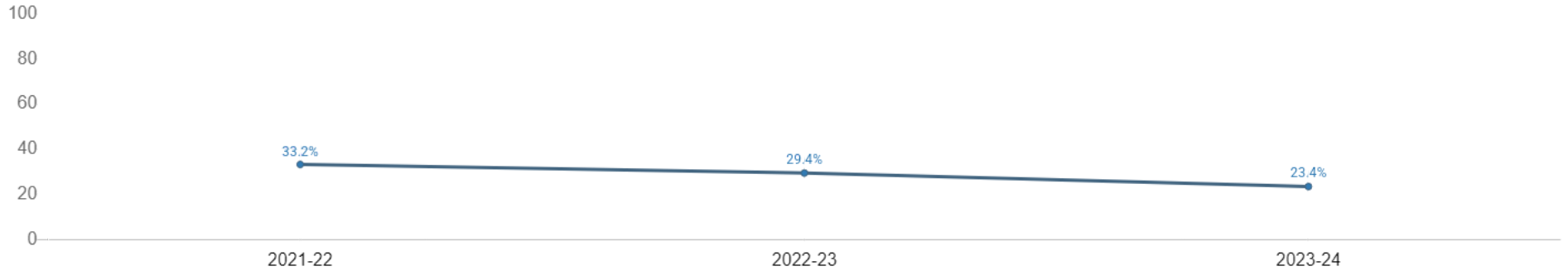
Climate and Environment

Student absences provide important information about a school's culture and climate. Research shows that absences impact a student's ability to succeed in school. The NJDOE used input from stakeholders to select chronic absenteeism as its measure of school quality and student success for the ESSA accountability plan. **Chronic absenteeism** is defined as being absent for 10% or more of the days enrolled during the school year. A student who is not present for any reason, whether excused, unexcused, or for disciplinary action, is considered absent unless permitted by state statute or regulations. Students with fewer than 45 days in membership are excluded from attendance calculations.

Chronic Absenteeism Trends

This table shows the number and percentage of students in grades K-12 both overall and by student group who were chronically absent during the school year. Pursuant to N.J.S.A. 18A:38-25.1, any school where 10 percent or more of the students enrolled are chronically absent must develop a corrective action plan to improve chronic absenteeism rates. The Requires Corrective Action Plan column in the table indicates whether the school's chronic absenteeism rate is 10% or higher, meaning that the school must complete a corrective action plan. The NJDOE Data-based Decision Making for Addressing Chronic Absenteeism guidance document (found on the [NJDOE attendance page](#) under Chronic Absenteeism) provides districts with guidance on responding to chronic absenteeism and includes sample corrective action plan templates.

The ESSA Target: State Average for Grades Served column is the target used for ESSA accountability purposes. It reflects the statewide average for students in the grades offered by the school. Each student group has the same target based on all students, so the same ESSA Target will appear for all student groups. The last column shows whether the rate for each student group was above the state average ("Not Met") or less than or equal to the state average ("Met").

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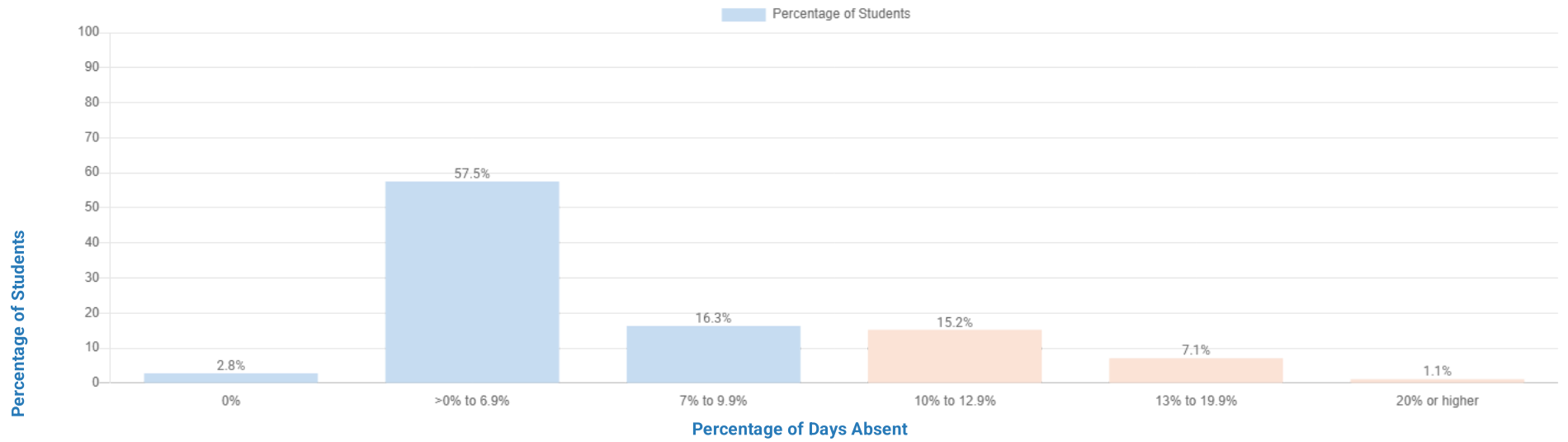

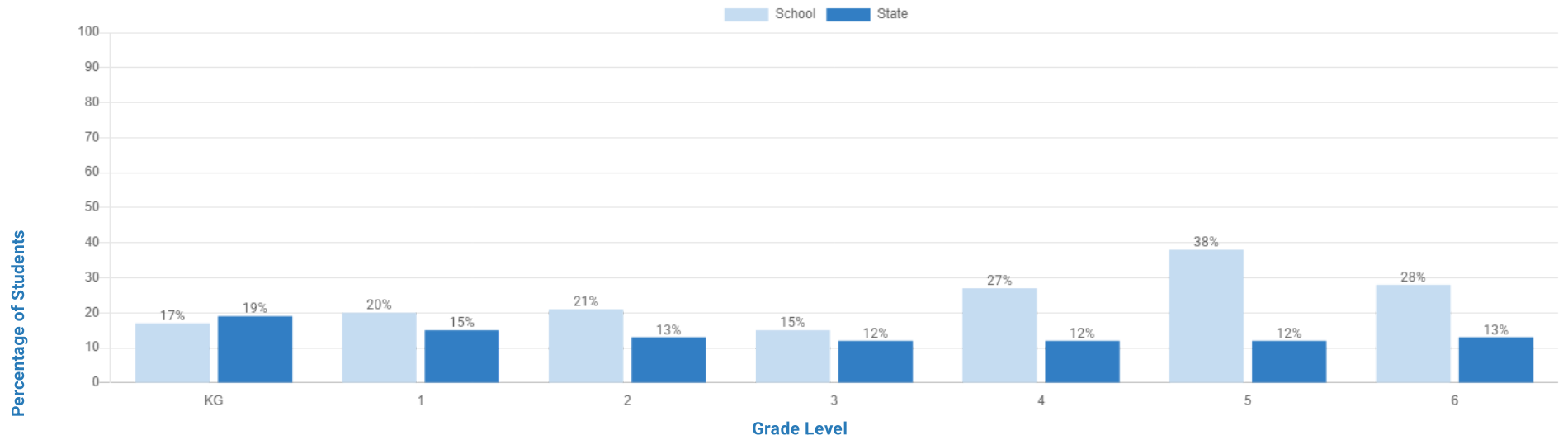


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Chronic Absenteeism by Grade

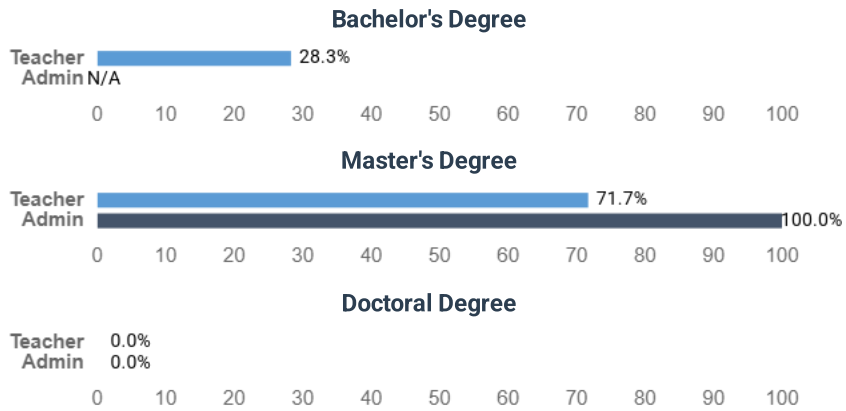

Accountability Summary by Student Group - 2023-24 School Year

The NJDOE is required under ESSA to identify schools for Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI) annually and for Additional Targeted Support and Improvement (ATSI) every three years. Both TSI and ATSI identifications are based on how student groups within schools perform. Schools are identified for ATSI if they have at least one student group that has a summative score that would be in the bottom 5% of Title I schools if it was its own school. Highlights:

- Lincoln School houses approximately 450 students in grades K-6. The school houses the LLD special education classes for the district in grades K-6 as well.
- The Lincoln School community utilizes a "whole child" approach in order to support students who are happy, healthy, safe, engaged, challenged, and empowered to learn, grow, and achieve.
- Lincoln School students strive to be "Lincoln Leaders" by embodying our core values: Respect, Honesty, Perseverance, Empathy, Kindness, Courage, Teamwork, Inclusion, and Safety.



Mission, Vision, Theme:

The Lincoln School community strives to create a nurturing, academic learning environment where our students are supported and inspired, as they uncover their passions, learn from their mistakes, and gain independence as they learn, grow, and achieve. We view ourselves as lifelong learners - understanding the value of working hard to meet high expectations, while reflecting and adjusting along the way. We share a sense of pride in our school and each other's strengths, unique talents, and achievements. We recognize that our emotions, actions, and words impact our relationships with others. We value empathy, compassion, understanding, and acceptance. We are cognizant of the potential of all of our students and strive to provide each with a researched-based curriculum, tailored to fit their individual needs.



Awards, Recognition, Accomplishments:

Lincoln School students participate in Law Fair, Forensics, and Challenge 24 Math Competitions. The Nutley school district is recognized as one of the top 100 school districts for its music program.

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Courses, Curriculum, Instruction:

The faculty infuses current instructional strategies, methods, and materials into all subject areas. Some of the programs/methods that our staff members utilize in our classrooms include: Balanced Literacy, Reading & Writing Workshop, Foundations, Math in Focus, Mystery Science, TCI: Social Studies Alive, and Competent Kids, Caring Communities (CKCC). The Computer Technology curriculum provides our students with a wide range of application programs and websites that correlate with, and enhance student learning. Our library media center and classrooms are fully wired and Internet accessible allowing students in Grades K-6 to access mobile laptop computer and iPad carts, and utilize Smart Boards and document cameras. In grades 5 & 6, each student receives a Chromebook.



Sports and Athletics:

Students in grades 5 & 6 participate, each March, in the Third Half Club Basketball Tournament. Each spring, students in grades 5 & 6 compete against their peers from the other elementary schools during the Junior Olympics. Students participate in physical education classes and have opportunities for various sports activities available during recess, such as basketball, football, soccer, etc.



Clubs and Activities:

Students in grades 4, 5 & 6 participate in Enrichment Clusters. Non-graded small groups of students meet with a teacher who shares a common interest. Clusters vary from year to year, depending on interest. Students also have the option to participate in school clubs and activities including: School Safety Patrols, Art Club, Storytellers Club, School Service Club, Math Club, Garden Club, Lincolnaires, Band, LEAD, Junior Olympics and the Third Half Club Basketball Tournament. Lincoln School students also donate clothing, toys, and other supplies to be distributed to those who are less fortunate.

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Before and After School Programs:

Before and After School Extended Day programs are offered by the district in the school each day, during teacher professional development days, and holiday breaks. The program is primarily supervised and staffed by teachers and staff from Lincoln School. Extended programming and enrichment programs are also offered during the summer. A supervised breakfast is available each morning. Students are given the opportunity to participate in enrichment activities while attending the program.



Staff and Professional Learning:

Staff members participate in professional learning related to best practice in curriculum, instruction and assessment. This includes meeting regularly during grade level meetings and workshops developed by the district, teacher leaders, and consultants related to designing instruction and unit planning. Topics for professional learning include Conquer Math, Math lesson studies, Reading and Writing Workshop, data analysis, using formative and summative assessments, Culturally Responsive Teaching, Sheltered Instruction, Dyslexia training, Handle with Care, Balanced Literacy, Health and Wellness, and co-teaching. Staff also engage in professional growth, as delineated in Danielson Framework for Professional Practice.



Student Supports and Services:

Our goal is to provide a safe, supportive, and caring environment where all students will achieve success. The Child Study Team, CARE TEAM, Intervention and Referral Service (I&RS), and 504 committee work with school counselors to meet individual student needs. A Strategies program for academic remediation, and a gifted and talented program provide supplemental resources. The Leveled Literacy Intervention Program is used with students who are struggling in reading. Additionally, Lincoln School is proud to serve its English Language Learners who come to us from a wide variety of countries and speak many languages.

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Student Health and Wellness:

Lincoln School students strive to be Lincoln Leaders by embodying our core values: Respect, Honesty, Perseverance, Empathy, Kindness, Courage, Teamwork, Inclusion, and Safety. The building principal and the school counselor work collaboratively to support students utilizing conflict/resolution, as well as restorative approaches to discipline. Students in Lincoln School are screened yearly for their hearing, vision, height, and weight. Character Education is taught as a part of the health classes and is infused throughout the building. The district adopted the CKCC curriculum which is implemented in grades K-5. Inspirational messages have been posted throughout the building. Students have the opportunity to practice yoga in their classrooms, during Enrichment Clusters, and as a part of the Extended Day Program. Breakfast is provided for the students of Lincoln School to those families who are interested in participating.



Parent and Community Involvement:

Parents and community members continue to play an integral role in the education of our students. Staff members are diligent in disseminating information through classroom newsletters and building notices and reminders. The PTO provides valuable assistance by organizing social events such as dances, book fairs, assemblies, author visits, enrichment activities, and various fundraising opportunities. Monies raised have supplied us with additional technology, as well as requested items for the various classrooms. Students meet with the local police department through the Law Enforcement Against Drugs (LEAD) program and the Police and Lunch with Students (PALS) programs throughout the year.

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Facilities:

Lincoln School was constructed in 1915, with additions in 1919 and 1928. The building is equipped with a dedicated cafeteria, auditorium, gymnasium, art room, and library/media center. The auditorium, cafeteria and library media center are newly updated. The building has a tempered air HVAC system throughout. There is a field behind the school that is used for recess as well as outdoor gym instruction.



School Safety:

Lincoln School is equipped with a secure entrance. We have a security officer on campus each day. Students and staff wear identification badges throughout the day. Fire and security drills are held monthly. Cameras have been installed throughout the building.



Technology and STEM:

Lincoln School is fully wired. Staff members are equipped with a laptop and have access to a Smartboard/projector and document camera for instruction. Students have access to laptops and iPads throughout the school. The fifth and sixth grade students each have a chrome book for their academics as a part of the district's 1:1 initiative. Teachers integrate technological tools and resources into their planning. Students learn about digital citizenship and safety online during library media classes.

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When a student's absence reaches a warning number, a formal letter is sent to parents/guardians regarding the number of absences for the student. Following the letter, there is clear communication shared with the family about attendance and school work expectations. There is personalized positive communication to families when students are absent. We also have recognition for satisfactory and improved attendance. Through family communication, impact of attendance on the whole child is widely understood. Every child and their family is encouraged to develop a success plan that includes attention to attendance. Common community and school barriers are identified and addressed. An attendance committee, is available to support students and meet with parents as needed. Attendance strategies may include peer group connections or intensive tutoring may be offered. Attendance strategies may also be added to a Section 504 plan or Intervention and Referral Services plan.

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Other Information:

The school day at Lincoln School runs from 8:30 am-3:20 pm, with a one hour lunch. Most students are within walking distance to the school. Communication with parents is ongoing through email, School Messenger, the school website, the PTO Board, and the PTO Facebook page. Many teachers also utilize the Remind app, and Google to inform parents of upcoming events and activities. Critical thinking, problem-solving strategies, problem design and the fundamental skills to support integrated instruction are included across content areas. Spanish is taught in grades two through six. Our guidance counselor provides lessons in conflict resolution to small groups, as well as to the whole class. Staff and students, with the support of the PTO, garden and harvest plants and vegetables in and around the school. Students at Lincoln School also participate in numerous community service activities throughout the year.
