
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
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English Language Arts and Mathematics Performance Trends

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



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
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

Graduation rates are calculated based on the adjusted cohort graduation rate calculation. Beginning in the 2020-2021 school year, the NJDOE was required to make changes to the methodology used to calculate the adjusted cohort graduation rate for federal reporting and accountability purposes. The United States Department of Education (USED) determined that the NJDOE must only include students who receive a diploma that is fully aligned with the state's standards, meaning they have met the state's graduation assessment requirements, and local attendance requirements. This means that students with disabilities who did not meet some or all graduation requirements because of a modifications or exemption in their Individualized Education Program (IEP) may not be counted as graduates in the calculated to frederal reporting and accountability purposes. It is important to note that this was only a change to how graduation rates are calculated for federal reporting. It does not affect requirements to earn a diploma or the type of diploma that the state awards to students with disabilities.

As a result of these changes, the NJDOE began calculating two versions of the adjusted cohort graduation rate starting with 2021 graduation rates. The "federal version" aligns with ESSA requirements and USED guidance and is used for federal reporting and ESSA school accountability only. The "state version" continues to use the same methodology used prior to 2021 and reflects all students who received a state-endorsed diploma.

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Graduation/Postsecondary

Graduation rates are calculated based on the adjusted cohort graduation rate calculation. Beginning in the 2020-2021 school year, the NJDOE was required to make changes to the methodology used to calculate the adjusted cohort graduation rate for federal reporting and accountability purposes. The United States Department of Education (USED) determined that the NJDOE must only include students who receive a diploma that is fully aligned with the state's standards, meaning they have met the state's graduation assessment requirements, and local attendance requirements. This means that students with disabilities who did not meet some or all graduation requirements because of a modifications or exemption in their Individualized Education Program (IEP) may not be counted as the calculated for federal reporting and accountability purposes. It is important to note that this was only a change to how graduation rates are calculated for federal reporting. It does not affect requirements to earn a diploma or the type of diploma that the state awards to students with disabilities.

As a result of these changes, the NJDOE began calculating two versions of the adjusted cohort graduation rate starting with 2021 graduation rates. The "federal version" aligns with ESSA requirements and USED guidance and is used for federal reporting and ESSA school accountability only. 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Graduation/Postsecondary

Information about students enrolling in colleges and universities after graduation is collected from the National Student Clearinghouse (NSC), which collects data from at least 97% of higher education institutions nationwide. New Jersey graduates are matched to postsecondary enrollment data by NSC each year. While most students who enroll in a postsecondary institution each year are able to be matched by NSC, there are some students each year who cannot be matched. Some reasons that students may not be matched are: 1. Postsecondary enrollment cannot be shared with the NJDOE if students request a FERPA block on their postsecondary enrollment records; 2. Students who attend a college or university outside of the United States are not included in NSC data; 3. Certain colleges or universities may not participate in sharing data with NSC or may fail to report data for a certain group of students; and 4. NSC may not be able to match a student's name or date of birth in NJ SMART to the information provided by the postsecondary institution(s) with a high level of confidence.

In 2023, NSC implemented an additional manual review process to reduce the number of students who do not match due to #4 above, which may result in NSC matching additional students to postsecondary records moving forward. As a result, the NJDOE is not including trend data from prior to 2022-2023 in the reports.

Note for 2023-2024: Postsecondary enrollment data for the 2023-2024 school year is not yet available. The NJDOE expects to release the data in the coming months. Please refer to the 2022-2023 reports for the most recently available postsecondary enrollment rates.

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
Climate and Environment

Student absences provide important information about a school's culture and climate. Research shows that absences impact a student's ability to succeed in school. The NJDOE used input from stakeholders to select chronic absenteeism as its measure of school quality and student success for the ESSA accountability plan. **Chronic absenteeism** is defined as being absent for 10% or more of the days enrolled during the school year. A student who is not present for any reason, whether excused, unexcused, or for disciplinary action, is considered absent unless permitted by state statute or regulations. Students with fewer than 45 days in membership are excluded from attendance calculations.

Chronic Absenteeism Trends

This table shows the number and percentage of students in grades K-12 both overall and by student group who were chronically absent during the school year. Pursuant to N.J.S.A. 18A:38-25.1, any school where 10 percent or more of the students enrolled are chronically absent must develop a corrective action plan to improve chronic absenteeism rates. The Requires Corrective Action Plan column in the table indicates whether the school's chronic absenteeism rate is 10% or higher, meaning that the school must complete a corrective action plan. The NJDOE Data-based Decision Making for Addressing Chronic Absenteeism guidance document (found on the NJDOE attendance page under Chronic Absenteeism) provides districts with guidance on responding to chronic absetneeism and includes sample corrective action plan templates.

The ESSA Target: State Average for Grades Served column is the target used for ESSA accountability purposes. It reflects the statewide average for students in the grades offered by the school. Each student group has the same target based on all students, so the same ESSA Target will appear for all student groups. The last column shows whether the rate for each student group was above the state average ("Not Met") or less than or equal to the state average ("Met").


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



For purposes of ESSA accountability, only schools and student groups with data for 20 or more students are included in calculations.

Through dual enrollment programs with Kean University and Middlesex County College, students gain access to advanced courses and a glimpse into college academics. The school's evolving curriculum includes courses like Intro to Robotics, Computer Science, Financial Literacy, Intro to Acting, Theater Production, and Intro to Piano/Keyboarding, catering to the varied interests of 21st-century learners. Programs like Sports & Entertainment History and Marketing bridge academic and practical skills, while partnerships with institutions like Lincoln Technical Institute provide vocational training opportunities. CHS leverages platforms like IXL and Link-It for assessment creation and data analysis, ensuring that teaching methodologies are effective and responsive.

In the spring of 2024 our varsity baseball team won the Greater Middlesex Conference Invitational Baseball Tournament.



CHS offers opportunities for students to expand their interests & nurture their abilities to meaningfully contribute to the school community. CHS offers an award winning Marching Band, Volleyball Club, Choir, Drama, DECA, and Student Council. CHS takes pride in celebrating culture and diversity of our students and community. Students can also join Ladies of Royalty, RWJ Safety Ambassadors, Prevention Players, Yearbook, National Art Honor Society, Debate Club, Newspaper Club, and much more. National Honor Societies have also been established for students who have demonstrated academic excellence. Our Pathways program offers students a multitude of additional club offerings such as SADD, PALS, Incorruptible US, GSA, Letters for Rose, Girl Talk, Letters for Rose, and Braiding Beauty. This year, CHS is offering a Peer Group Connection (PGC) program which offers peer-to-peer mentoring and allows students to learn valuable leadership skills that they can utilize in and outside of the class



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Before and After School Programs:

Study sessions for advanced courses are afforded to students by highly qualified staff. In addition, peer tutoring is offered to support students in their academic courses. Prevention Players is a student led organization that teaches character education and builds leadership skills through outreach and community service. Ladies of Royalty helps students develop character, leadership and life skills, promoting positive decision making. CHS also houses Pathways, a school-based counseling program that provides individual and family counseling, as well as programs such as SADD, the Great American Smoke-Out, Opioid Awareness Day, bullying prevention, Gender and Sexuality Alliance, PALS Community Service, the Breakfast Club, Teen Outreach Program, and a mentor program for our middle school students.



At Carteret High School (CHS), we recognize the importance of continuous professional development for our staff, essential for meeting the evolving educational needs of our students. To facilitate this, we offer a range of professional learning opportunities, including the PD Academy, specialized inservice programs, and professional learning communities (PLCs). These platforms provide educators with the latest educational research, innovative teaching strategies, and access to advanced instructional technologies. Our PLCs, convening twice a month, serve as collaborative hubs where teachers share best practices, create common formative assessments, analyze educational data, and build a unified vision for learning and professional growth. These sessions focus on developing integrated plans for student learning, assessment, and educator effectiveness, ensuring our teaching strategies effectively cater to each student's unique needs.



For the 2023/2024 school year, we had 274 graduates; 194 were college-bound with 65 attending a two-year college and 129 attending a four-year college. Six students have enlisted in the military. The PSAT 8/9, PSAT/NMSQT, SAT, and Accuplacer are offered annually during the school day. Fee waivers are provided to eligible students for AP exams, SATs, and ACTs. Annual Financial Aid Nights, College and Career Fairs, and on/and off-site visits to/from colleges and trade schools promote success after graduation.



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Student Supports and Services:

At Carteret High School (CHS), we are dedicated to supporting our diverse student community, especially Multilingual learners and those needing special education. Our ESL program features an innovative cohort model that strengthens relationships among students and teachers, fostering a sense of belonging. We utilize tools like Achieve 3000 to provide personalized learning experiences. In special education, we've enhanced our in-class resources, revised student schedules, and formed teaching cohorts to foster an inclusive environment. Our teaching teams have undergone extensive co-teaching training, and we've expanded our curriculum to include life skills, career exploration, and community-based instruction tailored to students with special needs. Furthermore, our collaboration with Effective School Solutions has resulted in a robust mental health program to support our students' well-being.



At Carteret High School (CHS), a comprehensive breakfast program is offered to ensure students start their day with a nutritious meal, recognizing the vital link between nutrition and academic performance. During lunch periods, students have a variety of nutritious options tailored to different diets. Physical Education lessons instill lifelong health and wellness habits. The inclusive program offers a variety of activities that cater to diverse student interests, and promote physical fitness as a joyful and fulfilling pursuit. Our Pathways School Based Youth Services Program provides crucial mental health counseling and educational programs, including suicide prevention, opioid awareness, and bullying prevention, as well as the Teen Outreach Program, which is focused on improving decision-making skills and fostering future success for youth. In addition, we partner with Effective School Solutions to implement mental health best practices & innovative clinical programs during the day



Parent and Community Involvement:

Further enhancing parent involvement, CHS's Parent University program provides a suite of resources and mini-workshops, designed to empower parents to become active partners in their children's educational journey. This program, featuring a rich video library, enables parents to effectively advocate for their children and offers a collaborative environment for learning and personal development. Our students are extremely active in the community and volunteer their time to assist in numerous community events. Most recently, our students performed at Carteret's Fall Festival, a community event in October 2024.

CHS distributes an annual survey to ascertain how students, faculty, and parents feel about school climate and culture. The results indicate students believe there are numerous opportunities for them to be involved in the school. Students feel we have a warm and welcoming environment in which they are engaged in becoming positive school community members. Staff responses indicate that students generally respect each other's differences and are tolerant of many different cultures.



Carteret High School (CHS) has made significant facility upgrades to enhance our learning environment and student safety. Our Science Department has seen a major transformation with six labs upgraded to cutting-edge facilities, equipped with the latest technology for hands-on learning experiences including hovercams. Additionally, we are boosting security with the construction of a new vestibule, providing a controlled entry point to ensure campus safety. This vestibule will open in the Fall of 2024, along with a new outdoor learning space that students can use during lunch and for classroom instruction.



Carteret High School (CHS) utilizes Verkada, a sophisticated ID security system and camera software program to manage access and monitor the building. Doors throughout the school are electronically controlled by secure key fobs. A digital hall pass system has been implemented to monitor and control student travel in the hallways during class periods. Annual safety training is provided for staff, and monthly security drills are conducted with students and staff to ensure preparedness. Our commitment to a respectful and inclusive environment is reinforced by our Anti-Bullying Specialist, who leads comprehensive programs to combat harassment and bullying. Starting this year, students and visitors will enter the building through a newly built security vestibule.



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Carteret High School (CHS) is dedicated to enhancing technology and support services to prepare students for college and careers. A significant part of this effort is our 1 to 1 Chromebook program, ensuring all students have access to essential technology and internet resources. We've also upgraded our Science Labs with HoverCams and trained staff for effective integration into instruction, enriching the science education experience. Our Carteret Tiered Support System (CTSS) team has streamlined student referrals through a fully digital system, which addresses students' social, emotional, and behavioral needs. Additionally, our tailored bell schedule optimizes learning opportunities, aiding in timely graduation and academic success.
