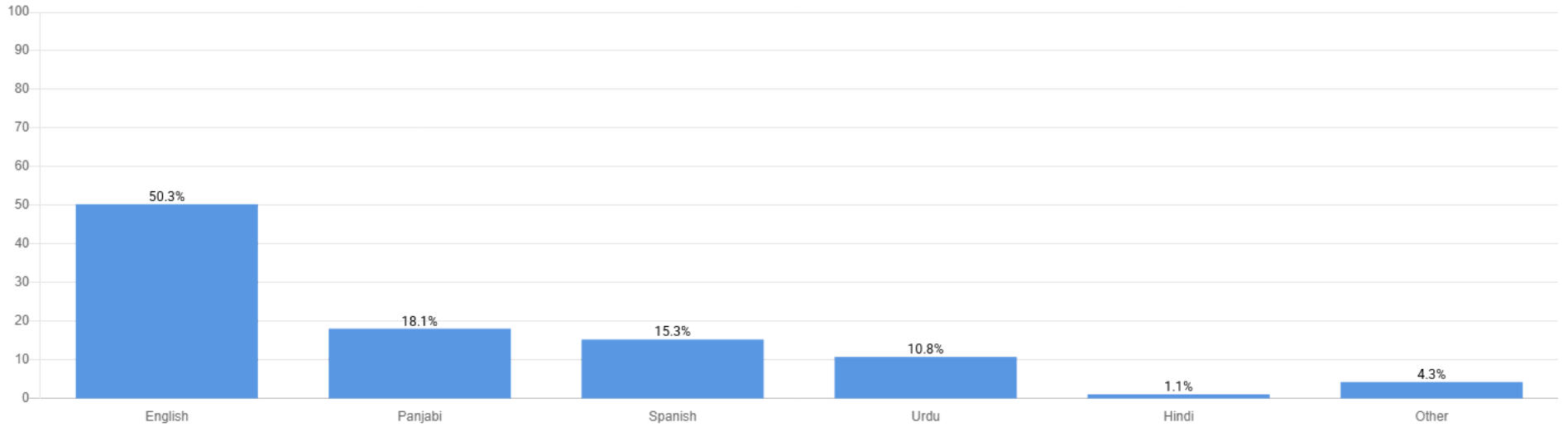

Student Growth

Student growth is a measure of how much students are learning each year. New Jersey's ESSA state plan outlines that academic progress will be measured with school's median student growth percentile (mSGP) on statewide ELA and mathematics assessments. Each individual student receives a Student Growth Percentile (SGP) for English Language Arts (ELA) in grades 4 through 8 and for Mathematics in grades 4 through 7. The SGP measures their academic progress from one year to the next compared to other students with similar prior test scores (academic peers).

A student's SGP falls between 1 and 99 and can be grouped into three levels. An SGP below 35 indicates low growth, an SGP between 35 and 65 indicates typical growth, and an SGP greater than 65 indicates high growth. If the SGPs for all students are ordered from smallest to largest, the mSGP is the percentile in the middle of the list.

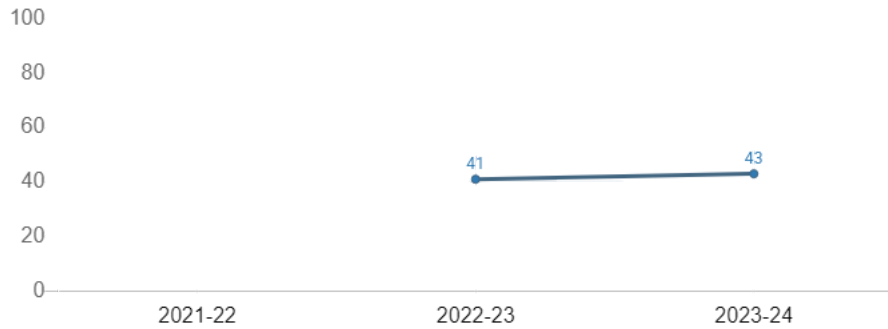

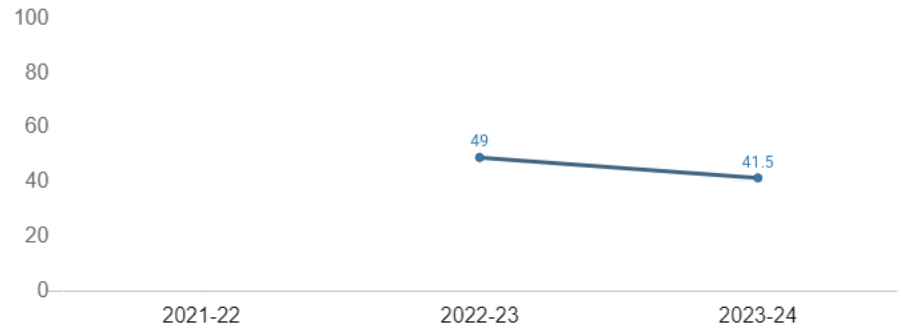

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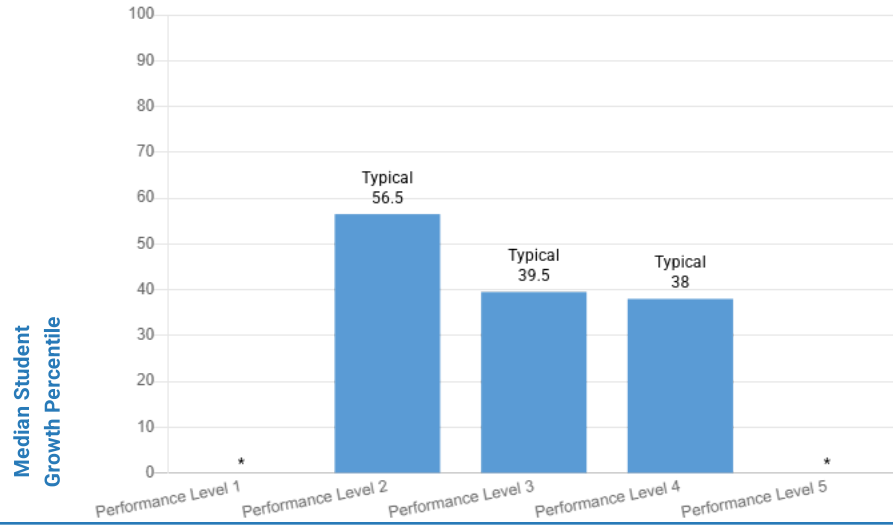
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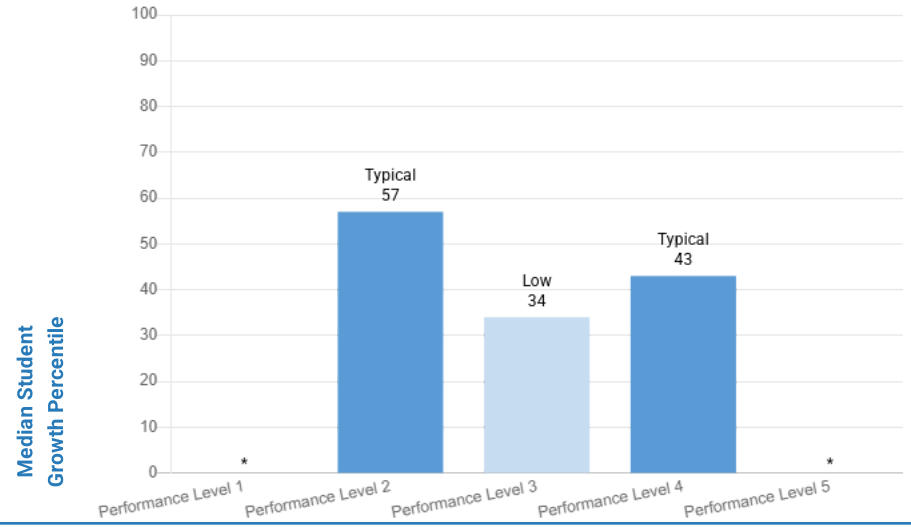

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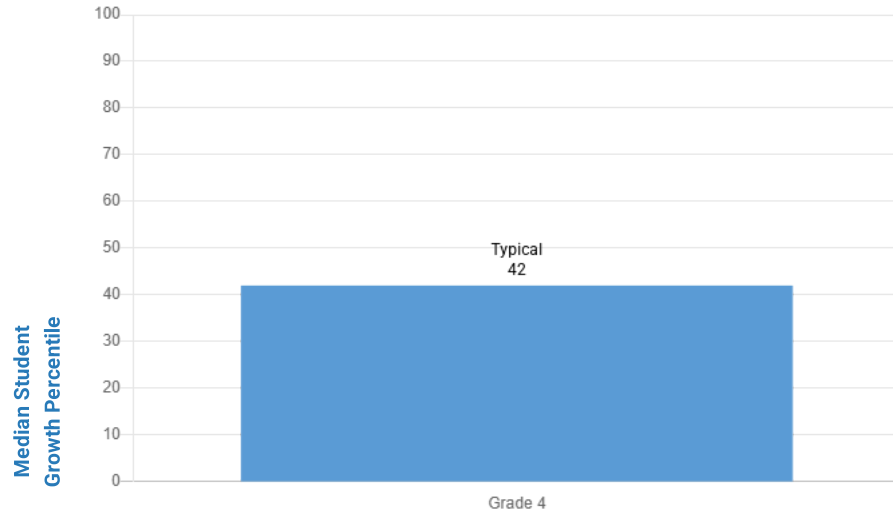
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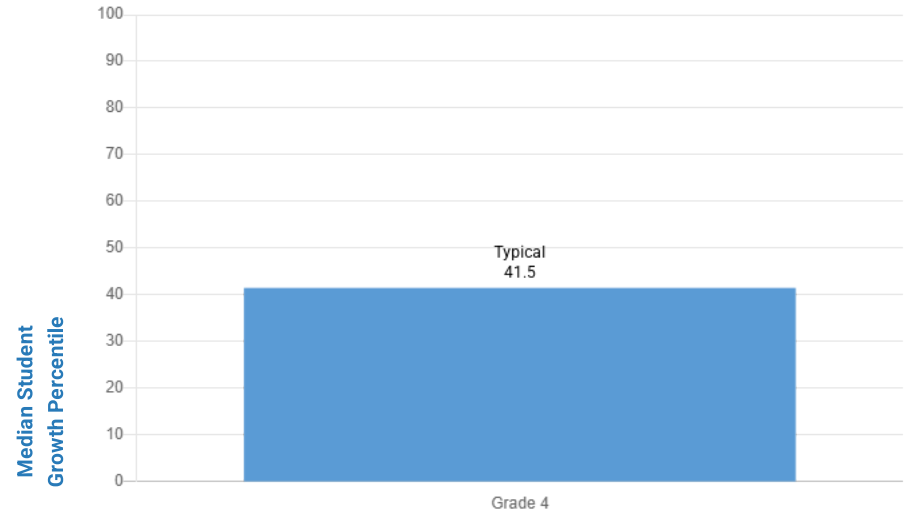
Student Growth by Grade

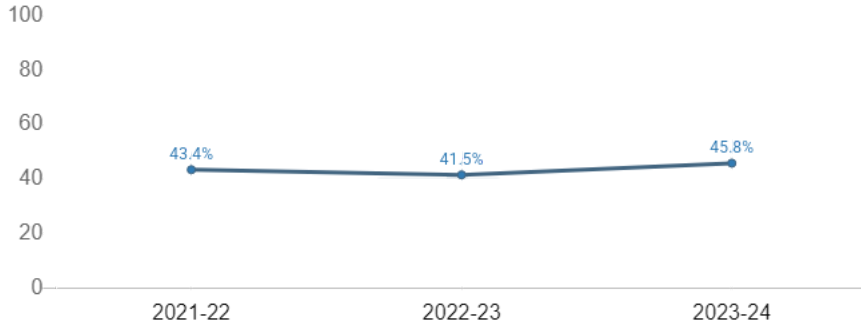

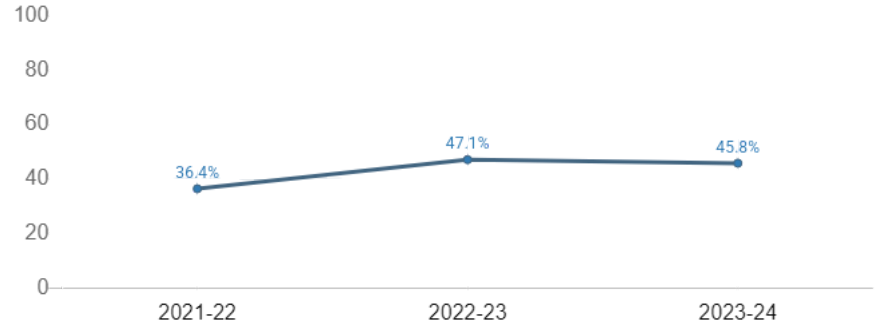
English Language Arts and Mathematics Performance Trends

These graphs show trends in the Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability over the last three years. The data includes the results of students taking both the New Jersey Student Learning Assessment (NJSLA) and the DLM alternate assessment for English language arts (ELA) and mathematics. The Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability measures the percentage of students who met or exceeded expectations on the assessments (NJSLA or DLM) with an adjustment made if the participation rate is below 95% to ensure reporting on at least 95% of students. Students who were enrolled for less than half a school year are excluded from performance results. 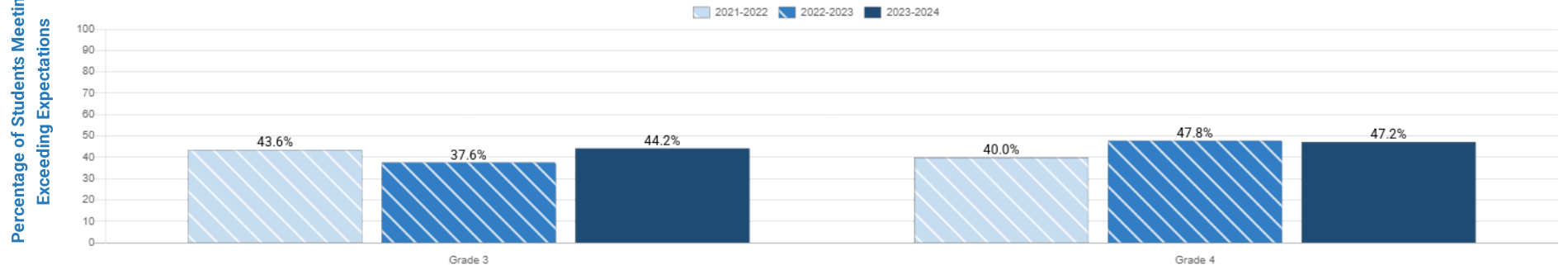

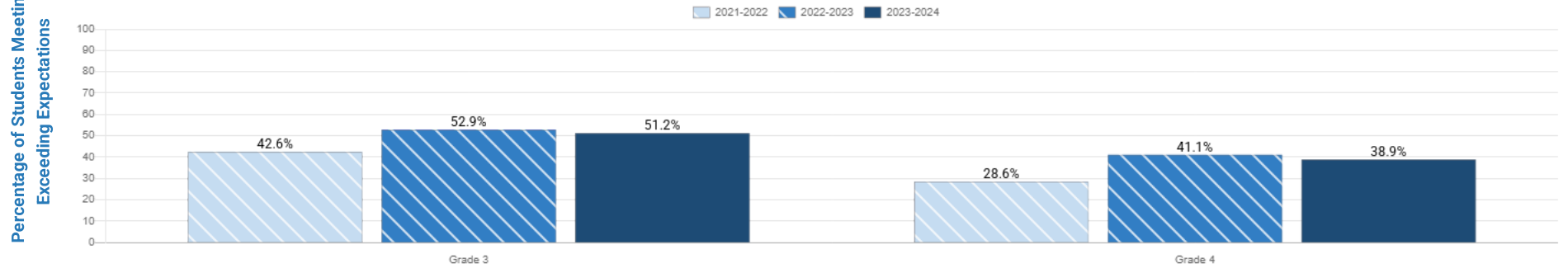

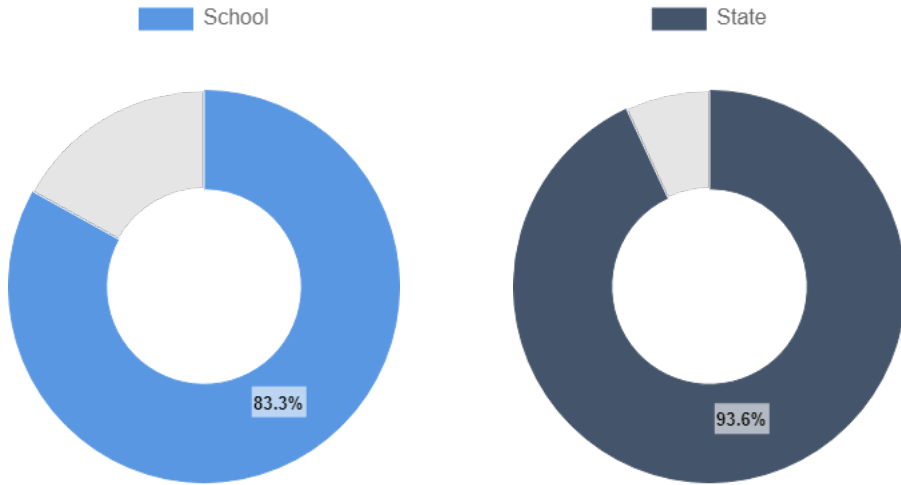

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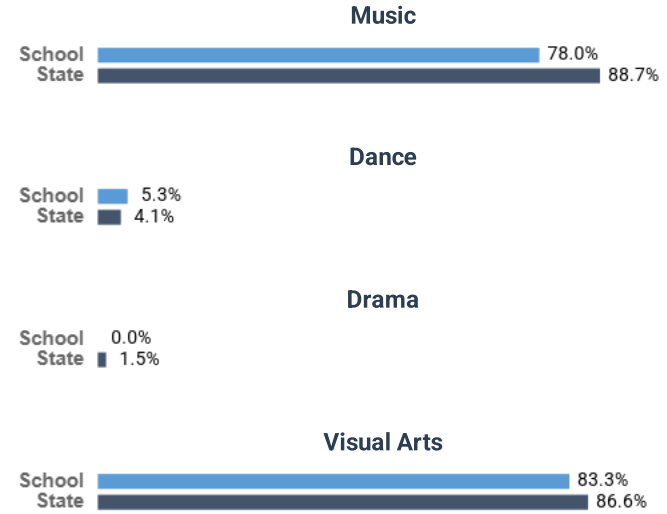

Students enrolled in one or more classes by discipline:



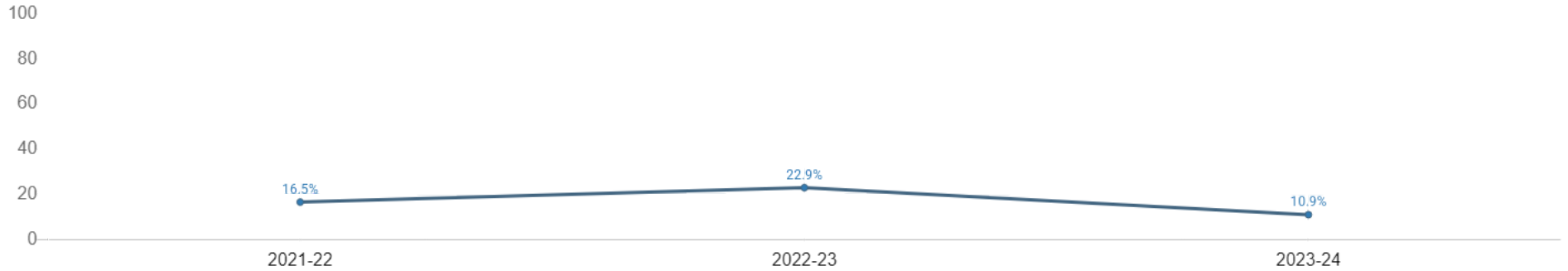

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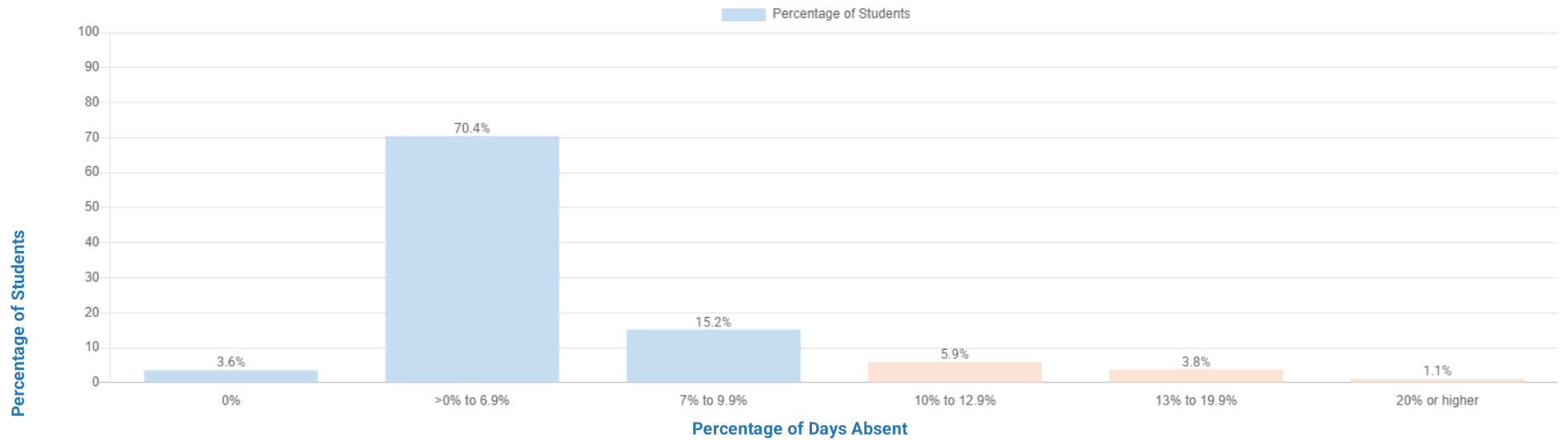

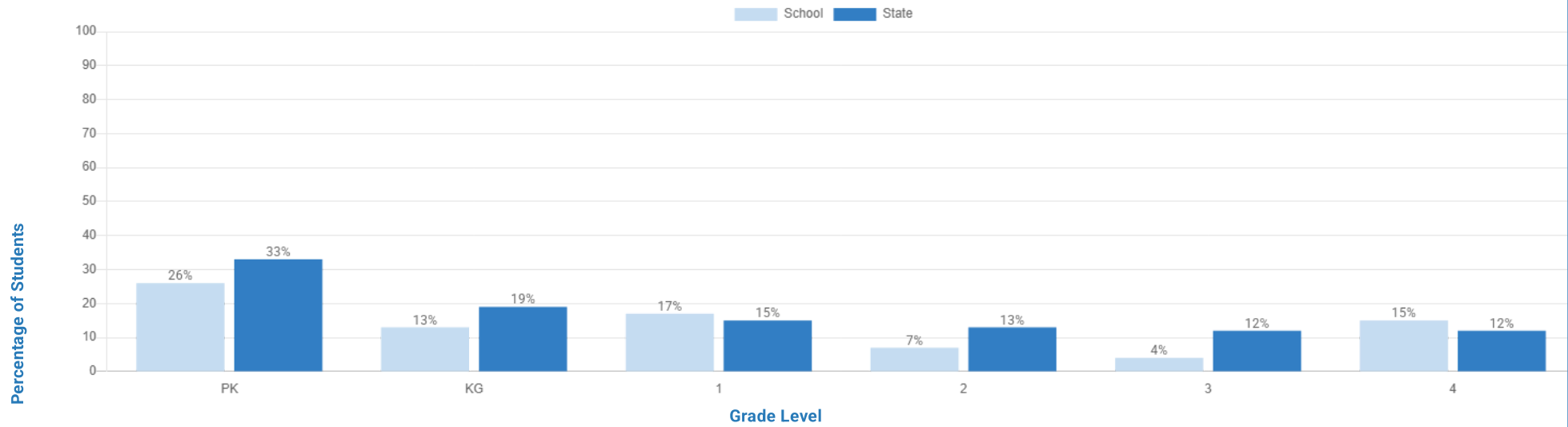


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Chronic Absenteeism by Grade

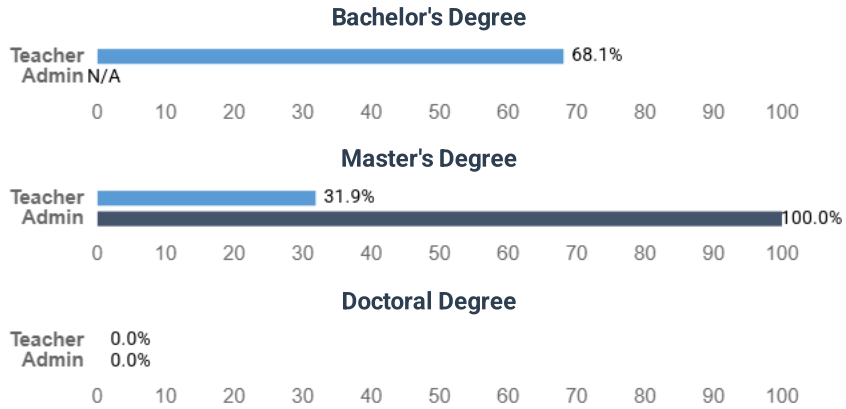

Accountability

Accountability Summary by Student Group - 2023-24 School Year

The NJDOE is required under ESSA to identify schools for Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI) annually and for Additional Targeted Support and Improvement (ATSI) every three years. Both TSI and ATSI identifications are based on how student groups within schools perform. Schools are identified for ATSI if they have at least one student group that has a summative score that would be in the bottom 5% of Title I schools if it was its own school. Schools are identified for TSI if they have at least one student group that missed annual targets or standards for all indicators for two years in a row. Only student groups that have data for at least 20 students are included in the accountability determinations.

- Implementation of Character Strong Social Emotional Learning Program to build strong character in students. We also partner with Pathways to provide school-based services for mental health.



Mission, Vision, Theme:

Our vision: Ramblers Rise Our Mission: Drawing on our cultural richness, Carteret Public Schools inspires and empowers students to be innovative, respectful, and confident leaders who will RISE to shape the world.



Awards, Recognition, Accomplishments:

Through our Student Council, our students regularly engage in community based philanthropic and civic projects. Our school has been recognized and received awards and acknowledgments from various community organizations for outstanding essays, artwork, and philanthropic projects. Our projects have included Food Drives for the Middlesex County Department of Community Services, Replenish, sponsoring donations for the Scholastic Pajama Drive and raising funds for the ARC of Monmouth County to benefit people with intellectual disabilities. Students raised and donated \$3,560.00 to the American Heart Association in response to the Kids Heart Challenge program. Civic programs also include students writing letters to thank first responders in the community for their service and letters to acknowledge the sacrifices veterans have made to our country.

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Courses, Curriculum, Instruction:

K-4 students are immersed in a rich learning environment focused on small group instruction using Being a Reader & Writer, math workshop model, providing all students access to rigorous instruction and personalized learning opportunities. Students participate daily in Google Classroom, online programs that enrich the curriculum, and utilize technology to create multimedia presentations and STEM projects. Our school offers S.P.A.R.K., Supporting Potential Achievement in Remarkable Kids, a program for high performing students in grades K-4. The goal of the program is to provide opportunities for identified students to participate in units of study that incorporate humanities, independent investigation, and STEM. The Multi-Tiered Systems of Supports Program for Grades K-3 provides interventions inclusive of Orton Gillingham, & Fountas and Pinnell LLI, Learning Without Tears, and SIPPS. High Impact virtual tutoring is provided to identified students in third and fourth grade.



Clubs and Activities:

Students in grades two through four demonstrate leadership and service by participating in the Student Council activities that benefit the school, local community, and charitable organizations. Students in fourth grade participate in an astronomy club and utilize a telescope for discovery and space exploration. Students in the fourth grade choir participate in vocal music concerts that are shared with the community. Each year, instrumental band students in the fourth grade participate in community concerts. Students in grades 1-4 participate in a Theater Week which culminates in a play performed for the school community. Students demonstrating core R.A.M.B.L.E.R. values are acknowledged on a weekly basis through a YouTube presentation shared with the school community. Safety Patrols are composed of fourth grade bus students who assist younger students during morning school bus arrival and dismissal.



Before and After School Programs:

Students in need of additional support in Language Arts and/or Mathematics in grades first through fourth participate in Title I After School programs. Our district offers a fee for service, Before and After School Program for students in grades kindergarten through fourth grade. The program offered in our school provides homework assistance to students, recreational activities, and focuses on developing positive interpersonal relationships.

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Staff and Professional Learning:

The results of state and local assessments are continuously analyzed by our faculty to assist in guiding instructional improvement. Focused upon identified district goals and school needs, our faculty participates in targeted professional development. Novice teachers participate in a comprehensive district mentoring program. Teachers engage in professional learning communities, share research based instructional practices, attend workshops and conferences, conduct and share action research, and complete graduate level courses. Professional learning is focused in content areas, as well as Responsive Classroom.



Student Supports and Services:

School resources include Pathways-School based Services program, a Child Study Team, a Multi-Tiered Systems of Supports Team, a Reading Specialist, a Math Coach/Interventionist, a Learning Acceleration Teacher, a school based social worker, a behavioral consultant, and specific intervention programs in Response to Intervention. A program for students with behavioral disabilities is supported by mental health professionals, a psychologist, and a psychiatrist. High Intensity programs in English as a Second Language and a Bilingual Punjabi tutorial program support the needs of English Language Learners in mainstream classrooms. Students identified in need of support for Literacy and Mathematics receive Title 1 services during and after school.



Student Health and Wellness:

Breakfast in the Classroom is offered to all students. Students engage in physical activity through physical education classes and recess. Students in third and fourth grades participate in Health courses on a quarterly basis. A full time school nurse conducts health screenings and presents lessons to students. Our school has implemented Mindfulness practices to increase student focus and well-being. Responsive Classroom practices are utilized throughout the school to promote safe, joyful, and engaging classrooms and a caring school community for students and teachers.

Narrative

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Parent and Community Involvement:

Our PTO works collaboratively with school staff to meet the needs and interests of our students. The PTO sponsors programs that enrich the curriculum. Parents and students engage in Family Literacy Nights, Family Math Night, Library Night, Student Award events, Book Fairs, parent workshops, cultural events, and activities specific to individual grade levels. Parents of multilingual learners take part in after school programs whereby they work with their children on activities that facilitate English language acquisition and literacy development. Parents have access to an online Parent Portal which provides them with real time grades. The district and school website provides information on school events, programs, resources for parents and resources for students to use outside of the classroom setting. Parents receive quarterly newsletters keeping them informed of grade level focus areas. Finalsite is the online platform used for parent communication.



Climate Surveys:

Is a Climate Survey Used: Yes; Who is surveyed: Students, Parents, Administrators, Teachers. A school climate survey is conducted annually. Parents, faculty, and students respond to the questions within the school climate survey. The results of the survey are shared with stakeholders through digital graphics. Results from the survey are used to develop goals to improve school climate and culture. The School Safety Committee and the Culture and Climate Committee meet monthly to monitor progress on identified school safety and culture /climate goals.



Facilities:

Our school was built in 1961. Our building includes a gymnasium and an all-purpose room. Intervention classrooms are designated for RTI and Orton Gillingham instruction. One classroom in our building is designed and dedicated to service the needs of students with emotional regulation impairment. New interactive ViewSonic boards have been installed in all classrooms. An outdoor learning space and furniture has provided students with opportunities for learning outside of the classroom. The Peaceful Playground program is used on the playground in order to enhance learning, physical activity, and to promote positive social interaction during recess. Stairwells have been updated, student bathrooms have been renovated, and the main office has been redesigned.

Narrative

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School Safety:

Full time security personnel are on staff. All staff are required to wear school identification. Annual training is provided to staff on the topics of Safety and Security. New high definition cameras have replaced older cameras within the building. Cameras and airphones have been installed at entrance ways. We utilize Verkada as our safety sign-in system and ID security system that allows us to monitor visitors in the building. Students and staff participate in monthly security/safety drills. An Anti-Bullying Specialist provides programs and resources to parents, students, faculty and staff. Every year our students along with their parents participate in 'Walk to School Day' sponsored by Keep Middlesex Moving. The goal of the program is to teach students safe practices when walking to and from school. Lessons from our Character Strong Program are implemented to improve student prosocial interactions and increase an understanding of positive character traits.



Technology and STEM:

Technology is embedded into all curriculum. Students in prekindergarten and kindergarten use iPads while students in grades 1-4 utilize chromebooks during instruction. Teachers use Google Classroom for interactive lessons. Classrooms are equipped with a ViewSonic board to support interactive learning. Students are also scheduled into the T.H.I.N.K. (Teaching Hands on Inquiry Nurtures Knowledge) Tank every week to complete STEM related activities and projects, which include Robotics, Coding, Circuits, Design and Structures. Online content programs support personalized and blended learning.



Early Childhood Education:

Preschool and kindergarten teachers utilize the Tools of the Mind curriculum within a full day program. Intense professional development combines with a comprehensive curriculum that helps young children to develop cognitive, social-emotional, self-regulation, and foundational academic skills. Within the program teachers incorporate the use of technology using iPads to present Power Tools to students which aids in teaching reading strategies. Teachers report on student progress on a trimester basis using an observation based assessment that includes all areas of development for prekindergarten and content based learning in literacy and mathematics for kindergarten. Parents of prekindergarten students are invited to school to work with their children on creating props for classroom use based upon themes presented in the Tools of the Mind curriculum.

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In compliance with NJ Statute 18A:38-25.1, our school addresses chronic absenteeism (grades 1-4) through weekly attendance monitoring and family outreach after 5+ unexcused absences. Communication includes September and pre-fall break letters, plus parent surveys on attendance barriers. We incentivize attendance through Battle of the Grades with monthly dress-down days and family gift card raffles. Our engaging environment features diverse events: cultural event celebrations, Grandparent's Day, Walk to School Day, family nights, and student recognition (Honor Roll, Student of the Month). Additional activities include our school play, Trunk or Treat, holiday events, and vocal and instrumental music concerts. These evidence-based practices foster an environment where attendance is valued, supported by monitoring, family engagement, and positive reinforcement.

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Other Information:

We take great pride in knowing that our school is named in honor of a Carteret resident, Pvt. Nicholas Minue, who was posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor in 1944. Each year students participate in learning about the life of Pvt. Nicholas Minue and the sacrifices he made for our country. Pvt. Nicholas Minue School has a diverse student population composed of 522 students who have various cultures, nationalities, and experiences. Students in all grades attend school from 8:30am-2:55pm and come to school dressed in school uniforms. Students participate in academic subjects as well as related arts on a daily basis. For World Language, students in grades 2-4 receive instruction in Spanish. Once a month a theme based Social-Emotional Learning Day is celebrated throughout the building. Social-emotional learning and Character Strong lessons taught to students emphasize self-awareness, self-management, social awareness, development of relationship skills, decision making, and positive character traits. Parents are considered our partners in education. Communication with parents is on-going through the Realtime Parent portal, Finals site, the district and school website, the Remind app, Class Dojo, and social media. We are committed to providing each child with a quality education that encompasses high expectations, academic achievement, social growth, and character development. Recognizing our students' unique and diverse academic, social, and physical needs, we promote growth by teaching our students to become critical thinkers, problem solvers, and caring citizens who will be able to function successfully in the future global society. We at Minue School take great pride in the positive and nurturing learning environment that characterizes our school. We embrace the beliefs that all students can achieve high academic standards and that education is a partnership between home, school, and the community.
