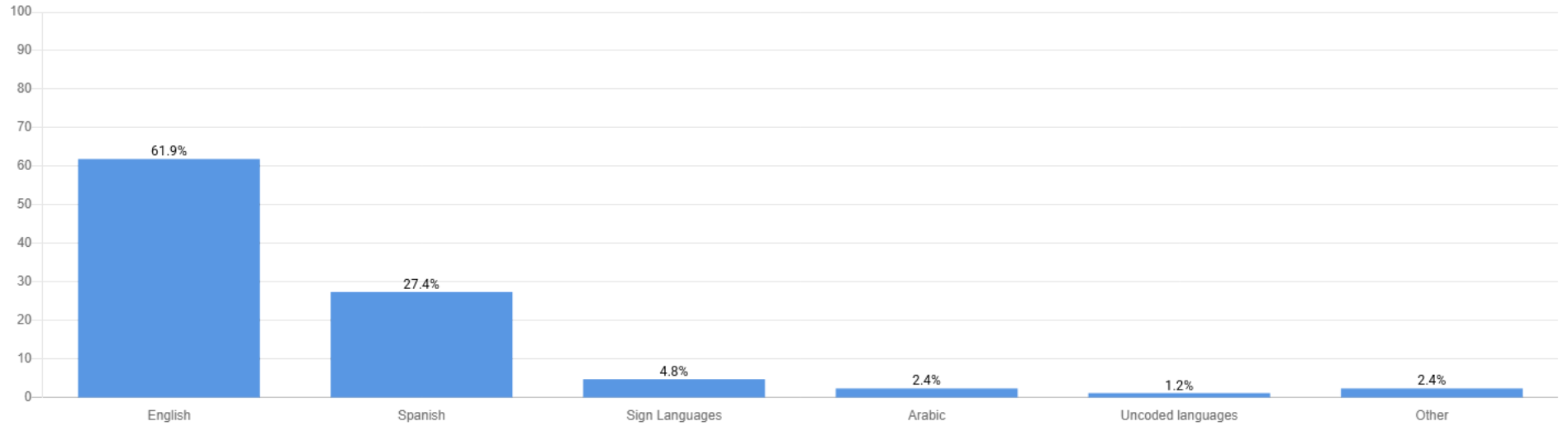

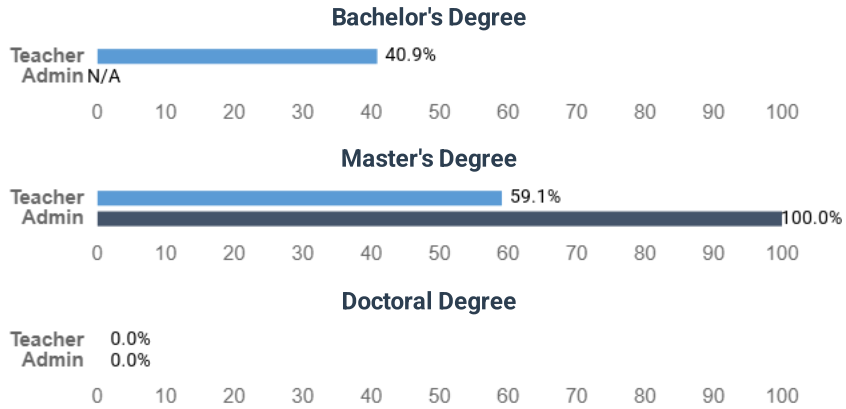

Courses, Curriculum, Instruction:

The Lake Drive Program has a comprehensive academic program that is enhanced by allied subjects. Technology at Lake Drive includes a varied inventory of equipment, which enhances teaching. All Lake Drive classrooms are equipped with Sharpboard or BenQ Boards, computer technology and students have access to Chromebooks and Google classroom. Technology enhances classroom instruction and student participation. Additionally students are provided with hearing assistive technology including DM systems and classroom sound fields to enhance the listening environment.



Clubs and Activities:

Staff support activities for students throughout the school year. The School Spirit Committee creates many opportunities for students including Fall Festival, Class Pumpkin Decorating Contest, Thanksgiving Feast, Signing Santa visit, Book Fair, guest speakers, Signing Chorus, Read Across America Actives, Deaf Role Model actives, Spirit Week, Deaf Career Day, Deaf Awareness Activities, Field Day, and Family Barbeque.



Before and After School Programs:

The Ivy Hall Time to Soar Before and After School program at Lake Drive School provides a safe, nurturing environment filled with fun enriched activities and an opportunity to socialize to develop positive relationships.

Staff and Professional Learning:

The Lake Drive Program staff participate in ongoing professional development, professional learning communities, monthly team meetings and monthly faculty meetings. Certified staff are encouraged to pursue professional development outside of the district by attending state and other professional associations offerings.



Student Supports and Services:

The Lake Drive Program has a large array of services for deaf and hard of hearing students. In addition to teachers of the deaf at all grade levels, we also have educational sign language interpreters, an educational audiologist, school psychologist, social worker, transition counselor, occupational therapists, physical therapist, speech language specialists, school nurse and paraprofessionals. All members of the team work for a common goal, for each individual student to reach their full potential. Lake Drive Program Mental Health team meets consistently on a weekly basis to be proactive in meeting students' social/emotional needs.



Student Health and Wellness:

Each year, Lake Drive has a character education theme. The theme is school-wide, social emotional based. The theme for the 23-24 school year was 'Responsibility'. All classes utilize the P.A.T.H.S program for SEL lessons to be integrated into weekly lessons. We also participate in quarterly Wingman Activates which is a social and emotional learning program that inspires children to go above and beyond for others, instilling them with the courage and leadership to create strong, inclusive communities.

Narrative

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Parent and Community Involvement:

A strong Home and School Association, and Superintendent Coffee Talks are open to all members of the community. The H&SA supports us in a variety of ways. In addition to supplying us with high quality assemblies and programs, their fundraising efforts permit us to enhance our program with an array of exciting materials.



Facilities:

Lake Drive was the first school in Mountain Lakes, built in 1914, and was a 4 room school house. In 1920 there was an addition adding 10 more classrooms. Today the school has updated technology, sharpboards or BenQ boards in every classroom and phonak soundfields for deaf students in all rooms. Lake Drive is also equipped with Alertus, a visual alert system to notify students and staff of security drills and a state of the art audiology suite.



School Safety:

Lake Drive school has exterior cameras on all doors, as well as a view of the exterior of the facility. Our School Safety and Security Team meet regularly to update and revise plans, when necessary. Each month we have a fire drill and a security drill. For the fire drill we utilize the fire alarm system while all security drills are performed using Alertus and the PA system.

Narrative

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Technology and STEM:

Lake Drive classrooms are equipped with sharpboard or BenQ board technology. Classrooms also have phonak sound towers. Students have access to DM systems, personal hearing devices, chromebooks and staff have access to Dell or Apple laptops. Some teachers also utilize an ELMO as a teaching tool.



Early Childhood Education:

Lake Drive has Ivy Hall Preschool, an integrated preschool program allowing students who are deaf or hard of hearing to learn along side their typical hearing peers. Mountain Lakes Early Intervention Program, Sound Start Babies, is housed in Lake Drive school.



Attendance:

Lake Drive offers open door counseling to all students and staff from a strong mental health team. A few years ago we also introduced Wingman, a social and emotional learning program that inspires students to go above and beyond for others, instilling in them the courage and leadership to create strong, inclusive school communities. Wingman uses the principles of experiential education; learning through immersive experience and focused reflection.
