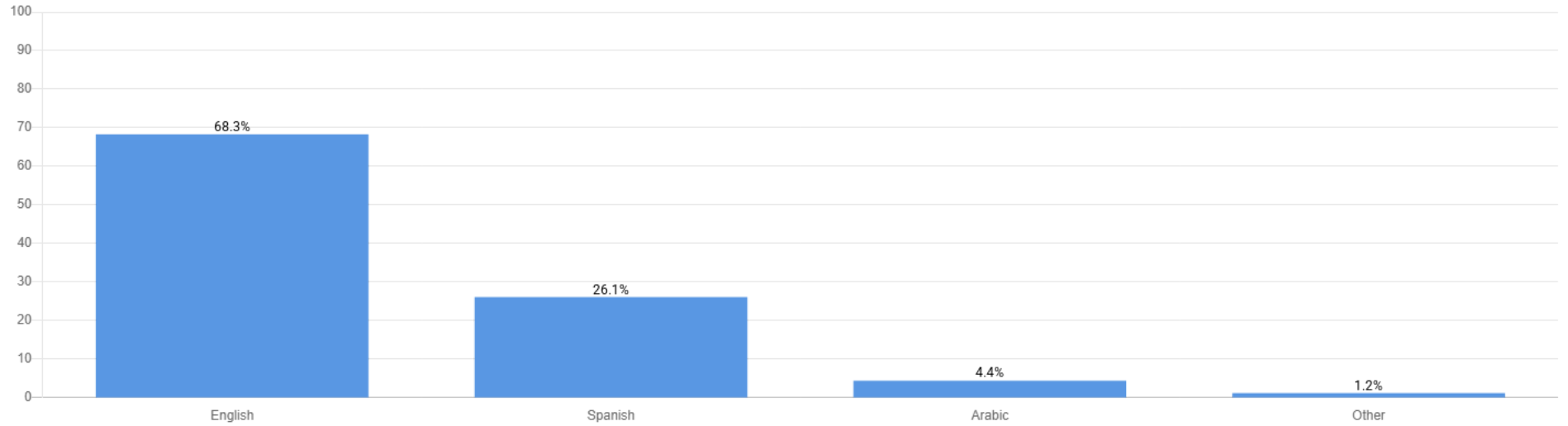

## Student Growth

Student growth is a measure of how much students are learning each year. New Jersey's ESSA state plan outlines that academic progress will be measured with school's median student growth percentile (mSGP) on statewide ELA and mathematics assessments. Each individual student receives a Student Growth Percentile (SGP) for English Language Arts (ELA) in grades 4 through 8 and for Mathematics in grades 4 through 7. The SGP measures their academic progress from one year to the next compared to other students with similar prior test scores (academic peers).

A student's SGP falls between 1 and 99 and can be grouped into three levels. An SGP below 35 indicates low growth, an SGP between 35 and 65 indicates typical growth, and an SGP greater than 65 indicates high growth. If the SGPs for all students are ordered from smallest to largest, the mSGP is the percentile in the middle of the list.

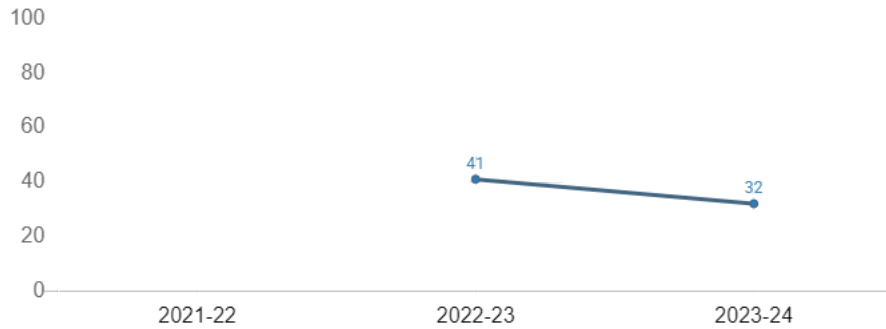

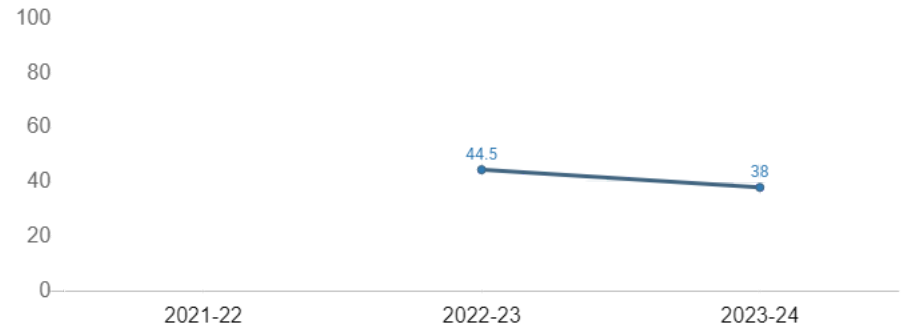

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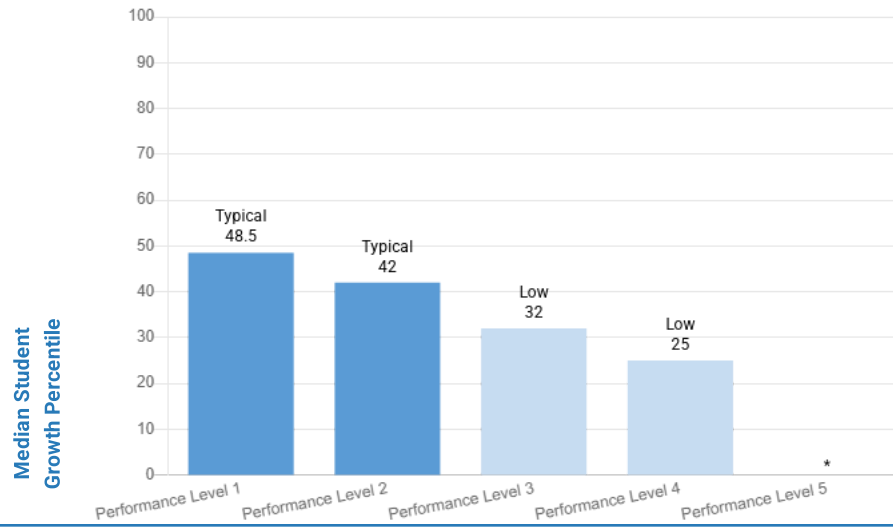
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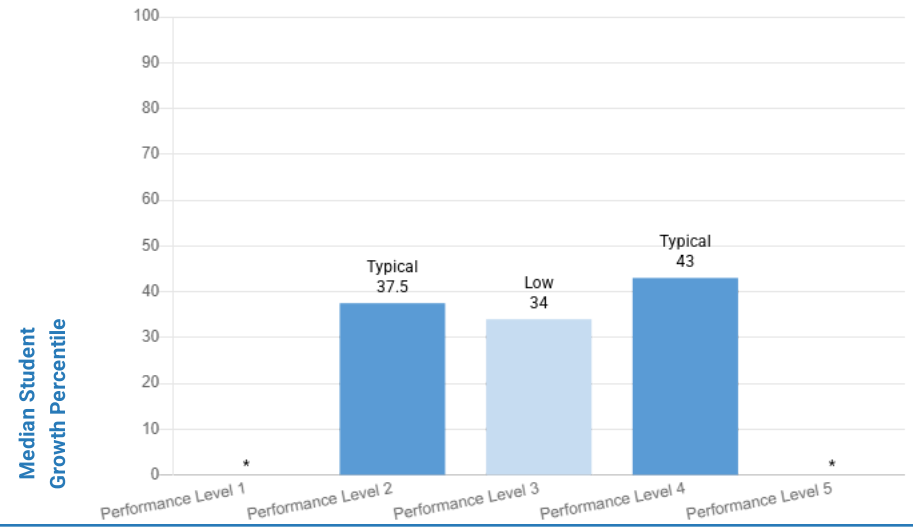

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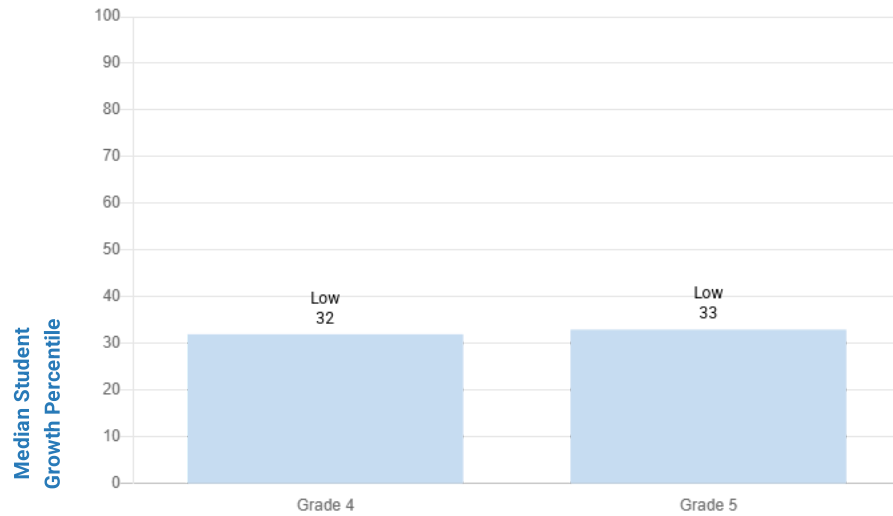
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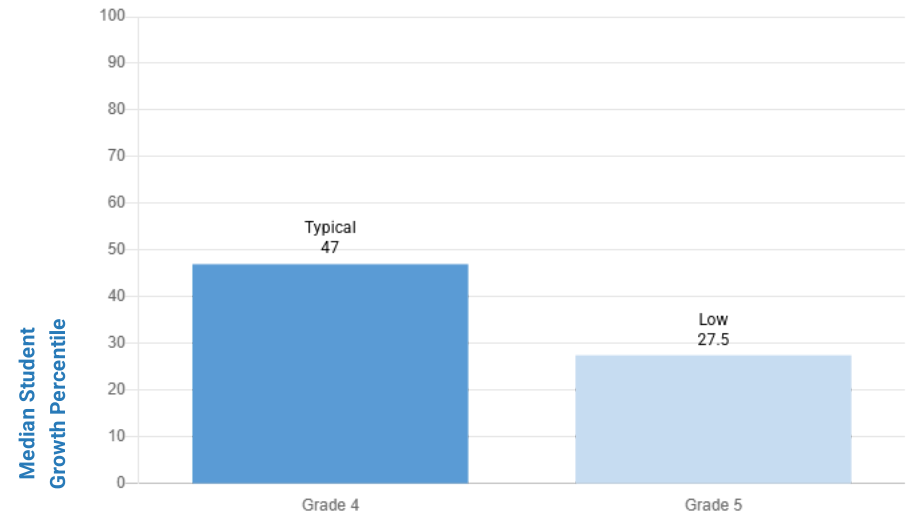

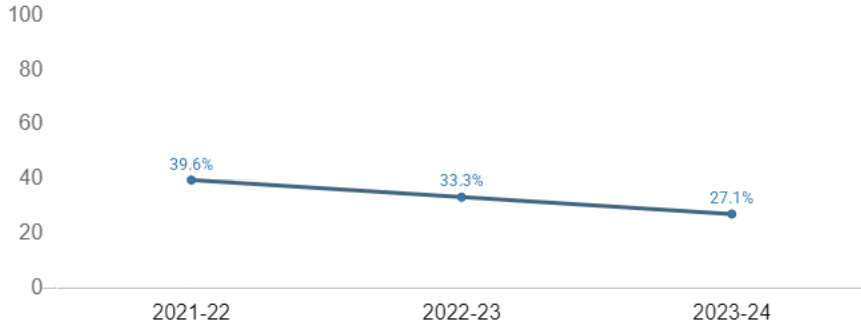

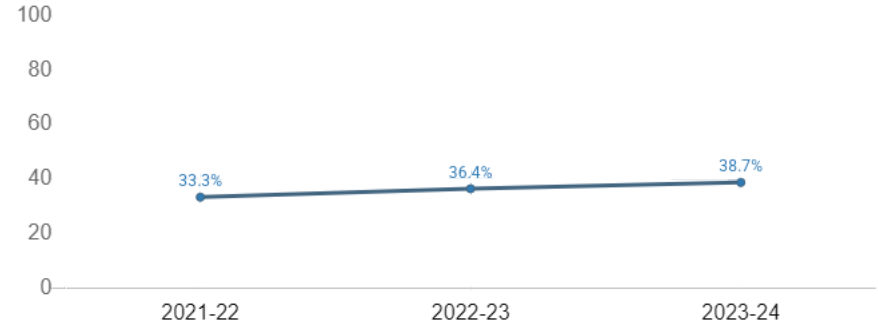
### English Language Arts and Mathematics Performance Trends

These graphs show trends in the Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability over the last three years. The data includes the results of students taking both the New Jersey Student Learning Assessment (NJSLA) and the DLM alternate assessment for English language arts (ELA) and mathematics. The Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability measures the percentage of students who met or exceeded expectations on the assessments (NJSLA or DLM) with an adjustment made if the participation rate is below 95% to ensure reporting on at least 95% of students. Students who were enrolled for less than half a school year are excluded from performance results. 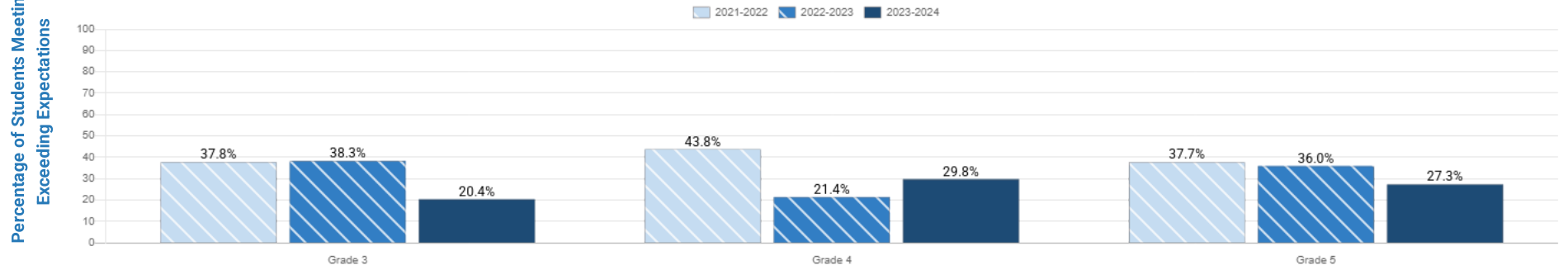

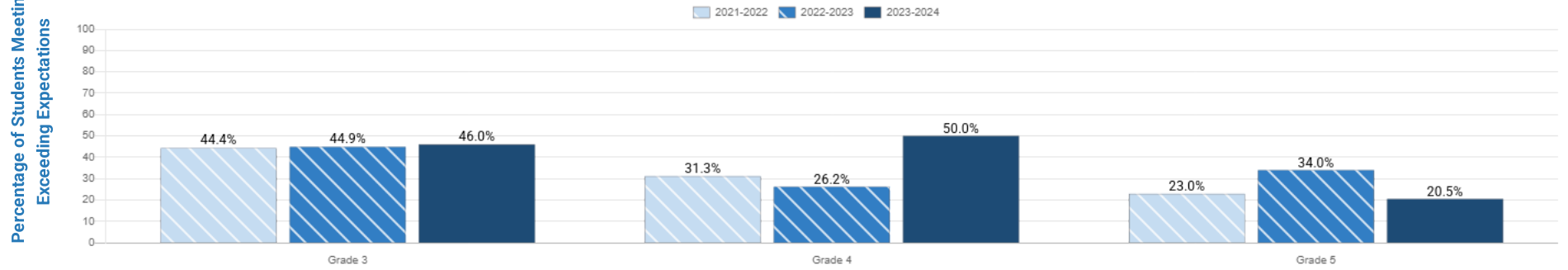

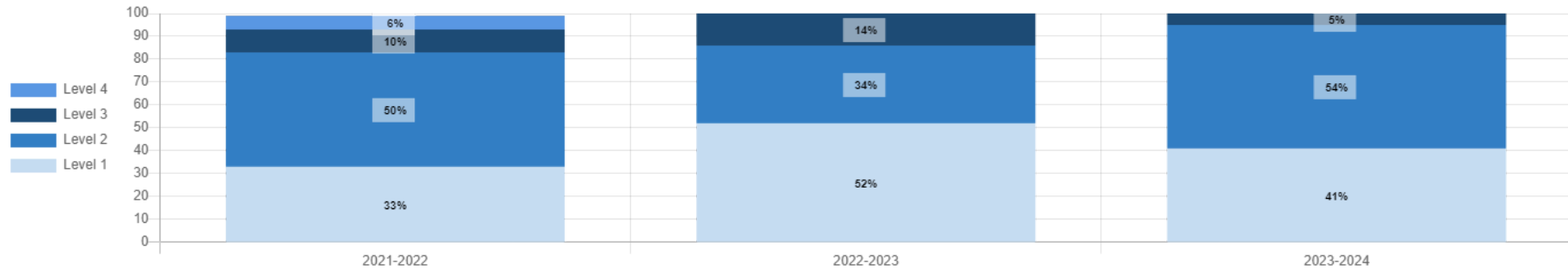

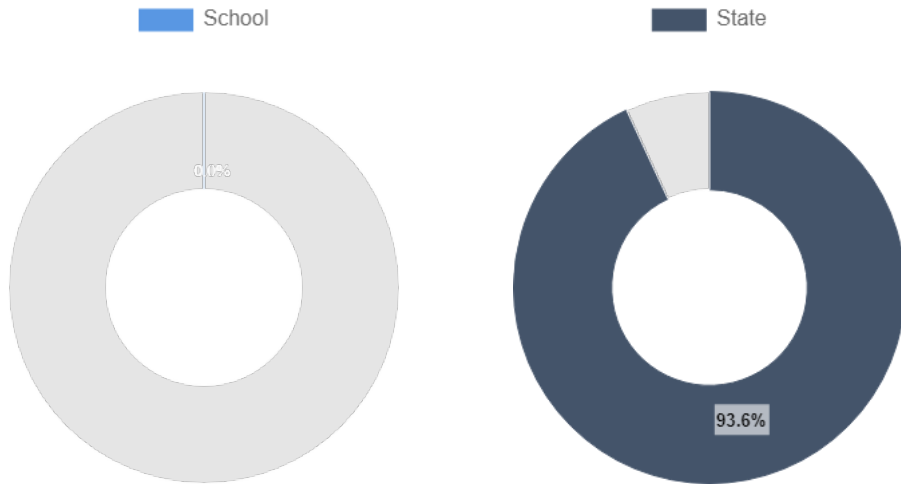

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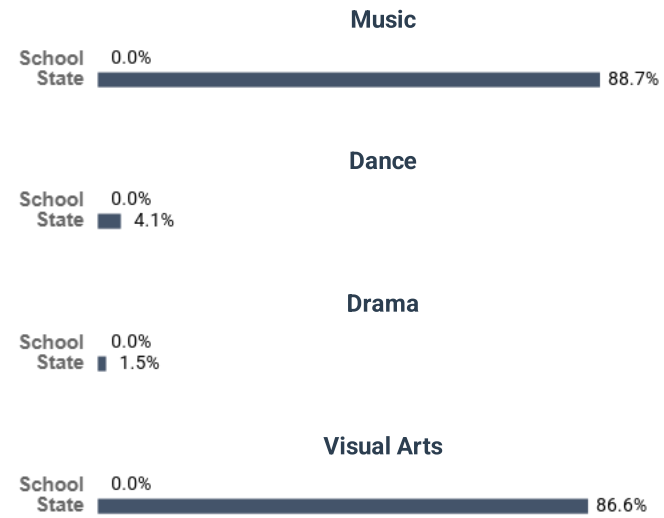

**Students enrolled in one or more classes by discipline:**



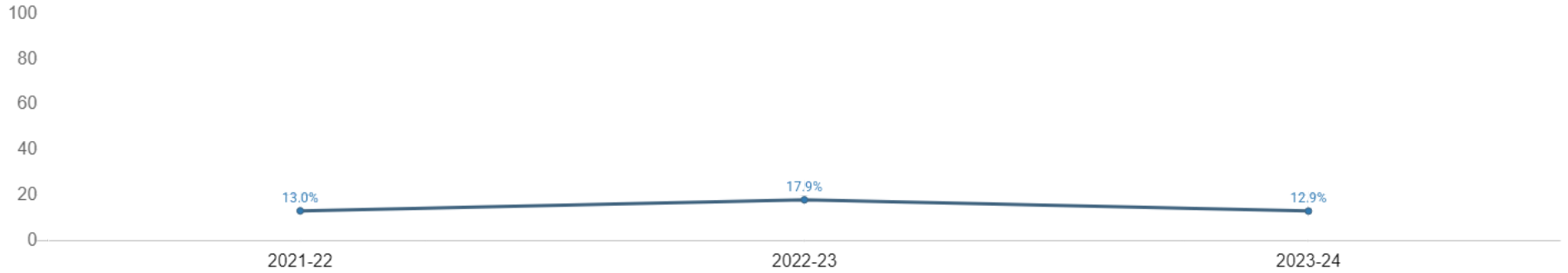
## Climate and Environment

Student absences provide important information about a school's culture and climate. Research shows that absences impact a student's ability to succeed in school. The NJDOE used input from stakeholders to select chronic absenteeism as its measure of school quality and student success for the ESSA accountability plan. **Chronic absenteeism** is defined as being absent for 10% or more of the days enrolled during the school year. A student who is not present for any reason, whether excused, unexcused, or for disciplinary action, is considered absent unless permitted by state statute or regulations. Students with fewer than 45 days in membership are excluded from attendance calculations.

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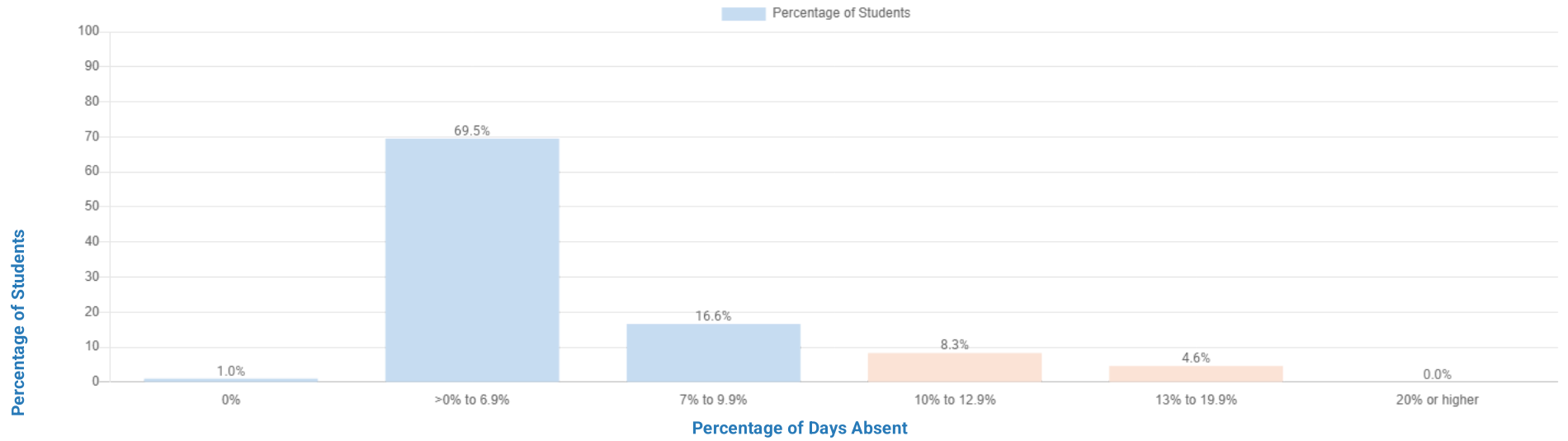

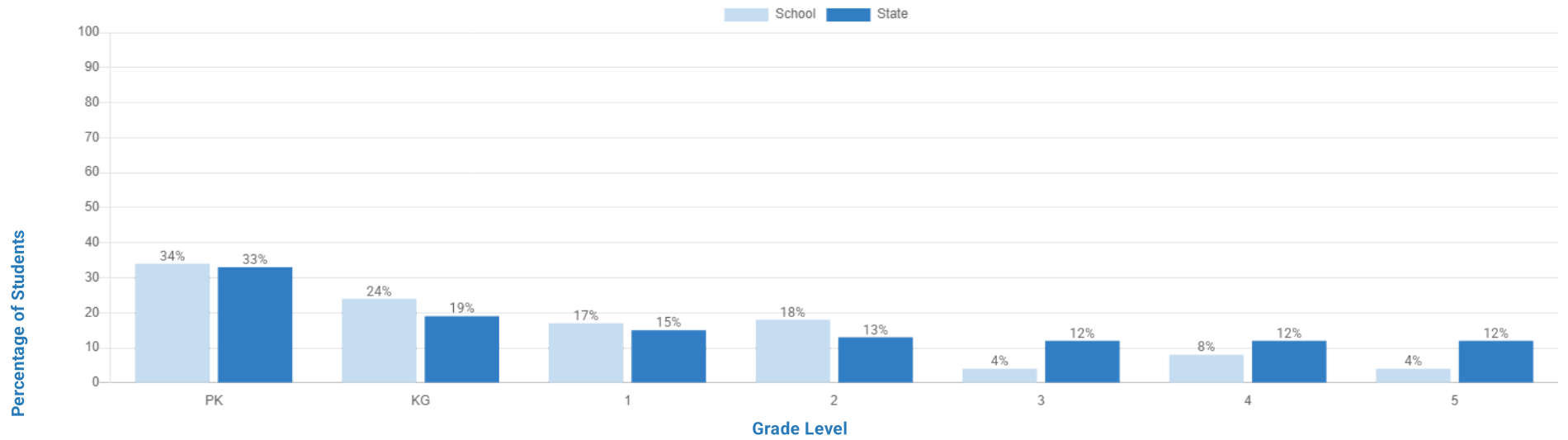

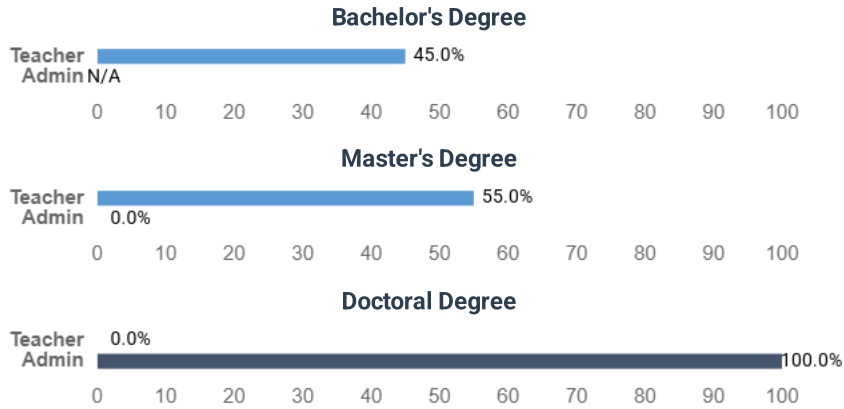

### Accountability Summary by Student Group - 2023-24 School Year

The NJDOE is required under ESSA to identify schools for Targeted Support and Improvement (TSI) annually and for Additional Targeted Support and Improvement (ATSI) every three years. Both TSI and ATSI identifications are based on how student groups within schools perform. Schools are identified for ATSI if they have at least one student group that has a summative score that would be in the bottom 5% of Title I schools if it was its own school. ### Mission, Vision, Theme:

School 15 is the Pride of Dutch Hill. Our student population and surrounding community consists of various ethnic and cultural influences. Our students speak a vast number of languages. This diverse student population contributes to the culturally aware, prideful and enthusiastic learning environment here at School 15. Our teachers challenge, support and encourage each child to reach their own potential. We work under the premise that all students are capable of learning and succeeding. Students and staff alike are encouraged to work hard and celebrate their progress no matter how small. Students are also reminded to do their best and we use the poem Good, Better, Best as our school motto. This poem focuses on effort and hard work to encourage students to work to their fullest potential in everything they do. School 15 along with the Support of the Clifton Public Schools, works diligently to create and enhance programs aligned with our curriculum to meet the needs of our students.



### Awards, Recognition, Accomplishments:

School 15 has implemented PBSIS, a multi-tiered system of support that fosters learning environments that contribute to everyone. Students earn Class Dojo points and PRIDE tickets when they are Positive, Respectful, display Integrity, Dedicated and Empathetic. Students earn weekly, monthly and quarterly prizes for meeting our schoolwide expectations. Students can also earn a GOLD coin to visit our PBSIS Literacy Vending machine by meeting the monthly ELA goal. School 15 also implements various monthly challenges including attendance challenge in an effort to motivate student attendance; Reading and Math challenges based on marking period goals.



### Courses, Curriculum, Instruction:

Our curriculum is aligned with and reflects the New Jersey Student Learning Standards. Teachers implement the enVisions Math Program, a rigorous research-based mathematics curriculum that promotes hands-on activities; inquiry based teaching, small group cooperative learning, and differentiation. Additionally, we implement adaptive mathematics web-based programs that align to each student's instructional level in order to enrich, reinforce, or remediate their own mathematical understanding. School 15 is a literacy-rich environment that nurtures a joyful community of readers. The Fountas & Pinnell leveled guided reading system is utilized in each K-2 classroom in an effort to meet students where they are in reading and to lead them forward into becoming fluent readers. We also use Foundations, a multisensory and systematic phonics, spelling, and handwriting program to develop the foundational reading skills for all kindergarten through grade three students.

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### Sports and Athletics:

Participation in recess, physical education, Clifton Recreation Center, the Boys and Girls Club and extracurricular activities, offers opportunities for students in grades PK-5 to be physically active. This has proven to help improve students' self-esteem/psychological well-being as well as increasing their overall physical wellness. The physically literate individual demonstrates competency in a variety of motor skills and movement patterns, as well as applying knowledge of skills to achieve and maintain a health-enhancing level of physical activity and fitness. This allows our K-5 students to recognize the value of physical activity for health, enjoyment and self-expression.



### Clubs and Activities:

Our school promotes a love and appreciation of the arts by providing instrumental music (band/strings), vocal music, and visual art opportunities throughout each school day. The breakdown includes the following: a standalone art class all K-5 students receive for 35 minutes once a week, a standalone vocal/general music class of 35 minutes once a week, and instrumental strings/band and chorus rehearsals for any 4th and 5th graders interested, that takes place once a week for 35 minutes. Lastly, theater is embedded in the language arts curriculum and dance is embedded in the physical education curriculum which all K-5 students receive. In addition, girls in grades 3-5 have an opportunity to participate in Girls on the Run. This program inspires participants of all abilities to recognize their individual strengths while building a sense of connection in a team setting.



### Before and After School Programs:

School 15 students participate in our Breakfast program daily to start their day with a healthy and nutritious meal. An after-school program is run by the Clifton Boys and Girls Club at School 15.

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### Staff and Professional Learning:

Clifton Public Schools have a strong emphasis on professional learning communities. District wide professional development plans are informed by school level improvement committees (SciPs). Professional Learning Communities meet to deepen teacher understanding of topics such as using data to inform instruction, sharing best practices, looking at students' work, and examining content-based benchmarks. As a district, we encourage and support our staff to continue to be lifelong learners. Our school collaborative team meet to address building communication concerns by providing viable solutions to improve the culture and climate of School 15.



### Student Supports and Services:

Staff trained by Mindful Schools implemented the School 15 Mindfulness Initiative in 2017. To date students in grades pre-kindergarten through grade 5 practice Mindfulness on a daily basis. This initiative helps students develop a greater awareness, focused attention and compassion action. Since the implementation of the Mindfulness Initiative we have seen a decrease in discipline referrals and an increase in student self regulation. Through Mindfulness students have expressed an awareness of their thoughts, feelings, and surroundings which enables them to make better choices. Better choices lead to students thriving and doing their best. Students receive support via the I&RS team. This team within the school convenes throughout the year to formulate coordinated services and systems to address the full range of student learning, behavior, social and health issues. Students receive support via the PBSIS multi-tiered program and I&RS process.



### Student Health and Wellness:

Students in grades K-5 are exposed to concepts related to good health and disease prevention to enhance overall health and wellness. These lessons on family, peers, culture, media, and technology promote overall health and wellness. Students practice the ability to use interpersonal communication skills to enhance health and wellness and avoid or reduce health risks by practicing good decision-making and goal-setting skills. Anti-bullying assemblies and activities are held to inform and combat bullying. Students engage in themed days that highlight PRIDE, mental health and violence awareness.

## Narrative

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### Parent and Community Involvement:

We strive to develop a partnership where our parents, teachers and community members are actively involved in our students academic, social and emotional growth. We believe that a communicative relationship between home and school is crucial to the success of our students. Students whose parents are actively involved perform better in school, develop socially, and have improved attendance and discipline. Our Home and School Association (HSA) is one means of bridging the gap and working together for the betterment of all our students. The HSA works to provide parents an opportunity to actively engage in the school community and help provide our students with various cultural programs, field trips, character education assemblies, community service projects, recognition awards and incentives.



### Early Childhood Education:

Clifton Public Schools offers 2 preschool program options: preschool for children with special needs and a state-funded preschool program. The free preschool program for children with special needs assists children ages 3 to 5 who have special needs. If eligible, there are inclusive opportunities within the state-funded preschool program. In addition, self-contained classrooms are also available throughout the preschool program. The free full-day, high-quality state-funded preschool program is available on a first-come, first-serve basis for age eligible 3 and 4 year-olds that live in Clifton upon completion of the registration process. With a strong relationship with Head Start and a growing list of private providers, our state-funded preschool program currently consists of 46 fully inclusive classrooms, located in 12 locations throughout the district taught by a certificated preschool teacher with a teaching assistant.



### Attendance:

The district has strategically funded instructional and behavioral interventions and support, as well as wrap around programs to address learning differences. High dosage tutoring has been implemented where possible and a comprehensive summer school program was offered to at-risk students across the district K through 12 to provide supplemental language arts, math and stem enhanced instruction. With a strong focus on student mental health, nurtured heart training has been expanded to many staff members and counseling and special education services have been expanded. Additional intervention teachers, counselors, social workers and behaviorists have been hired to address behavioral and developmental delays resulting from interrupted education.
