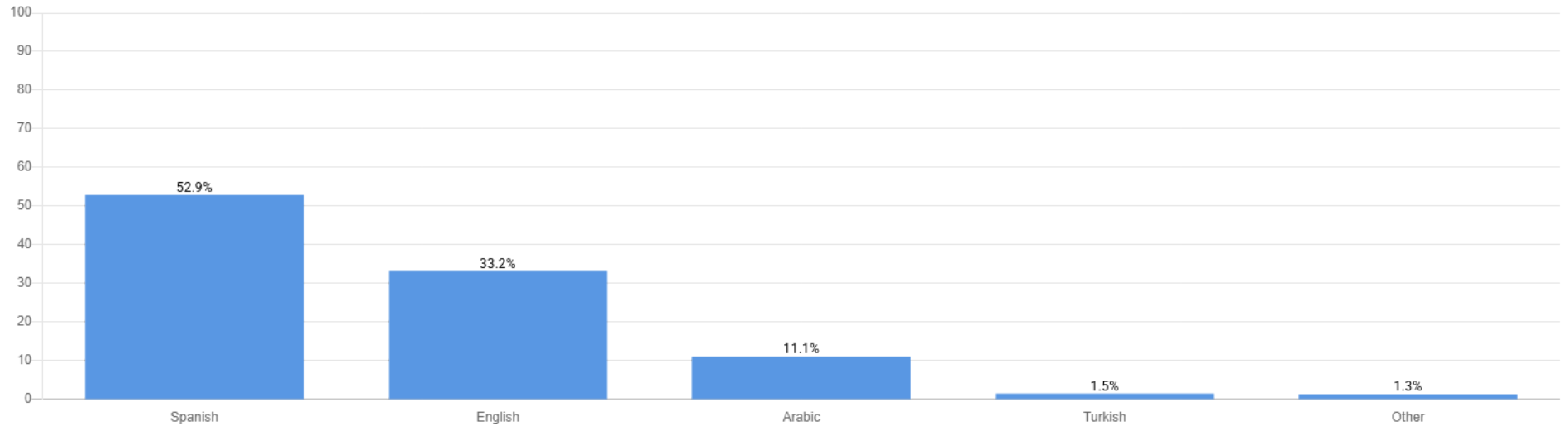

Student Growth

Student growth is a measure of how much students are learning each year. New Jersey's ESSA state plan outlines that academic progress will be measured with school's median student growth percentile (mSGP) on statewide ELA and mathematics assessments. Each individual student receives a Student Growth Percentile (SGP) for English Language Arts (ELA) in grades 4 through 8 and for Mathematics in grades 4 through 7. The SGP measures their academic progress from one year to the next compared to other students with similar prior test scores (academic peers).

A student's SGP falls between 1 and 99 and can be grouped into three levels. An SGP below 35 indicates low growth, an SGP between 35 and 65 indicates typical growth, and an SGP greater than 65 indicates high growth. If the SGPs for all students are ordered from smallest to largest, the mSGP is the percentile in the middle of the list.

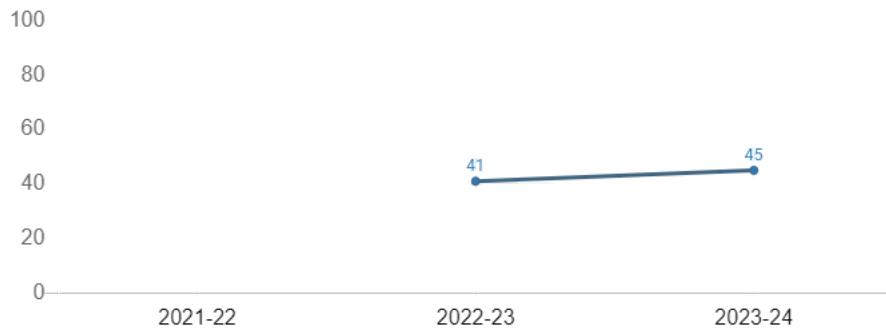

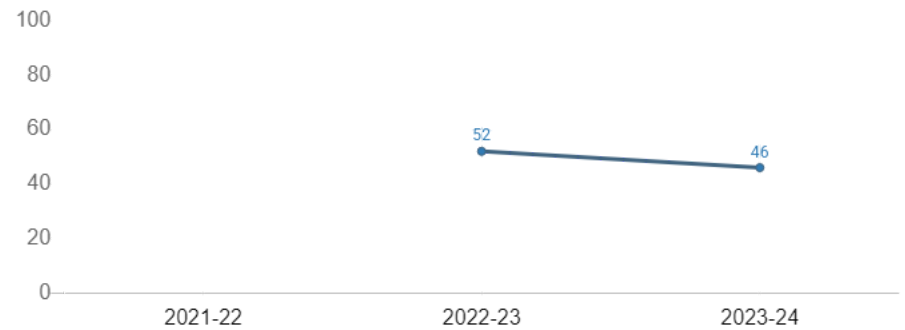

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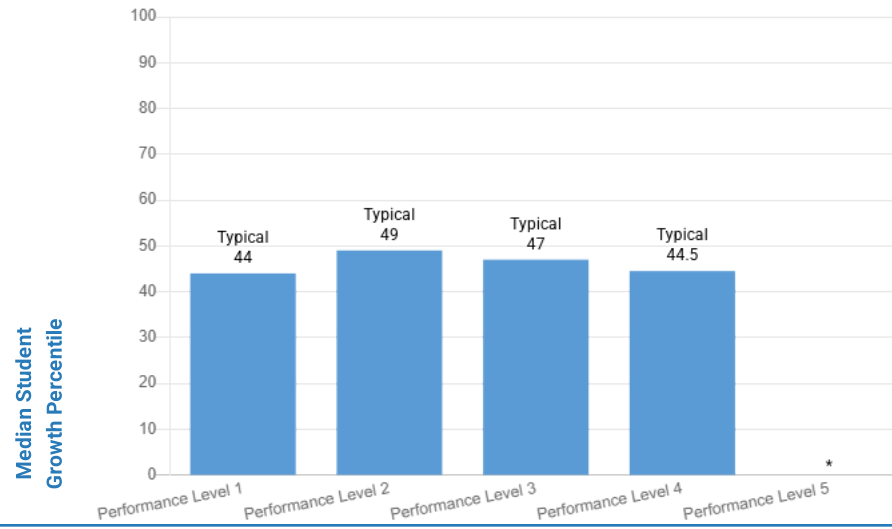
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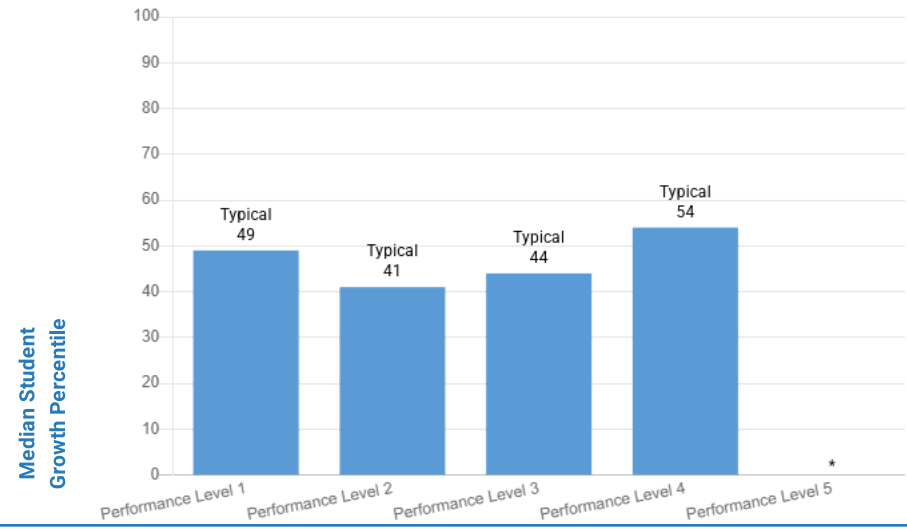

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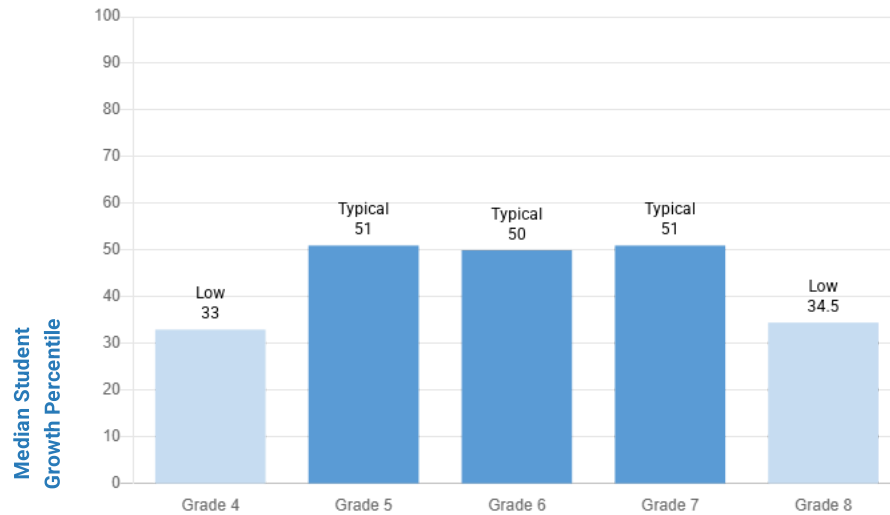
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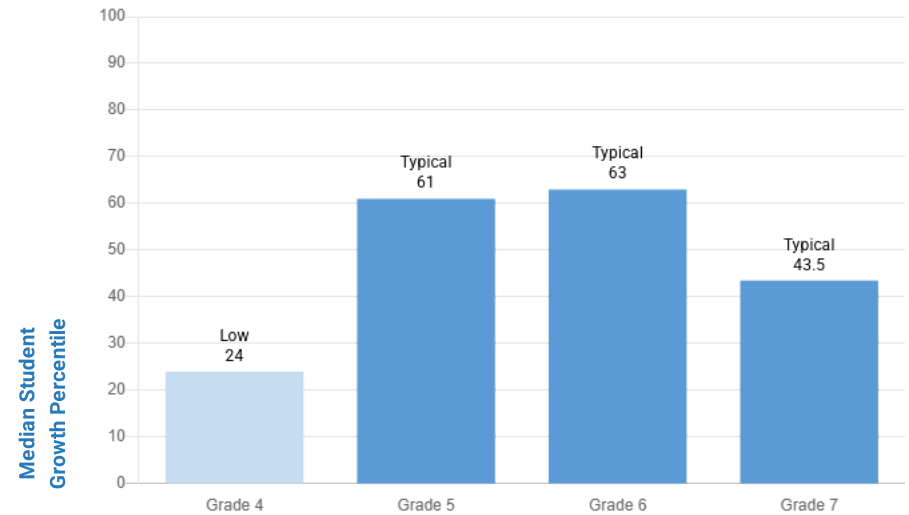

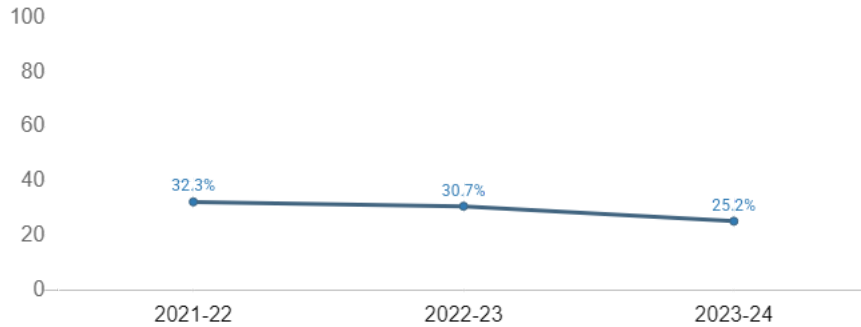

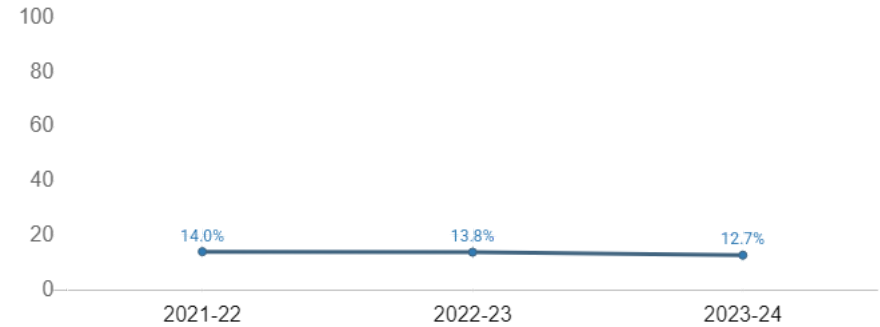
English Language Arts and Mathematics Performance Trends

These graphs show trends in the Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability over the last three years. The data includes the results of students taking both the New Jersey Student Learning Assessment (NJSLA) and the DLM alternate assessment for English language arts (ELA) and mathematics. The Proficiency Rate for Federal Accountability measures the percentage of students who met or exceeded expectations on the assessments (NJSLA or DLM) with an adjustment made if the participation rate is below 95% to ensure reporting on at least 95% of students. Students who were enrolled for less than half a school year are excluded from performance results. The table below provides participation rates, proficiency rates, annual targets and status in meeting the targets, and statewide proficiency rates.

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English Language Arts Assessment - Participation and Performance

This table shows performance on statewide assessments for English language arts (ELA) both overall and by student group. It includes the results of students taking both the NJSLA and DLM. NJSLA results for ELA include only students in grades 3 through 9. Students who were enrolled for less than half a school year are excluded from performance results. Student are considered to have met or exceeded expectations if they score at Level 4 or 5 on the NJSLA or at Level 3 or 4 on the DLM.

This table shows both the percentage of students who met or exceeded expectations and a proficiency rate used for federal accountability. The proficiency rate for federal accountability will be lower if the participation rate is below 95%. This table also shows status in meeting annual targets. Annual targets are specific to each student group, school, and district and represent the expected proficiency needed to stay on track to meet long-term goals. Student groups where the annual target fields are grayed out are not required to meet annual targets under ESSA accountability. 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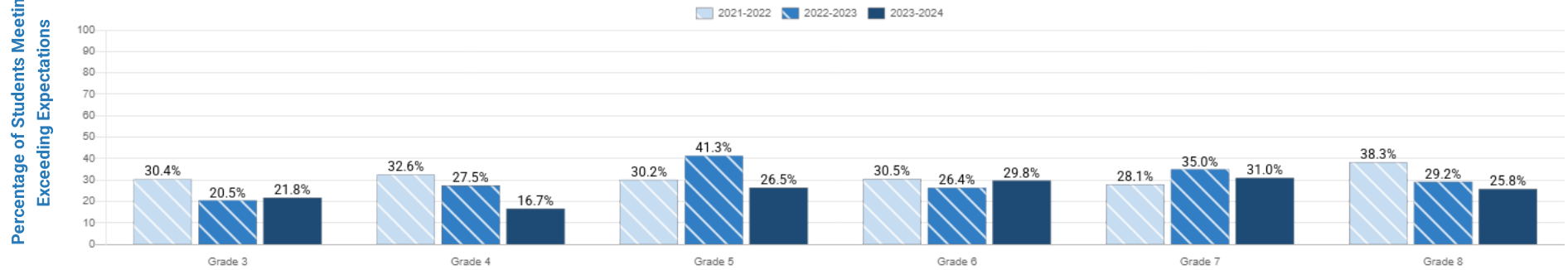

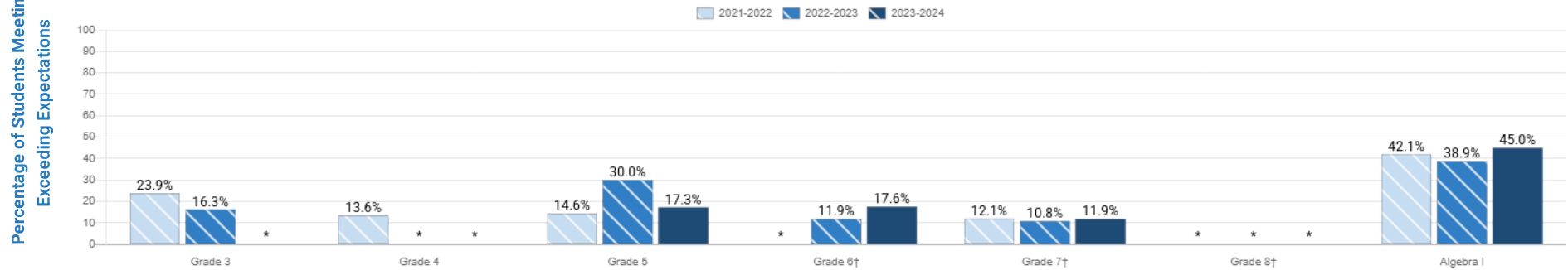

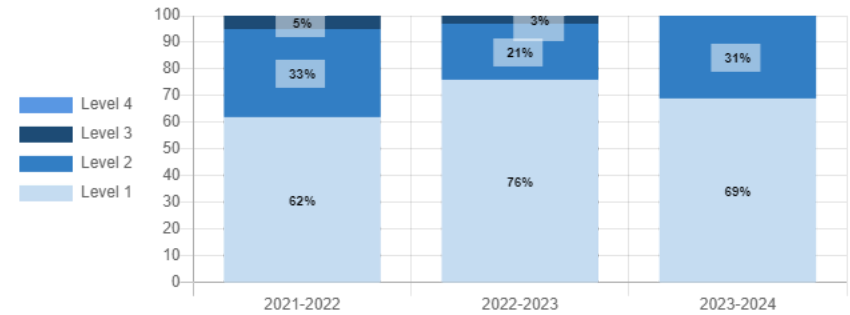

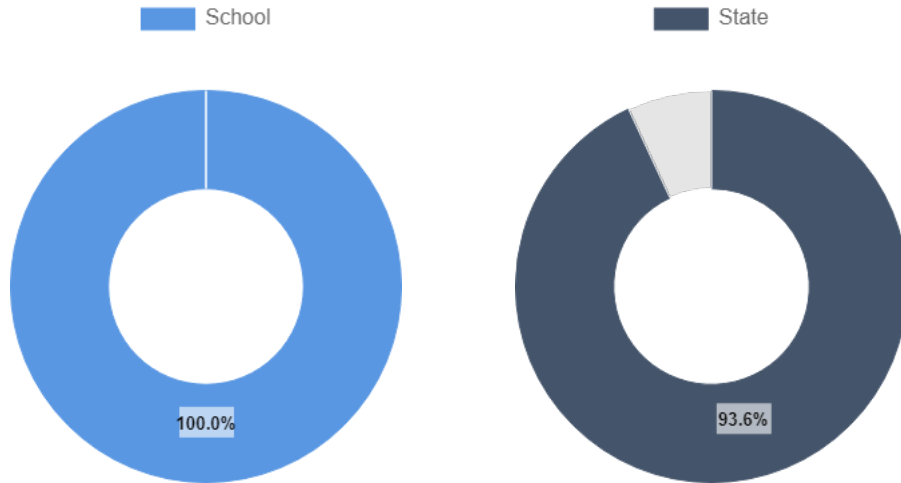

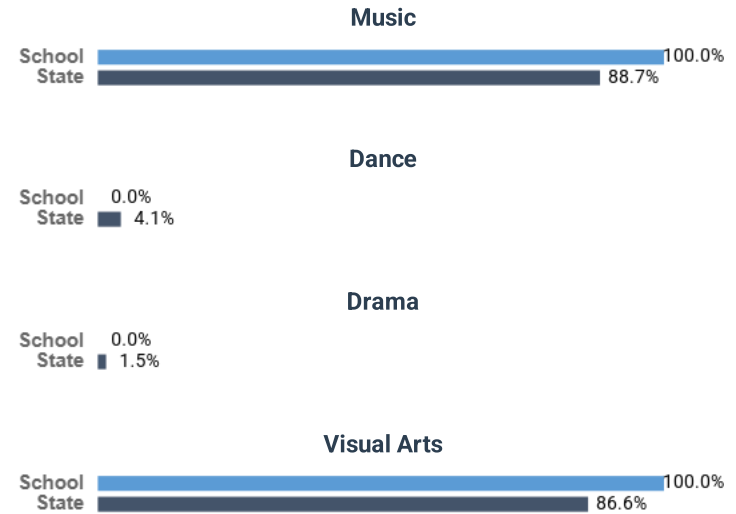

Students enrolled in one or more classes by discipline:



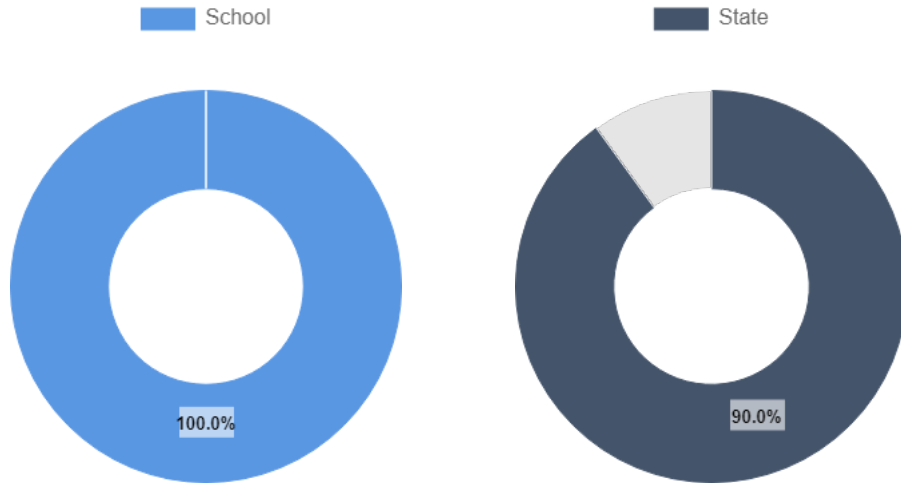

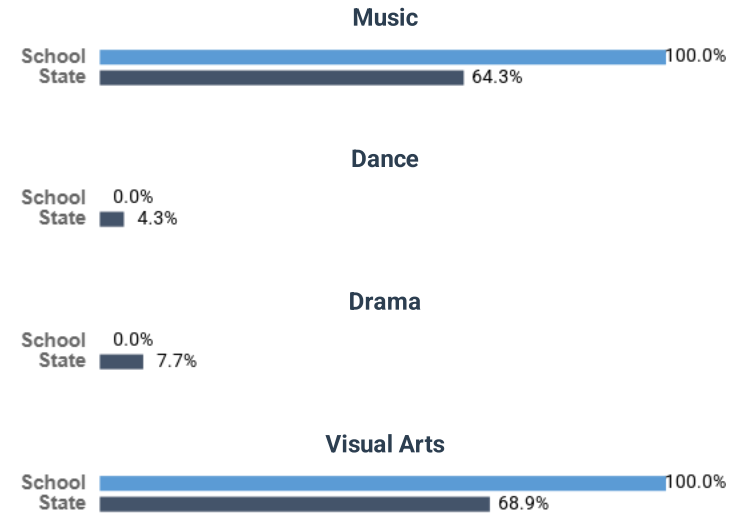

Students enrolled in one or more classes by discipline:



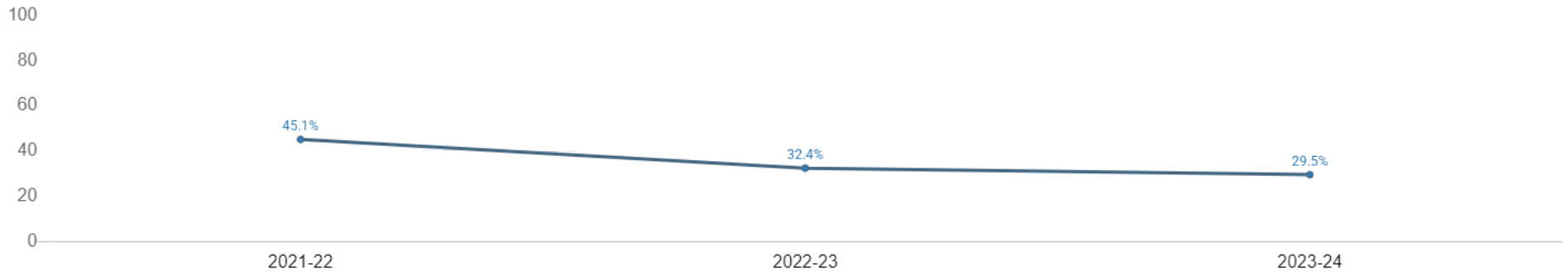

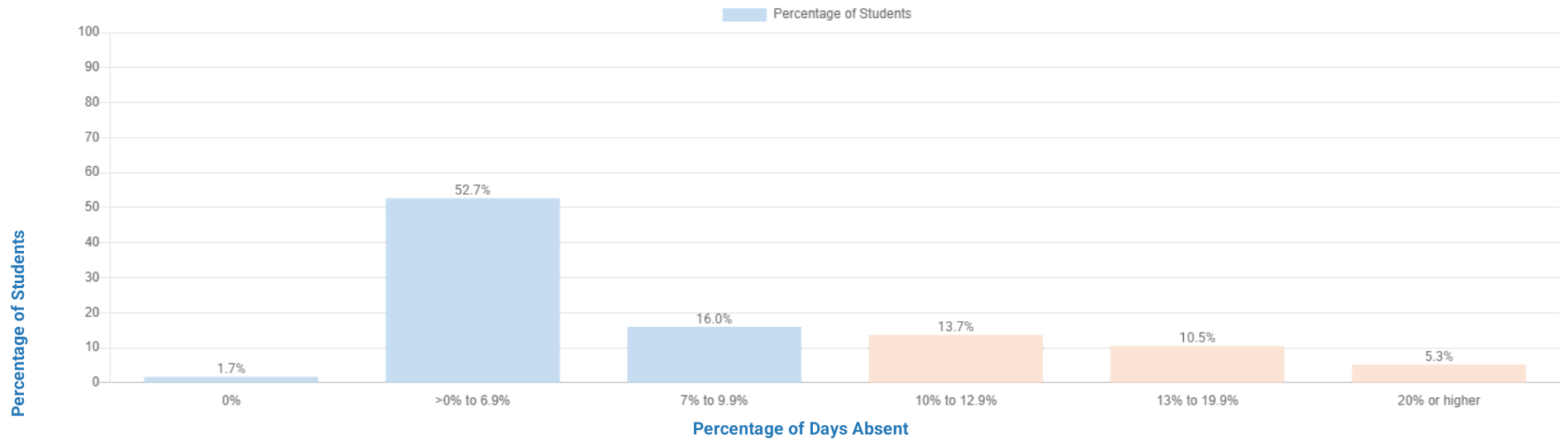

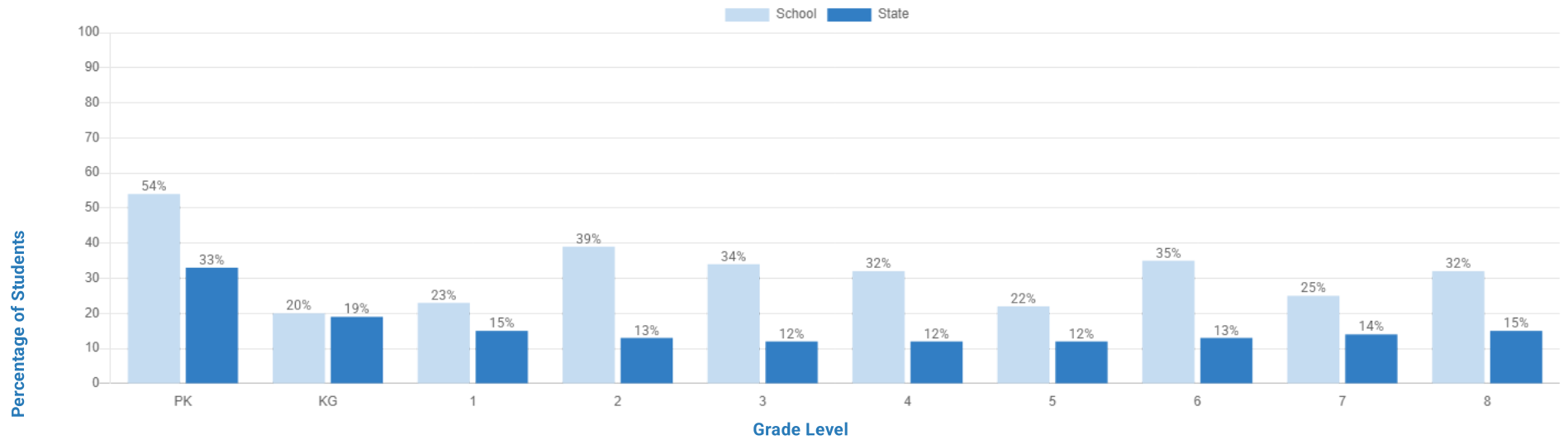

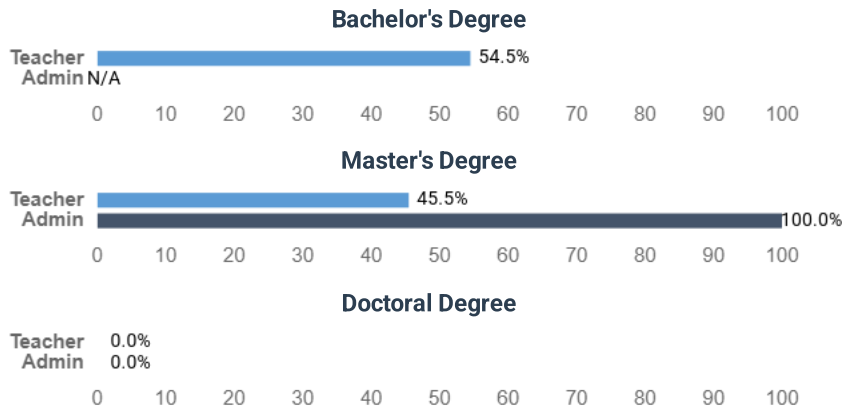

Accountability Summary by Student Group - 2023-24 School Year

School 25-Our Mission is to prepare each student for success in the college or university of their choosing and in their chosen career. Our Vision is Growing to learn and learning to grow, learning for all whatever it takes!

Narrative

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Courses, Curriculum, Instruction:

School 25 follows the NJSLS and district curriculum with fidelity. Pre-Algebra and Algebra courses are offered to Grade 7 and Grade 8 students. There is a Special Education Program with both Self Contained LLD, PSD, and Resource classes. The Bilingual Program follows a Push in Model for the English Language Learners and a Pull out support program for the Bilingual students in Grades 4-8. The staff utilizes Sheltered English Instruction. There is Technology utilized throughout the grade levels. There are Promethean Boards in every classroom and all students have a Chromebook device. FM Units are integrated in classroom.



Sports and Athletics:

Sports Offered: Basketball (Boys & Girls), Cheerleading (Girls)
 In the 2023-2024 school year, School 25 launched its basketball team, cheerleading team, and pep squad athletic program. Student athletes participated in various schoolwide events that provided a positive climate and culture including celebrating Reading Across America and recognizing students who exhibited and for promoting kindness.



Clubs and Activities:

Students participate in various clubs including Kindness Club, Maker Space Club, Art Club, and Tutoring Club. The Student Council champions diversity and inclusion through exciting monthly events that celebrate our unique school community. Social Emotional Club also organizes school activities and events including Social Dances and SEL Game Days. In the 2023-2024 school year, School 25 established its basketball team, cheerleading team, and pep squad.

Narrative

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Before and After School Programs:

School 25 held a before school Rising Readers Program and an after school program Young Achievers for students in Grades 2 - 5 which focused on improving Literacy skills. Supervision is provided by staff before school. Students can enroll in an after school care program run by Paterson Boys & Girls Club



Staff and Professional Learning:

Teachers participate in Grade Level Meetings and Professional Learning Communities to review data and plan interventions to enhance student achievement. Saturday PLCS focused on targeted data and improving teaching and learning.



Student Supports and Services:

School 25 offers the following student supports and services: ESL, School Counselor, Nurse, Reading Specialist, Therapy, Special Services, Speech and Language Services, and I&RS.

Narrative

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Student Health and Wellness:

Our school offers "Breakfast after the Bell" on a daily basis in the homeroom classroom. Core Team trained in "Mindfulness Learning". Students obtained free dental screenings and free eye exams and eyeglasses as needed. Full-time nurse on premises. The district Social Emotional Learning team met with the school counselors and building administration to discuss our specific needs SEL interventionists provided lessons on empathy, self-awareness, relationship building, resiliency, and kindness The school counseling team supported lessons and collaborated with teachers and SEL team to develop a schedule The SEL specialists met with teachers and gave resources and ideas on how to implement strategies on their own. Mindfulness Monday focused on SEL. Grief Counseling Training was provided to create at school based support team.



Parent and Community Involvement:

Parent and Community Engagement continues to improve and increase. Parents attend and participate in all school related events, Back to School Night and Report Card Conferences. Parents participated in Career Day, the various Heritage History Monthly Events, and the Talent and Fashion Show held during the Spring. There is ongoing communication between school and home. There are parents and community members as a part of the School Improvement Panel.

Is a Climate Survey Used: Yes; Who is surveyed: Students, Parents, Administrators, Teachers. School 25 surveys are given to parents, students and staff. The surveys are used to create programs that will enhance learning as well as to improve the school climate and culture.

Narrative

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Facilities:

Construction for School 25 started in July, 1930. The school was opened on September 14, 1931 and is a 3 story well-maintained building that stands majestically on a rise, has an impressive colonial style architecture, located on a spacious campus. There are over 30 classrooms, an auditorium, Maker Space Room and cafeteria/gymnasium which provides a comfortable learning environment. School No. 25 held a ribbon-cutting ceremony for its recently renovated baseball field on Monday, October 16, 2023. There is a well maintained playground for the Early Childhood Program. Air conditioning is provided throughout the building and over 60 new trees were planted on and around the school campus. The school flower garden continues to bloom.



School Safety:

School 25 has an active Safety Team of staff which meets regularly to discuss important safety plans and protocols. Every month safety drills are conducted and there is an active Safety Patrol Unit consisting of Middle School students who assist with the structure and organization of the AM arrival/PM dismissal.



Technology and STEM:

School 25 has expanded the Technology focus in the building providing every staff and student will access to a Chromebook device. Every classroom has a Promethean Board to support the Blended Learning approach. Every student (K-8) is provided technology instruction via Learning.com. All teachers have a Google Classroom and also utilize the various applications and digital resources that support the curriculum.
