Identify sources that present differing perspectives of the same topic from various time periods. Evaluate sources to identify the intent and purpose of the author. Consider contextual factors that may have influenced the author's perspective. Select and integrate sources of various perspectives into research. Draw connections between sources in order to develop a deeper understanding of a topic. 	 Identify the role of author bias in the development of sources. Determine how one's life experiences may influence the way they interpret and present information. Research and select sources that consider a broad representation of cultural, religious, ethnic, political, and socio-economic perspectives. Recognize the relationships across sources to construct a holistic understanding of an event, topic, or issue. Integrate diverse perspectives as a means for strengthening one's understanding and argument.
