Administrative Complaint Disposition – No Records Responsive to the Request Exist

Complaint Disposition: The Custodian certified that she responded to the Complainant in writing within the statutorily mandated response time¹ indicating that no records responsive to the OPRA request exist. Additionally, the Complainant failed to provide any evidence to contradict the Custodian's certification.² Thus, this complaint shall be dismissed because the evidence of record reflects that no responsive records exist.

Applicable OPRA Provision: "Government record' or 'record' means any paper, written or printed book, document, drawing, map, plan, photograph, microfilm, data processed or image processed document, information stored or maintained electronically or by sound-recording or in a similar device, or any copy thereof, that has been made, maintained or kept on file in the course of his or its official business . . ." N.J.S.A. 47:1A-1.1.

This is the final administrative determination in this matter. Any further review should be pursued in the Appellate Division of the Superior Court of New Jersey within forty-five (45) days. ¹ The Custodian included in the Statement of Information her January 24, 2024 e-mail response sent to the Complainant's correct e-mail address and a delivery failure notice to support her timely response.

² Following the Custodian's response to the GRC's request for additional information, the Complainant responded asserting that "[m]inimally, documents exist that I SENT . . ." (Emphasis in original). To the extent that this is true, the GRC notes that the Custodian was under no obligation to disclose e-mails the Complainant composed and sent to the Township of Edgewater Park. See Caggiano v. N.J.
