Complaint Disposition: The Custodian certified that she responded to the Complainant in writing within the statutorily mandated response time indicating that no records responsive to the OPRA request exist. Additionally, the Complainant failed to provide any evidence to contradict the Custodian's certification.² Thus, this complaint shall be dismissed because the evidence of record reflects that no responsive records exist.

Applicable OPRA Provision: "Government record' or 'record' means any paper, written or printed book, document, drawing, map, plan, photograph, microfilm, data processed or image processed document, information stored or maintained electronically or by sound-recording or in a similar device, or any copy thereof, that has been made, maintained or kept on file in the course of his or its official business . . ." N.J.S.A. 47:1A-1.1.

This is the final administrative determination in this matter. Any further review should be pursued in the Appellate Division of the Superior Court of New Jersey within forty-five (45) days. ¹ The Complainant originally submitted his OPRA request on May 8, 2025 directly to an e-mail address of employee that was no longer with the City of Absecon. He subsequently resubmitted his OPRA request to the Custodian on May

The Complainant contended that the Custodian should have been required to direct him to the location on the internet where responsive records existed. While N.J.S.A. 47:1A-5(e) allows for such an action, OPRA does not require a custodian to direct a requestor to websites not managed or maintained by that specific agency.
