Complaint Disposition: The Custodian certified that all records responsive to the subject OPRA request were provided to the Complainant within the statutorily mandated response time. Additionally, the Complainant failed to provide any evidence to contradict the Custodian’s certification.¹ Thus, this complaint shall be dismissed because the Custodian timely provided all responsive records.

Applicable OPRA Provision: “A custodian shall promptly comply with a request to inspect, examine, copy, or provide a copy of a government record.” N.J.S.A. 47:1A-5(g).

“Unless a shorter time period is otherwise provided by statute, regulation, or executive order, a custodian of a government record shall grant access to a government record . . . as soon as possible, but not later than seven business days after receiving the request, provided that the record is currently available and not in storage or archived.” N.J.S.A. 47:1A-5(i).

This is the final administrative determination in this matter. Any further review should be pursued in the Appellate Division of the Superior Court of New Jersey within forty-five (45) days. ¹ The Complainant’s stated issue in the Denial of Access Complaint was that the link expired, and the Custodian advised the Complainant that she would have to file a new OPRA request to receive a new link. The GRC notes, however, that contrary to the Custodian’s demand, an individual need not file an OPRA request to obtain a record. Instead, OPRA applies where a requestor invokes the statute by submitting an official OPRA request.
