### Organization & Content of Institutional Accountability Report for 2007

#### A. Accreditation status.

##### 1. Institutional accreditation.

County College of Morris is licensed by the State of New Jersey. It is accredited by the Commission on Higher Education of the Middle States Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. It was initially accredited in 1972. The most recent re-accreditation was completed in 1998.

We are in the process of preparing for a Middle States visit, scheduled for 2008. A self-Study design has been formulated and work teams have been created.

##### 2. Professional accreditation.

The *Chemical Technology*, *Environmental Science*, and *Biotechnology* programs are accredited by the **American Chemical Society, Chemical Technology Program Approval Service.**

The college's *Nursing* program is fully accredited by the **New Jersey State Board of Nursing** and the **National League for Nursing Accrediting Commission.**

The *Respiratory Therapy* program is accredited by the **Commission on Accreditation of Allied Health Education** programs through the **Committee for Respiratory Therapy Education.**

The *Radiography Program* is accredited by the **State of New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection, Radiologic Technology Board of Examiners** and by the **Joint Review Committee on Education in Radiologic Technology.**

The *Veterinary Technology* program is accredited by the **American Veterinary Medical Association, Committee on Veterinary Technician Education and Activities.**

All of the above are accrediting agencies are recognized by the U.S. Department of Education.

The programs in *Electronic Engineering Technology* and *Mechanical Engineering Technology* are accredited by the **Technology Accreditation Commission of the Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology**, and **TAC/ABET**. ABET is the sole national accreditation organization for programs in engineering and engineering technology.

The programs in *Business Administration* and *Business Career* are accredited by the **Association of Collegiate Business Schools and Programs.**

Students were exempt from testing in all three areas upon presentation of appropriate documentation to the Admissions Office.

1. Students who have taken SATs or ACTs and have earned scores of 500 or higher on the SAT Math (or a 21 on ACT Math) or a 500 or higher on the SAT Verbal (or 21 on the ACT Verbal) for Writing.
2. Students who have previously received an associate's degree or a bachelor's degree from a U.S. college or university.
3. Students who have passed the appropriate remedial coursework at another college or university.

Students for these tests were also exempt if they were not matriculated or have earned less than 12 credits and decided not to take the test until a later time. Also, students did not have to take Mathematics Computation if they passed the Basic Algebra Test.

Admission from high school requires an SAT score of at least 1100 or ACT equivalent and/or graduation in the top 20 percent of the class.

English for Speakers of Other Languages is a non-credit program of study designed for students whose native language is not English but who already have some fundamental knowledge of English as determined by a placement examination administered on the CCM campus. The academically oriented curriculum provides international students with the linguistic knowledge, cultural awareness and strong study skills appropriate for college studies. Students in the program will be allowed to matriculate in a college curriculum upon satisfactory completion of the program.

CCM received certification from the Committee on National Security Systems for its program in Information Security. The certification ensures that the program adheres to the National Training Standards for Systems Security Professionals. CCM is the only community college in New Jersey to be granted the certification.

CCM became a certified provider of continuing education courses for nurses and allied health professionals. The certification was granted by the New Jersey State Nurses Association (NJSNA), which is accredited by the American Nurses Credentialing Center's Commission on Accreditation. Active and inactive nurses and allied health professionals will be able to earn the continuing education credits they need to upgrade their skills and renew their speciality certification and licenses.

### I. Major research and public service activities.

CCM pursues funding from both public and private external sources to fund scholarships, improve teaching and learning, acquire state of the art equipment and provide public services. 2006-2007 was a successful year in this regard with over a million dollars garnered for the College. Projects worthy of note include:

- The Women's Center at CCM was awarded grants by five different funding sources totaling almost \$160,000 to continue serving displaced homemakers and other needy women.
- Chilton Memorial Hospital, Morristown Memorial Hospital and Saint Clare's Hospital continued their pledges of \$250,000 for the Weekend Nursing Program that will support the education and training of approximately 90 student nurses.
- New Jersey Statewide Systemic Initiative Plan for math and science teacher enhancement was awarded \$80,000 for the Math-Science Initiative NorthWest (MSI-NW).
- The County College of Morris Foundation continues to be successful in acquiring philanthropic support. The 2006-07 campaign netted funds and future pledges of over \$750,000 including support for the new Weekend Nursing Degree Program.

The College faculty and staff also continued to provide lectures for community events through the CCM Speakers Service.

During 2006-2007 year, the Special Events department provided public service through events that stimulated and enriched the social, cultural, professional and recreational climate of the community. Many of the programs were co-sponsored by the Office of Campus Life. Program expenses are subsidized by the College to keep ticket prices affordable and accessible to the local communities.

### J. Major capital projects.

#### 1. Capital projects underway in FY2007:

- Renovation of Henderson Hall, which included abatement of asbestos containing materials within the renovated areas prior to construction, roughing in of energy management and fire alarm systems, HVAC duct work, electrical work for telecommunication and audio visual requirements, and partial framing is in process.
- Front of the House Lights and Drapery/Curtains project for the Student Community Center, which includes new additional stage lighting and all new stage curtains.
- Completion of phase II work associated with the Stormwater Management Program to satisfy the NJDEP requirements regarding MS4 outfalls, drainage at parking lots, spill containment area adjacent to the gasoline pump, repair of catch-basins and installation of a new enclosed salt shed.
