H. <u>Major Research and Public Service Activities</u>

In Spring 2011, WCCC conducted the Noel Levitz Institutional Priorities Survey of the staff and faculty to gauge opinions across a variety of topics related to the institution. The results will be compared to the results of the Noel Levitz Student Satisfaction Survey, administered in Fall 2010, to analyze common areas of improvement among students, faculty and staff.

I. Major Capital Projects Underway in FY 2011

Phase I of the College's Library Expansion Project was completed in September 2010. Phase II, which includes the construction of a mezzanine level and the overall refurbishment of the library, is expected to be completed in October 2011. This project was supported with proceeds from a 2010 Chapter 12 bond.

Also during 2010-11, the College completed the renovation/acquisition of 52,000 GSF satellite site in Phillipsburg, New Jersey. The Phillipsburg Education Center, which was formally dedicated on September 7, 2011, will bring post-secondary educational services to the western edge of the County. This center will host the College's non-credit programs as well as select credit classes for residents of the County's largest municipality. In addition to supporting the Corporate and Continuing Education activities, the Center also will be home to the Small Business Growth Center, the county's business incubator. This facility acquisition also was supported through Chapter 12 bond funds.
