Sampling of GCC's Athletic Program Activities and Awards Academic Year 2012–2013

The Gloucester County College Athletic Department is a comprehensive 13-sport program for men and women. As a member of the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA), GCC competes in Region XIX and the Garden State Athletic Conference against other two-year colleges from New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Delaware and Maryland.



Activities and Awards received in 2012–2013 include:

- For the fourth straight year, GCC has been named the best overall National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) Non-Scholarship Athletic Program in the country.
- Ron Case, Director of Athletics, received the Under Armour Athletic Director of the Year Award.
- GCC had five NJCAA championship teams in the 2013 academic year: Women's Cross Country, Women's Tennis, Women's Track and Field, Men's Tennis and Men's Baseball. The Women's Soccer and Men's Track and Field teams also placed second nationally.
- The Women's Cross Country team won the NJCAA Division III Championship with three All-Americans. In addition, the Men's Cross Country Team had three All-Americans. The College's cross country program received the "Pepsi Challenge Cup" for being the best overall cross country program in NJCAA Division III.
- The Women's and Men's Tennis teams were both named NJCAA Division III Champions, with a combined total of nine All-American athletes. The Women's Team had four individual National Champions and the Men's Team had two individual National Champions.
- The Women's Track and Field team won the NJCAA Division III title for the 2013 academic year. GCC's Men's Track and Field team took second in their division. There were eight All-Americans between the two teams.
- The Men's Baseball team took the title of 2013 NJCAA Division III National Championship with three All-American team members. Additional awards included: 1st Team Outfield, 1st Team Pitcher and 1st Team Designated Hitter with the 1st Team Pitcher also winning the NJCAA Division III Baseball Player of the Year Award.
- *Mike Dickson, Head Baseball Coach*, won the Skip Bertram National Baseball Coach of the Year Award, as well as the NJCAA Division III and ABCA Baseball Coach of the Year Award.
- *Ryan Hughes, Head Cross Country Coach,* won the NJCAA Division III Women's Cross Country Coach of the Year Award; this is his third time receiving this award.
- *Brian Rowan*, *Assistant Director of Athletics*, received the NJCAA Division III Men's/Women's Tennis Coach of the Year Award.
