This year New Jersey Secretary of Higher Education Rochelle Hendricks paid a visit to Warren County Community College to learn about the College's proposed Health Education Center and to attain a better understanding of why the center is important not just for the College's mission to serve the community, but as an enhancement to the entire region. The Secretary of Higher Education agreed with the College's ambitions for what the new Health Education Center can accomplish.

This year also brought with it some changes to the appearance of the College. The parking lot, sidewalks and front entrance were all updated to make the College even more in keeping with the Americans with Disabilities Act and easily accessible to everyone.

Changes for the future were conceptualized around a new outdoor amphitheater at the College. This structure will hopefully become a community venue allowing the public to come to the College for outdoor cultural events.

While he continues to lead the College, President Will Austin will be in the national spotlight as he assumes his official role as Chair-Elect of the American Association of Community Colleges' Presidents' Academy executive committee later this year.

I. Major Capital Projects Underway in FY 2014

Beginning in November 2013, WCCC began implementation of Jenzabar EX, a new data management software system. This project is made possible through funds from New Jersey Higher Education bonds. The implementation and use of this new system will allow us to better serve our student community and integrate across departments to assist us in advancing the goals of academic and administrative offices across the campus and throughout the student experience here at WCCC. This project continues to be underway and will be in full use by the beginning of the 2015-2016 Academic Year.

The College plans to publicly bid the construction of a new outdoor 250 seat amphitheater at the back of the school that will move the College toward being a community cultural venue.
