

Section A Introduction and Accreditation Status

Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey

General Background

Chartered in 1766 as Queen's College, Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey, is the eighth oldest institution of higher learning in the United States. It has a unique history: from its inception as one of the nation's nine colonial colleges, Rutgers grew to become the land-grant college of New Jersey in 1864, and to assume full university status in 1924. Legislative acts of 1945 and 1956 designating it "The State University of New Jersey" qualified it as the youngest of the nation's major public research universities. The University of Newark merged with Rutgers in 1946, and the College of South Jersey in Camden joined in 1950. All of the university's property and educational facilities are imparted with a public trust for higher education of the people of the State.

In the short span of several decades, Rutgers transformed from a disparate collection of schools, geographically dispersed and operating largely independently, into the ranks of the most prestigious educational institutions. That advancement was recognized in 1989 when Rutgers was invited to join the Association of American Universities (AAU). Dedicated to a threefold mission, Rutgers is equally committed to excellence in teaching, scholarship, and public service. Driving all of Rutgers' activities is the defining characteristic of a premier research university: the continuous and vigorous creation of intellectual capital—the new discoveries and insights that drive the advancement of human knowledge and contribute to the improvement of the human condition. The very same intellectual and physical resources that distinguish Rutgers as a comprehensive research university that creates and advances knowledge enable it to provide the kind of education that best prepares its undergraduates to participate in and contribute to today's intricate and fast-changing, knowledge—intensive world.

The New Jersey Medical and Health Sciences Education Restructuring Act, passed by the New Jersey Senate and Assembly on June 28, 2012, and signed by Governor Chris Christie on August 22, 2012, integrates all units of the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey, except University Hospital in Newark and the School of Osteopathic Medicine in Stratford, into Rutgers effective July 1, 2013. As required by the 1956 Rutgers Law, the legislation needed approval of both the Rutgers Board of Governors and Rutgers Board of Trustees. Both boards approved the integration of Rutgers and UMDNJ at their November 19, 2012, meeting. Twelve functional teams with members from both universities began working to ensure a smooth operational integration.

University Mission

As New Jersey's sole comprehensive public research university, Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey, has the threefold mission of:

- providing for the instructional needs of New Jersey's citizens through its undergraduate, graduate, and continuing education programs;
- conducting the cutting-edge research that contributes to the medical, environmental, social, and cultural well-being of the state, as well as aiding the economy and the state's businesses and industries; and

• performing public service in support of the needs of the citizens of the state and its local, county, and state governments.

Each component of the university's mission reinforces and supports the other two. For example, research creates the new knowledge so necessary to support quality instruction and innovative public service. The mission of the university is accomplished through locations in Camden, Newark, and New Brunswick, and the New Jersey Agricultural Experiment Station, which complement and support each other, permitting the most effective use of state resources.

University Campuses and Academic Structure

Today, Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey, is a single university with locations in three geographically separate cities: Camden, Newark and New Brunswick. This definition of Rutgers was articulated in the Rutgers Act of 1956, when state legislation formally designated Rutgers as The State University. The integration of the legacy elements of UMDNJ into Rutgers has created a fourth unit, Rutgers Biomedical and Health Sciences (RBHS), which consists of a number of schools and units located on various sites but closely aligned with the campus in New Brunswick.

As one Rutgers, all of our campuses and units share common values, features, resources and administrative and other centralized services. As distinct entities, however, the campuses and RBHS each have differentiated missions and future visions that emanate from this unified core.

New Brunswick is the birthplace of Rutgers and is home to the university's largest campus. Rutgers—New Brunswick actually comprises five smaller campuses, each reflecting the university's historical evolution: the College Avenue Campus in New Brunswick (74 acres)—the site of Rutgers College, as original Queen's College was renamed in 1825; the Cook Campus in New Brunswick and North Brunswick (753 acres)—originally the site of the experimental farm of the land-grant Rutgers Scientific School, later Cook College, and now the School of Environmental and Biological Sciences; the Douglass Campus in New Brunswick (150 acres)—site of the New Jersey College for Women, later renamed Douglass College; and across the Raritan River, the Busch Campus in Piscataway (771 acres)—site of many science facilities; and the Livingston Campus in Piscataway and Edison (935 acres)—site of Livingston College, founded in 1969 as a shared learning community committed to academic innovation and excellence. In March 2006, the university approved the restructuring of undergraduate education in New Brunswick resulting in the merger of the university's four liberal arts colleges of Douglass, Livingston, Rutgers, and University College into a single "School of Arts and Sciences."

Rutgers Biomedical and Health Sciences, which serves as the umbrella organization for eight schools, four centers and institutes, and a behavioral health network, was created in July, 2013, according to the 2012 New Jersey Medical and Health Sciences Education Restructuring Act. The creation of RBHS within Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey, established Rutgers as one of the largest academic in the United States providing health care education, research and clinical service and care.

Tracing its origins to 1908, Rutgers–Newark today is housed on 38 acres in the downtown area of Newark, New Jersey's largest city. It is the northernmost campus of Rutgers, located just 20 minutes from New York City. Rutgers–Camden (29 acres) is located in the heart of the Camden Waterfront and

metropolitan Philadelphia region. It began in the 1920s as an amalgam of the College of South Jersey and the South Jersey Law School.

In total, the university operates research and instructional facilities on 5,973 acres in 13 counties and 28 municipalities. As of September 2016, university degrees are awarded by 33 schools and colleges. New Brunswick including RBHS, 20 schools offer degrees; in Newark, six colleges and schools offer degrees; in both Newark and New Brunswick, the Rutgers Business School: Graduate Programs–Newark and New Brunswick offers degrees; in both Newark and Camden, the Rutgers Law School offers degrees; and in Camden, five colleges and schools offer degrees.

In 2013, the Middle States Commission on Higher Education (MSCHE) reaffirmed the university's accreditation. Certain programs at the university are also accredited by professional accreditation associations. Among these include the AACSB International—The Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business; ABET; and the Association of American Law Schools and American Bar Association.

DEFINITIONS

Branch Campus - A branch campus is a domestic or international location of an institution that is geographically apart, independent of the primary/main campus. The branch campus is considered independent of the main campus if it is permanent in nature; offers courses in educational programs leading to a degree, certificate, or other recognized educational credential; has its own faculty and administrative or supervisory organization; and has its own budgetary and hiring authority. 

Community Health Programs

Health services at Rutgers aim to ensure that all individuals, particularly those living in traditionally underserved areas, have access to high-quality health care regardless of their cultural or ethnic background or ability to pay. Many of our programs serve residents in urban communities of New Jersey. Below are some of our signature programs.

Community Health Programs, Robert Wood Johnson Medical School

Robert Wood Johnson Medical School (RWJMS) has a clearly stated commitment to community service and the improvement of community health. Medical students at RWJMS engage in a variety of community health activities including the Homeless and Indigent Populations Health and Outreach Project (HIPHOP) and the Promise Clinic in New Brunswick.

Eric B. Chandler Health Center, Robert Wood Johnson Medical School

The center is a comprehensive, family-oriented community health center offering primary care services including family medicine, internal medicine, infectious disease, pediatrics obstetrics and gynecology, podiatry, family planning, and dentistry.

FOCUS Wellness Center, School of Nursing

The center provides comprehensive primary care, and women's health, mental health, and medication review and education services to Newark and surrounding communities. The center is a model of interprofessional collaborative practice, uniting Rutgers faculty and students from the School of Nursing, School of Social Work, Ernest Mario School of Pharmacy, and School of Health Professions in helping patients to achieve their best possible health outcomes. The center was established through a partnership with the FOCUS Hispanic Center for Community Development.

Free Community Participatory Physical Therapy Clinic, School of Health Professions

The clinic serves the community of Newark with physical therapy services and education on wellness and health. It is supervised by a licensed physical therapist and student volunteers from the entry-level doctoral program in physical therapy.

Jordan and Harris Community Health Center, School of Nursing

The center provides comprehensive, on site health services to residents of the Hyatt Court, Pennington Court, Terrell Homes, and the Stephen Crane Village public housing developments in Newark. In collaboration with the school's Mobile Healthcare Project, the center offers physical exams, vaccinations, screenings, and diagnostic testing, as well as home visits to elderly or housebound residents, pregnant women, and new mothers.

Mobile Healthcare Project, School of Nursing

This initiative includes the New Jersey Children Health Project (NJCHP), a partnership with the Children's Health Fund that takes a fully equipped mobile health clinic to neighborhoods in Newark and vicinity to provide primary and preventative care to medically underserved children and families. Goals of the NJCHP include ensuring that children in high-risk populations have access to primary and specialty care, mental health services, and early identification and management of chronic conditions including asthma and childhood obesity.

Oral Care at the School of Dental Medicine


The Rutgers School of Dental Medicine provides a full range of oral health services while training the next generation of dentists. Care is provided by dental students working under the direction of faculty members who are fully licensed dentists.

Student Family Health Care Center, New Jersey Medical School

The center offers free health care to the Newark community. Services include physical examinations, chronic disease management, gynecological care, and psychological counseling. All services are provided by volunteer medical students under the supervision of board-certified family physicians.

Rutgers University — Newark (RU-N) is a remarkably diverse, urban, public research university that is not just *in* Newark but *of* Newark—an anchor of our home city. The RU-N community has long recognized that our location is both a defining influence in our story and a distinctive strength. It attracts and cultivates talent on many levels, ranging from generations of students hungry for the opportunities afforded by a first-rate higher education in a major American urban center, to faculty who vigorously embrace the opportunity to produce high-impact scholarship, and engage the community while preparing these students for professional success and informed citizenship. Our location is also a magnet for professional staff committed to advancing our research, pedagogy, and social impact within an inclusive campus culture focused on excellence.

Our campus recently completed a strategic visioning process that underscored this defining aspect of RU-N's identity, yielding a **strategic plan** that emphasizes the need to develop even more fully and purposefully

our anchor institution agenda. Our work toward this end has been organized thus far under five broad areas that capture much of the scholarly expertise and civic-oriented interests in anchor institution work:

Building Strong Educational Pathways (pre-K-16) for Increased Postsecondary Attainment Strong, Healthy, and Safe Neighborhoods Promoting and Leveraging the Arts and Culture Science and the Urban Environment; and Entrepreneurship and Economic Development

Our goal is to move away from traditional models of "public service" in which faculty and students do things for "a passive and needy public," as public historian Scott Peters has put it, and engage instead in "public work that taps and engages and develops the civic agency, talents, and capacities of everyone, inside and outside the academy." Our strategic activities in these areas already range from cross-disciplinary initiatives rooted in community, to partnerships with diverse "communities of experts," to co-created spaces in the city and region. Throughout, we seek to pool the expertise and energies of our faculty, staff, and students with those of partners from across the public, private, and nonprofit sectors.







16 RBHS Site Wide Campus Network Protectors Replacement

The scope of this program intends to replace the Low Voltage Network Protectors in four existing transformer vaults (Administration Complex, Dental School, Library, and Power Plant) at the RBHS Campus. Each vault consists of double ended switchgears in a ring bus configuration.

The switchgear feeders are energized with incoming 26.4 kV power flow from the main switchgear. Each substation is connected to a network of 2000 kVA transformers stepped down to 480/277V. The transformer outputs feed the building MCCs and distribution panels.

The functionally of Low Voltage Networks are to prevent power from 'back-feeding' from one transformer to another. The Network Protectors are designed to open (that is, break the circuit) quickly when they detect back-feeding and initiate automatic recluses system to normal.

Founded in 1766, Rutgers' history is the nation's history, a story that begins before the American Revolution and emerges in today's fast-paced universe of the digital age. Rutgers has grown from a private colonial college with a small cadre of students to one of the largest, most diverse universities in America educating more than 65,000 students in a vast array of fields of endeavors. We mark our historic 250-year anniversary with a yearlong commemoration of events beginning on Charter Day, November 10, 2015.

Fast Facts on Our History

- On November 10, 1766, William Franklin, the Royal Governor of New Jersey, grants a charter for Queen's College for the purpose of educating young men for the ministry in the Dutch Reformed Church. The new college, the eighth of nine colonial colleges, is named in honor of Charlotte of Mecklenburg, queen consort of King George III of England.
- With 20 students enrolled, Queen's College holds its first commencement in October 1774 and confers the first and only degree that day to Matthew Leydt. Since then, Rutgers has awarded more than 500,000 degrees.
- in 1825, the college's trustees rename the school in honor of fellow trustee Colonel Henry Rutgers, a Revolutionary War veteran and devoted member of the Dutch Reformed Church. He later donates to the college the interest from a \$5,000 bond and a bell that still hangs in the cupola of the Old Queens building.
- In 1864, Rutgers prevails over Princeton University to become New Jersey's landgrant institution, tasked with offering educational access to a wider range of students who would be the new workforce for America's expanding businesses, factories, and farms. That year the Dutch Reformed Church also severs its last ties with Rutgers. Both events pave the way for Rutgers' eventual role as the state university.

- Rutgers is the birthplace of college football. On November 6, 1869, Rutgers played Princeton in the first intercollegiate football game. Rutgers won, 6 to 4.
- ☼ In 1945 and 1956, state legislative acts designate Rutgers as The State University of New Jersey.
- (b) In 1946, the University of Newark becomes part of Rutgers, giving rise to Rutgers University–Newark. Four years later, Rutgers welcomes the College of South Jersey into the university and Rutgers University–Camden is born.
- Rutgers is the only university in the United States that is a colonial college, a land-grant institution, and a public research university.
- In 1989, Rutgers University–New Brunswick is invited to become a member of the Association of American Universities, a highly selective organization comprising the 62 top research universities in North America. Rutgers is the only public university in New Jersey represented in the association.
- Rutgers welcomes most units of the former University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey into the Rutgers community in July 2013. This merger—the largest in the history of U.S. higher education—creates a new health and patient care division, transforming Rutgers into a truly comprehensive public research university.

- The Big Ten Conference accepts Rutgers University–New Brunswick as one of its newest members, effective July 2014. The storied conference, comprising leading research-intensive flagship universities such as Ohio State, the University of Michigan, and the University of Wisconsin, is noted for its deep commitment to balancing excellence in academics and athletics. Coupled with the Big Ten move, Rutgers University–New Brunswick is invited to join the Committee on Institutional Cooperation, the nation's premier consortium of top-tier research institutions.
- At 250 years old, Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey, stands as a public research university with three higher education institutions— Rutgers University-New Brunswick, Rutgers University-Newark, and Rutgers University-Camden—and an academic health care division, Rutgers Biomedical and Health Sciences, which collaborates universitywide and is aligned with Rutgers University-New Brunswick. Rutgers educates more than 65,000 students at 31 schools, logs over 1.7 million patient visits annually, has more than 22,000 faculty and staff, and boasts more than 460,000 living alumni worldwide.

Never Forget

Fulfilling a goal of the 9/11 Commission and creating an unparalleled resource for generations to come, Rutgers Law School published "A New Type of War," an online monograph of logs, audiotapes, transcripts, and radar data of the doomed flights of 9/11. The website logged 7 million visitors from 173 countries when it went live in September 2011.

Known as the "Rutgers Group," artists and professors Allan Kaprow, Roy Lichtenstein, George Segal (also a Rutgers alumnus), and Robert Watts pioneered the **Happenings**, **Pop Art**, **and Fluxus** movements of the 1950s and '60s that would change the avant-garde art scene forever. The world's first Happening—an immersive art performance with audience participation—took place at Rutgers in 1958. At the 1993 United Nations World Conference on Human Rights in Vienna, her work led to UN recognition of violations of women; the formulation went viral at 1995's 4th World Conference on Women in Beijing, bringing the needs of marginalized women to the forefront.

College football was born at Rutgers in 1869, as Rutgers defeated Princeton, 6–4, in the first college football game. From that modest start, college football has grown to be the third most popular sport in the U.S., behind professional football and major league baseball.



Six Rutgers alumni have had the honor of serving as governor of New Jersey, shaping everything from public education to the state highway system to environmental protection. William A. Newell was the first to hold the office, followed by George Ludlow, Foster Voorhees, Richard Hughes, William Cahill, and James Florio.

Rutgers was at the forefront of the burgeoning internet phenomenon. In 1985, **rutgers.edu** was registered as the world's 8th domain name.

And the World Changed

Plastic Fantastic ■ In 1987, Rutgers patented a plastic resin recovery process that made raw material out of recycled plastics, launching a new industry: items made from recycled goods. Just five years later, the nation went from recycling zero pounds of plastic to recycling over 500 million pounds a year.

Brown v. Board of Education ■ The first African-American student admitted to Rutgers' New Jersey College for Women, now Douglass Residential College, Julia Baxter Bates was the NAACP's lead researcher for two decades. Her work directly influenced the U.S. Supreme Court's 1954 *Brown v. Board of Education* ruling, which declared school segregation unconstitutional.



Earth's Final Frontier In 2009, Rutgers marine scientists achieved the world's first transatlantic crossing of an undersea robotic glider, proving that sensor-laden robots were the future of understanding the planet's greatest resource, the world ocean. Rutgers gliders monitored the Gulf of Mexico during the Deepwater Horizon oil spill and monitored the New Jersey shore during hurricanes Irene and Sandy. Above, glider home base—the Center for Ocean Observing Leadership.

"Father of U.S. Coast Guard" ■ The federal Life-Saving Service, forerunner of the U.S. Coast Guard, began in 1848 with passage of a bill sponsored by Rutgers alumnus and U.S. Congressman William A. Newell. Newell would later serve as New Jersey's 18th governor.

Autism Comes Out of the Cold When Rutgers opened the Douglass Developmental Disabilities Center in 1972, it was the first university-based school of its kind in the nation. Focused on treating children through behavioral interventions, DDDC set the stage for New Jersey's national leadership in autism-spectrum education and treatment and helped debunk the popular "refrigerator theory" that blamed autism on "cold" mothers.

This Land Was Made for You and Me ■ Professor and alumnus Ralph E. Good's research led to the designation in 1978 of the New Jersey Pinelands as America's first National Reserve. Today, the reserve—the largest body of open space between Richmond, Virginia, and Boston—is a protected UNESCO Biosphere.

Plants for a Cleaner Planet ■ When plant biologist Ilya Raskin was asked in 1989 to join the International Atomic Energy Agency Task Force assessing the Chernobyl nuclear disaster, he recommended using toxin-eating plants to aid the cleanup, pioneering the science of "phytoremediation." The technique is used in America's brownfields—contaminated, abandoned industrial sites—and in the area of Fukushima, Japan's tsunami-ravaged nuclear power plant.



Pathologist Oscar Auerbach's research was key evidence in the 1964 Surgeon General's Report linking smoking and lung cancer. The report heralded sweeping changes in laws regulating cigarette advertising and distribution and spawned intensive research into treatment for cancer and other lung diseases.

"The Map That Made New York"

Alumnus Simeon De Witt was one of three cartographers who in 1811 designed the street grid for New York City, literally laying the groundwork for the rise of the world's greatest metropolis. Thirty years earlier, De Witt was the Revolutionary War surveyor whose maps guided George Washington's Continental troops.

"Antibiotics"

— The "Rutgers antibiotics" of the 1940s were a sensational breakthrough in infectious disease treatment. The term "antibiotics" was defined by professor, alumnus, and Nobel Prize-winning microbiologist Selman Waksman, who, with his graduate students, discovered antibiotics in soil microbes. Waksman and graduate student Albert Schatz discovered streptomycin, the

first antibiotic to treat tuberculosis. Streptomycin saved many lives.





Globalization

The Rutgers Centers for Global Advancement and International Affairs were recognized with the 2014 Senator Paul Simon Award for Comprehensive Internationalization from NAFSA: Association of International Educators. The award is given to universities that demonstrate outstanding internationalization efforts.

Rutgers has more than 300 formal partnerships with institutions around the world. More than 1,100 international scholars come to Rutgers each year, and faculty and staff make more than 800 trips to more than 100 countries annually for scholarly purposes.



For three consecutive years, Rutgers has been selected to host the Mandela Washington Fellowship program, the flagship program of President Obama's Young African Leaders Initiative. Participants are up-and-coming sub-Saharan African leaders who develop professional skills that can spur growth, strengthen democratic governance, and enhance peace and security across Africa.

At Home in the **World**

RUTGERS PEOPLE AND PROGRAMS MAKE A DIFFERENCE WORLDWIDE.

Africa The School of Business–Camden "adopted" the Kalksteenfontein K–7 primary school in South Africa—visiting annually and donating school supplies, musical instruments, sports equipment, clothing, and books for a school library—after professor Julie Ruth read that children do not attend school because a \$15 fee is unaffordable.

Antarctica Rutgers scientists are studying the fastest winter-warming place on earth: the West Antarctic Peninsula. As a member of the Long-Term Ecological Research project at Antarctica's Palmer Station, Rutgers marine biologist Oscar Schofield looks at how the decline of winter sea ice and rise of ice temperatures affect vulnerable wildlife populations, particularly the Adélie penguin, and what these developments tell us about climate change.



Asia Associate professor of childhood studies Sarada Balagopalan's ethnography on street children and child laborers in Kolkata, India, discusses the struggles of impoverished children to transition from labor to school. Her broader research focus includes her participation in educational interventions directed at making compulsory schooling meaningful for these children.

Europe The Rutgers University Archaeological Field School in Italy is excavating a Roman villa site in the village of Vacone. Material from the site (ca. 100 BC to AD 200) supports the Upper Sabina Tiberina Project whose goal is to study ancient patterns of habitation and agriculture in this region.

North America Professor of arts, culture, and media Tim Raphael's "Newest Americans: Stories from the Global City" documents the lives of immigrants in New Jersey, focusing on Rutgers students. The project has gleaned national praise; its first film, *Notes for My Homeland*, a wrenching film about Syrian-American musicians, is featured on National Geographic's Proof website.

South America As a Fulbright scholar in Brazil, nutrition scientist Daniel Hoffman gives seminars and develops research projects that promote an interdisciplinary approach to global health research and education. For two decades, Hoffman has studied firsthand how malnutrition affects the poorest children of São Paulo, Brazil, the largest city south of the equator.


Giving to Rutgers
