Preface

Your Salem Community College (SCC) remains the affordable, quality, empowering and personalized educational opportunity. Though COVID-19 has greatly altered our lives, SCC has enhanced its vital role to our community. Virtual learning became the norm throughout the 2020-2021 academic year with some exceptions. Glass Education remained active with in-person teaching as well as Nursing, some lab courses, and interspersed Art offerings. Instructionally, we modified our delivery within CDC safety protocols and followed a series of rules that were definitely beyond our normal comfort zone. However, we made it through the year with no on-campus infections. We know how to deal with a pandemic.

Our value to the community is evident. Salem Community College tuition costs are about a third of those found at our four-year state colleges and truly a fraction of the private colleges in the region. With student debt becoming an increasing concern on the national level, the community college, and Salem in particular, become even more valuable. Your Salem Community College has a unified pricing model where fees are only affixed to courses where extraordinary materials are needed, such as labs, art, nursing, and glass. Our tuition investment may look a bit higher than our competitors, until you integrate all the fees that are part of other schools' tuition framework. SCC is a solid investment in your future.

SCC is the educational epicenter of Salem County. We partner with local high schools and area businesses through strong alliances which include Salem Medical Center, PSEG Nuclear, Atlantic City Electric, and Chemours, and a host of small businesses. Building a labor force for these enterprises requires both on-campus and off, virtual and in-person, instruction delivered through a comprehensive schema of coursework, intern/apprentice opportunities, and, most significantly, personalized attention. Salem Community College is the place where everyone knows your name. Our small size and personalized attention allow us to have personal contact with students as we build long lasting and productive relationships. This is evident when you see our outstanding retention and graduation rates (routinely among the best in New Jersey).

Our College Acceleration Program (CAP), often referred to as Dual Credit or Dual Enrollment, continues to grow. Last spring, we graduated seven students who received their Associate's degree before they were issued their high school diploma. Through a combination of CAP approved courses, and additional classes either on-campus, online, or after hours at remote locations, these students, accrued the necessary credits to complete their SCC program and enter the world of higher education with opportunities and experiences placing them ahead of their peers.

Our Scientific Glass Technology and Nursing programs remain mainstays of the student body. However, there has been an increasing interest in Liberal Arts and Business over the last few years. Sports Management, Supply Chain Management, STEM (Science Technology Engineering and Math) as well as Agricultural Sciences have grown as well. This is a great time to be part of your Salem Community College.

Enrollment By Attendance Status, Fall 2020



Non-Credit Clock Hours, FY 2020



Enrollment for academic year 2020 totaled 1,732 students and 26,801 credit hours for a full-time equivalency of 893 students.



- C. Characteristics of undergraduate students
- 1. Enrollment in remediation courses by subject area

In fall 2020, 6.2 percent of students enrolled in one or more remedial courses. Of the new first-time, full-time students, 14 percent enrolled in at least one remediation course in their first semester. Forty-four percent of the students in remedial courses were first-time, full-time students.

b. By gender

Total Enrollment by Attendance Status and Gender, Fall 2020



c. By age

Over two-thirds (67.2 percent) of SCC's student body is traditional college age (under 25 years of age). The proportion of traditional age students is higher among full-time students (76.6 percent) versus part-time students (52.4 percent). The average age of the SCC student is 24. Female students are, on average, older than male students (25 versus 22 years of age); part-time students are, on average, older than full-time students (27 versus 22 years of age).

3. Numbers of students receiving financial assistance

Financial aid awards totaled \$3.5 million in academic year 2019-20, consisting of 75.0 percent federal aid programs, 14.3 percent state aid programs, and 10.7 percent Foundation and institutional aid programs. Fifty-two percent of first-time, full-time students received federal, state, or institutional financial aid for an average aid award (not including loans) of \$4,923. Fifty-six percent of first-time, full-time students received federal, state, or institutional financial aid for an average award (not including loans) of \$5,680.



First-Time, Undergraduates By State Residence, Fall 2020



D. Student Outcomes

1. Graduation rates

Graduation rates of first-time, full-time degree seeking students reflect the percentage of students that graduate, by completing a degree or certificate, within a specified time frame of first enrolling at SCC. Of the 170 students in the fall 2017 cohort, 30.6 percent graduated in two years. An additional 12.9 percent graduated the third year, for a total three-year graduation rate of 43.5% percent.

Fall-to-Fall Retention Rates of First-Time Students by Attendance Status, 2015-2020



Degrees and Certificates Conferred by Race/Ethnicity, AY 2020



Completions by Award Type, AY 2020



Degrees and Certificates Conferred by Gender, AY 2020





3. Faculty and staff recognitions and awards

The 2020-21 recipients of the Academic Excellence Award were **Renee Gieswein** and **Ann Marie Bell.**

The 2020-21 recipient of the Arlene Kelley Service to Students Award was Sonia Bermudez.

Assistant Professor **Jenna Lucente** served as a consultant and visiting artist to Kansas State University, where she spoke to students in the College of Architecture, Planning, and Design about the public artwork proposal process.



Additionally, Lucente instructs monthly figure drawing sessions at the Delaware Contempory in Wilmington, DE.

Maura Cavanagh Dick and Dana Collins-Moore were featured in the New Jersey Council of County Colleges' Women of Achievement video series in March.

Under the guidance of **Rosanne Danner**, a team of four teenagers from area high schools participated in the Conrad Challenge Summit and captured the Power Pitch Award for their division. The team is part of It's a Girl's World Inc, which is a program out of Salem Community College that promotes STEM education for women. Their winning invention was The Valkyrie, a small robot designed to autonomously maneuver down the center aisle of an aircraft and disinfect the cabin.

4. Collaborations with area schools

Salem Community College received the Office of the Secretary of Higher Education Year 4 NJ GEAR UP/College Bound grant, which enabled the college to collaborate with the Penns Grove-Carneys Point Regional School District. The grant enabled the college to provide services to 119 students in grades 7-12. Student participants typically have access to a full tutoring program during the academic year, along with a Summer Enrichment Program for students; college tours; cultural events; instruction for study skills, reading, and math; mentoring; and parent workshops. Because of the COVID-19 and subsequent quarantine mandates, many of the services were adapted for virtual delivery and access. The most recent summer program was held in a hybrid modality in partnership with the Early College Program via the Carver Foundation, which also serves students from the Penns Grove-Carneys Point Regional School District.

As a recipient of the College Readiness Now VII Grant (CRN VII), Salem Community College partnered with Penns Grove-Carneys Point Regional School District and Salem County Vocational Technical School District to provide Accelerated Learning Programs to local students. Students enrolled in ENG101, as well as a companion support course during the spring 2021 semester. Students who successfully completed the course were able to earn college level credits while still in high school.

Noah McFadden and Bill Clark collaborated with the Salem County Department of Education to produce a videotaped academic recognition program for select 8th and 12th graders in May. Due to the pandemic, the video (which resides on the SCC YouTube channel) replaced the traditional in-person recognition breakfast.

5. Public service activities

a. Community service and outreach events

The SCC Nursing Department partnered with the Salem County Health and Human Services Department to offer COVID-19 vaccination clinics in the DuPont Field House throughout the winter and spring.

Additionally, the College hosted the Delaware River and Bay Authority's physical fitness exams, the American Red Cross blood drive with Penns Grove Rotary in December, and



Salem County Office on Aging drive-through meal pick-ups periodically throughout the year.

SCC continues to serve as the permanent home of the award-winning Team 316 (The Lunatecs) of South Jersey Robotics, affiliated with FIRST Robotics. The College also hosted a two-week STEM summer camp for middle school and high school girls, in partnership with Girls World Inc. and South Jersey Robotics.

Dr. Mike Gorman, **Kevin Catalfamo**, **Ken Robell**, **Dana Collins-Moore**, and **Larry McKee** presented virtual workshops in the Salem County Chamber of Commerce's Lessons in Leadership series.

Bill Clark chaired the Salem County Chamber of Commerce's Business Education Committee and served as vice chair of Deepwater Industries Federal Credit Union Board of Directors.

Associate Professor **Karen Mattison** served on the New Jersey Collegiate Business Administration Association (NJCBAA) leadership cabinet as the Member-at-Large for Two-Year Colleges. The NJCBAA supports and celebrates students and faculty from New Jersey in the business fields by providing professional development, facilitating the NJCBAA Honor Society, and rewarding exceptional business teaching and research.

Additionally, Mattison contributed to the community as an active member of the Gloucester County Chapter of AmeriCorps and Serv-A-Tray, which provides meals to homebound seniors and residents.

Associate Professor **Jennifer Martin** continued to serve on the board of the Literacy Volunteers of Salem and Cumberland Counties, which as part of the Gateway Community Action Partnership in Bridgeton, NJ provides free tutoring for adults in Cumberland and Salem counties who need help with reading, writing, or speaking English. Martin has expanded her role with the organization by participating in ESL tutor training with the intent to serve as literacy tutor.

Since 2017, Chuck Erhardt (Coordinator of Student Outreach and Communication), Laura Green (Advisor), Jill James (Registrar/Coordinator of Academic Programs), and Alicia Smith (Office Personnel, Enrollment Management) have volunteered with Meals on Wheels (MOW) of Salem County on behalf of Salem Community College. Once a month, the foursome delivers meals with a smile to residents in Pennsville. For many homebound residents, MOW team members are the only people they see on a particular day.

b. Cultural events

Author Visits

In celebration of Black History Month 2021, the SCC Library welcomed a virtual visit from author and Stranger Comics Co-Founder and President, Sebastian Jones on February 24, 2021. One of their best-known titles, "Niobe: She is Life", was the first ever nationally distributed comic to feature a black female hero, and to also have been co-written and drawn by black females (Amandla Stenberg and Ashley A. Woods respectively).

In a typical year, the Salem Community College Michael S. Cettei Memorial Library displays rotating student art exhibits, as well as faculty or guest art. However, the COVID-19 pandemic required staff and students to utilize virtual spaces, such as social media and blogs, for artistic expression.

I. Major capital projects underway in fiscal year 2021

In the COVID-19 dominated year of FY 2021 there were no significant capital projects. In FY 2022, Salem Community College is resuming its evaluation, design, and planning for replacement of the primary HVAC system for Davidow Hall, which houses the Sol & Jean Davidow Performing Arts Theatre and the DuPont Field House. This project, presently estimated in the \$1.1 million range, is anticipated to begin in FY2022 and is being funded via NJ Chapter 12 bond program. Lesser projects outside of the referenced Davidow Hall HVAC project are not expected to exceed \$50,000 for any individual project or \$250,000 cumulatively.



1. By fall credit hour totals





Fall Student Enrollment Status


