Preface

Hudson County Community College (HCCC) is a vibrant, comprehensive, urban college providing high-quality programs and services that promote student success and upward social and economic mobility. It is the largest institution of higher education in Hudson County, serving one of the most historic, densely populated, and ethnically diverse areas of the United States. Courses are available at three state-of-the-art campuses - the Journal Square Campus in Jersey City, North Hudson Campus in Union City, and the Secaucus Center in Secaucus, all easily accessible by public transportation - in addition to a diverse and growing array of fully online programs.

In 1974, the New Jersey Board of Higher Education established a community college commission in Hudson County. HCCC began as a "contract college." In the mid-1990s, HCCC formulated and began implementing strategic plans for its academic and physical growth focused on community needs. The administration and Board of Trustees worked to ensure that all of the people of Hudson County had access to a high-quality, affordable education that provided the knowledge and skills needed in today's complex, global society. The goals of that plan were accomplished, the College achieved growing stability in enrollment, resources, and operations over time.

Going forward, the "Building the Future," "Building on Success," and "An Institution of First Choice" strategic plans were successfully implemented. These plans brought the College remarkable growth, including increased enrollment and graduation rates and physical expansion.

HCCC is close to completion of its most recent the strategi plan, entitled "Hudson is Home!" The "Hudson is Home!" Strategic Plan is focused on two overarching College priorities: Student Success and Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion. As the College looks towards its next Strategic Plan, these priorities will pervade HCCC's Academic Master Plan, Student Success Action Plan, DEI Action Plan, Board of Trustee Goals, and Presidential Goals.

HCCC has designed and implemented innovative and award-winning programs addressing the barriers that prevent students from completing their degrees. Our *Hudson Scholars* program, winner of the prestigious 2023 National Bellwether Award for Instructional Programs and Services, combines proactive academic advisement, financial stipends, high impact educational experiences, and early academic intervention to drive student success.

Hudson Scholars has increased student success across the board and has been especially impactful for students from traditionally underrepresented groups including Hispanic and African American students. Hispanic and Latino participants in the program are 52% more likely to persist and 363% more likely to graduate in two years in comparison to students who are not in the program. In Fall 2023 the program introduced an innovative faculty mentoring component to assist students in completing their degrees and help prepare them for further study or the workforce. Hudson Scholars now serves nearly 2,000 students, and the College is expanding this best-practice model to all credential-seeking students.

HCCC has experienced unprecedented growth in its course offerings, created the nationally distinctive "Hudson Helps Resource Center" with wraparound services to support students, joined the *Achieving the Dream* network of high-performing community colleges committed to the use of data and best practices to inform student success, and created the President's Advisory Council on Diversity, Equity and Inclusion and a Vice President for DEI, reporting to the President, to lead and support diversity, equity and inclusion in all forms. These efforts have galvanized the HCCC and external communities and have brought HCCC growing regional, state-wide, and national recognition and commendation.

This work is integrated into a foundation of college-wide initiatives such as a comprehensive and centralized academic and student success counseling program, expanded and enhanced student activities and cultural programs including an art gallery and year-round cultural programs open to the community, and the continued development and expansion of state-of-the-art facilities.

In alignment with HCCC's commitment to removing barriers, supporting the needs of all learners, and promoting equitable outcomes for all students, the College has invested significant funding, including state and federal stimulus dollars, into enhanced classroom technology. New and improved college-wide technology includes comprehensive, immersive telepresence video systems, microphones, document cameras, special whiteboards, and virtual desktop infrastructure with the goal of facilitating a high-quality, robust educational experience for all students.

In addition to day and evening classes, the College now provides on-campus studies seven days a week and a growing and comprehensive array of virtual and online courses, programs, and services 24/7.

2 ACCREDITATION STATUS

2.1 Institutional Accreditation

Hudson County Community College is an Accredited institution and a member of the Middle States Commission on Higher Education (MSCHE) www.msche.org. Hudson County Community College's accreditation status is Accreditation Reaffirmed. The Commission's most recent action on the institution's accreditation status on June 27, 2019 was to reaffirm accreditation.

MSCHE is an institutional accrediting agency recognized by the U.S. Secretary of Education and the Council for Higher Education accreditation (CHEA).

2.2 Professional Accreditation

The AAS degrees in Culinary Arts and Culinary Arts-Option in Baking and Pastry and the Certificates in Culinary Arts and Culinary Arts-Baking and Pastry are accredited by the Accrediting Commission of the American Culinary Federation Education Foundation.

The Medical Assisting program is accredited by the Commission on Accreditation of Allied Health Education Program upon the recommendation of the Medical Assisting Education Review Board (MAERB) on Accreditation.

The Nursing (NSG) Program currently offered at the Journal Square Campus is approved by the New Jersey Board of Nursing and accredited by the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN).

The Practical Nursing (PNU) Program offered at the Journal Square Campus is sanctioned by the New Jersey Board of Nursing.

The Paramedic Science (EMT) Program is offered in conjunction with Robert Wood Johnson//Barnabas Health at the Jersey City Medical Center. It is accredited by the Commission on Accreditation of Allied Health Education Programs upon the recommendation of the Committee on Accreditation of Educational Programs for the Emergency Medical Services Professions (CoAEMSP).

The Radiography Program is accredited by the Joint Review Committee on Education in Radiologic Technology (JRCERT) and approved by the New Jersey Radiologic Technology Board of Examiners.

- Lori Margolin, Associate Vice President of Continuing Education and Workforce Development, and her Gateway to Innovation Team, and Natalia Vazquez-Bodkin, Associate Director of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI), received awards from the National Alliance for Partnerships in Equity (NAPE)
- HCCC was designated a Leader College by Achieving the Dream (ATD), the national nonprofit
 organization dedicated to advancing community colleges as catalysts for equity and mobility in
 their communities. HCCC is one of only 16 Leader Colleges in the 300-college ATD network.
- The College's "Hudson Scholars" program was recognized with the 2023 National Bellwether Award. The honor was presented at the 2023 Bellwether College Consortium "Community College Futures Assembly" in San Antonio, Texas. The award recognizes cutting-edge, trendsetting programs that address critical issues facing community colleges through applicable research and the promotion and replication of best practices in Instructional Programs and

- Services, Workforce Development, and Planning, Governance and Finance. The Bellwether Award has been compared to football's Heisman Trophy because it is competitively judged and awarded by respected peers in leadership positions.
- Six HCCC students were named semi-finalists for the 2023 Jack Kent Cooke Undergraduate Transfer Scholarship

9 RESEARCH AND PUBLIC SERVICE ACTIVITIES

9.1 GRANTS AND RESEARCH

- HCCC is in the second year three-year National Science Foundation (NSF) "New to Advanced Technological Education" grant that will enhance eareas of study at the College. The nearly \$300,000 grant will support career opportunities for community members leading to a better educated and more skilled workforce for area businesses.
- The College continues to implement a five-year, \$3 million Title V Grant project, entitled *La Puerta Dorada/The Golden Door*. This project will support the ever-increasing excellence of the ESL program and opportunities for the growth and support of students, faculty, and staff.
- HCCC received a \$100,000 Provident Bank Foundation's (PBF) Signature Grant to support the Hudson Scholars initiative.
- HCCC was awarded a \$2.2 Million federal grant for the "Technology Advance Project," which will provide technology enhancements in the College's new Academic Tower.
- The College continues its participation in the Metallica Scholars Initiative. HCCC received \$100,000 in 2022 and \$50,000 in 2023 to provide a pathway to welding careers for 21 previously incarcerated individuals. The life-changing HCCC program is offered in partnership with the New Jersey Reentry Corporation and the Governor's Reentry Training and Employment Center in Kearny.
- The Food Fuels Minds project is a collaboration of the HCCC "Hudson Helps Resource Center,"
 faculty and students from the College's Art Department, and Rutgers University. The innovative
 project is focused on addressing food insecurity and stimulating interest in New Jersey's
 Supplemental Nutritional Assistance Program (SNAP). The project is funded by a grant from
 Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and designed to engage the College community in sharing
 their food insecurity experiences.
- Dr. Clive Li, Assistant Professor of Engineering Science, was conferred with the American Association of Community Colleges' (AACC) 2023 Dale P. Parnell Distinguished Faculty Recognition medal. The honor recognizes faculty who demonstrate passion for and support of students in and out of the classroom.

9.2 New and Ongoing Institutional and Community Partnerships

• HCCC has begun its participation in *FamilyU*, a program of the national nonprofit student parent support organization, Generation Hope. Our work over the next two years will focus on the use of data, best practices, and professional development to enhance the retention and completion of HCCC's many student parents.

- The HCCC Center for Adult Transition is funded by the State of New Jersey to support the transition of individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities up to the age of 24.
- The HCCC Latino Advisory Council and African American Outreach Committee continued their work during the past year. The Latino Advisory Council offered its second annual "Hudson es Casa," a Latino Education and Community Fair at the North Hudson Campus in October.
- Hudson County Community College (HCCC) and New Jersey City University (NJCU) have collaborated to design HCCC NJCU CONNECT, a transformational program that will provide highly visible, inclusive, and barrier-free transfer pathways to guide students and their families from high school, through studies at HCCC, and on to graduation from NJCU. The program will launch in January 2024.
- HCCC hosted the 2023 Northeast and Mid-Atlantic Creative Placemaking Leadership Summit
- HCCC hosted a Summer Training Institute for court-involved young adults at the College's
 Culinary Conference Center. This innovative program provided 175 court-involved young adults,
 ages 18-25, with comprehensive job training and industry-recognized credentials that will ready
 them for a variety of in-demand and family-sustaining careers).
- Hudson County Community College (HCCC) President, Dr. Christopher Reber, and New Jersey
 Reentry Corporation (NJRC) Founder and Chairman, former New Jersey Governor James
 McGreevey, announced the establishment of a Phlebotomy Technician Certification program
 leading to an industry recognized credential from the National Health Career Association (NHA).
 The program is designed solely for court-involved individuals.
- HCCC hosted its second annual *Teaching and Learning Symposium on Social Justice in Higher Education*.
- Reverend Al Sharpton delivered the Keynote Address at HCCC's 2023 Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Summer Retreat
- HCCC welcomed Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities (HACU) President Dr. Antonio
 Flores and other HACU leaders and members, higher education representatives, state
 legislators, corporate and community leaders, and many invited participants for "HACU on the
 Road" in May 2023.
- The College was the first institution of higher education in New Jersey selected to participate in the health care segment of the Pay It Forward Program. The program provides zero-interest, nofee loans, non-repayable living stipends, access to emergency aid funds, and supportive services like mental health counseling for students. The HCCC Associate of Science (A.S.) in Nursing program was chosen for its proven, high-quality training, and track record of strong employment outcomes, employer relationships, and experience serving diverse learners. The Pay It Forward Program closely aligns with HCCC's overarching principles of dedication to diversity, equity and inclusion, and student success.
- HCCC was selected by The Tepper Foundation to participate in their "Building Community to
 Expand Opportunity Initiative," a two-year project offered in partnership with the NJ Council of
 County Colleges (NJCCC). The project is focused on expanding capacity to meet students' basic
 needs by strengthening a culture of care. This initiative will support the efforts of grantees "to
 ensure students get on, stay on, and complete post-secondary degrees and credentials leading
 to jobs and careers that promote upward economic mobility."
