

Enrollment By Attendance Status, Fall 2022



Non-Credit Clock Hours, FY 2022



Enrollment for academic year 2022 totaled 2,096 students and 28,528 credit hours for a full-time equivalency of 951 students.



- 1. Enrollment in remediation courses by subject area

In fall 2022, 6.8% of students enrolled in one or more remedial courses. Of the new first-time, full-time students, 14.8% enrolled in at least one remediation course in their first semester. 46% of the students in remedial courses were first-time, full-time students.

Undergraduate Enrollment by Race/Ethnicity by Attendance Status, Fall 2022



b. By gender

Total Enrollment by Attendance Status and Gender, Fall 2022



c. By age

Over two-thirds (68.7%) of SCC's student body is traditional college age (under 25 years of age). The proportion of traditional age students is higher among full-time students (80.4%) versus part-time students (58.4%). The average age of the SCC student is 24. Female students are, on average, older than male students (25 versus 22 years of age); part-time students are, on average, older than full-time students (26 versus 22 years of age).

Enrollment by Age and Attendance Status, Fall 2022



3. Numbers of students receiving financial assistance

Financial aid awards totaled \$3.6 million in academic year 2021-22, consisting of 79.6% federal aid programs, 13.3% state aid programs, and 7.1% Foundation and institutional aid programs. Fifty-seven percent of first-time, full-time students received federal, state, or institutional financial aid for an average aid award (not including loans) of \$4,654. Fifty-four percent of first-time, full-time students received federal, state, or institutional financial aid for an average award (not including loans) of \$6,109.

First-Time, Undergraduates By State Residence, Fall 2022



D. Student Outcomes

1. Graduation rates

Graduation rates of first-time, full-time degree seeking students reflect the percentage of students that graduate, by completing a degree or certificate, within a specified time frame of first enrolling at SCC. Of the 221 students in the fall 2019 cohort, 28.5% graduated in two years. An additional 5.9% graduated the third year, for a total three-year graduation rate of 40.3%.

Fall-to-Fall Retention Rates of First-Time Students by Attendance Status, 2018-2022



Degrees and Certificates Conferred by Race/Ethnicity, AY 2022





Degrees and Certificates Conferred by Gender, AY 2022





4. Collaborations with area schools

Salem Community College supports the ongoing function and events of the Math Science Bridge Committee of Salem County. The Committee supports the K-12 Math and Science departments in the County and holds events (Science Fair, KIC, Ag Day, etc.) at the College and other County sites. Associate Dean Maura Cavanagh Dick is a member of the Math Science Bridge Committee of Salem County.

- 5. Public service activities
 - a. Community service and outreach events

Associate Dean **Maura Cavanagh-Dick** served as co-lead for two New Jersey Health Initiative (NJHI), Small and Mighty Communities grants for Salem and Penns Grove cities (total grant award \$100,000), along with Cristina Chlliem (InterAgency Council of Salem County) and Monica Lallo (Acenda Health). The overall grant focused on supporting the work of building community partners working toward a common goal of alleviating health disparities, specifically food insecurity.

Additionally, the Salem and Penns Grove Collaboratives partnered with A.T. Buzby Farms to support the development of its Farm-to-Customer Program (CSA boxes). Developments of the Farm-to-Customer Program include:

(1) An increase of the staple and fresh food offerings available to customers in the Program and



(2) The addition of delivery service that increases access of Program goods to residents in the underserved and designated food-desert municipalities of Salem and Penns Grove cities.

Salem Community College was awarded \$2000 through the PSEG Neighborhood Partner Grant. Through the grant, SCC expanded the knowledge and expertise of our faculty and staff to better serve our community populations for whom English is not their primary language. Faculty and staff gained access to an online language-learning platform (Mango Languages) and professional development training in best practices on using the online-learning platform. Through the grant, the SCC began to build capacity to offer English as a Second Language (ESL) programs by enrolling faculty in a certification course to teach English to speakers of other languages.

Associate Dean **Maura Cavanagh-Dick** and Admissions Counselor, **Rissi Stanko** participated in the annual Nuclear Science Week event held at the Energy & Environmental Resource Center (EERC) providing fun and informative activities to children and families of Salem County.

Dr. Theresa Covello, served as ACEN Peer Evaluator in the Spring of 2023.

Associate Professor **Karen Mattison** served on the New Jersey Collegiate Business Administration Association (NJCBAA) leadership cabinet as Member-at-Large for Two-Year Colleges. The NJCBAA supports and celebrates students and faculty from New Jersey in the business fields by providing professional development, facilitating the NJCBAA Honor Society, and rewarding exceptional business teaching and research opportunities to its members.

Additionally, Mattison contributed to the community as an active member of the Gloucester County Chapter of AmeriCorps Seniors.

Since 2017, Chuck Erhardt (Coordinator of Student Outreach and Communication), Laura Green (Advisor), Jill James (Registrar/Coordinator of Academic Programs), and Alicia Smith (Office Personnel, Enrollment Management) have volunteered with Meals on Wheels (MOW) of Salem County on behalf of Salem Community College. The IFC was founded by SCC Distinguished Alumnus and internationally respected artist Paul Stankard of Mantua, N.J. Stankard is now IFC chair emeritus. 

1. By fall credit hour totals





Fall Student Enrollment Status




