H. Major Research and Public Service Activities

Democracy House, The Center for Community Engagement and Civic Leadership - Democracy House is Middlesex College's award-winning Center for Community Engagement and Civic Leadership. Democracy House provides hands-on opportunities for students to integrate real life experiences and college-level learning, while simultaneously addressing community needs, through intentional community service and volunteer work. Democracy House is able to make these opportunities possible through ongoing collaboration and partnerships with local, non-profit organizations. Democracy House houses the national Bonner Leader Program, the Volunteers in Action club and for summer 2023, added a pilot Summer Service Internship program.

Bonner Leader Program - 10-15 students are accepted as Bonner Leaders annually. Bonners commit to completing 300 hours of service throughout the academic year at one of a growing list of community partner sites. Bonners also participated in an off-site Day of Service for Martin Luther King Day annually.

In 2023-2024, Bonners completed approximately 2,550 hours at the following partner sites:

- Elijah's Promise Community Soup Kitchen (New Brunswick, NJ) is one of Middlesex College and Democracy House's longest standing partnerships to date. Bonner Leaders were able to return to Elijah's Promise Soup Kitchen after they had to close their doors to all external volunteers in March of 2020 because of the pandemic. While Elijah's is still unable to accept the level of volunteers they were pre-pandemic, they were able to work with two Bonners because they could offer consistent, weekly service hours. The Bonners placed at this site work directly in the kitchen to help prepare and serve meals to kitchen guests.
- The Perth Amboy Teen Center (Perth Amboy, NJ) provides weekly programming and homework assistance for local teens (ages 13-18) during after school hours. Bonners assist with all weekly programming, including facilitating workshops and activities and assist with homework help.
- The Puerto Rican Action Board (PRAB New Brunswick, NJ) is a comprehensive human services program that offers early childhood, youth, family, and community services. Bonner Leaders serving at this site support the organization's Youth Services division via their after-school programs. Bonners work weekly with elementary and middle school aged students throughout the academic year to provide homework help and social enrichment workshops and activities.
- The Success Bound Youth Leadership Institute is a one- to two-year commitment including a mandatory 5- week summer institute that begins in July. The institute



aims to equip participants with the support they will need to be a motivated student prepared for college through learning: time management, how to work in groups, goal setting, college/FAFSA application process and career exploration. Bonners work weekly with program staff to develop workshops and training, assist with outreach, and reminders.

- Middlesex College Early Learning Center. The Early Learning Center provides daycare and preschool education for Middlesex College students and staff, and the community. Daily routines are established to provide a structured learning environment designed to enhance the children's individual strengths. Bonners work weekly with programs staff and faculty to assist with enrichment activities.
- Middlesex Community College Resource Hub & Food Pantry. Bonners work weekly with the Food Pantry staff to provide students with community resources that will improve their health, wellness, and security by assisting with inventory, registration, and connecting students to community resources.
- In 2023-2024, Bonner Leaders hosted a coat drive with donations going to *Jersey Cares*.
- In April 2024, Bonner Leaders and Democracy House partnered with the Middlesex County Center for Empowerment for a Sexual Assault Awareness Month campaign. Students hosted information tables, gathered ally pledges from students and faculty, and designed tie-dyed shirts with supportive messages for survivors.
- In addition to weekly meetings, the Bonners also participated in our annual Martin Luther King Jr. Day of Service on Monday, January 15th supporting a Homelessness and Food Insecurity initiative.

Volunteers in Action Club – The Volunteers in Action (ViA) club is open to students interested in supporting their community but who cannot commit to year-long or semester-long service. As a club, ViA identifies service opportunities that last one day or less, and open these to students to participate in as their schedules and commitments allow. Volunteers in Action club members meet monthly to discuss the issue areas they are interested in and to plan group community service events.

Summer Service Internship Program – Summer 2024 was the second year of this program. Two students successfully completed the five-week internship by supporting the Success Bound Youth Leadership Academy during its respective Summer Institute program.



The Center for the Enrichment of Learning and Teaching (CELT) provides professional development programming that focuses on enhancing learning, teaching, and scholarship. CELT serves the campus through workshops, one-on-one consultation, in depth learning experiences, and mentoring of new faculty. Teaching and learning resources are made available to the community via the public website.

The Center for Justice-Impacted Students works to advance higher educational opportunities for justice-impacted students. Across the state of New Jersey, we provide access to higher educational opportunities and high-quality college programming to currently incarcerated youth through our partnerships with the Camden and Middlesex County Juvenile Detention Centers (JDC) and with the New Jersey Juvenile Justice Commission (JJC). On campus, we act as an education and advocacy body for supporting the implementation of inclusive policies and practices that advance educational opportunities for justice-impacted students, and we serve as a resource hub and support center for justice-impacted students. Designed specifically for formerly incarcerated and justice-impacted students on our College campus, our Justice Scholars Program offers holistic support, advising, and other relevant services to help our Scholars succeed and establish a sense of community as they transition home from carceral settings.

Community Resource Hub and Food Pantry

- Through monetary donations and grant funding, we are able to provide students with grocery gift cards to aid in instances of food insecurity.
- Developed a program with our Hospitality, Culinary & Dietetics Department (HCD) which provides our students with frozen meals prepared by our HCD students.
- Students in need are able to request and receive support via the Middlesex Foundation's Student Emergency Fund which began with a one-time \$20,000 donor contribution to meet critical needs that when unmet hinder a student's ability to reach their academic potential

The *Dental Hygiene Program* participates in many community service events for a variety of organizations and age groups. In October and April, children (ages 3-5) from Acelero Head Start received free preventive dental care and exams. In February, the program provided access to dental care to children ages 3 – 13 during a Give Kids a Smile event. The treatment included restorative, extractions, and preventative care. Local dentists, hygienists, assistants, dental hygiene program faculty, staff, and students volunteered to participate. Students in their senior year of the program rotate each week to Robert Wood Johnson Barnabas Health Dental Clinic in New Brunswick, Zufall (federally qualified health care facility) in Flemington, and Kindersmile in Trenton. Beginning in 2023-2024, senior students and faculty conducted oral health screenings at the Educational Services Commission of New Jersey (ESCNJ), a school for children with developmental disabilities. After the screenings, students and one faculty member rotated to the Piscataway and Sayreville campuses to provide preventive oral health



care. Senior students along with a faculty member will volunteer at Special Olympics and assist in taking dental radiographs and patient education.

Senior students along with faculty members, conducted a dental screening on-site for preschool children at Noah's Ark (ages 3-5) in Highland Park utilizing teledentistry to capture intraoral images and create custom referrals from the dentist. Senior dental hygiene students created oral health presentations and activities for the following locations:

- Noah's Ark, Highland Park
- Turning Point Academy, Middlesex County Youth Detention Center, North Brunswick
- Middlesex County Youth Shelter, North Brunswick, NJ ARC Mercer
- Pathways to Adult Living, Sayreville
- United Way Family Partnership, Milltown and New Brunswick
- Alternative Education Institute, Perth Amboy
- Walnut Avenue School, Cranford
- Hillside Avenue School, Cranford

In addition to community outreach, the program developed a relationship with New Brunswick High School. Students attending NBHS who were enrolled in the dental assisting course visited the Middlesex College Dental Hygiene program to shadow senior dental hygiene students. They also received a lecture on the dental profession and participated in a lab.

The *Earth Science Club* actively participates in beach clean-up initiatives along the Jersey Shore during both the autumn and spring semesters. Meanwhile, the Sustainability program hosts educational events that offer practical demonstrations highlighting the importance of responsible plastic usage and recycling, both on an individual and societal scale. These efforts are aimed at benefiting the planet, and the program also extends its outreach by offering community training in hydroponics techniques.

As part of an Opportunity Meets Innovation Challenge (OMIC) grant, the *English as a Second Language (ESL) and Educational Opportunity Fund (EOF)* offices created the *ASPIRE program (Advancing Student Potential, Impact and Retention for English-learners)* for English Language Learners (ELLs) as they progressed from ESL coursework to full time in their degree programs. One component of this is a free summer program that included an ESL course, structured study time, English practice groups, breakfast, lunch, and snacks, workshops and activities centered on student success, access to college and community resources, and building a support system. Students received a weekly stipend to defray transportation costs.

The *Holocaust and Human Rights Center* strives to create a world where citizens act promptly and effectively to prevent genocide and human rights abuses. Through the lessons of history, a speaker series, pertinent trips, a student club, and a peer reviewed journal this organization



looks to bring awareness to genocidal ideology and its prevention as well as discussing pertinent human rights issues such as illegal detention, war crimes, immigration issues, refugees and displaced persons, human trafficking, climate change, education and debt, poverty, racism, and terrorism. To achieve our goal, we state the claim that understanding our common global histories, philosophies, arts, and cultures will enable us to make more informed decisions in the present: a better sense of the humanities will make better humanitarians.

The *Hospitality, Culinary Arts, and Dietetics Department* runs a course called Quantity Foods Production and Menu Design. Through this course, the department continued to donate meals prepared during the in-person foods labs to the Ozanam Family Shelter in Edison and Elijah's Promise Community Kitchen in New Brunswick. With a commercial vacuum sealer in the HCD Foods Lab and a freezer in the Middlesex College Cares Food Pantry, HCD was able to provide frozen meals to the Middlesex College Cares Food Pantry for our Middlesex College students as well! In addition, HCD provided 25 luncheon tickets to MC Cares Food Pantry participants for each luncheon prepared in the Banquet and Dining Room Management course (a capstone course). This 3-course sit down dining experience provided a unique culinary experience for our Food Pantry participants. The HCD Department and the Natural Sciences Department continued their collaboration between the foods lab and the hydroponics lab. Microgreens grown in the hydroponics lab were donated to the foods lab, where culinary students incorporated the microgreens in a variety of recipes. The microgreens were also featured in most Banquet and Dining Room Management luncheons. HCD students visited the hydroponics lab and Natural Science students attended one of the luncheons, allowing them to see the 'big picture.'

The Department of Mathematics sponsors an organization of Middlesex students titled **The Mathematics Society**. Students in the **Society** participate in rigorous problem solving, in and out of the competitive arena, avail themselves of faculty mentoring, gain access to noted mathematicians and statisticians, as well as socialize with faculty and each other.

The *Middlesex County Teen Arts Festival* is a celebration of the arts for students in Middlesex County Middle Schools and High Schools (ages 13-19), including public, private, parochial, and home schools. The festival recognizes the accomplishments of the county's teen artists by showcasing their creative efforts in the areas of Fine Arts, Creative Writing, Dance, Music, Theatre, and Voice. Students participate in Master Class Workshops and have their work adjudicated by professionals in their specific art form.

The *Natural Sciences Department* at Middlesex College offers two cutting-edge, inquiry-based science courses, namely Biology-240 and Chemistry-240. These courses are part of an ongoing commitment to foster lifelong learning and enhance the analytical and independent thinking abilities of our students.

Moreover, Middlesex College provides students with the exciting opportunity to become Undergraduate Research Fellows through our affiliation with the New Jersey Space Grant Consortium, administered by Rutgers University and funded by NASA. As Research Fellows,



students engage in a diverse array of research projects under the guidance of faculty members. These projects span various disciplines, including Big Data analysis, organic chemistry synthesis research, and exercise-related physiology research.

Our students proudly showcase their research findings at the virtual biannual Science Research Symposium, demonstrating their dedication to advancing scientific knowledge and their commitment to academic excellence.

The *Nursing Department*'s Association of Middlesex College Nursing Students (AMCNS) participated in the following community programs. In honor of Breast Cancer awareness month, AMCNS set up a table at the college's Harvest Fest celebration to educate the community about breast cancer and provide information about self-breast exams.

AMCNS also helped to increase awareness about mental illness and raised funds to support NAMI (National Alliance of Mental Illness). The director and a faculty member participated in the NAMI walk to show support for this cause.

AMCNS conducted a food drive in November. Students, faculty and staff contributed nonperishable food items for the Thanksgiving holiday. Seven large bags and boxes were collected for donation to families in Perth Amboy, which were distributed by Hackensack Meridian Raritan Bay Medical Center.

The Alpha Delta Nu honor society conducted two research projects for the College community; handwashing education to young children enrolled in the Early Learning Center on campus and Heart Health education including healthy eating, exercise, and smoking cessation

In addition, during the American Heart month of February, the nursing faculty raised awareness on heart disease, which is the leading cause of death in the US, by wearing red, educating on this disease, and encouraging students to educate someone they know about preventing cardiovascular disease. Finally, students participated in programs sponsored by the New Jersey Nurses Student Organization.

- Phi Theta Kappa International Honor Society students perform service to the College community as well as to the local community as one of the pillars of the society. In academic year 2023-2024, Kappans individually volunteered as tutors in the Tutoring Center; organized a team to participate in Breast Cancer Awareness Walk; volunteered with Mobile Family Success Center of the Catholic Charities Diocese of Metuchen to wrap gifts for their holiday party and a second time to register families and run the photobooth at the holiday party; ran donations drives for feminine and baby health products for women's shelters run by FaithLift & Hope LLC.
- For the 2023-2024 College Project, the Athletics Department approached PTK to provide one-on-one tutoring for athletes struggling in specific courses. PTK members who had



earned an A in the courses identified by the coaches were paired with athletes currently enrolled in those courses. The project had two primary goals: 1) to help student athletes achieve the academic standards set by the NCJAA for continued participation in their sports, and 2) to motivate them to persist and complete their degrees by enabling them to remain active in their sport.

The Radiography Department and the Student Association of Radiographers (SAR) — The College serves as host to a career day event called "Advancing Your RT Career" with the New Jersey Educators in Radiologic Imaging (NJERI). This event invites students from all 15 radiography programs in New Jersey. Colleges and Universities in New Jersey and across the country share advanced degree programs catered to radiography program graduates. Additionally, advanced modality programs share information about mammography, CT, radiation therapy, ultrasound and MRI programs. This year's February event hosted 14 advanced degree programs and over 160 radiography students and graduates. This event supports the colleges mission to support student success for lifelong learning. It is great benefit to our program alumni.

In April the College served as the host for a Career Fair for Radiography & Dental Hygiene students spearheaded by Charlotte Quigley, Director of Civic Engagement and Community Partnerships. Students had the opportunity to network with area medical centers, imaging centers and urgent care facilities to pursue potential employment. The college arranged for

professional headshots of students for their LinkedIn profile. Several students accepted positions as a direct result of this event.

The Student Association of Radiographers (SAR) members attended the New Jersey Society of Radiologic Technology (NJSRT) annual meeting. They participated in professional conference sessions and represented the College in the Annual Emma Wolf Memorial Student X-ray Competition. Additionally, SAR conducted a food drive in spring semester. Students, faculty and staff contributed nonperishable food items for the Middlesex College Food Pantry.

Community-Engaged Learning Program and Project Highlights:

Community-Engaged Learning (CEL) courses incorporate a project focused on a particular social issue or issues, most often in collaboration with a local non-profit community partner. Research demonstrates that students who engage in CEL feel more connected to the college community, have a better understanding of course content, and deeper insight into the social issues faced by the local community and beyond. Below are program highlights from the 2023-2024 academic year.

In the spring of 2024, the Community-Engaged Learning (CEL) program sought to expand external and interdepartmental partnerships. The Coordinator for Civic Engagement &



Experiential Learning met with the Bonner Foundation liaison and key departments within the college – namely the Admissions Department, Student life, Civic Engagement and Community Partnerships. This meeting generated new projects and excitement, leading to the expansion of campus-wide collaboration within Middlesex College.

The Veterans Services Center – Sponsored by a private source, the Middlesex College Veterans Services Center provides comprehensive services for all military-affiliated students. The Center is the nexus for all military-affiliated students regarding certification of State and VA educational benefits; academic and vocational counseling; tutoring; mentoring; VA Work Study opportunities; maintaining spaces around campus dedicated to supporting military-connected student success; and for the Student Veterans of America (SVA)-affiliated student organization. The Center has consistently ranked within the Top 20 2-year colleges in the nation for veteran support by the Military Times, designated a Military Friendly School, and among the Top Colleges and Universities for military-affiliated student support.

VITA Tax Preparation Program: Every year since 2005, the New Brunswick Center has served as a VITA site where the general public including students, staff and faculty receive free tax preparation services from IRS certified tax preparers. Middlesex College students are actively recruited to serve as volunteers.

The Student Life Office collaborates with college student clubs and community organizations to conduct in-person and virtual social and co-curricular events. The variety of event types include virtual movie screenings, lectures, cultural celebrations, orientation sessions and Middlesex Colt sporting events. Students stay engaged with the college by joining and participating in the many (30+) student clubs under the categories of academic, special interest, identity, athletic, student media and honor societies.



The Middlesex College's **Workforce Development and Lifelong Learning Department** offers a broad range of noncredit courses and certificate programs focusing on career training, apprenticeship, professional development, personal enrichment, and industry-recognized certification programs. The department offers a number of certificate programs and courses that prepare individuals for the attainment of industry valued credentials. Also, through its participation in two U.S. DOL *Scaling Apprenticeships* grant consortiums, the department is helping accelerate the expansion of apprenticeships and increase the level of apprenticeship activity among businesses within the healthcare and advanced manufacturing sectors.

The **Corporate Education and Training** office provides a wide variety of customized incumbent worker training to businesses, industries, and agencies throughout the area. In addition, the office provides grant funded training for their incumbent workforce.

In addition to the above activities, the College's Workforce Development and Lifelong Learning Department serves as a community-wide employment and training resource, providing comprehensive training services, career development and job placement assistance to qualified candidates. The department works collaboratively with the *Middlesex County Office of Career Opportunity* to enhance employment skills for dislocated workers. As a partner in the *Middlesex County Adult Education Consortium*, the Department provides *English as a Second Language* training as well as *High School Equivalency (HSE) preparation*. The *Out of School Youth Program* offers *HSE/GED preparation* for at risk, out-of-school youth and provides work readiness skills. It also prepares high school graduates and equivalency students for occupational training and successful employment.

For youth in elementary, middle, and high school, Workforce Development and Lifelong Learning provides a Youth Enrichment summer program, as well as Test Preparation and Study Skills courses during the Fall and Spring semesters. The Middlesex College on-campus **Early Learning Center** offers the community a high quality, developmentally appropriate educational program for children, ages 2-5.

Middlesex College hosts elementary and middle school students for on-campus tours, hands-on workshops to introduce them to various programs at the college such as culinary and engineering, and other activities to engage them in post-secondary education options for their futures.

Middlesex College's chapter of the Kappa Delta Pi Honor Society hosts an annual *Literacy Alive* event that brings 100 elementary-aged children and their families to campus to dive into literacy and explore the Middlesex College campus.

The High School Scholars Program allows students to take college level courses while they are still in high school. Students can take courses on-campus or online for college credit.



The Dual Enrollment and Dual Degree programs allow high school students to take college level courses for dual credit at their high school and earn credits for transfer or to work toward earning an Associate's degree at Middlesex College concurrently with high school graduation.

High School to College Transition Programs. Success Bound Summer Youth Leadership Academy is a partnership between the Cities of Perth Amboy, South Amboy, Carteret, and Middlesex College that assists rising high school juniors and seniors in developing the skills needed to become successful learners and future college students. Students participate in academic coursework and career exploration coupled with a paid internship that integrates meaningful community service. Students who reside or attend school in the City of Perth Amboy, South Amboy, or Carteret are eligible for the program. Via the yearlong **EMPOWER Program**, high school students learn of the importance of volunteer work and civic engagement and prepare early for a successful college transition. In collaboration with local high schools and Rutgers University, students are given the opportunity to attend afterschool programming at the New Brunswick Center which include college preparation sessions, peer mentoring, tutoring and paid college classes.

Advanced Placement Summer Institutes train educators to teach Advanced Placement courses in high schools. Participants come from all over the United States for an intense 4-day training provided by College Board certified training consultants.

Middlesex College New Jersey State Science Olympiad State Finals is a state-wide science competition for middle and high school students who have successfully competed in the State Regional tournaments. The College also hosts the NJ DECA Central Regional Blue and Gold Conferences for marketing students from throughout Central NJ.

Engage NJ Faculty Symposium

Middlesex College is a member of Engage NJ, with President Mark McCormick serving as a member of the Board of Director's and the Director of Civic Engagement and Community Partnerships, serving on the Strategic Planning Committee. The College hosted the Engage NJ Annual THRIVE Student Conference in 2022, 2023 and 2024 for all member colleges in New Jersey. The college also hosted Engage NJ's first Faculty Symposium in April 2024 entitled Rooted in Purpose, Branching Out in Action: Empowering Communities Through Civic Engagement Towards a More Sustainable Future welcoming faculty from member colleges and universities throughout New Jersey.

Citizen's Campaign

Middlesex College is a Civic Center within the Citizen's Campaign National Citizen Leadership Service. The Citizen's Campaign is a national network that educates Americans on their political power and engages them in No-Blame Problem Solving to foster a solution-focused political culture. This organization aims to develop a pipeline of principled leaders capable of addressing major issues like climate change and cybersecurity. Among the initiatives at Middlesex College is the free community access to the Citizen's Campaign online course The Power of Civics: Leadership and the No Blame Problem Solving toolkit.



Voter Friendly Campus

Middlesex College is one of more than 200 colleges and universities in 37 states and the District of Columbia designated as a "Voter Friendly Campus." The initiative, led by national nonpartisan organizations Fair Elections Center's Campus Vote Project (CVP) and NASPA — Student Affairs Administrators in Higher Education, held participating institutions accountable for planning and implementing practices that encourage their students to register and vote in the 2020 election and in coming years.

The mission of the Voter Friendly Campus designation is to bolster efforts that help students overcome barriers to participating in the political process. Middlesex College was evaluated based on a campus plan about how it could register, educate, and turn out student voters in 2023, how it facilitated voter engagement efforts on campus, and a final analysis of its efforts – all in the face of the upheaval caused by a global pandemic.

ALL IN Campus Democracy Challenge In April of 2022 Middlesex President Mark McCormick signed the Higher Education Presidents' Commitment to Full Student Voter Participation for the ALL IN Challenge. The All IN Campus Democracy Challenge (ALL IN) is a national awards program that recognizes colleges and universities for their commitment to increasing student voting rates. ALL IN encourages higher education institutions to help students form habits of active and informed citizenship, make democratic participation a core value on campus, and cultivate generations of engaged citizens. ALL IN participants establish and institutionalize a campus-wide voting coalition and develop and implement a campus action plan. ALL IN campuses commit to increasing student voting rates and participate in the National Study of Learning, Voting, and Engagement (NSLVE).



I. Major Capital Projects

The design was completed for fire alarm replacements. Construction of fire alarm replacements is 95% complete due to supply chain issues. **100% complete** A fire pump is included in re-design of the College Center sprinkler system. The re-design is delayed until March 2024. **Fire Pump installed, testing being conducted, and punch list items being developed.** HVAC control replacements (HVAC Phase 4) is 90% complete. The contractor is working on punch list items. **100% complete**

HVAC equipment replacements (HVAC Phase 5) is in design phase. **In Progress** The additional security systems project is delayed due to complications acquiring design services.

Design services are 80% complete for ADA restroom improvements. **Design Services 100% complete**

Construction work was completed on the renovations and ADA improvements to the North Hall building. **100% complete**

Capital funding for FY23 has been secured for the reconfiguration of Chambers Hall and roof replacements on several buildings. Capital funding was secured for both projects listed FY22
