CENTER FOR WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

Workforce Development at Atlantic Cape offers various certificate, certification, professional, and community education training programs to meet the needs of individuals and businesses in Atlantic and Cape May counties. Partnerships with local businesses and industry help meet industry needs for skilled workers and their employees' need for enhanced skills. Classes are offered during the day, evenings, and weekends at all three College campuses and locations throughout Atlantic and Cape May counties. Many programs are available online.

Adult Literacy and Integrated Education Programs

Atlantic Cape's Adult Literacy division provides educational services for adults seeking to enhance their basic skills. Necessary skills enhancements allow participants to move into employment. Courses include Adult Basic Education, High School Equivalency (HSE) Preparation, and English as a Second Language (ESL). There is no cost to eligible applicants.

Certificate and Certification Training Programs

Atlantic Cape offers over 40 Career Training Certificates and Certification Programs to prepare students for many career options. These programs are designed to help students acquire the skills necessary to launch a new career -- often in just a few short months. Healthcare, technology, hospitality, gaming, and culinary programs are available. Experienced instructors utilize up-to-date equipment to provide a well-rounded curriculum designed for success. College credits can be earned upon successful completion of many programs.

Casino Career Institute

Atlantic Cape's Casino Career Institute (CCI) has provided training and consulting services supporting the gaming industry for over 45 years. CCI was the first licensed gaming school in the nation to be affiliated with a community college. CCI offers dealer training, surveillance, and games protection training. Students receive hands-on training on our fully-equipped mock casino floor.

Career Services

The Career Services and Experience-based Learning team is prepared to assist students with resumes and interview skills. The team also assists employers in connecting with students for employment and experience-based learning opportunities, such as internships and apprenticeships.

Center for Transition Success

Atlantic Cape Community College is a resource that supports individuals transitioning from secondary school to postsecondary education, adult employment, workforce training, and independent living. The Center for Transition Success's funded programs are supported financially by the County College-Based Center for Adult Transition Grant administered by the New Jersey Office of the Secretary of Higher Education (OSHE).

Health Professions Institute

Atlantic Cape's Health Professions Institute (HPI) provides comprehensive healthcare training for indemand careers. Phlebotomy, Certified Clinical Medical Assistants, Emergency Medical Technicians, and Paramedic Science Programs are available.

Professional Development and Community Education

Workforce Development offers a range of professional development and personal enrichment courses tailored to meet the interests and needs of residents in Atlantic and Cape May counties. The College provides workshops and seminars to help busy professionals acquire additional credentials, certifications, and skills. Classes are offered on days, evenings, and weekends at all three Atlantic Cape campuses and various locations throughout Atlantic and Cape May counties.

Retail, Customer Service & Hospitality

Workforce Development provides training in sales, customer service, retail management, front desk operations, and guest service.

Workforce Solutions (Training Services for Business)

Atlantic Cape's Workforce Solutions Programs deliver training tailored to the specific needs of businesses and organizations in Atlantic and Cape May counties. Professional trainers facilitate sessions on topics that help businesses meet the demands of their challenging and competitive markets. Workforce Solutions also offers needs assessments and application assistance with the NJ Department of Labor's Workforce Development grant opportunities.

Wind Training Center

The Wind Training Center offers the Global Wind Organization (GWO) Basic Safety Training (BST) over four days. The training will provide 28 hours of instruction in four areas (First Aid, Manual Handling, Fire Awareness, and Working at Heights). Training will be delivered in the Wind Training Center at Atlantic Cape Community College's Worthington Campus in Atlantic City, NJ. Atlantic Cape was awarded \$2.9 million for the 1,700-square-foot facility. The New Jersey Offshore Wind Safety Training Challenge is a grant program administered by the Office of the Secretary of Higher Education with the support of the New Jersey Economic Development Authority. The training program and supporting facility were the first of their kind in the State, enabling New Jersey to strengthen its leadership position in offshore wind energy.

Awarded \$1,000,000 NJ DOL Digital Equity Training Grant to offer digital literacy training to the WorkFirst New Jersey (WFNJ) population to overcome the digital divide and empower participants by improving skills with technology-based learning and resources

Awarded \$75,000 *AACC Metallica Scholars Initiative Grant* to provide academic and financial support to students enrolled in Atlantic Cape's Air Traffic Control Terminal and Professional Pilot degree programs

ARTICULATION AGREEMENTS AND OTHER COLLABORATIONS

2025- present

Atlantic Cape and Stockton University signed an articulation agreement on March 24 in the STEM Building on Atlantic Cape's Mays Landing campus. Under this partnership, Atlantic Cape graduates will have the opportunity to pursue a Bachelor of Arts in Interdisciplinary Visual Art, Bachelor of Fine Arts in Studio Art, or Bachelor of Fine Arts in Visual Communications degree at Stockton after being admitted into the University and meeting the regular standards for admission for all New Jersey community college graduates. Atlantic Cape students will have to complete certain Stockton University program and cognate course requirements, as well as writing requirements. Upon graduating from Atlantic Cape, students transferring to Stockton would do so with junior-year status as they work toward earning a bachelor's degree.

2024 -present

Signed Articulation Agreement for Media & Communication Degree Program with Arcadia University on December 16. Under this partnership between the two institutions of higher learning, Atlantic Cape students who have completed an Associate in Arts Degree in Communication will be assured status as a junior and a seamless transition to *Arcadia University's Bachelor of Arts in Media & Communication degree program*. Students who complete their remaining required courses at Arcadia may earn their bachelor's degree in two years (or four semesters).

Collaborated (Atlantic Cape Leadership Group) with 25 Institutions of Higher Education to Create the *NACUBO Student Success Hub*. This nearly three-year partnership project, involving 25 other institutions of higher education nationwide, aims to create a Student Success Hub in collaboration with the National Association of College and University Business Officers (NACUBO). The Hub is a compilation of free toolkits and resources for higher education professionals, offering a flexible and customizable model of practice for business officers to follow. It will ensure that they are prioritizing financial resources and institutional capacity in strategic and impactful ways to improve success for all students. Generous grants from the Ascendium Education Group, College Futures Foundation, and Trellis Foundation funded this initiative.

Signed a memorandum of understanding on November 30th with *Thomas Jefferson University's College of Health Professions*, which established a convenient and accessible pathway for Atlantic Cape students to enroll in one of ten Jefferson health programs.

Met with Princeton University as part of their community college *Transfer Scholars Initiative*, a summer program to build partnerships for transfer opportunities and articulation/elective credit courses, and to get community college students interested in transferring to Princeton University. Held a student session with Princeton University on December 5. Atlantic Cape is one of the 11 partner community colleges in New Jersey participating in the Transfer Scholars Initiative.

Signed a memorandum of understanding on February 14th with Rutgers University-Camden, referred to as the *Premier Partnership Agreement*, allowing students to fully matriculate to Rutgers University-Camden with 60 completed credits and pay the Atlantic Cape tuition and fee rate for their third year.

H. MAJOR RESEARCH & PUBLIC SERVICE ACTIVITIES

1. SELECTED ADVOCACY, SCHOLARLY, PUBLIC SERVICE, AND COMMUNITY OUTREACH

ADVOCACY

Dr. Barbara Gaba, President, Atlantic Cape Community College, worked to advance the College's mission through her advocacy work in her role of serving as the Co-Chair of the New Jersey Council of County Colleges (NJCCC) Collaboration/Operations Committee and the Executive Board of the New Jersey Presidents Council (NJPC), which included the following:

Advocated for the restoration of \$20 million in state funding for community colleges in the state budget. Following these advocacy efforts, including those of Atlantic Cape and the larger community college network, the New Jersey Legislature passed the FY 2026 state budget, which restored the \$20 million in critical operating aid for community colleges and also included investments in the Summer Tuition Assistance Grant (TAG) program. This restoration was widely applauded by the NJCCC and the community college system as a win for students, colleges, and the state's economy.

Attended budget hearings, where community college leaders, students, and advocates testified about the impact of the proposed cuts. Dr. Gaba and the other members of the NJPC (NJ Presidents Council) met with Assemblywoman Linda Carter, Chair of the Assembly Higher Education Committee, to aid advocacy efforts for higher education. Atlantic Cape Community College was vocal about the potential adverse effects on its programs, services, and students if the funding cuts were enacted.

Asked the College community to participate in an action campaign, which involved using social media to express concerns and advocate for the restoration of the funding. This aligned with typical community college advocacy strategies, which leveraged various communication channels to mobilize support and amplify their message.

Hosted (NJCCC) *Building Opportunities Summit* from June 4-6, 2025, at the Hard Rock & Casino in Atlantic City. Atlantic Cape had a strong turnout of college faculty, staff, and leadership, as well as several trustees from the Board of Trustees. The Summit drew a participation of over 400 attendees from across the state, including trustees, presidents, faculty, and staff. The focus was on the diverse pathways that community colleges help students succeed. Trustee Money received the Distinguished Alumni Award. Additionally, Dr. O'Brien-McMasters led a panel discussion on our initiatives to serve adult learners effectively.

Attended the Greater Atlantic City Chamber of Commerce's Policy Impact Series event, where those in attendance discussed important policies affecting the business community in Atlantic, Cape May, and Cumberland counties.

Attended the National Legislative Summit (NLS) from February 9-12, and presented on a panel that discussed "CEO Search Services: Best Practices and Services Offered."

Elected to the Board of Directors of the American Association of Community Colleges (AACC). the primary advocacy body for the nation's community colleges. The association represents more than 1,000 two-year associate degree-granting institutions nationwide for nearly 12 million students.

Held the Annual Nurses Pinning Ceremony on May 21 in the Walter E. Edge Theater on the Mays Landing campus to celebrate the Program's 82 graduates.

Recognized Daniel Mulraney and Roman Segov, both graduates of the class of 2025, for being appointed to the 2025 New Jersey All-State Academic Team.

Held the 58th Annual Commencement Ceremony on May 22 at the Mays Landing campus, where 400 students in attendance received their associate degrees and certificates. The Class of 2025 featured 891 students, aged 17 to 77, who were awarded 887 associate degrees and 37 certificates. Associate degrees were also conferred upon 31 high school seniors from Atlantic and Cape May counties, including Absegami, Cedar Creek, Lower Township, Middle Township, Oakcrest, and Pleasantville high schools, who took part in Atlantic Cape's Early College Program.

Traveled (ten students from the Academy of Culinary Arts) to Italy for a 17-day educational excursion as part of the Marco Polo Study Abroad Program. She led a presentation that dove deep into the psychological effects of stress and anxiety on students while urging action from educators and policymakers before nearly 40 guests in the lecture hall at Atlantic Cape's Cape May County campus on February 27
- Hosted the African American Heritage Museum of Southern New Jersey's (AAHMSNJ) "The NORTHSIDE: Redlining in the Sand" exhibit at the Student Center to educate today's younger generation on the factors that created segregated neighborhoods, such as Atlantic City's Northside neighborhood, that existed throughout the country at the turn of the 20th century.

- Held Black History Month Luncheon in Carême's on February 18 as the Black Student Alliance honored Lena Richard, who was a culinary school owner and the first Black woman in America to host her own cooking show on television. Members of the Academy of Culinary Arts served the guests in attendance.
- Held Soul Food-inspired lunch & virtual museum tour on February 25 in the Cape May County campus cafeteria. Students also watched a virtual field trip about Black History Month.
- Held Black Professionals Women in Healthcare Panel at the Worthington Atlantic City campus on February 19. AtlantiCare employees Valerie David, doctor of respiratory therapy; Shonna Corrales, clinical nursing manager; and Desiree May, associate chief nursing officer, discussed what Black history means to them and how they overcame challenges in their lives to become the successful professionals that they are today.
- Held Black Professionals Criminal Justice Panel on February 24. Atlantic City Police Department captains Donnell Holland, Sr., Alexus Zeilinger, and Henry White III shared their respective stories of the obstacles that they had to endure over the years as they rose to the rank of captain as Black citizens.
- Held Black Professionals "Hair Me, Wee Me" Hair Stylists Panel on February 25 at the Student Center in Mays Landing. The panelists shared insights, tips, and stories about the beauty and significance of Black hair throughout history. Black Student Alliance President Chaunice Murphy provided the audience with a brief glimpse into Black hair and hairstyles throughout human history.

Commemorated the beginning of Pride Month in June with a flag-raising ceremony on the Quad on the Mays Landing Campus on June 3, hosted by the Atlantic Cape Pride Club.

Foundation

Held the annual Scramble FORE Scholarships golf tournament on October 4 with record attendance of more than 150 players, and raised \$75,000. This event marked the 20th anniversary of the Mullock Family hosting it.

Held the *Women of Wonder (WOW)* event on November 14 at the Flanders Hotel in Ocean City. Trustee Clemans was one of the awardees. This event raised more than \$16,000 compared with \$14,150 in FY24. The Cape May County Women's Commission supported this event, where nearly 100% of the proceeds go to the neediest students in Cape May County.

Raised \$20,282.14 during GivingTuesday on December 3, eclipsing the goal of \$17,000, thanks to the tremendous outpouring of selfless giving and philanthropy from donors, supporters, and alums this holiday season.

Received a \$40,000 donation by the Powell Family Foundation, which allowed the College's Athletic Department to purchase a brand new, 15-passenger van to transport student athletes to road games.

Raised \$250,000 from the Doherty Family Charitable Trust specifically for scholarships for Cape May County residents attending Atlantic Cape in credit and workforce development programs.

Held the 42nd Annual Restaurant Gala on March 27, with over 900 guests, new and returning sponsors, 50 restaurants and bake shops, wineries, and breweries. Approximately \$305,000 was raised. Thanks to the Gala, 13 students from the Academy of Culinary Arts will be able to study in Italy as part of the 2025 summer immersion program. The Gala funded each student \$1,500 to help cover costs.

Selected to receive \$25,000 from OceanFirst, which has renewed its commitment to education across South Jersey and is funding each of the community colleges and 4-year institutions in its banking delivery area. This funding will be used to support our needlest students through scholarships.

Held the Annual Scholarship Recognition Ceremony on May 19 with 320 parents, supporters, students, and donors in attendance. Four hundred twenty-two scholarships were awarded to 242 students, totaling more than \$408,000 in financial assistance.

Continued to cultivate our alumni with the Foundation's annual summer bash at Morey's Piers on June 22. Nearly 400 Atlantic Cape alumni, family, and friends, who traveled from as far away as New York and Pennsylvania, descended upon the iconic Wildwood boardwalk to enjoy the rides on the three amusement piers and two water parks, while also enjoying a delicious all-you-can-eat barbecue lunch at the Rendezvous Beach Picnic Pavilion. The Alumni Bash is the Alumni Association's largest annual event, which has served as a celebratory kick-off to the summer for thousands of Atlantic Cape graduates and their guests since 2016. Atlantic Cape is grateful for the long-standing partnership with Morey's Piers and the More family, who support ongoing fundraising efforts and scholarships for students attending Atlantic Cape.

Closed out FY25 by awarding 767 scholarships to 517 students in the amount of \$766,945 (unaudited), a slight decrease from the prior year. By comparison, last year the Foundation awarded \$792,000 in scholarships.

Athletics

Received (former Atlantic Cape Buccaneers Men's Basketball standout, David Colt) Division I scholarship to the University of Kansas for his senior year.

Hosted the 2nd Annual High School Girls Volleyball Summer Showcase on May Landing Campus on August 14th. The tournament featured incoming 2024-25 academic year student athletes from Absegami, Cedar Creek, Egg Harbor Township, Oakcrest, and Pleasantville high schools. Each team played two, two-set matches against each opponent (for a total of eight matches), followed by a one-set, single-elimination playoff round. This event provided athletes with practice matches as they prepared for their respective upcoming seasons.

Made (Atlantic Cape Buccaneers Women's Basketball team) the playoffs after not having played a full National Junior Collegiate Athletic Association (NJCAA) season since 2019-2020. Finished as the eighth seed and earned a trip to the NJCAA Region 19 Division III playoffs.

Led the Atlantic Cape Buccaneers Men's Basketball team to a successful season, winning the opening round of the National Junior Collegiate Athletic Association (NJCAA) Division III Region 19 playoffs before losing in the second round to Union County College.

Recognized six men's basketball sophomore student athletes, Christopher Parker, Ramar Cook, Jaylen Jenkins, Semajeh Echols, Omero Chevere, and Jeremy Ellis, for their two years of dedication, determination, and effort during this year's Sophomore Night ceremony on February 15.

Reached (Sophomore men's basketball student athlete Christopher Parker) 1,000-career-point milestone on February 15 as the Bucs defeated Harrisburg Community College, 84-78 at Stockton University in

Galloway. Parker received a full scholarship to Division I South Carolina State University, where he will begin his junior year this fall.

Recognized Alec Barnes for receiving the Region 19 2nd team distinction for Men's Volleyball.

Programs

Awarded a \$551,818 grant by the National Science Foundation for the Proposed Drone Data Technicians Associate Degree Program. The project, "Preparing Small Unmanned Aircraft Systems Data Technicians," addresses the evolving technology landscape in the field of small unmanned aircraft systems. This includes advancements in miniaturized sensors, the development of specialized data processing software, and the use of machine learning for analysis. The industry is poised for another round of significant growth, driven by impending additions to regulatory frameworks that will increase opportunities for small unmanned aerial system (sUAS) operations. The anticipated outcomes of the project include an increased number of faculty trained to deliver new curricula, a diverse student population benefiting from the programs, and measurable results in terms of enrollment, retention, and graduation/credentials earned. By aligning the education provided with industry needs, the project strives to meet the workforce demand for skilled sUAS data technicians and contribute to the growth and advancement of the field. James Taggart, professor, Computer Information Systems, will serve as the program's principal investigator (PI). Assistant Professors Kenneth Cabarle and Anthony Esposito will serve as co-principal investigators, with Professor Judith Otterburn-Martinez rounding out the program's faculty team. This new associate degree option is tentatively scheduled to be launched in time for the Fall 2025 Semester.

Recognized for having one of the most affordable substance abuse counseling certificate and associate degree programs (AS in Psychosocial Rehabilitation and Addiction Counseling) throughout the Northeast by SubstanceAbuseCounselor.org. Atlantic Cape was applauded by the website for its "dedication to providing quality education at an affordable price is truly commendable, and we believe this recognition will resonate with students, particularly those from backgrounds where higher education feels out of reach, such as many first-generation college students."

Hosted the New Jersey Aviation Education Council's (NJAEC) Aviation Symposium on February 28 to showcase the numerous aviation degree programs that are available at Atlantic Cape for high school students interested in a higher education that can prepare them for a successful career in the burgeoning aviation industry. The symposium's keynote speaker, Priya Abiram, is a native of Edison, New Jersey, who is currently completing her undergraduate degree in Aerospace Engineering at Cornell University and preparing to begin her graduate program in the fall. She is also a Citizen Science Astronaut Trainee at the International Institute of Astronautical Sciences.

Awarded a \$474,227 National Science Foundation (NSF) grant on June 17 for its "Industry-Linked Artificial Intelligence and Machine Learning Pathways for Computer Programmers" project. Over the next three years, this project will create a comprehensive associate degree and one-year certificate program that will increase access to AI technologies education for the College's students throughout Atlantic and Cape May counties.

<u>High School Outreach - Atlantic County</u>

Invited High School and College History teachers to submit abstracts for 30-minute papers/panel discussions for the Teaching Revolutionary New Jersey symposium on May 23, 2025. This symposium was designed to bring the area's preeminent American Revolutionary scholars together as we prepare to celebrate the 250th anniversary (Semiquincentennial) of the American Declaration of Independence in

2026. Following the symposium, the submitted papers and presentations were compiled into a publication and made available to all high school and college educators to assist in their teaching of New Jersey's importance in American Revolutionary history.

Held Annual Atlantic County Coalition for a Safe Community's Teen Summit on March 21 at Atlantic Cape's Mays Landing campus, with nearly 200 students from 12 local high schools gathered seeking ways to collaboratively create new and successful solutions to today's important issues. The students in attendance represented Absegami, Atlantic City, Atlantic County Institute of Technology, Buena, Cedar Creek, Egg Harbor Township, Hammonton, Mainland, Oakcrest, and Pleasantville high schools, as well as Ideal Institute of Technology (Pleasantville) and Gloucester County Institute of Technology (Sewell). The Atlantic County Coalition sponsored this year's summit for a Safe Community in collaboration with Atlantic Cape Community College, AtlantiCare Healthy Schools, Ideal Institute of Technology, and New Jersey Statewide Student Support Services (NJ4S).

Hosted Drone Discovery Day on June 5 in the Walter E. Edge Theater on the Mays Landing campus for students from Absegami and Atlantic City high schools learned about careers in the aviation and drone industry, and had the chance to fly one as well. Cassandra Rodriquez of General Dynamic Information Technology gave the keynote address, which was then followed by two workshop sessions that the students could choose to attend. Assistant Professor of Biology Ken Cabarle and Instructor Jamieson Allen conducted a First Time Drone Flight session Assistant Professor Small Unmanned Aircraft (SUA) Anthony Esposito discussed possible careers in the aviation and drone industry; Melissa Lekas from Women in Aviation International inspired with a session on empowering the next generation of women in aerospace; Current Atlantic Cape Drone program student and former Atlantic Cape Aviation student. Andrew Rock hosted a student-run workshop meant to empower young pilots.

Hosted (Academic English Language Program) 26 juniors and seniors from Pleasantville High School. Denise Coulter was on hand to welcome them to the campus. They were able to sit in on a live AELP class and participate in interactive activities with Judith Otterburn Martinez and Janice Burg Levi. Students were then given a tour of the WACC campus and enjoyed lunch as Danays Hernandez and Ryan Moore explained financial aid and registration procedures.

High School Outreach - Cape May County

Hosted the New Jersey Statewide Student Support Services Campus EmpowermentU, a five-week camp for Cape May County students entering the 6^{th} , 7^{th} , and 8^{th} grades in Fall 2025. from July 16 through August 15 at the Cape May County Campus.

Hosted (Student Advocacy) Nick Scott, Chairman, CEO, and founder of Wheelchair Bodybuilding, Inc., on March 27 in the Student Center. A near-fatal car accident at 16 changed his life forever. Despite the challenges, he transformed himself from an overweight and discouraged individual into a champion. Now an IFBB Professional Wheelchair Bodybuilder, two-time World Powerlifting Champion, professional wheelchair ballroom dancer, award-winning actor, published author, entrepreneur, real estate investor, and philanthropist, Nick uses his experiences to motivate others. He shared insights on overcoming adversity, mental health challenges, and achieving personal goals, and signed his book.

Partnered (Atlantic Cape and the Inlet CDC) with community groups for Inaugural Clean-up Day & Summer Kick-off event in Atlantic City. The volunteers, who wore white t-shirts to mark the occasion, gathered at one of two starting locations, Fisherman's Park on Melrose Avenue and Altman Park on Pacific Avenue. Each volunteer was provided with garbage bags and pickers before making their way down nearby streets and across vacant lots to rid the areas of loose trash, debris, and other items. Following the two-hour community cleanup, the accumulated debris was bagged and left at nearly 20 designated locations throughout the Inlet for pickup. I. MAJOR CAPITAL PROJECTS

MAYS LANDING CAMPUS

Completed the \$1.48 million baseball field of dreams that brought back the Buccaneers' baseball program home for the 2025 season after spending the past decade playing its home games at Surf Stadium in Atlantic City. This was funded through the State of New Jersey and Atlantic County Chapter 12 funds, as well as the "Bring it Home" fundraising campaign in 2020, which, thanks to the generosity of its donors, raised \$186,000. After several years of planning, fundraising, architectural design, environmental approvals, and community and alumni outreach, construction was completed on the parcel of land situated behind the Rutgers Lifelong Learning Center. The new baseball field features a state-of-the-art digital scoreboard in center field, Americans with Disabilities Act-compliant bleachers along both baselines for spectator seating, two enclosed dugouts, and two 80'x30' bullpens. The field dimensions measure 330 feet down the left and right field lines, and 400 feet to straight-away center field.

Completed gymnasium renovations that included the installation of new bleachers, LED lighting, and the refinishing of the basketball court.

CAPE MAY CAMPUS

Started and completed renovations of two of our health science classrooms.
