This enhances the educational experience for students who are deaf or hard of hearing. The ASL DLA provides support and communication while the interpreter facilitates the spoken language.

Working with an ASL DLA may help the students who are deaf or hard of hearing achieve their academic goals and provides them with the necessary support for a successful educational journey.

The collaboration between teachers of the deaf and ASL DLAs ensure students receive the necessary tools and supports to thrive academically, socially and emotionally.
