## Background

This quarterly report, mandated by the Work First New Jersey (WFNJ) law, is a summary of New Jersey's Temporary Assistance for Needy Families Program and General Assistance Programs. The data elements included in the report are those specified by N.J.S.A. 44:10-41.

### Part One: WorkFirst NJ Caseload

#### **Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF)**

11,862 families received WFNJ/TANF at the end of March 2024, an increase of 0.01% from the previous quarter.




Figure 1: TANF family caseload by quarter.

#### **Client Deferrals and Exemptions**

Of the total TANF family caseload (11,862), 6,966 cases (58.73%) had an adult in the household with a mandatory WFNJ/TANF work requirement. 2,203 cases (18.57%) were exempt child-only households and 550 cases (4.64%) had a long-term health deferral. 2,143 cases (18.07%) had some other type of deferral.




Figure 2: TANF caseload by case status as of March 2024.

### General Assistance (GA)

The number of persons receiving General Assistance (GA) at the end of March 2024 was 14,727, an increase of 6.56% from the previous quarter.




Figure 3: General Assistance (GA) participants by quarter.

### Part Two : Employment and Work Preparation

#### Participation of WFNJ/TANF Clients in Employment-Directed Activities

In March 2024, 2,910 TANF clients were engaged in work activities. 546 (18.76%) of these individuals had begun working but were receiving a partial cash assistance payment due to income disregards.




Figure 4: Participation of WFNJ/TANF clients in employment-directed activities.

#### Federal Participation Requirement

Of the recipients scheduled to participate in the work-directed activities, 611 participated at levels sufficient to satisfy federal requirements.

### Cases Closed Due to Employment

During the first calendar quarter, an average of 331 WFNJ/TANF and GA clients per month left the program due to employment. The number of employed TANF and GA recipients trended upward with an increase of 3% from January to March, and an increase of 18% for GA clients.




Figure 5 : GA and TANF clients leaving due to employment.

### Major Reasons for TANF Case Closings

During the first calendar quarter of 2024, 2,966 TANF cases were closed. 18% of these TANF cases closed due to employment.

### Earnings of TANF Recipients

During the first calendar quarter of 2024, WFNJ/TANF recipients who were working earned an average of \$18.33 per hour, an increase of 7% since June 2023.

### Part Three: Child Care

#### WFNJ/TANF Cases Receiving Child Care Benefits

As of March 2024, over 800 WFNJ/TANF clients received child care benefits. Post-TANF child care benefits were issued to over 200 families who became employed and were no longer receiving cash assistance.
