MANDATORY REPORTING

The following professionals are required by law to report suspected abuse, neglect, or exploitation:

- All health care professionals (e.g., doctors, nurses, social workers, etc.)
- Law enforcement officers
- Firefighters, paramedics, EMTs

WHY REPORT TO APS?


- Mandated reporters are legally required to report suspected abuse, neglect, or exploitation.
- To check if the individual is an active APS client or if APS has had prior involvement.
- To seek guidance or suggestions from APS in ensuring the patient's safety and well-being.

APS CASE CRITERIA

A vulnerable adult may qualify for APS if they meet *all* of the following:

- Age: 18 years older
- Residence: Living in a private home or non-regulated community setting
- Vulnerability: Unable to manage their well-being due to physical or mental illness, disability, or deficiency
- Risk: Experiencing abuse, neglect, or exploitation

Note: APS services are voluntary unless court ordered.



CONFIDENTIALITY

- All APS reports and records are confidential.
- APS may only disclose information under a court order or as required to ensure the individual's protection.

LIMITS TO APS ASSISTANCE

- APS cannot force services on adults with capacity who decline services.
- APS cannot remove an individual from their home without consent or a court order.
- APS cannot impose restrictions unless ordered by a court.

REPORTING TO APS

When reporting to APS:

- If possible, information should be provided by the person with firsthand knowledge.



If available, provide detailed information including:

- Patient Information: Name, address, Social Security number
- Health Details: Relevant diagnoses and physical/mental health concerns
- Support Systems: Involved family members, services, or agencies
- Allegations: Specific concerns about abuse, neglect, or exploitation
