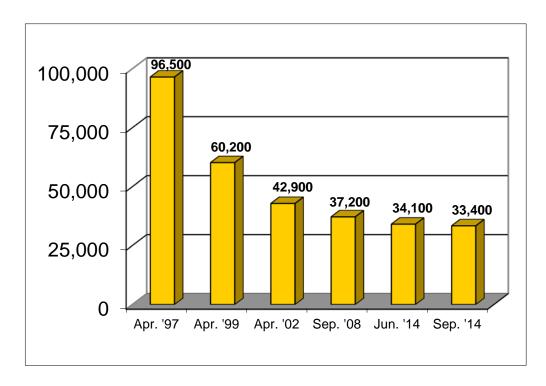
## **Quarter Ending September 2014**

#### 1. Work First NJ Caseload

#### Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF)

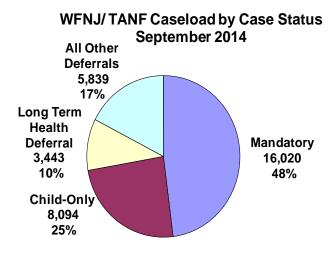
The number of families receiving WFNJ/TANF totaled approximately 33,400 as of September 2014, a slight decline from the June 2014 caseload.

#### **WFNJ TANF Caseload**



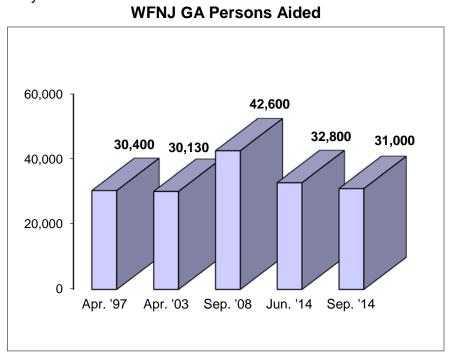
#### Client Deferrals and Exemptions

Of the total TANF caseload of 33,400, about 16,000 cases (48 percent) were those with adults in the household who must comply with WFNJ/TANF work requirements.



#### General Assistance (GA)

As of September 2014, there were approximately 31,000 General Assistance (GA) persons aided in New Jersey.



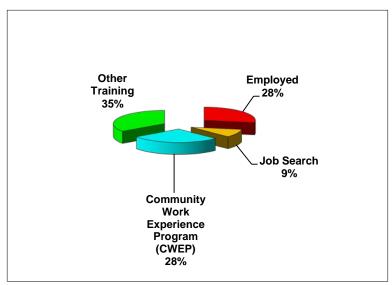
#### Teenaged Welfare Recipients

Of the WFNJ/TANF population of 33,400 in September 2014, about 690 (2.1%) were teenaged recipients, aged 18 and 19, who were heads of their households.

#### 2. Employment & Work Preparation

#### •Participation of WFNJ TANF Clients in Employment-Directed Activities

For the month of September 2014, over 14,500 TANF clients were engaged in work activities. About 4,000 (28 percent) of these individuals had begun working but were still receiving a partial cash assistance payment, due to income disregards.



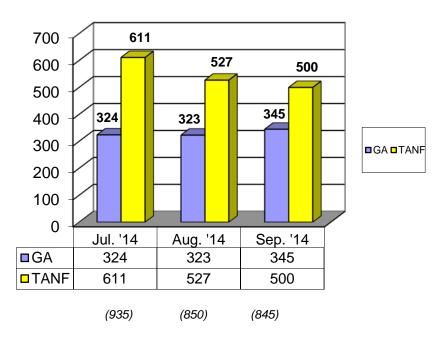

#### Cases that met the Federal Participation Requirement

Of the people scheduled to participate in the work-directed activities, 4,694 participated at levels sufficient to satisfy federal requirements.

#### Cases Closed Due to Employment

During the quarter, an average of about 877 WFNJ TANF and GA clients left welfare for employment each month.

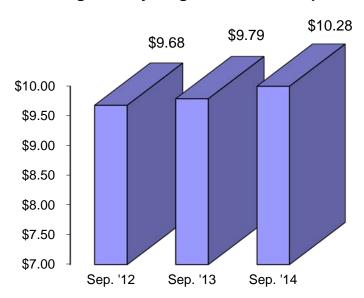

#### Statewide Job Openings

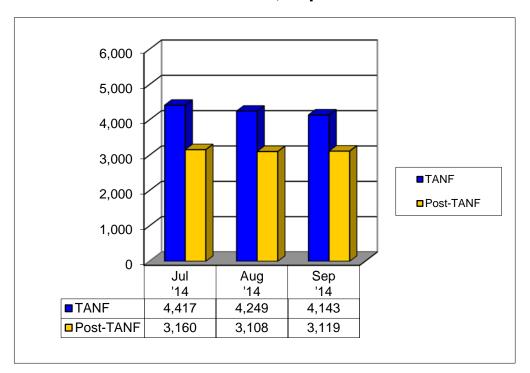
According to the NJ Department of Labor and Workforce Development, there were 184,688 job openings statewide during the period of October 1, 2013 through September 30, 2014. The majority of positions available were in the Professional, Scientific and Technical Services category, followed by the Finance and Insurance and Administration and Support Waste Management and Remediation Services.

As of September 2014, over 4,100 WFNJ TANF clients received child care benefits. Post-TANF child care benefits were issued to nearly 3,100 families who had become employed and were no longer receiving cash assistance.
