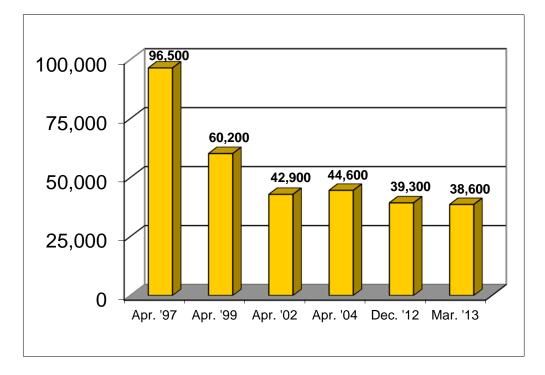
Work First New Jersey (WFNJ) Quarterly Progress Update

Quarter Ending March 2013

1. Work First NJ Caseload

•Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF)

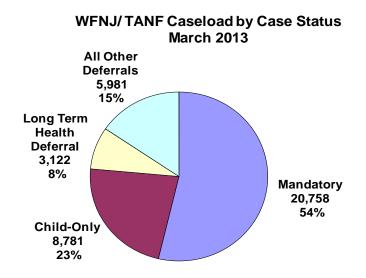
The number of families receiving WFNJ/TANF totaled approximately 38,600 as of March 2013, a slight decline from the December 2012 caseload.



WFNJ TANF Caseload

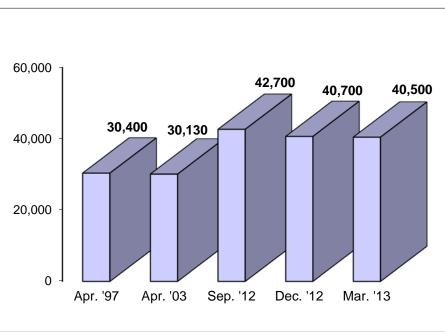
Client Deferrals and Exemptions

Of the total TANF caseload of 38,600, about 20,758 cases (54 percent) were those with adults in the household who must comply with WFNJ/TANF work requirements.



•General Assistance (GA)

As of March 2013, there were approximately 40,500 General Assistance (GA) persons aided in New Jersey.



WFNJ GA Persons Aided

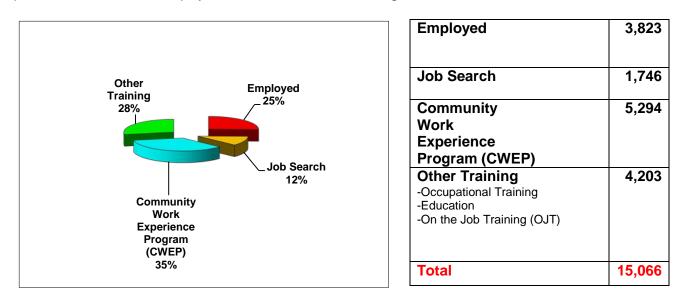
•Teenaged Welfare Recipients

Of the WFNJ/TANF population of 38,600 in March 2013, about 1,115 (2.9%) were teenaged recipients, aged 18 and 19, who were heads of their households.

2. Employment & Work Preparation

Participation of WFNJ TANF Clients in Employment-Directed Activities

For the month of March 2013, over 15,000 TANF clients were engaged in work activities. About 3,800 (25 percent) of these individuals had begun working but were still receiving a partial cash assistance payment, due to income disregards.

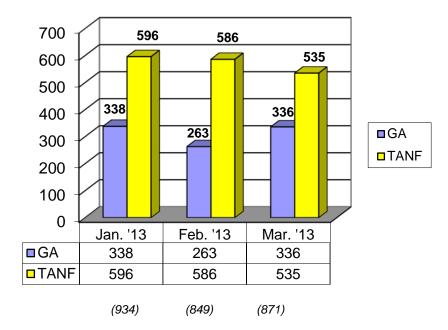


•Cases that met the Federal Participation Requirement

Of the people scheduled to participate in the work-directed activities, 5,203 participated at levels sufficient to satisfy federal requirements.

•Cases Closed Due to Employment

During the quarter, an average of about 885 WFNJ TANF and GA clients left welfare for employment each month.

Average Hourly Wages of Former TANF Recipients

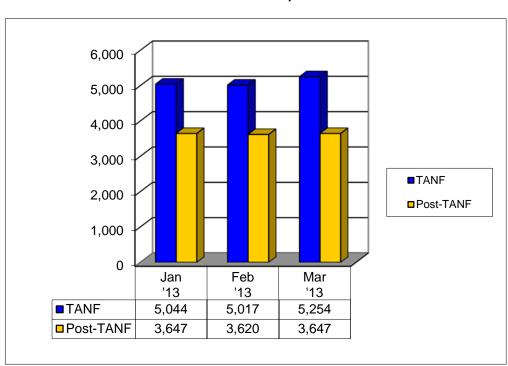
•Statewide Job Openings

According to the NJ Department of Labor and Workforce Development, there were 84,547 job openings statewide during the period of April 1, 2012 through March 31, 2013. The majority of positions available were in the Administration and Support, Waste Management and Remediation category, followed by the Retail Trade and Accommodation and Food Services.

3. Child Care

As of March 2013, over 5,200 WFNJ TANF clients received child care benefits. Post-TANF child care benefits were issued to nearly 3,600 families who had become employed and were no longer receiving cash assistance.
