

1. Work First NJ Caseload

Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF)


The number of families receiving WFNJ/TANF totaled approximately 40,100 as of June 2012, a slight decline from the March 2012 caseload.






•Client Deferrals and Exemptions

Of the total TANF caseload of 40,100, about 21,400 cases (53 percent) were those with adults in the household who must comply with WFNJ/TANF work requirements.



General Assistance (GA)

As of June 2012, there were approximately 44,800 General Assistance (GA) persons aided in New Jersey.




Teenaged Welfare Recipients

Of the WFNJ/TANF population of 40,100 in June 2012, about 1,320 (3.3%) were teenaged recipients, aged 18 and 19, who were heads of their households.

2. Employment & Work Preparation

•Participation of WFNJ TANF Clients in Employment-Directed Activities

For the month of June 2012, over 17,000 TANF clients were engaged in work activities. About 4,300 (25 percent) of these individuals had begun working but were still receiving a partial cash assistance payment, due to income disregards.





•Cases that met the Federal Participation Requirement

Of the people scheduled to participate in the work-directed activities, 5,019 participated at levels sufficient to satisfy federal requirements.

Cases Closed Due to Employment

During the quarter, an average of about 1,042 WFNJ TANF and GA clients left welfare for employment each month.



<u>•Earnings of Former TANF Recipients</u>
During the second quarter of 2012, WFNJ TANF recipients who were working were earning an average of \$9.68 per hour.

Statewide Job Openings

According to the NJ Department of Labor and Workforce Development, there were 60,561 job openings statewide during the period of July 1, 2011 through June 30, 2012. The majority of positions available were in the Administration and Support, Waste Management and Remediation category, followed by the Accommodation and Food Services and Professional, Scientific and Technical Services fields.



3. Child Care

As of June 2012, over 5,400 WFNJ TANF clients received child care benefits. Post-TANF child care benefits were issued to nearly 4,000 families who had become employed and were no longer receiving cash assistance.

The Department of Human Service' Division of Family Development (DFD), in accordance with P.L. 2011, c. 184, has posted the Work First New Jersey (WFNJ) Quarterly Progress Update for the quarter ending March 2012. This progress update is posted at http://www.state.nj.us/humanservices/dfd/news/, as required pursuant to P.L. 1997, c.13. A copy of the update is enclosed for your convenience.

This report reflects the current trend of clients receiving Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) and General Assistance (GA) benefits. During this quarter, an average of about 1,042 clients (TANF and GA combined) left WFNJ for employment each month. The average wage of TANF clients who became employed was \$9.68 per hour.
