FINAL DECISION

Petitioner appeals the Respondent Agency's termination of Emergency Assistance ("EA") and imposition of a 6-month penalty. The Agency terminated the Petitioner's EA and imposed a 6-month penalty because Petitioner failed to comply with her Service Plan, failed to take reasonable steps to resolve her emergent situation, and was evicted from her EA shelter placement for possession of alcohol on the premises. Because Petitioner appealed, the matter was transmitted to the Office of Administrative Law for a hearing. On August 26, 2014, the Honorable Joseph A. Ascione, Administrative Law Judge ("ALJ"), held a plenary hearing, took testimony and admitted documents. On September 15, 2014, the ALJ issued an Initial Decision which reversed the Agency determination.

Neither party submitted exceptions.

As Director of the Division of Family Development, Department of Human Services, I have considered the record for this matter and the ALJ's Initial Decision, and having made an independent evaluation of the record, I accept and adopt the Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law contained in the Initial Decision.

Petitioner receives Work First New Jersey/Temporary Assistance for Needy Families, Medicaid and Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, f/k/a the Food Stamp Program, benefits.

The record for the present matter shows that the Petitioner denied that she had consumed/possessed alcohol on the shelter premises or that she had purchased

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alcohol for another resident. The Agency failed to demonstrate, through either testimonial or documentary evidence, that there was alcohol on the shelter premises, that Petitioner had in fact consumed alcohol on the premises, or that the Petitioner contributed towards others consuming alcohol on the premises. As such, I agree with the ALJ that the Agency failed to prove its case by a preponderance of the credible evidence.

For the foregoing reasons, I ADOPT the Initial Decision and REVERSE the Agency determination.
