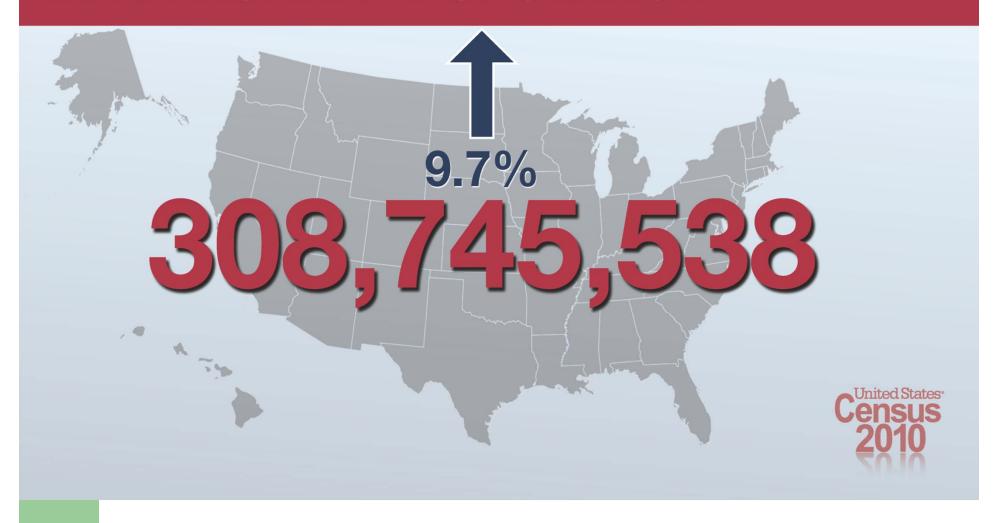

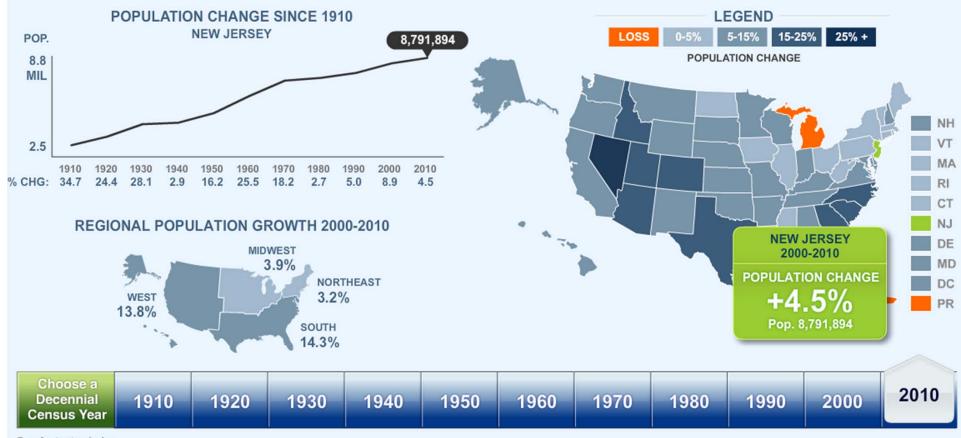
New Jersey Population

Population change is the rate of change in population between decennial census years. While every census region grew considerably durin the twentieth century, the South and West experienced the largest increases in population.

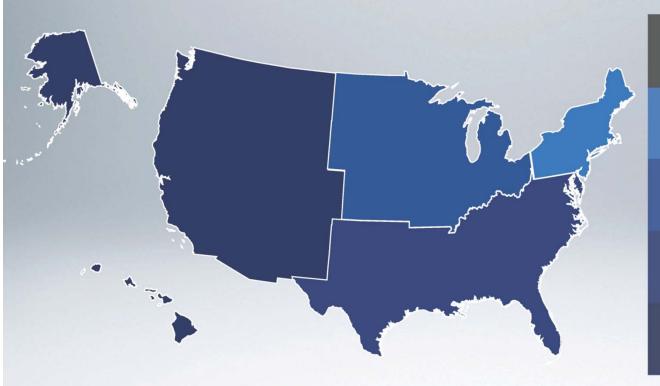

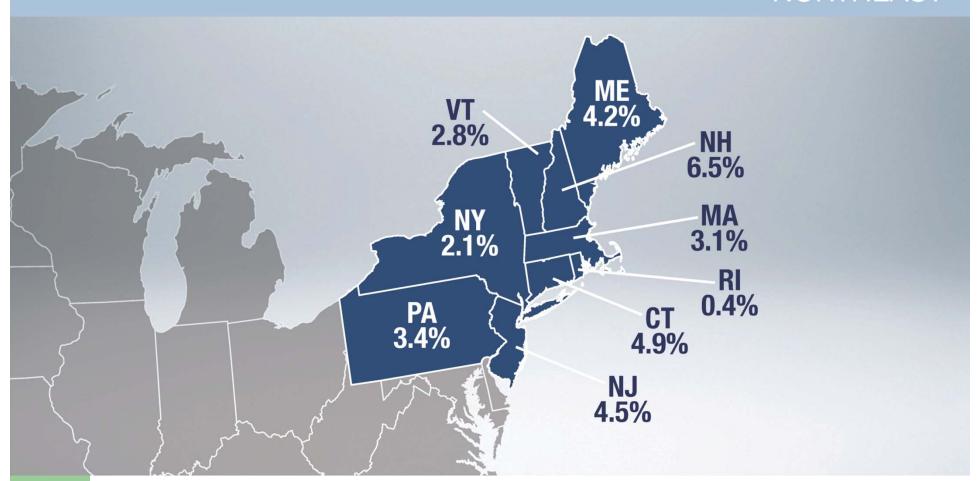

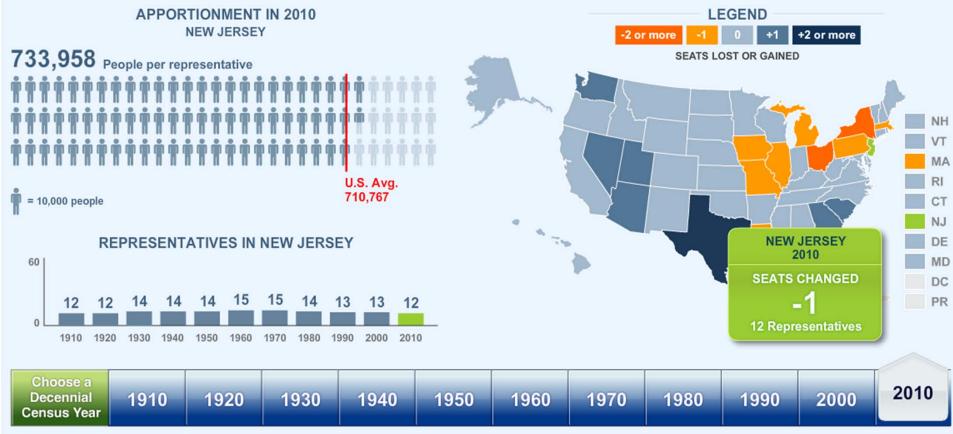

Apportionment is the process of dividing the 435 memberships, or seats, in the House of Representatives among the 50 states based on th population figures collected during the decennial census.

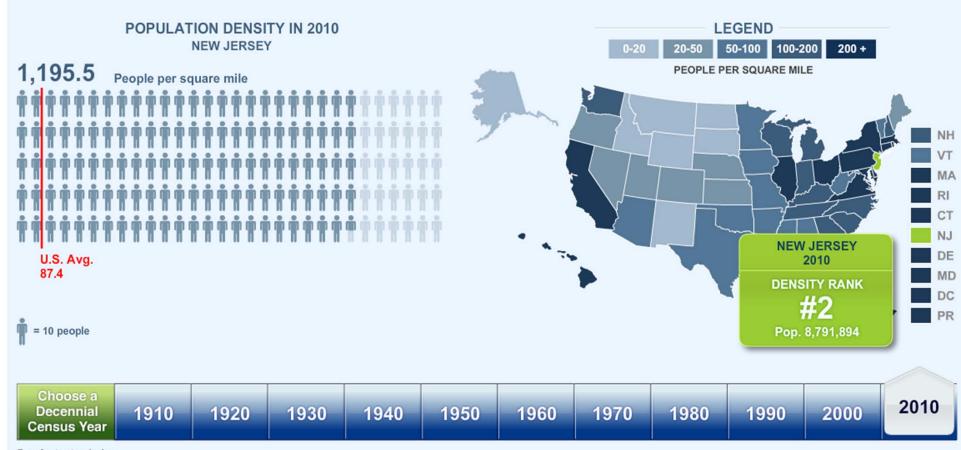

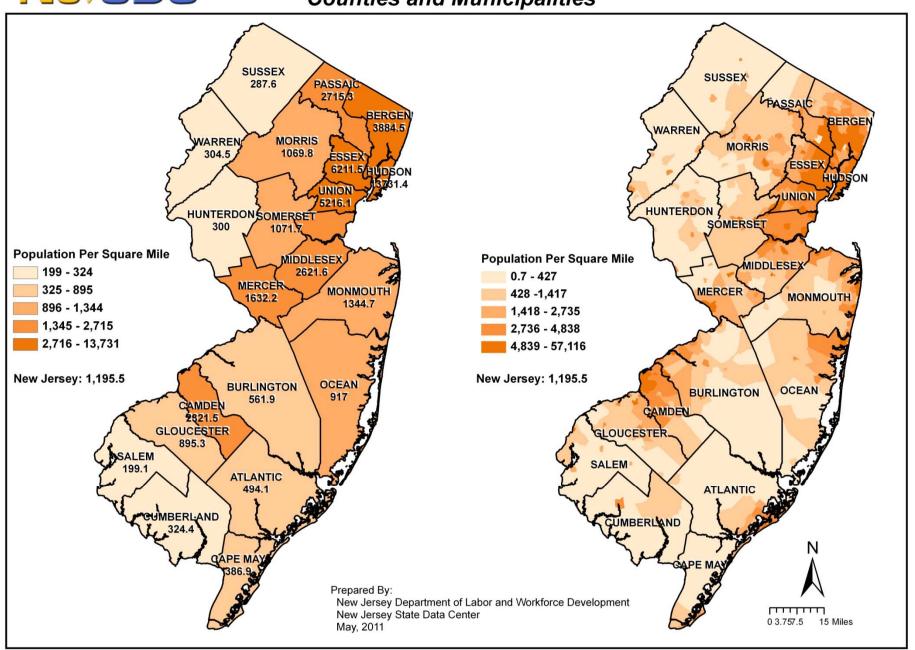

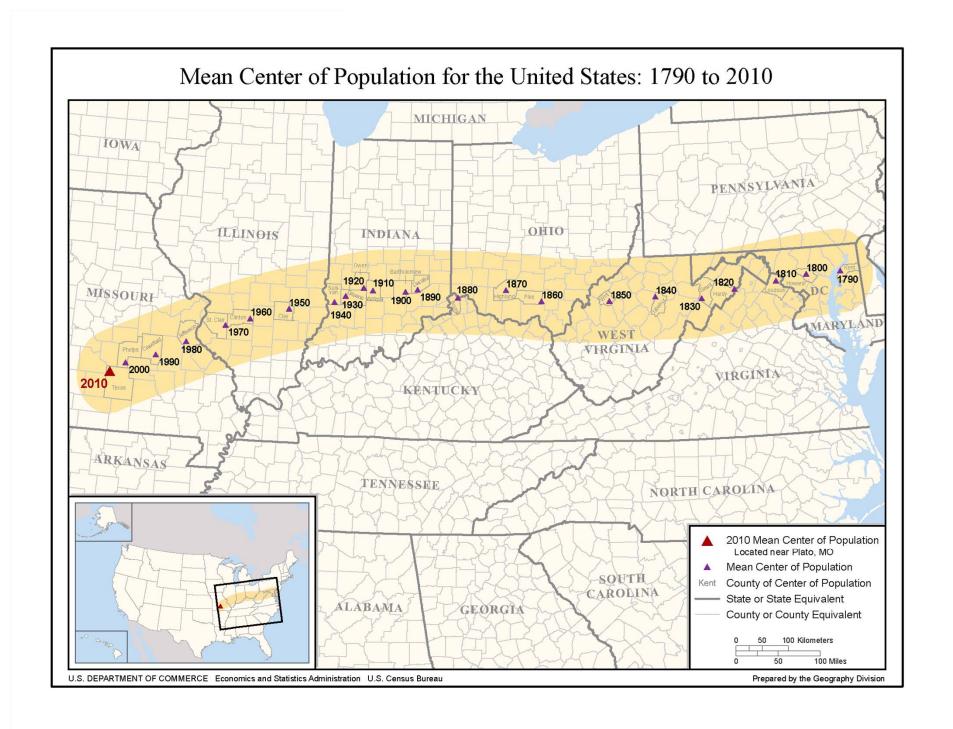

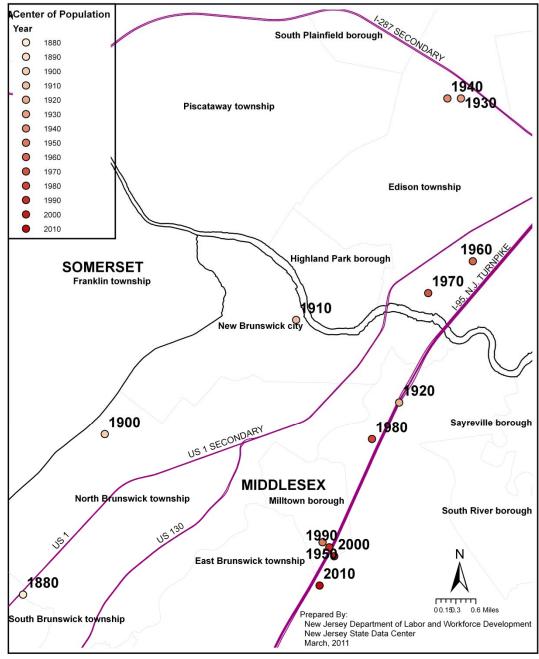
Census 2010 Population Density Counties and Municipalities

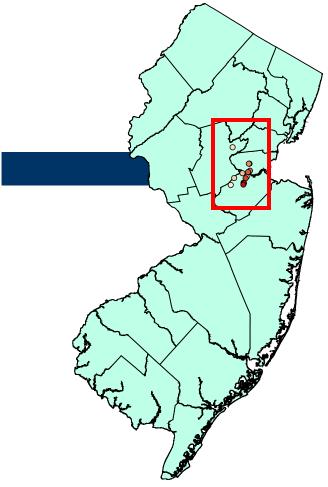






Center of Population 1880-2010 New Jersey

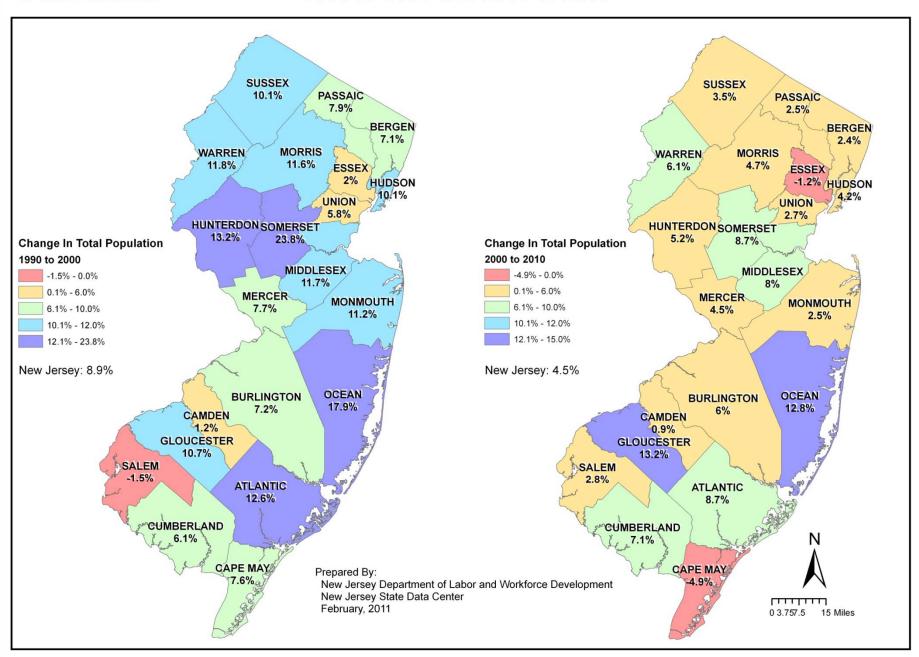




Since 1960, New Jersey's Center of Population has been moving to the South and is within East Brunswick Township in 2010.

- Population grew by 4.6% slightly faster than state
- Population gain of 11,354 smallest gain of the 5 regions
- Sussex and Warren County slowed down their growth
 - Sussex 1990-2000 10.1% 2000-2010 3.5%
 - Warren 1990-2000 11.8% 2000-2010 6.1%
- These two counties are home to 3% of NJ residents in 2010

- Population grew by 2.3% slowest among the 5 regions
- Population gain of 84,824 ranks 3rd among the 5 regions
- Morris was the fastest growing county at 4.7%
- Essex County population decreased by 1.2%
- These six counties are home to 43.8% of NJ residents in 2010 (down from 44.8% in 2000)



Central Region

(Hunterdon, Mercer, Middlesex, & Somerset)

- Population grew by 7.1% fastest among the 5 regions
- Population gain of 107,762 largest among the 5 regions
 - 28.5% of state growth 2000-2010
- Somerset was the fastest growing county 8.7%
- Mercer had the slowest growth rate 4.5% (equal to the state)
- Central region is home to 18.5% of total population in 2010 (up from 18.1% in 2000)



Coastal Region

(Atlantic, Cape May, Monmouth, & Ocean)

- Population grew by 6.6% second fastest among regions
- Population gain (97,666) was 26% of state growth 2000-2010
- Ocean County added more residents than any other county in the state (65,651)
- Cape May population decreased by -4.9%
- Regions share of population grew from 17.6% in 2000 to 18.0% in 2010



Southern Region

(Burlington, Camden, Gloucester Cumberland & Salem)

- Population grew by 5.4% third fastest among the 5 regions
- Population gain of 75,938 ranks fourth among the 5 regions
 - 20% of state growth 2000-2010
- Accelerated growth from 1990-2000's 5.0% growth rate
 - Only region to do this
- Gloucester was fastest growing county in the region 13.2%
 - was also fastest growing county in NJ for 2010 Census
- Regions share of state population grew from 16.6 % in 2000 to 16.8% in 2010

New Jersey Municipal Highlights

- 30 municipalities in New Jersey have populations greater than 50,000 but less than 100,000
 - Account for about 23% of New Jersey residents
 - 5.32% growth as a group between 2000 and 2010
- 210 municipalities in New Jersey have populations between 10,000 and 50,000
 - Account for about 51% of New Jersey residents
 - 5.26% growth as a group between 2000 and 2010
- Together these two groups accounted for approximately 87% of New Jersey's total population growth between 2000 and 2010.
- Population declined -7.7% in the 32 municipalities with less than 1,000 residents.

- Eight of these municipalities had less than 10,000 residents in 2000.
- Lakewood Township only exception population increased 53.8 percent from 60,352 in 2000.

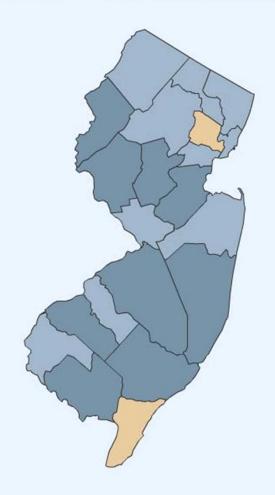

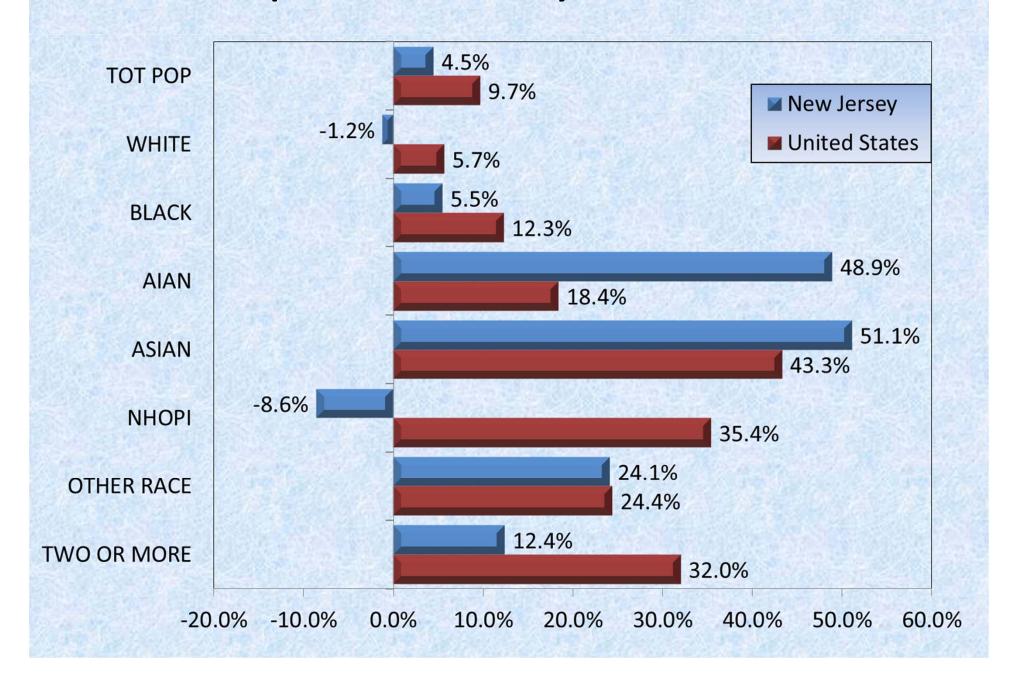

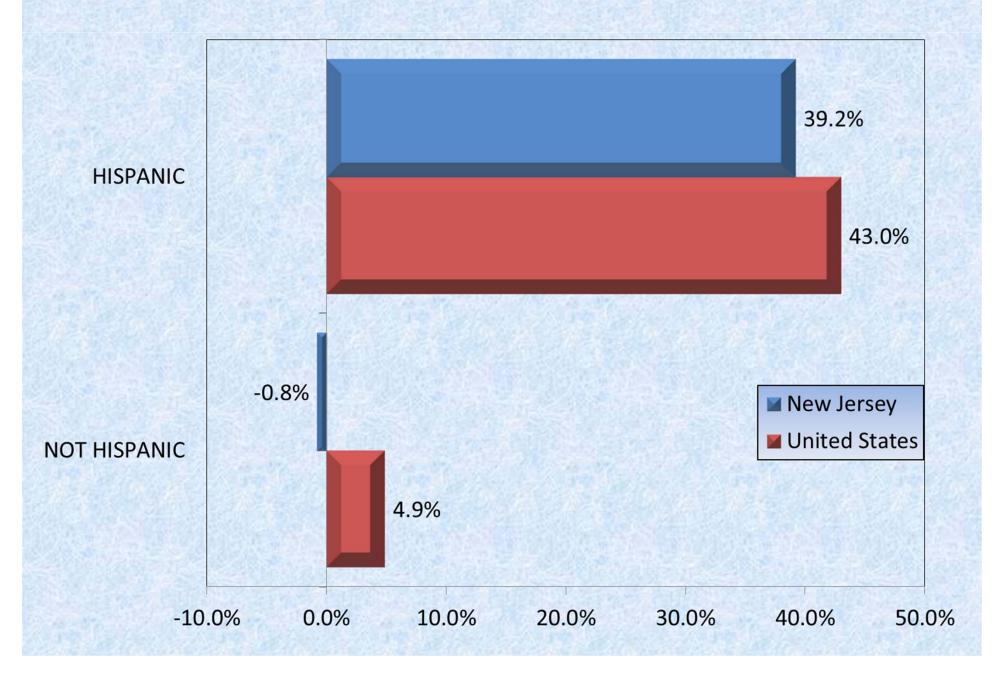

New Jersey Race & Ethnicity: White

- White population declined somewhat (-75,457 or -1.2%) from 2000 to 2010
- Substantial declines in Bergen (-42,533), Middlesex (-25,709) and Camden (-25,367) counties
- White Population did increase in 11 counties
 - Ocean county had highest net increase with 49,186
- Proportion of non-Hispanic whites in New Jersey declined to 59.3% in 2010 from 66.0% in 2000 and 74.0% in 1990



New Jersey Race & Ethnicity: Black or African American

- The Black or African American population grew faster than the total population (5.5% or 63,005)
 - Share of state population increased from 13.6% to 13.7%
- The largest increases in the Black population occurred in three counties: Burlington (+10,434), Middlesex (+9,995) and Union (+9,720)
 - Together, these three counties accounted for 48% of the state's total black population increase
- Black population did decrease in six counties
 - Atlantic, Cape May, Essex, Monmouth, Passaic, Salem
 - Despite losing 6,845 Black residents, Essex County still had the highest number (320,479) and highest proportion (40.7%) of Black residents in the state



New Jersey Race & Ethnicity: Asians

- Increased by 51.1% (245,450) between 2000 and 2010 to 725,726
- Share of state's population rose from 5.9% in 2000 to 8.3% in 2010
- More than one in every two (53.7%) New Jersey Asians were concentrated in just three counties in 2010 — Middlesex (173,293), Bergen (131,329) and Hudson (84,924)
- Growth rate ranged from 21.6 % in Essex County to 115.2% in Warren county
- Asians were the largest minority group in Bergen, Middlesex and Somerset counties
- In Middlesex county Asians also outnumber the Hispanic population



New Jersey Race & Ethnicity: Asians

- Recently released 2010 Census Demographic Profile data shows:
- Asian was the fastest growing race in New Jersey
 - Asian Indian was the state's fastest growing Asian group: +73%
 - Japanese was the only Asian group to experience a decline in 2010 -10%
 - Chinese, Filipino and Korean were second, third and fourth largest
 Asian groups in 2010
 - Nationally, Asian Indians grew +69% and number of Japanese also declined by -4%
 - Nationally, Chinese was still the largest Asian group followed by Asian Indians and Filipinos.



New Jersey Race & Ethnicity: Asians

- Recently released 2010 Census Demographic Profile data shows:
- Asian Indian
 - Number of Asian Indians more than doubled in six counties
 - Middlesex (+49,825), Hudson (+16,750), Somerset (+11,558) and Bergen (+7,111) had largest numeric gains and accounted for almost two-thirds (64.5%) of state's total Asian Indian population

Chinese

- Chinese population increased in every county ranging from 11% in Monmouth County to 104% in Salem County (small base)
- Middlesex County had the largest numeric gain of Chinese (+6,493)
- More than two-thirds of Chinese reside in six counties (Middlesex, Bergen, Somerset, Morris, Hudson and Monmouth)

New Jersey Race & Ethnicity

- The American Indian and Alaska Native population grew substantially (48.9%) in New Jersey but from a very small base
- Sixty percent of New Jersey's American Indian and Alaska Native population reside in Hudson, Passaic, Essex, Middlesex, Union, and Bergen counties
- Very few Native Hawaiians and other Pacific Islanders resided in New Jersey
 - Population declined from 3,329 in 2000 to 3,043 in 2010



- The Number of Hispanics increased substantially in New Jersey
 - Increased by 39.2% from 2000 to 2010
 - Represent 17.7% of the state's population in 2010, up from 13.3% in 2000
 - State's net gain of 437,953 Hispanics greater than its total population increase of 377,544
- More than two-thirds of the state's Hispanic Population resided in six counties.
 - Hudson and Passaic counties continued to have the largest number and proportion of Hispanics in their population: 42.2% and 37.0%
 - Essex, Middlesex, Union and Bergen counties also had a large number of Hispanics (more than 100,000) residing in each county.
 - These six counties account for 67.7% of NJ's total Hispanic population



- Recently released 2010 Census Demographic Profile data shows:
- Hispanic population from 2000 to 2010 soared:
 - Led by 111% increase in the Mexican population
 - Cuban population increased 7.8% reversing decline of last two decades
 - Puerto Rican remained largest Hispanic group (27.9% of Hispanics in NJ)
 - Mexican is the largest Hispanic group nationally accounting for 58.5% of Hispanics in 2010



- Recently released 2010 Census Demographic Profile data shows:
- Mexicans -Tripled in Cape May and Salem counties (from small bases)
 - The 65.7% growth of Mexican population in Passaic County was slowest among counties
 - Passaic, Middlesex, Monmouth and Hudson counties had largest Mexican population and accounted for 48% of the state's Mexican population
- Puerto Ricans increased in almost every county except Hudson
 - Their 98% growth in Gloucester and 91% growth in Warren were the fastest
 - Hudson, Essex, Middlesex, Camden and Passaic counties account for 55% of Hispanics in NJ



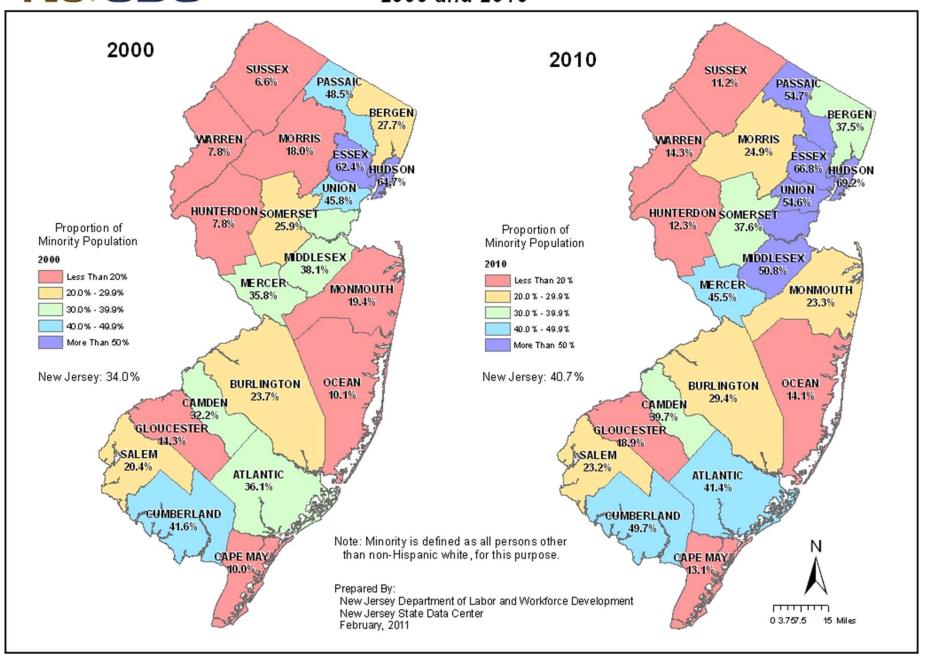

Cubans

- Cuban population increased in every county in New Jersey except Hudson between 2000 and 2010.
- Despite a 15% decline, Hudson County still had the highest Cuban population in the state (28,652)
- Hudson, Bergen and Union counties account for 62% of New Jersey's total Cuban population

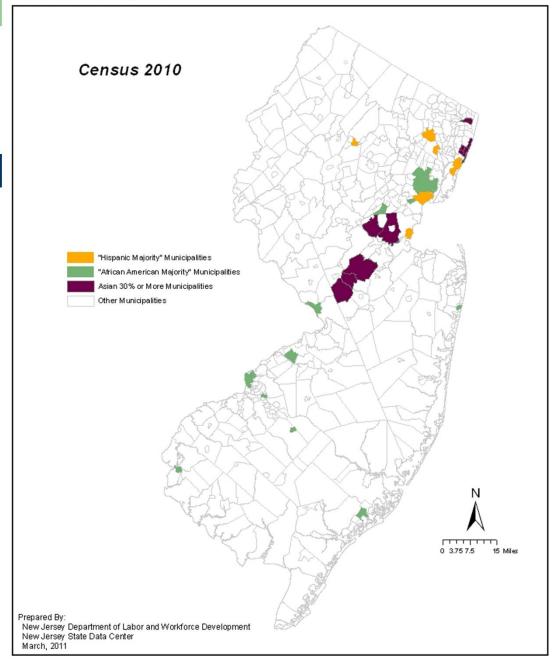


Proportion of Minority Population by County 2000 and 2010



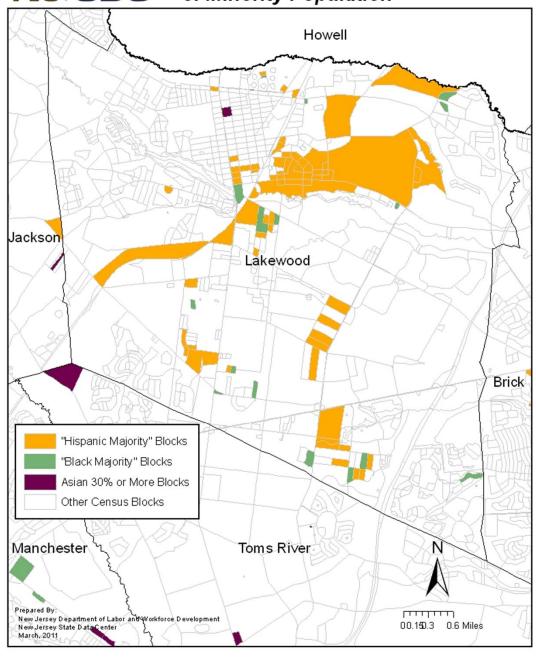


Municipalities with High Proportion of Minority Population





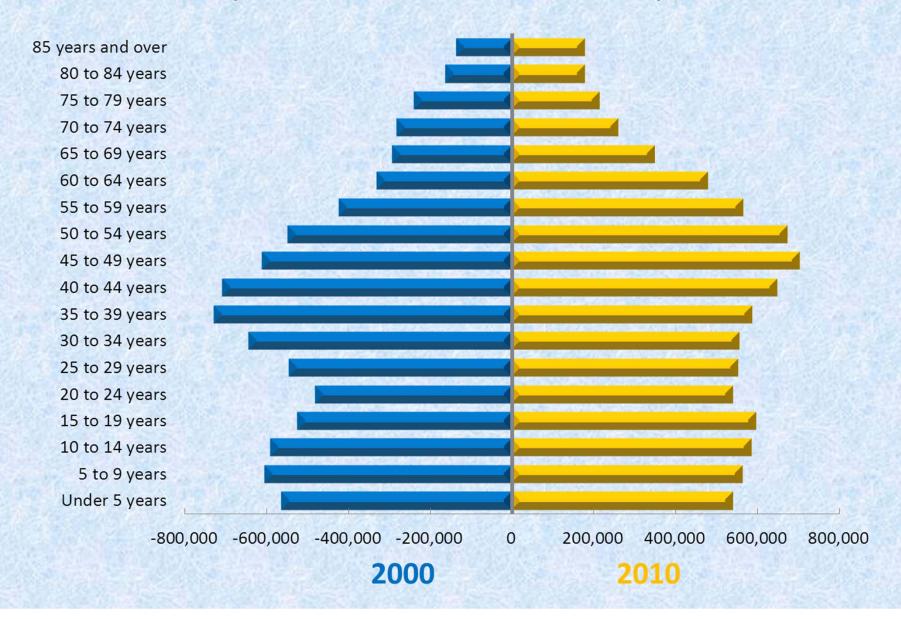
Census Blocks With High Proportion of Minority Population



Population by Age 2000 to 2010

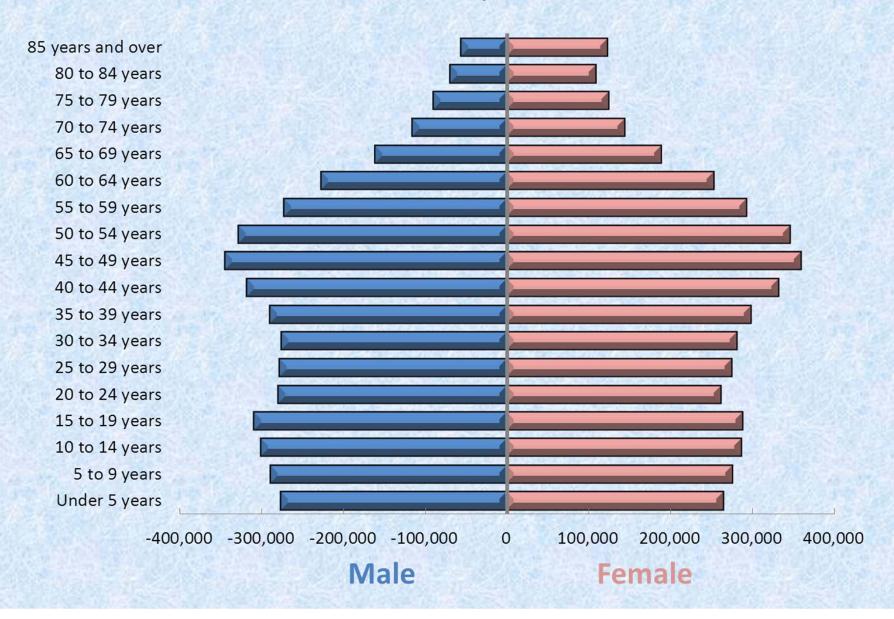

Demographic Profile: Age

 Population aged 65 and over grew faster than total population while the population under 18 in declined somewhat in New Jersey during the past decade:

- Cape May had largest percentage of persons aged 65 and over: 21.6%
 - Ocean County 21.0%
- Bergen and Ocean had the largest number of senior citizens
 - Bergen 137,103 Ocean 121,104
- Morris County added the most persons 65 and over: + 13,625
- Sussex County experienced the fastest growth: + 35.7% (from small base)



Demographic Profile: Age

- Median Age
 - NJ median age increased 2.3 years to 39.0 in 2010 from 36.7 in 2000
 - US median age increased 1.9 years from 35.3 in 2000 to 37.2 in 2010
- Cape May County continues to have highest median age

 Hunterdon 43.5
 Ocean 42.6

- Eleven counties had median ages over 40 in 2010 compared to only 2 counties in 2000 (Cape May and Ocean)
- Hudson County had the youngest median age
 - 34.2 in 2010 Up from 33.6 in 2000

Centenarians (People over 100 years Old)

- Recently released data from 2010 Census shows:
 - Population 100 years and over increased 16.8%
 - 1,514 in 2000 to 1,769 in 2010
 - 82.8% are Women
 - Largest Counties and Municipalities
 - Bergen (232), Essex (195) and Ocean (155)
 - Newark city and West Orange Township 33 in each
 - 217 Municipalities with no centenarians
 - Centenarian data only available decennially



Demographic Profile:Housing Units and Vacancy Rates

Total housing units increased 243,287 to 3.55 million in NJ in 2010

- NJ growth rate 7.3% over the decade compared to 13.6% nationally
- Hudson County added the most housing over the decade: +29,714
 - Ocean County closely followed +29,341
- Gloucester County had the fastest growth rate of housing units: 15.5%
- Housing vacancy rate increased in NJ from 7.4% in 2000 to 9.5% in 2010
 - Vacancy rates increased in all counties except Camden (-0.2%) and Cumberland (0.0%)
 - Highest vacancy rate increases among counties from 2000 to 2010
 - Cape May from 53.7% to 58.5% seasonal housing
 - Hudson from 4.2% to 8.8%



Demographic Profile:Household Size and Home Ownership

- New Jersey's average household size of occupied units was 2.68 persons in 2010, unchanged from 2000
 - Nationally, average household size was 2.59 in 2000 and 2.58 in 2010
 - NJ's average household size ranged from 2.32 in Cape May county to 2.94 in Passaic county

Demographic Profile:Household Size and Home Ownership

- Out of 3.2 million occupied housing units in 2010, 65.4% or 2.1 million were occupied by owners and 34.6% or 1.1 million were occupied by renters
 - NJ homeownership rate declined from 65.6% in 2000 to 65.4% in 2010
 - Nationally, this rate declined faster from 66.2% to 65.1% over same period
 - NJ homeownership rate declined in 13 counties led by Ocean County (-2.1%)
 - Sussex (84.3%) and Hunterdon (83.9%) highest ownership rates
 - Hudson (32.1%) and Essex (45.2%) lowest ownership rates in NJ



Demographic Profile:Household Characteristics

- Non-family households grew substantially faster than family households (8.5% vs. 3.3%) between 2000 and 2010 in NJ
 - Less than national growth rate for non-family (16.3%), and family (8.0%)
- Gloucester (20.9%), Hunterdon (18.2%), and Sussex (17.3%) counties led state in non-family household growth
 - Non-family households grew slowest in Cape May County (0.6%)



Demographic Profile: Household Characteristics

- Unmarried-partner households grew by 25.8%
 - 151,318 in 2000 to 190,283 in 2010
 - 5.9% of the state's total households, up from 4.9% in 2000
 - 12.7% were same-sex partner households
- Cumberland County had highest percentage of unmarried partner households (9.1%) while Bergen County had the lowest percentage of unmarried partner households (4.2%)



Demographic Profile: Household Characteristics

- Families headed by women with no husband present increased 10.9%
 - Married couple families only grew 0.3% between 2000 and 2010
 - Nationally female headed households grew 18.2% vs. married couple families 3.7% growth
- Female headed households had fastest growth in Somerset (24.1%) and Gloucester (22.4%) counties
 - Proportion of female headed households relatively low in these counties
 - Married couple households declined in nine counties (led by -7.4% in Cape May)



Demographic ProfileGroup Quarters

- Group Quarters Two Categories
 - Institutionalized: includes correctional facilities for adults, juvenile facilities, nursing facilities/skilled nursing facilities, and other institutional facilities
 - Non-institutionalized: includes college/university student housing, military quarters and other non-institutional facilities



Demographic ProfileGroup Quarters

- Total GQ population in New Jersey was 186,876 in 2010
 - Represented a -4.1% decline from 2000
- Institutionalized GQ population fell to 100,621 (-8.7%)
- Non-Institutionalized GQ population grew 1.9% to 86,255
- Middlesex, Essex and Mercer Counties led the state in group quarters population
 - Middlesex (15,811) and Mercer (12,740) large college campuses within non-institutionalized population
 - Essex largest institutionalized population (12,126)
 - All three counties accounted for 36% of NJ's group quarters population
