1999 State and County Population Estimates by Age, Race, Sex and Hispanic Origin

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ccording to the 1990-1999 state and county population estimates by age, race, sex and Hispanic origin recently released by the US Bureau of the Census, the number of Hispanics, Asians and Pacific Islanders increased substantially in New Jersey during the last decade. The estimates also indicated that from 1990 to 1999, school-age children (5-17 years old) and the 45-64 age group were the fastest growing age groups in the state.

Hispanics accounted for 71 percent of the state's total population growth.

Persons of Hispanic origin (or Latinos) increased by 279,540 in New Jersey from 747,737 in 1990 to 1,027,277 in 1999. They accounted for approximately 71 percent of New Jersey=s total population growth during the nine-year period. Their 37.4 percent growth rate far outpaced their non-Hispanic counterpart's 1.7 percent growth rate. They represented 12.6 percent of the state's total population in 1999, up from 9.7 percent in 1990. Only six other states (California, Texas, New York, Florida, Illinois and Arizona) had more Hispanic residents than New Jersey according to the 1999 estimates.

Asian and Pacific Islander are the fastest growing racial group.

With a hefty 69.5 percent increase from 1990 to 1999, Asians and Pacific Islanders were the fastest growing racial group in the state during the 1990s æ a continuation of the 1980s trend. With a population of 469,435, New Jersey ranked 5th nationally in terms of Asian and Pacific Islander population, behind only California, New York, Hawaii and Texas. In addition, at 5.8 percent of its total population, New Jersey had the highest proportion of Asians and Pacific Islanders outside the nation's West Coast. Only three western states (Hawaii 63.6%, California 12.2%, Washington 6.0%) had higher proportions of Asians and Pacific Islanders as of 1999.

New Jersey's black population ranked 13th nationally.

New Jersey replaced Pennsylvania's 13th place ranking in the nation in the number of blacks (or African Americans) in 1998. In 1990, New Jersey's black population ranked 14th nationally. New Jersey maintained its 13th rank place in 1999 with 1,197,430 black residents. From 1990 to 1999, the state added 120,311 (or 11.2%)

black residents. Consequently the proportion of blacks in the state's total population increased from 13.9 percent to 14.7 percent during the 1990-1999 period.

American Indians also grew substantially in New Jersey.

The American Indian and Alaska Native population also grew substantially (+42.3%) in New Jersey from 1990 to a 1999 level of 22,625. However, New Jersey ranked 24th nationally, and this racial group accounted for only 0.3 percent of the state's total residents.

New Jersey had a net loss of non-Hispanic white population.

The growth of the Hispanic white population from 1990 to 1999 (234,152 or 35.9%) in New Jersey was offset by a net loss of 157,932 (-2.8%) non-Hispanic white residents. As a result, the state's total white population (both non-Hispanic and Hispanic) increased a scant 1.2 percent in the last decade. However, New Jersey at 6,453,922 still had the 9th highest white population among the nation's 50 states, as of 1999, unchanged from its 1990's ranking. This matched its total population ranking.

New Jerseyan's median age was 37 years in 1999.

The graying of the *baby boomers*² was reflected in the substantial growth of the state's 45-64 age group (17.4% growth from 1990 to 1999). It also elevated the median age of New Jersey residents to 37.0 years in 1999, from 34.3 years in 1990. The hefty growth of the elderly (persons 65 years old and over) in the 1980s has slowed down in this decade due to low birth rates experienced during the Great Depression years of the 1930s. However, their 8.1 percent increase was still substantially higher than their under-65 counterpart's 4.6 percent growth during the last decade. Similar to the national trend, the oldest age group (85 years and over) was the fastest growing group. This group grew by 43.1 percent in New Jersey and 38.1 percent in the nation from 1990 to 1999. The 75-84 age group also grow rapidly (+22.8% in New Jersey and +21.3% in the nation) while the number of young-elderly (65-74 years old) declined somewhat in New Jersey (-5.1%) and increased nominally (+0.9%) in the nation as a whole during the 1990s.

School-age children continued to grow.

Fueled by a mass influx of the *baby boom echo* generation,³ the number of school-age children (5-17 years old) has continued to grow in New Jersey (+15% from 1990 to 1999). Nationally, this age group also grew substantially (+13.5% from 1990 to 1999). After reaching its peak in 1994, the number of preschoolers (under age 5) gradually decreased between 1994 and 1999, reflecting the gradual declining number of women in their child-bearing ages.

White population grew fast in Somerset County.

Somerset County led the state's white population growth with a 14.5 percent increase from 1990 to 1999, followed by Hunterdon County's 14.2 percent and Ocean County's 13.3 percent. Ocean County gained more white residents (+55,278) than any other county in the state. In contrast, nine New Jersey counties experienced a net loss of white population from 1990 to 1999. Essex County had the largest decline of white residents (-43,104 or -10%) in the state during the period. The nation's top 100 counties (ranked by 1999 white residents) included five New Jersey counties — Bergen(45th), Middlesex (65th), Monmouth (73rd), Ocean (84th), and Morris (99th).

African Americans increased substantially in Burlington, Monmouth and Camden.

Substantial increases (more than 12,000) in black (or African American) population were found in three counties from 1990 to 1999: Burlington (+12,612), Monmouth (+12,500) and Camden (+12,069). Essex County still had the highest proportion of black residents (43.3%) in the state as of 1999, while the proportion of blacks in Sussex County was still the lowest (1.1%). Five New Jersey counties were

among the nation's top 100 counties in terms of black residents: Essex (17^{th}), Union (62^{nd}), Camden (69^{th}), Passaic (76^{th}) and Hudson (86^{th}). Together, these five counties accounted for 58.7 percent of the state's black population as of 1999.

Passaic County had the highest number of American Indian population.

With the highest number of American Indian and Alaska Native population (2,498) in New Jersey, Passaic County ranked the 200th among the nation's 3,142 counties. Cumberland County, on the other hand, had the highest proportion (1.3%) of American Indian and Alaska Native residents in the state as of 1999. During the 1990-1999 period, the American Indian and Alaska Native population increased at a substantial rate in every New Jersey county albeit from a small base.

Asian and Pacific Islander population was concentrated in three counties.

Almost one of every two (48.3%) New Jersey's Asians and Pacific Islanders resided in just three counties — Bergen (94,295), Middlesex (77,712) and Hudson (54,744) as of 1999. The Asian and Pacific Islander population grew fast (between 45.2% and 106.6%) in every New Jersey county during the 1990s. This group accounted for more than 10 percent of the total number of residents in both Bergen (11.0%) and Middlesex (10.8%) counties. Ten New Jersey counties were among the nation's top 100 in the number of Asians and Pacific Islanders — Bergen (19th), Middlesex (26th), Hudson (35th), Essex (53rd), Morris (56th), Monmouth (64th), Union (77th), Somerset (79th), Camden (84th) and Passaic (86th) in 1999.

Hudson and Passaic gained more Hispanics than any other county.

Hudson County (+44,752) and Passaic County (+37,834) gained more Hispanics (or Latino) population during the 1990s than any other county in New Jersey.

These two counties also had the highest proportion of Hispanic residents (41.3% and 29.6%, respectively) in the state as of 1999. Together, they accounted for 36.2 percent of the statess total Hispanic resident population. Hudson and Passaic county's

Hispanic population ranked 25th and 39th nationally. The number of Hispanics in five other New Jersey counties were also on the nation's top 100 list: Essex (45th), Union (55th), Middlesex (60th), Bergen (67th) and Camden (92nd).

More than one in every five residents in Ocean and Cape May counties were senior citizens

Two coastal counties — Ocean (22.8%) and Cape May (20.4%) continued to have the highest proportion of elderly (persons 65 years old and over) residents in the state. In contrast, Sussex County (9.0%) and Hunterdon County (10.0%) had the smallest percentage of seniors in the state. The number of senior citizens increased in all counties except Essex (-5,406), Hudson (-2,054) and Union (-524) during the 1990s. Middlesex (+14,368), Ocean (+13,375), Burlington (+13,118) and Morris (+10,464) counties gained the most elderly residents between 1990 and 1999. An analysis of the 1999 total population and elderly population by county was published in the April 2000 issue of the *New Jersey Economic Indicators* (pages 10-16).

School-age children increased substantially in all counties

The aged 5-17 group grew in every New Jersey county including those with total population decline during the 1990s (Essex, Salem and Hudson). Somerset County had the highest growth rate of school-age children (31.2%) in the state.

However, Monmouth (+20,237), Ocean (+19,589), Middlesex (+17289) and Bergen (+15,248) added more 5-17 years old residents than other counties during the 1990s. As of 1999, more than one in every five residents was school-age children in five New Jersey counties — Sussex (21.3%), Gloucester (21.0%), Camden (20.6%), Cumberland (20.4%) and Salem (20.4%).
