Logistics Hub: New Jersey's Leading Role in Warehousing

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
New Jersey is a renowned warehousing hub and a crucial component in the regional and national supply chain. Key assets include the largest international port on the East Coast, a major cargo airport, access to the national freight rail system, five Foreign Trade Zones¹, and 39,000 miles of public roadways. This sector provides an ample amount of opportunity, employing 85,900 workers, who ensure the proper handling, storage, and transportation of consumer and industrial goods.

New Jersey's Warehouses



The map illustrates how New Jersey's highway system and rail lines support the warehousing sector. Easy access to major transportation routes to deliver goods domestically and a connection to the world marketplace through our ports makes the state an ideal location for warehousing operations.

Warehousing & Storage Employment



New Jersey's warehousing and storage employment has increased by 51.9% since 2018. The state ranked second in the Middle Atlantic Region, following Pennsylvania (33,971 jobs added) for the number of jobs added during this period.

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Information gathered from online job ads indicates that the most sought-after skills by employers include order picking and lifting ability, in addition to interpersonal communication skills. Common certifications and credentials valued by employers over the past year include Forklift Certification, a valid driver's license, CDL Class A and B licenses, Transportation Worker Identification Credential (TWIC) Card, Hazardous Material Certification, and Pallet Jack Certification.

In Fiscal Year 2024, NJDOL has invested \$725,000 through the UPSKILL: NJ Incumbent Worker Training Grant program to help employers keep their workforce updated with new and emerging skills in the warehousing industry. ¹A Foreign Trade Zone is a designated area where merchandise and components can be imported and stored, assembled and exported duty free. Customs taxes are only due on any goods that are distributed within the US.

²A TEU or Twenty-foot Equivalent Unit is a measurement used to determine cargo capacity of container ships and terminals. It is based on the size of a shipping container.
