KEEPING LSRPs INFORMED

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The Next LSRP Licensing Exam Will Be Held on October 14, 2026

The next LSRP Licensing Exam will be held on Wednesday, October 14, 2026. Applications from those interested in applying to be Licensed Site Remediation Professionals are due to the Board by Friday, July 31, 2026. Current LSRPs are especially encouraged to share this information with anyone who might be interested in becoming an LSRP.

In order to qualify to take the LSRP Licensing Exam, candidates must demonstrate that they meet the minimum college degree requirements (a bachelor's degree in natural, chemical, or physical science or an engineering degree in a discipline related to site remediation) and have full-time professional experience in the field of site remediation amounting to 8 years. Experience must include 5000 hours of relevant professional experience within New Jersey over the 5 years immediately prior to submitting the application. Applicants must also have completed environmental health and safety training within one year prior to submitting the application, and have completed the required Case Study Training course (<https://cpe.rutgers.edu/environmental/lrsp-case-study-next-generation>) within 36 months prior to submitting the application. The applicant cannot have had a professional license revoked within 10 years prior to submitting the application, or have been convicted of a crime. Applicants that the Board finds qualify for the license will be approved to take the LSRP Licensing Exam on October 14, 2026. Applicants must take and pass the exam to be granted a license. Advice from DEP

The SRPL Board asked DEP employees if they have any advice for LSRPs to help remediations run more smoothly.

Here are some tips they provided:

1. Do not ignore Regulatory Timeframes! Too many LSRPs don't pay attention to RTFs and don't take any action until the Mandatory Timeframe. The Person Responsible for Conducting Remediation is relying on the LSRP to make sure timeframes are met. Notifications are required by N.J.A.C. 7:26I-6.8(b) and (c) – don't forget to make them!
2. Check DEP's Data Miner frequently for timeframes by running the Case Tracking Tool! [NJDEP New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection \(DataMiner\)](#) If any of the timeframes do not look correct, contact the DEP. It is better to be pro-active than reactive. BEI's phone number for such inquiries is 609-633-1480.
3. Pay attention to what you are retained for. Review your LSRP Comprehensive Report on Data Miner and dismiss where appropriate. Even if a client is not paying the LSRP, if the LSRP has not dismissed he or she is still responsible for advising the client and Department of timeframes.
4. When proposing new dates in an adjusted direct oversight Administrative Consent Order be sure the estimated cost of the remediation meshes with the amount of time requested for submittal of the key documents.
5. Respond to the DEP! If a DEP employee asks you questions or requests further information, do not put off responding. If you need more time, inform the DEP employee that you are looking into the matter and provide a proposed date for your response.
