New facility slated for 177th Fighter Wing



On Saturday, Dec. 12, at 10 a.m., Maj. Gen. Glenn K. Rieth, The Adjutant General of New Jersey; the New Jersey Air National Guard and the 177th Fighter Wing will host Congressman Frank LoBiondo, 2nd District of New Jersey, at a groundbreaking ceremony for the Operations and Training Facility. The \$8.4 million, 21,400 square foot, state-of-the-art facility will support the Wing's mission in the Overseas Contingency Operation by housing the Wing Commander and Staff, Public Affairs, Wing Safety, Mission Support Group Commander and Staff, Judge Advocate, Accounting and Finance, Comptroller, Wing Plans, Chaplain, Forces Support Squadron, Equal Opportunity, Family Support and Recruiting. The facility was designed by Burns and McDonnell located in East Hanover and will be built by Sambe Construction Company, Inc., of Pennsauken. Construction will take approximately 15 months and is expected to be completed in January of 2011.

DMAVA Green

As the holidays get closer and closer, we often get more and more frantic on finding ways to decorate our homes without spending even more money. Here are a few green ways to decorate without plunking down the green!

Those little tea light candles that come in small metal cups keep the candle wax from messing up the container, but they aren't very pretty. Place them in old tea cups, colored glasses, a bowl of marbles or shells, even in a row of coffee mugs lined on a shelf - they will create an ambiance little money and no mess.

Looking for some luminaries to light up your sidewalk or porch? Paper bag luminaries can blow over in a wind, even with sand in them. For sturdier, longer lasting luminaries, dig through your recycling bin for cans - string beans from last night's dinner, for instance - and take the label off the can. Fill the can with water and place in the freezer until the water is frozen solid. With various size nails and a hammer, hammer holes in the can to create a design or simply an abstract look. Let the ice melt, dry the can and you have a luminary for a tea light or votive candle.

For a low cost wreath for the front door, take a wire hanger and clip off the hook. Shape the rest of the hanger in a circular shape and then wrap it in masking tape to make it stronger. Cover the form with cuttings from trees and bushes in your yard - 7 inches is a good length - and fasten onto the form with those twist ties from bread bags or trash bags. Decorate with bows, leftover tree decorations, old cookie cutters, etc.

If you have some old Christmas tree balls that are losing their spirit and some kids that have too much spirit, why not join the two for an hour or so of crafting? Spread the table with old newspapers or a plastic tablecloth and give the kids paints, glue, sequins, beads, old jewelry, buttons, and other small pieces. Let them paint and glue to make the balls pretty again.

NORAD tracking Santa for kids of all ages this year

PETERSON AIR FORCE BASE, Colo., Dec. 9, 2009 - North American Aerospace Defense Command officials are getting ready to track Santa Claus.

The "NORAD Tracks Santa" Web site, http://www.noradsanta.org, features holiday games and activities that change daily.

The site is available in seven languages: English, French, German, Italian, Japanese, Spanish and Chinese. On Dec. 24, the Web site will stream videos, captured by NORAD "Santa Cams," from numerous cities along Santa's journey.

This year, children and the young-at-heart are able to track Santa through Facebook, Twitter, YouTube, Flickr, and TroopTube. mil. To follow on any of these Web sites, type in @noradsanta into the site's search engine and start your tracking.

New this year, OnStar is providing its subscribers with live Santa updates as they travel in their vehicles on Christmas Eve. Subscribers simply push the blue OnStar button to get status reports on Santa's whereabouts.

Also new and beginning at midnight MST on Dec. 24, visitors to the "NORAD Tracks Santa" Web site can watch Santa as he prepares his sleigh, checks his list, and goes through all his preparations to ensure he has a successful journey. As soon as Santa takes off from the North Pole, children can track him with up-to-the-minute Google Maps and Google Earth reports.

Santa trackers will begin answering phones and replying to e-mail at 4 a.m. MST on Christmas Eve. Children of all ages can call 877-Hi-NORAD (877-446-6723) toll-free, or can send an e-mail to noradtrackssanta@gmail.com. NORAD tracks Santa with help from many corporate partners. Booz Allen Hamilton designed the Web site.

Other sponsors include Verizon, which donated the toll-free number; Time Warner, Avaya and PCI providing communications engineering; and OnStar, 5 Star Bank, Pepsi Distributing and First

Choice Awards and Gifts keeping the trackers happy with food, beverages and souvenir tracking pins.



The program began Dec. 24, 1955, when a child dialed a

phone number that was misprinted in a newspaper advertisement and reached the Continental Air Defense Command Operations Center in Colorado Springs, Colo. The commander at Cheyenne Mountain Air Force Station who answered the phone that night gave the youngster the information requested: Santa's whereabouts. This began the tradition of tracking Santa, a tradition that was carried on by NORAD when it was formed in 1958.

The program has grown immensely since it first was presented on the Internet in 1998. The Web site receives millions of unique visitors from hundreds of countries and territories around the world. In addition, its operations center will be occupied for 25 hours with more than 1,200 volunteers on Christmas Eve, who will be receiving hundreds of thousands phone calls and e-mails from families around the world.

NGB looking for officers to participate in Senate Youth Program in March

The National Guard Bureau is looking for military officers (O-I through O-4) to be Mentors for the 2010 Senate Youth Program. The program, instituted in 1962 by U.S. Senate Resolution and held annually in Washington, DC, is designed to give the nation's top-rated high school seniors a working knowledge of American politics through personal interaction with high-level government agencies and officials. Military Mentors serve as counselors, facilitators and role models for the 104 students (two from each state and territory), giving them a better understanding of defense missions, personnel and lifestyle. Military Mentor officers who are selected must be on Permissive TDY or leave status for the duration of the program to include two days of pre-program training. Inclusive dates of the program are March 4-13, 2010 (Senior and Assistant Senior Mentor Officers will be required to attend three additional days of training beginning on March 1.)

The Hearst Foundation, which sponsors the program, will pay for lodging, meals, and incidental costs such as laundry and drycleaning. Officers who have participated in the past are eligible and encouraged to participate in the 2010 program (provided they are O-I thru O-4). The volunteer Military Mentors are responsible for their own transportation costs to get to Washington, DC.
