Key Congressional staffers hear DMAVA priorities

The New Jersey National Guard and state Department of Military and Veterans Affairs have a reputation for finding innovative solutions to budget constraints.

But Maj. Gen. Glenn K. Rieth, the Adjutant General, told a group of two dozen key staff members from New Jersey's Congressional Delegation on Wednesday that continued support from the federal government will be critical for the Guard and Department to meet future objectives.

Rieth and other top Guard and DMAVA leaders brought the Congressional staff members to New Jersey for a three-day visit this week to familiarize them with the top six federal Legislative priorities for the department.

"We want you to leave here as subject matter experts to go back and talk to your bosses with a better understanding of what we need to continue to achieve success," Rieth said.

The Legislative priorities include money to achieve or continue three vital military missions and three veterans-service objectives.

The military items are \$4 million to consolidate the United States Property and Fiscal Office on DMAVA's Lawrenceville Campus to increase efficiencies; support for an Army Guard proposal to create an Unmanned Aviation Center of Excellence in Warren Grove; and next-generation aircraft for both the Air Guard's 177th Fighter Wing and the 108th Wing. Failure to obtain the new aircraft over the next decade could place the future of both units in jeopardy.

The veteran items are an increase to the current \$300 federal Plot Interment Allowance (PIA); creation of a PIA for the burial

of eligible dependents and approximately \$2.5 million to allow DMAVA to comply with federal health records requirements at the three Veterans' Memorial Homes, a measure that will also improve patient care.

As part of the visit, the staffers took part in a whirlwind tour of key installations, including the Lawrenceville Campus, Joint Base McGuire-Dix-Lakehurst, the 177th Fighter Wing, and Picatinny Arsenal. Transportation from Washington, D.C. was provided by the 108th Wing's KC-135 refuelers and in-state transportation was Army Guard UH-60 Blackhawk helicopters.

Military Appreciation, family fun weekend at Ringoes, July 10-11

RINGOES, NJ - On July 10-11, the Black River Railroad Historical Trust (BRRHT) will host its annual Military Appreciation and Railroad Days event. This family-oriented special event will offer the public an in-depth look at Hunterdon County's railroad heritage through special train and caboose rides, interactive displays, and guided tours from railroad volunteers. Filing claims with VA made easier, faster for veterans

WASHINGTON - As part of Secretary of Veterans Affairs Eric K. Shinseki's effort to break the back of the backlog, the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) is reducing the paperwork and expediting the process for Veterans seeking compensation for disabilities related to their military service.

VA has shortened application forms to reduce paperwork for Veterans. The new forms, which are being made available on VA's Web site at www.va.gov/vaforms, include:

* A shortened VA Form 21-526 for Veterans applying for the first-time to VA for disability compensation or pension benefits. This form has been cut in half - from 23 to 10 pages. It is immediately available to Veterans via Web download, and will be available through VA's online claim-filing process later this summer at <http://vabenefits.vba.va.gov/vonapp/main.asp>

* VA Form 21-526b for Veterans seeking increased benefits for conditions already determined by VA to be service-connected. This new form more clearly describes the information needed to support claims for increased benefits.

In order to make the claims process faster, VA has also introduced two new forms for Veterans participating in the Department's new fully developed claim (FDC) program, which is one of the fastest means to receive a claims decision.

Gathering the information and evidence needed to support a Veteran's disability claim often takes the largest portion of the processing time.

If VA receives all of the available evidence when the claim is submitted, the remaining steps in the claims-decision process can be expedited without compromising quality.

To participate in the FDC program, Veterans should complete and submit an FDC Certification and VA Form 21-526EZ, "Fully Developed Claim (Compensation)," for a compensation claim, or a VA Form 21-527EZ, "Fully Developed Claim (Pension)," for a pension claim.

Along with the application and certification, Veterans must also submit all relevant and pertinent evidence to "fully develop" their claims. A claim submitted as "fully developed" may still require some additional evidence to be obtained by VA, to include certain federal records and a VA medical examination.

Disability compensation is a tax-free benefit paid to a Veteran for disabilities that are a result of -- or made worse by -- injuries or diseases that happened while on active duty, active duty for training or inactive duty training. Pension is a benefit paid to war-time Veterans with limited income, and who are permanently and totally disabled or age 65 or older.

What can I recycle? That depends on where I live. Research tells me that I can recycle clean plastic types 1-7 in the city of Los Angeles in curbside bins, but where I live here in New Jersey, I am only permitted to recycle types 1 and 2 in my blue recycling buckets.

As I wander through recycling Web sites, I find that there is a number of kinds of cans that my family uses and tosses in the recycling bin; how can I tell the difference and are they all able to be recycled? Again, the local municipality has some say. They will tell you about the tin, steel, aluminum and bi-metal cans; just about all are recyclable. Some areas even want clean aluminum foil and foil dinner trays. How can I tell the difference between the types of cans? **Magnets do not stick to aluminum cans.**

When it comes to glass, the clear, brown and green glass bottles that come into a house are all ready for the blue bin, but need to be rinsed out first. But do not recycle the broken drinking glass or window pane. Those go into the trash can. It is good to wrap them in newspaper so anyone handling the bag doesn't get cut from the jagged pieces. Also, light bulbs -- particularly fluorescent bulbs which contain mercury and must be disposed of during those special hazardous waste days -- cannot be recycled.

Most paper can be recycled. Some communities have Single Stream Recycling, which means residents can mix all their recycling -- plastic, paper and glass -- in one container. Paper that has been contaminated with food, waxed paper, waxed cardboard milk and juice containers, oil-soaked paper, carbon paper, sanitary products or tissues, thermal fax paper, stickers and plastic laminated paper such as fast food wrappers, juice boxes and pet food bags cannot be recycled.

Simple rules to follow and everyone and the environment can benefit.

Veterans' medallion for headstones is available

WASHINGTON (June 29, 2010) - Secretary of Veterans Affairs Eric Shinseki announced today that the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) is offering bronze medallions to attach to existing, privately purchased headstones or markers, signifying a deceased's status as a Veteran.

"For Veterans not buried in a national or state Veterans cemetery, or those without a government grave marker, VA is pleased to offer this option that highlights their service and sacrifices for our country," said Secretary Shinseki.

The new item can be furnished instead of a traditional government headstone or marker for Veterans whose death occurred on or after Nov. 1, 1990, and whose grave in a private cemetery is marked with a privately purchased headstone or marker.

Under federal law, eligible Veterans buried in a private cemetery are entitled to either a government-furnished grave marker or the new medallion, but not both. Veterans buried in a national or state Veterans cemetery will receive a government headstone or marker of the standard design authorized at that cemetery.

The medallion is available in three sizes: 5 inches, 3 inches and 1 ½ inches in width. Each bronze medallion features the image of a folded burial flag adorned with laurels and is inscribed with the word "Veteran" at the top and the branch of service at the bottom.

Next of kin will receive the medallion, along with a kit that will allow the family or the staff of a private cemetery to affix the medallion to a headstone, grave marker, mausoleum or columbarium niche cover.

VA is currently developing an application form for ordering the medallion. Until it is available, applicants may use the form for ordering government headstones and markers, VA Form 40-1330. Instructions on how to apply for a medallion are found on the VA Web site at www.cem.va.gov/hm_hm.asp.

Veterans with a discharge issued under conditions other than dishonorable, their spouses and eligible dependent children can be buried in a VA national cemetery. Other burial benefits available for all eligible Veterans, regardless of whether they are buried in a national cemetery or a private cemetery, include a burial flag, a Presidential Memorial Certificate and a government headstone or grave marker.

The new medallions will be available only to Veterans buried in private cemeteries without a government headstone or marker. Families of eligible decedents may also order a memorial headstone or marker when remains are not available for interment.

Eligibility for the program is not income based. - Debtor-Creditor Law

Joint Base security forces offer tips for entering post

To increase efficiency at the entry points to Joint Base McGuire-Dix-Lakehurst, the installation security forces are issuing a reminder that a 100 percent identification check remains in effect.

For vehicle drivers, only the following forms of ID are accepted by the installation commander: DoD common access card; DD Form 1173, dependant ID; DD form 2, retired ID; DoD investigative services credential; AF Form 354, retired civilian employee ID; DD Form 2765, Uniform Service IDS and Privilege Card; Friends of JB MDL ID. All vehicle passengers over aged 18 must show a federal- or state-issued identification card. To apply for an ID card, visit any of the Joint Base Welcome Centers. Also, the window sticker known as the DD Form 2220 is not required for installation access, but can be issued by the welcome center.
