Airmen from Jersey adapt and overcome in Iraq

BAGHDAD – Here's a story about how some Airmen from New Jersey beat equipment woes, horrific weather and a seemingly impossible deadline to complete a mission in a war zone half a world away.

It all started on Friday, May 7 when word came down that the New Jersey Air National Guard's 447th Civil Engineer Squadron needed to move an aging trailer through the maze-like terrain on the grounds of Baghdad International Airport. They had 48 hours.

The team leapt into action. The structures shop worked into the night to prep the trailer for the move. The Engineering Assistants planned and marked roads as well as access and security points for the new location.

At 'o'darkthirty' the next morning, the rest of the task force

hit the trail, grading a road and moving a crane to hoist the trailer onto a flat bed truck. The morning turned to afternoon and the temperature climbed into the low 100's. Crews went to work with graders, a bulldozer and front loaders to smooth the route and a crane was moved in place to lift the trailer. Then the first snag hit. The trailer turned out to be far heavier than advertised and could not be safely moved. It would have taken several days to acquire a larger crane. But the team didn't have days.

In the can-do spirit of their New Jersey roots, Capt. Eric Balint and Chief Master Sgt. Tim Grover, the operation chiefs, started working up an alternate plan. With the help of Master Sgt. Pat Basnett, the team decided to try to convince an Army unit to give up a different trailer. While some members of the team went

Retirement workshops for PERS, TPAF members

The Division of Pensions and Benefits is offering Retirement Workshops to members of the PERS and TPAF who plan to retire between July 1, 2010 and January 1, 2011.

- Workshops are being held at the New Jersey Forensic Science Technology Center in Hamilton Township (Mercer County), N.J.

- Workshop times are at either 9 a.m. or 1 p.m. and are currently scheduled for June 4, 7, 11, 15, 18, 21, 25, and 30.

- Members interested in attending must register online using the link on the Division's Web site. Go to: www.state.nj.us/treasury/pensions and click the link for "Retirement Workshops". Seating is limited – additional dates may be added but cannot be guaranteed.

During the workshops, our representatives will take a step-by-step approach to explain topics that include retirement benefits, beneficiary options, group life insurance, the taxability of your pension, and health benefits in retirement.

If attending, members must print an Estimate of Retirement Benefits using the Member Benefits Online System (MBOS) and bring it to the workshop (retirement estimates will not be provided at the workshop). To register for MBOS go to: www.state.nj.us/treasury/pensions/mbosregister.shtml and follow the registration instructions. Estimates obtained from MBOS are the same estimates obtained when visiting the Division's offices and use identical salary and service information.

Due to the recent increase in retirement applications, members must use the online Retirement Application available in MBOS. Submitting the application through MBOS reduces the chance of any delays in receipt of your application and provides for the fastest processing. Please also note that paper retirement applications will not be available and will not be accepted at the workshops.

A recent order came in the mail and as I dug through to get everything, those little "peanuts" kept sticking to my clothes and the stuff I bought; they are enough to drive me crazy. But what do I do with them after I unpack the box? Can I recycle them?
Styrofoam® is also called expanded polystyrene (EPS) foam, a version of plastic #6. Even if your community accepts #6 in its recycling program, it may not accept EPS. Check your local community recycler to make sure what their rules are for recycling EPS.
Here are ways to recycle those packing peanuts and other forms of EPS.
There are various sites that take EPS or reuse packing peanuts. Visit the following site and plug in your address to find the nearest recycling/reusing center - www.earth911.com.
There is also a mail back program through the Alliance of Foam Packaging Recyclers. Check out their information at www.epspackaging.org/info.html.
Peanuts can be saved for your next package to someone – pass on the joy. Or you can donate them to your local shipping store or UPS. Where can you find a place to give your peanuts? Drop by www.loosefillpackaging.com/pages/why.htm or call 800-828-2214 (24 hours a day) to find a site near you that will reuse those pesky things.
With a little work and time, you can keep EPS out of the landfill where it takes up space and does not biodegrade.
New technology has created biodegradable packing materials that are plant based. It can be used as a fertilizer on your lawn – it breaks down into inert proteins when it mixes with water and soil bacteria eats the packing material.
Until then, when mailing packages – use crumpled newspaper; reuse your old packing and...

Vietnam Museum to host toy exhibit from an turbulent era

On June 12, at 1 p.m., the Vietnam Era Museum & Educational Center will host a discussion on *Dolls and Toys of the 1960s & 1970s* by N.J. collector and former Five and Dime store owner, Steven Stegman.

The discussion will highlight objects currently on display in the traveling exhibit, *Growing Up in the 1960s-70s: A Flash Back in Time*. The exhibit is a collection of over 50 toys from the 1960s-70s from The Toy Museum located in Brooklyn, N.Y. This exhibit will be on display at the Vietnam Era Museum & Educational Center in Holmdel, N.J through the end of August 2010. Educators who attend the lecture will receive Professional Development Credit hours.

Following the post-World War II economic boom, mass production of dolls and toys exploded in the Vietnam era. G.I. Joes were first produced in 1964 helping little boys act out their pride for their father's tour of duty. Barbie, who was popularized by Mattel in the 1960s, has remained youthful even after celebrating her 50th birthday last March. Other featured objects on display include Star Trek figures, Etch A Sketch, Trolls, Legos, Nerf balls, dollhouse furniture, teddy bears, and much more. Children and those young at heart will love learning about the toys from the past during one of America's most difficult decade.

to secure the new trailer, the rest of the crew began prepping the site for new trailer.

That night, fueled by the great heat of the day, torrential rains struck. It had been the worst rain of the year to that point and it was bad enough to undue all the painstaking prep work the new site.

One part of the team went back to work, redoing the prep work. The rest of the team set about moving the new trailer. Master Sgt. John Krzewski oversaw that part of the operation, ensuring both speed – and safety.

The trailer was moved without a hitch. But the team still had much to do and the clock was ticking.

Electricians went to work not just connecting, but upgrading the equipment in the trailer. HVAC put new units in place and wired them up. Structures performed a quick rehabilitation of the interior. First Sgt. "Broadway" Joe McKenna was moving vertical curtain walls from a storage area across the base to the work zone, where they would be finally positioned by forklifts. Several forklifts were borrowed from the Logistics squadron and crewed by trained but non-Heavy Equipment members of CE. This ballet went on for 14 hours, into darkness. The troops used every available form of illumination, including vehicle headlight.

By the time Security Forces had placed the concertina wire, 57 members of Civil Engineering had sacrificed their down-day, 1.5 linear miles of road were constructed, 300 concrete barriers were moved and placed, a security gate was fabricated and installed, furniture from the original office was moved into the new one, phones and computer systems were set up and the trailer was operational, waiting for it occupants the following morning.

All of this occurred without a single mishap or injury, under the eye of Lt. Col. Paul Novello, Commander of the 447 Expeditionary Civil Engineer Squadron and garnering the praise of the Base commander, Col. Bruce Taylor.

Joint Base security forces offer Tips for entering post

To increase efficiency at the entry points to Joint Base McGuire-Dix-Lakehurst, the installation security forces are issuing a reminder that a 100 percent identification check remains in effect.

For vehicle drivers, only the following forms of ID are accepted by the installation commander: DoD common access card; DD Form 1173, dependant ID; DD form 2, retired ID; DoD investigative services credential; AF Form 354, retired civilian employee ID; DD Form 2765, Uniform Service IDS and Privilege Card; Friends of JB MDL ID. All vehicle passengers over aged 18 must show a federal- or state-issued identification card. To apply for an ID card, visit any of the Joint Base Welcome Centers. Also, the window sticker known as the DD Form 2220 is not required for installation access, but can be issued by the welcome center.
