McGUIRE AIR FORCE BASE – Six months ago, family members of more than 60 airmen from the New Jersey Air National Guard's 108th Wing were overwhelmed with uncertainty, fear, and sadness as their husbands, wives, and children boarded a plane destined for combat. The tears of sadness transformed to tears of joy Sunday when the wing's Civil Engineering Squadron stepped off a plane, onto U.S. tarmac, and into the base's passenger terminal, where they were greeted by proud and relieved family members and friends.

The returning airmen were involved in critical construction projects throughout the Baghdad area during their six-month tour. But Sunday wasn't about war stories; it was about hugs, kisses, and smiles.

Lt. Col. Paul Novello's family was among the first to arrive and had been waiting for this moment since saying goodbye six months earlier. "We tracked a countdown on calendars," said P.J., Novello's 5-year old son. "We each got one for Christmas last year," added Gina, his 6-year-old daughter.

"It was very difficult having my husband gone," said Carolyn,

Novello's wife who wore a custom-made "Just Kiss Me!" T-shirt. "But it's so nice to have him back home because I have a huge to-do list for him," she added with a chuckle.

The family was able to keep in touch with the squadron's commander though e-mail and Skype video calls, but seeing him in person brought his 18-year-old daughter, Megan, to tears.

Staying in touch with the aid of technology was a common theme among the families. Kristen Salfas said her husband, Tech Sgt. Daniel Salfas, watched his son Ryan grow up one weekend at a time through an internet connection.

"It was so tough with him gone," Kristen said with a tear in her eye. "I'm so excited to finally have him home," she added as her 13-month-old son showed off his newly discovered walking skills.

When Salfas made his way through the passenger terminal's crowd, he hoisted his son high into the air before lowering him to a barrage of kisses. He then placed his son back in the stroller, carefully avoiding the welcome-home balloons and signs, and set his sights on Kristen. The reunited family then walked out of the terminal and headed home together for the first time in more than six months.

VA eases claims process for veterans with PTSD

WASHINGTON, July 12, 2010 - The Veterans Affairs Department will publish a final regulation tomorrow intended to ease the claims process and improve access to health care for veterans with post-traumatic stress disorder, VA officials announced today.

"This nation has a solemn obligation to the men and women who have honorably served this country and suffer from the often-devastating emotional wounds of war," Veterans Affairs Secretary Eric K. Shinseki said in a statement. "This final regulation goes a long way to ensure that veterans receive the benefits and services they need."

The new rule, to be published in the Federal Register, will relax the evidence requirement if the PTSD stressor claimed by a veteran is linked to "fear of hostile military or terrorist activity and is consistent with the places, types and circumstances of the veteran's service," a VA news release said.

Currently, VA decision makers are required to confirm that a noncombat veteran actually experienced a stressor related to hostile military activity, the release said.

Under the new rule, VA no longer will require substantiation of a stressor tied to fear of hostile military or terrorist activity if a VA psychiatrist or psychologist can confirm that the experience recalled by a veteran supports a PTSD diagnosis and the veteran's symptoms are related to the stressor, a VA release said.

"With this new PTSD regulation, we are acknowledging the inherently stressful nature ... of military service in which the reality and fear of hostile or terrorist activity is always present," Michael Walcoff, VA's acting undersecretary for benefits, said during a news conference today.

The regulation will eliminate the need to search for records to verify veterans' accounts, "often a very involved and protracted process," Walcoff said, and enable VA officials "to move more quickly to award more benefits to veterans suffering from PTSD."

More than 400,000 veterans currently are receiving compensation benefits for PTSD, VA officials said. And of the nearly 400,000 veterans treated at VA facilities for PTSD in fiscal 2009, nearly 70,000, or 19 percent, were veterans of operations Iraqi Freedom and Enduring Freedom.

Dr. Robert A. Petzel, VA's undersecretary for health, said the regulation will be particularly beneficial for veterans who have had their military records damaged or destroyed, female veterans whose records don't specify they have combat experience, and veterans who have experienced combat but have no record of it.

President Barack Obama called the changes a "long-overdue step" in his weekly address.

Morning PT run at Youth Camp 2010, Sea Girt



Obama announces return of the SAVE award

WASHINGTON, July 12, 2010 - President Barack Obama wants federal employees to submit their ideas for eliminating government waste and saving American taxpayers' money as part of the 2010 SAVE Award program.

Obama made the announcement in a video on the White House website July 8.

"If you see a way that the government can do its job better or do the same job for less money, I want to know about it," he said.

The program – its acronym stands for "securing Americans' value and efficiency" -- began last year and was an instant success.

"In just three weeks, federal employees submitted more than 38,000 ideas identifying opportunities to save money and improve performance," said Peter Orszag, director of the Office of Management and Budget.

Nancy Fichtner, a fiscal program support clerk at the Colorado Veterans Affairs Hospital in Grand Junction, Colo., received the 2009 SAVE award for her proposal that saved about \$2 million. She suggested that the Veterans Affairs Department find a way to reuse medicines that are prescribed by physicians, but not used by patients.

The deadline for submissions is July 22, with the winners being announced in September.

"In a change from last year, we also are asking federal employees to help rate the submissions from their fellow workers," Orszag said. "This new feature will allow employees to apply their insight to the evaluation process, making sure the best ideas make it into the fiscal 2012 budget."

Some of the most innovative ideas for efficiencies and savings come from those federal employees on the front lines, Obama said.
