'Perfect Storm' allows Jersey Guard to rise to occassion

When he was activated to respond to the post-Christmas blizzard of 2010, New Jersey Army National Guard Spc. Andy DeLeon was afraid there would be no action.

It turned out there was plenty.

In fact, DeLeon and his fellow Soldiers may have ended up saving some lives.

In the early morning hours of Dec. 28, DeLeon and Pfc. Brian Francione found themselves on Route 18 in Monmouth County, forcing their Humvee through five-foot snowdrifts to respond to reports of trapped motorists.

They stumbled across a scene almost from a movie. Scores of vehicles nearly buried in snow. A helicopterhovered overhead, sweeping a spotlight to cut through the darkness and the near whiteout conditions caused by howling winds.

"We started finding people in

some of those cars," DeLeon said. "One guy had run out of gas and was getting really cold. In another car, we found two guys who had been driving in



different cars and just decided to stay in one to save gas."

Most had been stuck for hours. As DeLeon and Francione worked, they saw another vehicle on the opposite side of the highway. They tried to force the Humvee across the median, but without any luck. They made their way across on foot, through waist-high snow.

The Soldiers reached the van and found Jessica Furlani, a nurse who had been making her way to her shift at a local hospital. She had been stuck in her car for 23 hours.

They helped Furlani out of her vehicle, gave her a ride to the Tinton Falls police station and then onto a makeshift shelter that had been set up at the AMC Theater at the Monmouth Mall.

She was among five people the Soldiers rescued that morn-

"It was amazing how all these people kept going that long. I'm sure that was something they didn't expect," said De-Leon said.

In all, nearly a dozen Soldiers responded to the storm, assisting more than a dozen motor-

DeLeon, a Signal specialist assigned to the 50th Infantry Brigade Combat Team Headquarters, said his duty during the storm was the most gratifying he's had in his two years in uniform

"It was an experience I won't forget. I'm glad I went ahead and took the duty," he said. "It was a good feeling to help people. You could see the joy on people's faces when we got to them."

ESGR is a Department of Defense agency established in 1972 whose mission is to develop and promote employer support for Guard and Reserve service by advocating relevant initiatives, recognizing outstanding support, increasing awareness of applicable laws, and resolving conflict between employers and service members. Vietnam Memorial Announces Scholarships for High School Seniors

Graduating seniors have until April 15, 2011, to submit their applications and essays to qualify for one of two scholarships offered by the New Jersey Vietnam Veterans' Memorial Foundation.

The scholarships, each in the amount of \$2,500, will be awarded to high school seniors from New Jersey who plan to further their education either at a college or university or trade/technical school.

Winners will be notified in early May and will be awarded the scholarship on Monday, May 30, 2011, during the Memorial Day Ceremony held at the New Jersey Vietnam Veterans' Memorial.

In addition to the scholarship application and proof of acceptance to a college or trade school, all applicants must submit an essay about his/her visit to the New Jersey Vietnam Veterans' Memorial, located off the Garden State Parkway at exit 116 in Holmdel.

To assist students in writing their essays, the Foundation offers free, veteran-led guided tours of the Memorial. Beginning February 5, 2011, and continuing through April 9, 2011, these tours are held every Saturday at 11 AM and at 1 PM. These tours are also available to the members of the general public who would like to learn more about the memorial. Tours are approximately 45 minutes in length.
