Mullen cites importance of remembrance in Memorial Day message

WASHINGTON, May 21, 2008 – Navy Adm. Mike Mullen, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, cited the importance of remembering the cost of freedom in a Memorial Day message to the armed forces.

His full message follows:

“Let no ravages of time testify to the present or the coming generations that we, as a people, have forgotten the cost of a free and undivided republic.”

“With that solemn promise, Army General John Logan signed the order in 1868 that established Memorial Day. We have honored his promise faithfully ever since, and this year – with our nation still at war and a new generation of heroes fighting and dying for freedom – we will do it again.

“The ‘cost’ of which Logan wrote is, of course, the blood spilt of those who paid the ultimate sacrifice for their country. It is the hardest currency of all, once spent never to be recouped, a debt we can never truly, fully repay.

“And yet, Memorial Day provides us the opportunity at the very least to acknowledge that debt, to recognize this incredible sacrifice and to recommit ourselves to making sure it wasn’t spent in vain.

“Upon the graves of our war dead – be they from Lexington and Concord; Gettysburg and Antietam; the Argonne Forest or the beaches of Normandy; Chosin and Inchon; Saigon and the Mekong Delta; Baghdad or Kandahar – rests not only the memories and the pride of valor past, but the hope and the vision of a better, more peaceful future.

“Please join me this Memorial Day in remembering, on behalf of present and coming generations, the deep and abiding debt we owe to our fallen and to their loved ones.”

There have been a lot of issues with tax W2s, pension statements and pay checks being returned to our office, as well as some employees not receiving their new health cards, all due to incorrect addresses. Your address change is not automatic and it is not limited to completing a new W4. There are specific forms for employees to complete that updates their new information statewide. Asian Pacific American Heritage Month

In an effort to celebrate the history and contributions of Asian/Pacific Islanders to the United States, in 1977, Reps. Frank Horton and Norman Mineta proposed to President Carter that the first 10 days of May be observed as Asian/Pacific Islander Heritage Week. The proposal was accepted and soon became an annual celebration. It was in 1990 that extended the celebration into an entire month. The month is meant to commemorate the arrival of the first Japanese immigrants in 1843 and the endless contributions of Asian Americans, such as the Chinese miners who died while helping to build the transcontinental railroad.

Throughout the history of our nation, Asian Pacific American service members have embodied the military core values for generations. From the birth of our nation to the current Global War on Terrorism, Asian Pacific American service members have effectively provided strength and leadership in defending freedoms of the United States.

DMAVA celebrates the contributions of Asian Pacific American service members and their importance to the nation in the past, present and future.

FACTS

Asian Americans

👉 In 2006, there were an estimated 14.9 million U.S. residents who said they were Asian or Asian in combination with one or more other races. This group comprised about 5 percent of the total population. California had the largest population (5 million) of this group. (U.S. Census Bureau)

👉 There are 3.6 million Asians of Chinese descent. Chinese Americans are the largest group followed by Filipinos (2.9 million), Asian Indians (2.7 million), Vietnamese (1.6 million), Koreans (1.5 million), and Japanese (1.2 million). (U.S. Census Bureau)

👉 Regarding education, 49 percent of single-race Asians 25 and older have a bachelor's degree or higher. This compares to 27 percent for all races 25 and older. (U.S. Census Bureau)

👉 In 2002, Asian Americans owned 1.1 million businesses. The rate of increase in the number Asian-owned businesses was about twice that of the national average for all businesses. (U.S. Census Bureau)

👉 After Spanish, Chinese is the second most widely spoken non-english language in the United States, with 2.5 million people age 5 and older who speak the language (U.S. Census Bureau)

Native Hawaiians and Pacific Islanders

👉 In July 2006, 1 million U.S. residents said they were Native Hawaiian or other Pacific Islander, or native Hawaiian or other Pacific Islander in combination with one or more other races. This group comprised 0.3 percent of the total population. (U.S. Census Bureau)

👉 In 2006, Hawaii had the largest population (275,000) of Native Hawaiians and other Pacific Islanders (either alone or in combination with one or more other races), followed by California (260,000) and Washington state (49,000). (U.S. Census Bureau)

👉 Fourteen percent of single-race Native Hawaiians and other Pacific Islanders 25 or older have at least a bachelor's degree. (U.S. Census Bureau)

👉 In 2002, 28,948 Native Hawaiians and other Pacific Islanders owned businesses, up 49 percent from 1997. The rate of growth was more than three times the national average. (U.S. Census Bureau)

👉 The median income of households headed by single-race Native Hawaiians and other Pacific Islanders is \$49,361. (U.S. Census Bureau)

Government

👉 The first Asian-American U.S. representative was Dalip Singh Saund in 1956, a native of Punjab, India. The first female Asian-American elected to Congress was Patsy Takemoto Mink in 1964, born in Maui, Hawaii.

👉 The first female Asian-American Cabinet member was Elaine Chao, a native of Taipei, Taiwan. Chao was appointed secretary of labor in 2001.

Science and Medicine

🦋 The first individual to successfully clone the AIDS virus was Flossie Wond-Staal, a Chinese American, in 1984.

🦋 In 1949, An Wang, also Chinese American, was the first to invent the small iron ring that served as the core of computer memory, until a decade later when the microchip was invented.

Entertainment

🦋 The first Asian Academy Award winner was Haing Ngor, a native to Samrong Young, Cambodia. Ngor won Best Supporting Actor of 1975 for his role in "The Killing Fields."

🦋 The first Asian-American network-news reporters were Japanese American Ken Kashiwahara and Chinese American Connie Chung in 1974. In 1993, Chung became the first Asian American to be a nightly news anchor for a major network (CBS).

Sports

🦋 The first Korean and Asian-American player to be drafted in the first round of an NFL draft was Eugene Chung in 1992, selected by New England.

🦋 In 1974, Japanese American Wataru Misaka became the first Asian American to play in the National Basketball Association (NBA), where he played for the New York Knicks.

A 40-percent discount for children of military personnel referenced above is available. Discount is not available with \$198 maximum military fare. No other discounts apply.

Only totally unused tickets may be refunded to the location of the original purchase. A 15-percent penalty fee applies upon refund. No refund will be allowed if any portion of the ticket has been used.

Departure date and time may be changed for a charge of \$10 per ticket provided that the advance purchase requirement is not violated.

Advance purchase tickets purchased over the phone require a minimum of ten days for delivery by mail and for online orders. Casino, commuter, Discovery Pass, student or other special military fares do not qualify for the military discount.

Fares are subject to change until purchase and may be higher during peak holiday travel periods. The 10 percent discount may not be used in conjunction with the \$198 maximum fare.
