Women served as

1775-1783; The American Revolutionary War



1861-1865; The Civil War

Thousands of women volunteered as nurses to serve as caretakers for wounded soldiers on both sides of the conflict. Over 21,000 women served the Union alone.



For the first time women could officially serve as part of the US Army and Navy in medical and support capacities.

1901-1908; Army & Navy Nurse Corps Created



congress passes legislation allowing women to enroll in US Military Academies for the first time, beginning in 1976.

1917-1918; World War I Over 30,000 military women across the Army, Navy, and Marines contribute to the war effort as not only nurses, but as clerical workers and telephone operators.

1941-1948; World War II & Aftermath More than 350,000 women now serve in all branches of the military, including as support pilots. By 1948 women were granted permanent status within regular armed forces. 1976;

Women Admitted to Service Academies



40,000 women are deployed to the Persian Gulf, serving a variety of functions from logistics, to aviation, to intelligence operations.

1991; The Gulf War



2013-2016: Combat Roles for Women Open

In 2013, the Department of Defense lifted the ban on women serving in combat roles. By 2016 this was expanded to include infantry and special forces.

Today, women serve in every branch of the military, contributing across combat, leadership, and technical roles. Their service reflects the evolving strength and readiness of our armed forces.
