# Overview of EPCRA and the SERC



### **EPCRA Background**



- Emergency Planning and Community Right to Know Act (EPCRA) was passed by Congress in 1986
- Triggered by 1984 chemical disaster in Bhopal, India
- Addressed hazmat planning and reporting for all levels of government, as well as private sector industry
- New Jersey addressed EPCRA compliance in 1987 when Gov. Kean issued Executive Order #161 establishing NJ's State Emergency Response Commission (SERC)
- In January 2022, Governor Murphy issued Executive Order #284, clarifying the role and responsibilities of the SERC and providing flexibility to redistrict, together increasing effectiveness of the SERC's supervision



### Scope of EPCRA Planning



- Each year, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency publishes a Consolidated List of Lists, which contains Extremely Hazardous Substances (EHS). Facilities that contain EHS over a certain Threshold Planning Quantity (TPQ) are subject to EPCRA planning.

### Responsibilities of the SERC




- Designate Emergency Planning Districts
- Delegate appointment of Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) members to local elected officials and emergency management coordinators
- Provide leadership, resources, and expertise to support LEPCs

# LEPC Purpose and Responsibilities

Perform duties under Emergency Planning and Community Right to Know Act (EPCRA), Executive Order 161, and Executive Order 284 for the designated "Emergency Planning District."

- ✓ Enhance hazmat awareness, preparedness, and response
- ✓ Optimize safety of first responders, workers and the public
- ✓ Make information available to the public


### LEPC ≠ LEMC/CEMC



### Distinction between the LEPC and the LEMC/CEMC

Executive Order 161 (1987) Executive Order 284 (2022)	Directive NJOEM-5 (2022) Directive NJOEM-9 (2022)
Jurisdiction is the Emergency Planning District designated by the SERC	Jurisdiction is the political boundary, per the provisions of the Disaster Control Act
Deals with EPCRA and the Off-site Emergency Response Plan (ERP) - MUST be made available to the public	Deals with the all-hazards Emergency Operations Plan (EOP) - Treated as a protected document

### LEPC Primary Responsibilities



### Publicly Available Documents

EPCRA mandates public access to the following, pursuant to 42 USC § 11044:

- √ Off-site ERP
- ✓ Safety Data Sheet (SDS) or list of hazardous chemicals submitted by facilities
- ✓ Right-to-Know (RTK) surveys <u>if requested</u> for a specific facility (LEPC has 45 days to provide)
- ✓ Toxic chemical release forms and followup reports

### Access to Documents

Restricted to a "reading room" during normal business hours

- ✓ By appointment or through set hours (must be reasonable access)
- √ No photocopying or taking pictures
- ✓ Requests to view the Off-site ERP and related documents should be processed through the LEPC Information Coordinator, not as a regular OPRA request

DO NOT PROVIDE PHOTOCOPIES IN LIEU OF MAKING THE DOCUMENTS AVAILABLE IN A READING ROOM.

### **Public Notice**

LEPCs must publish an annual notice in local newspapers to inform the public about:

- ✓ Information available through the LEPC pursuant to Executive Order 284
- √ How the public can access the information
- ✓ Date, time and location of the annual LEPC meeting

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

## When should you update the Off-site Emergency Response Plan?

- The best data is available in August of any given year
  - Facilities that report to DEP <u>should</u> annually report their current surveys by March 1<sup>st</sup>
  - Facilities that report to DOH <u>should</u> annually report their current surveys by July 15<sup>th</sup>
- We ask that LEPCs submit the updated Off-site ERPs by December 1<sup>st</sup>
- The SERC will then review all ERPs by the end of the year

  - LEPC exercise completion
  - ERP update

### **SERC Policy on Exercising the Off-site ERP**

The NJ SERC requires LEPCs to conduct or participate in an annual exercise to test various elements of the Off-site Emergency Response Plan (ERP). These exercises can either be standalone LEPC exercises, or as part of emergency management exercises required to satisfy other statutory guidance or NJOEM directives, provided that elements of the ERP are incorporated.

 See Directive NJOEM-14 (2024) for county and municipal OEM exercise requirements



### Exercising the Off-site ERP



- Possible elements of the plan to exercise:
  - Response procedures for facility workers and first responders to chemical releases
  - Chemical release notification procedures:
    - for facilities to notify persons designated in the Off-site ERP
    - for emergency coordinators to notify the public
  - Methods for determining the occurrence of a release, and the area or population likely to be affected by such release
  - Evacuation plans, including provisions for a precautionary evacuation and alternative traffic routes



### Examples of Qualifying Exercises



- Call down notification drill (test communications/current contacts)
- Public notification systems drill for shelter-in-place or evacuation
- US EPA funded and sponsored TTX Template
  - Six counties completed/in process
  - US EPA committed to funding contracted support for three additional exercises
  - Exercise materials are available from the SERC via the website

### **US EPA Exercise Objectives**



- Test the Off-site ERP provisions for:
  - Internal notification of a chemical release incident from an EPCRA-regulated facility
  - Assessment, internal communication, coordination, and decision-making regarding protective actions for the public
  - Notifying the public in response to a chemical release
  - Documenting chemical release incidents and evaluating the effectiveness of agencies' ability to share results and evaluate the incident response and share the results with stakeholders and the public
