Requirements:



The NJSP Internship Program requires a minimum of 60 credits earned; a 2.5 GPA; and the ability to work in a professional environment.

You will need to prepare and submit your resume and a letter prepared by your college internship coordinator (on college/university letterhead), attesting to your registration in an internship course for credit, and that you have attained the minimum of 60 credits, and have earned a GPA of 2.5 or higher. Be sure to include your specialized skills and the degree that you are pursuing on your resume.

After the application deadline, interns will be submitted for a background check. Following the background investigations, this office will notify all suitable intern candidates of the date/time/location of the mandatory internship program orientation seminar. At that session, students will be provided with their internship assignment, along with a contact person and phone number. In many cases, a representative of that Troop, Bureau or Unit will be present to meet with small groups of students assigned to that particular location. Internship assignments are based upon the

operational needs of the Division. However, consideration is also given to the academic interest and preparedness of the student, and proximity of the assignment to the student's residence.

Deadlines are as follows: Fall Semester- July 20 Spring Semester- November 24 Summer Semester- April 24
