Program Summary

This *interactive* seminar will present a practical approach to handling motions to suppress evidence by offering an easy-to-use analytical model that works in practically every kind of police-citizen encounter and that can help prosecutors quickly identify and resolve the legal and factual issues that are actually in dispute. The seminar will include an update on significant recent search and seizure decisions. The bulk of the seminar will be devoted to building and then dissecting a fact pattern based upon an incomplete police report. Attendees will be asked to ascertain the relevant facts, identify the legal issues, objectively evaluate the likelihood that evidence would be suppressed, determine how best to create a solid record at a suppression hearing, and marshal the strongest possible legal arguments in support of the admissibility of seized evidence.

Who Should Attend?

This program is intended for experienced assistant prosecutors and deputy attorneys general who handle criminal matters.

Who Is the Faculty?

AAG Ron Susswein has served for a combined 29 years as a DAG/AAG in the Division of Criminal Justice and the Union County Prosecutor's Office. During his career, AAG Susswein helped to draft many of the Attorney General directives and guidelines that are designed to channel a prosecutor's plea bargaining discretion, including the policies concerning "Brimage," "Graves Act," "NERA," and public corruption cases.
