Program Summary

The issuance in 2007 of the New Jersey Attorney General's Guidelines governing the interaction of law enforcement with federal immigration authorities, and more recently the New Jersey Supreme Court's decision to allow higher bail against aliens facing deportation and this year's landmark United States Supreme Court decision in *Padilla v. Kentucky* that extends the Sixth Amendment guarantee of effective assistance of counsel to advice on deportation, all underscore how immigration law and criminal practice have become inextricably enmeshed. No less than criminal defense attorneys, county and state prosecutors should be conversant with the basics of immigration law and understand how these laws may impact upon prosecuting non-citizens. This presentation will provide a general overview of relevant federal laws and important practice pointers for new and experienced prosecutors.

Who Should Attend?
